



Our school children were taught the significance of the American Creed and given the slogan, "American Creed: Need! Speed!", and armed with the motto, "In God We Trust", and encouraged to go forth and collect metal, rubber and rags for "Uncle Sam" who is in great need for great speed.

In the first week of the big drive 10,105 pounds of scrap was collected; the remaining 9,895 pounds came in more slowly, but 20,000 pounds were collected during the drive and \$98.85 was realized from its sale.

The smaller children brought in names and addresses of those who had scrap to donate and the older children saw that it was "carted" in. Heavier loads were hauled by parents and friends in trucks and private cars.

The children still collect and sell scrap, as well as caring for younger children, selling newspapers and magazines, passing hand bills, delivering groceries, delivering for drug stores, milking cows, feeding chickens, selling and picking peanuts, helping with household duties, etc.

Amount invested in stamps and bonds, \$3,000.00. The goal set was \$900.00 to buy a jeep- enough has so far been realized to buy three and one-half jeeps and we are trying to finish the remaining one-half so that in another month or so there will be a fourth jeep.

The American Creed, the Gettysburg Address and the Flag Salute are part of the daily program. All the national posters received have been posted, and pupils are encouraged to put their own ideas on posters.
