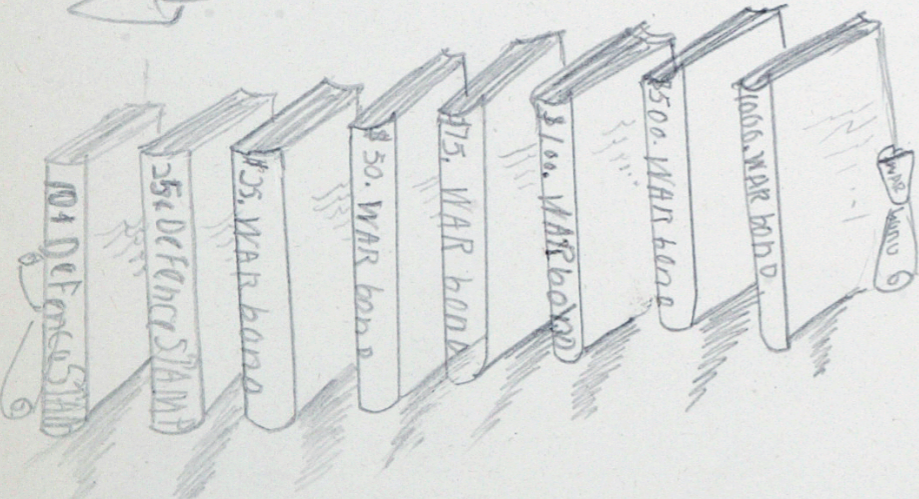
What We're Doing
