

Daily, as the scrap pile at the Millwood school on North East-ern avenue grows, the 13-year-old American-born son of Japanese parents is proving he's an Amer-

Eugene (it's Admiral Eugene now to his classmates) is head of one of the two Millwood school teams chosen to carry on the salvage campaign in the neighborhood. The size of the pile in front of the school building will testify to his efforts and to those of 13-year-old Neal Main, chief of the other squad.

THE school is divided into two teams, one bearing the navy's banner and headed by the Japanese boy, and the other dubbed the army. When the contest started last week to see which team could bring in the most scrap, both teams dove into the fight with a will. In fact, the puryls became so conthused over the competition that it was decided Tuesday to pool the scrap contributed by both

Because he is one of the more popular boys in the school and because he had done such a good job last time when the school children set out to contribute scrap, Eugene Nakayama became one of the captains when the new drive was inaugurated.

Intelligent, (his teachers say he is an excellent pupil) cheerful Eugene is the son of Lloyd Nakayama, a truck farmer living about 2½ miles from the school. The boy was born in Colorado and has lived in Oklahoma county about eight years. His parents were born in Japan.

MISS EVA J. CLIFFORD, teacher at Millwood school, is as enthusiastic about the results of the children's scrap drive as any one of them. She likes to recall that in the last scrap drive her school led the rural schools by collecting more than 6,500 pounds of metal, 500 pounds of rubber and several truck loads of paper.



It's the old army (and navy) game at the Millwood school that is helping to bring in the scrap. Dividing the school into two teams brought so much competition that a unified command was decreed and the groups joined forces. Even though the school gathered so much scrap in the last drive that it

was able to buy two war bonds with the proceeds, the neighborhood once again is supplying a huge collection. Girls as well as boys are busy on the drive as is evidenced by this picture of June King and Eugene Tharp from the army team and John Clifford and Maxine Phillips of the navy squadron.


