



- (4) pennies put in circulation







The pupils of Lincoln School are glad to have a part in developing a co-ordinated program of the various war activities in which we are capable of participating.


Such a program, we feel, has its educational value to the extent that we have learned to save, to economize, to share, and to be aware of the great responsibilities that confront us.

The activities participated in by teachers, patrons, and students have been, namely:


- (1) buying stamps regularly;
- (2) conservation of all kinds of materials;
- (3) collecting of scrap rubber, paper, tin, copper, iron, etc.
- (4) putting pennies into circulation.

During the "Scrap Drive" more than eleven tons of metal, 900 pounds of rubber, and two and one-half tons of paper were turned in by the 225 students enrolled in the school.

We shall continue to do our part as members of the "Little Army" on the home front, doing its bit for the country we love and enjoy.

bread, butter, and milk—a typical filling army meal.


This picture of Sergeant York is being used to adorn the front of a Food for Freedom poster, recently distributed all over the nation by the department of agriculture.



**Salute** Deciding the old manner of saluting the flag in the pledge of allegiance was to nearly the Nazi method of honoring their leader congress has amended the flag code to provide for holding the hand over the heart throughout the pledge of allegiance. **Salute To The Flag  
In Proper Manner**

The pledge of allegiance to the flag, "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation indivisible, with liberty and justice for all," is rendered by standing with the right hand over the heart; extending the right hand, palm upward, toward the flag at the words "to the flag" and holding this position until the end, when the hand drops to the side. However, civilians will always show full respect to the flag when the pledge is given by merely standing at attention, men removing the headdress. Persons in uniform shall render the military salute.
