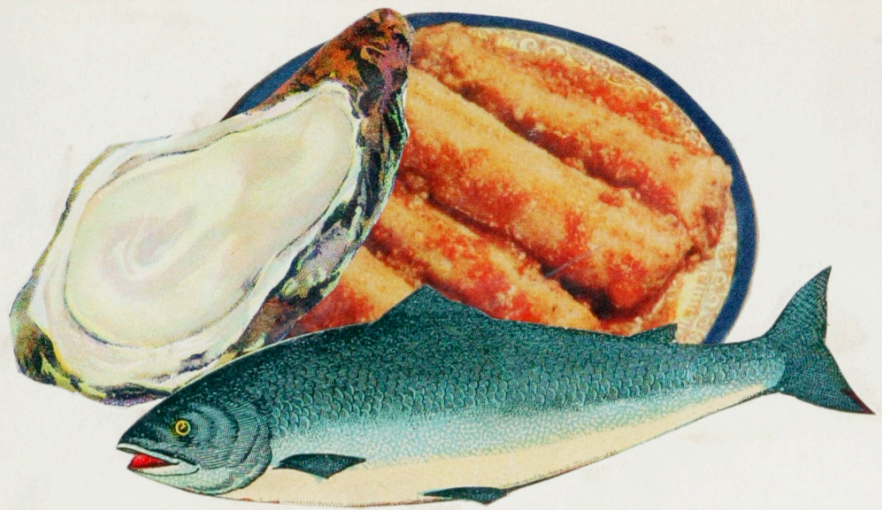

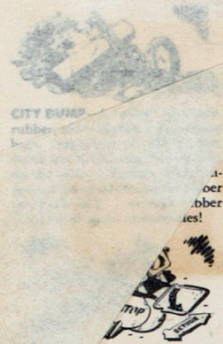

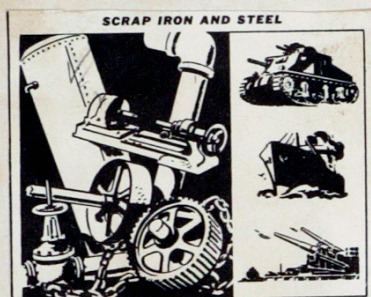

50% of every tank, ship, and gun is made of scrap iron and steel!

Other metals—Rubber—Rags—
Manila rope—Burlap bags



Thousands of tons of these materials are needed to make bombs, tires for jeeps, surgical supplies for military hospitals, wiping rags for guns, insulation for electric wiring, parachute flares and sandbags.

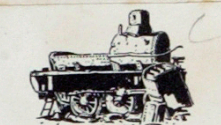

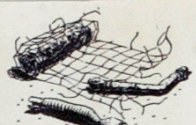

OLD LOCOMOTIVE PARTS . . . staybolts, pistons, cylinders, boiler sections and grates . . . hundreds of such parts are lying in empty lots. Dig them out! It takes 500 pounds of scrap like this for every 2,000-pound aerial bomb!



WORN-OUT FROGS . . . plates, rails, spikes, bolts and other right-of-way waste. Every pound of it will make two hand grenades. Look for steel grease drums, guard rails, rail skids and car stops. One road found 5,000 tons of steel in 125 crossings . . . enough scrap for nearly 400 medium tanks!



FENCE WIRE . . . Miles of unused wire are found on nearly every right-of-way. Also needed are tons of rubber air and water hose, floor mats and bumpers that are now helping nobody. A 10-ton pontoon bridge uses almost *two tons* of rubber. So get in the scrap!



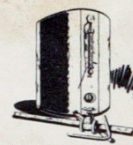

ABANDONED BUILDINGS—both municipal and private, yield tons of steel beams, electric wiring, door-knobs, hinges, plumbing and fixtures—all kinds of sorely-needed metals. Tear down these civic eye-sores . . . or send the names of their owners to the Special Projects Section, Conservation Division, War Production Board, Washington, D. C.



AUTOMOTIVE EQUIPMENT—Worn-out parts of old fire engines, police cars, ash trucks. The Fire Dept. of Davis, Cal. collected over 40 tons of scrap iron. Remember—every ton of useless crankshafts, cylinder blocks and gears supplies enough scrap for a 75 mm. howitzer!



POWER PLANT SCRAP—parts of engines, boilers and furnaces . . . pumps, pipes and valves. Round them up! The Minneapolis Water Dept. alone collected 1326 tons of scrap iron. Such items as steam pumps count up fast. One old boiler may provide enough scrap steel for 15 one-ton aerial bombs!



OLD FIRE HOSE—also hand tools, machine shop scrap. Nothing is too large or too small. Start looking *now* . . . dig it out today and bomb the Japs with junk!



CITY DUMP—A "mine" of metals, rubber, often Manila rope, burlap bags. Inspectors of police, fire, water and health dept.'s should be on the alert. A Buffalo smoke inspector found 400 lbs. of old rubber in a back yard . . . enough rubber scrap for 40 scout motorcycles!



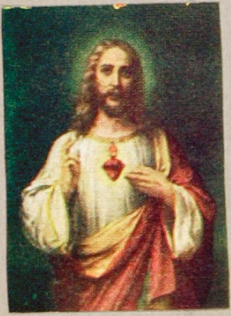
TRAFFIC SIGNS—Old traffic standards, iron fences, disused street car tracks and metal monuments are being turned into tanks and shells. The Governor of Mississippi started at home . . . found over three tons of scrap within the state capitol building! Get behind the Scrap campaign today!

HERE'S WHAT TO DO . . . Appoint one man as Salvage Manager for your department. Give him authority to *act*—to condemn old equipment, to move material, to collect scrap of all kinds. Have him separate all scrap by type. Then move it promptly through your regular scrap dealers. Don't wait—start rounding up scrap *now*—and keep it moving until the war is won!

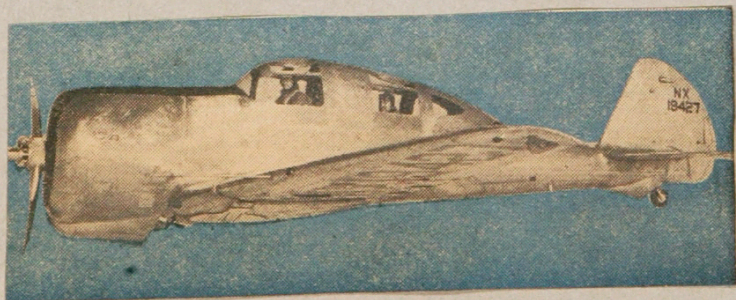

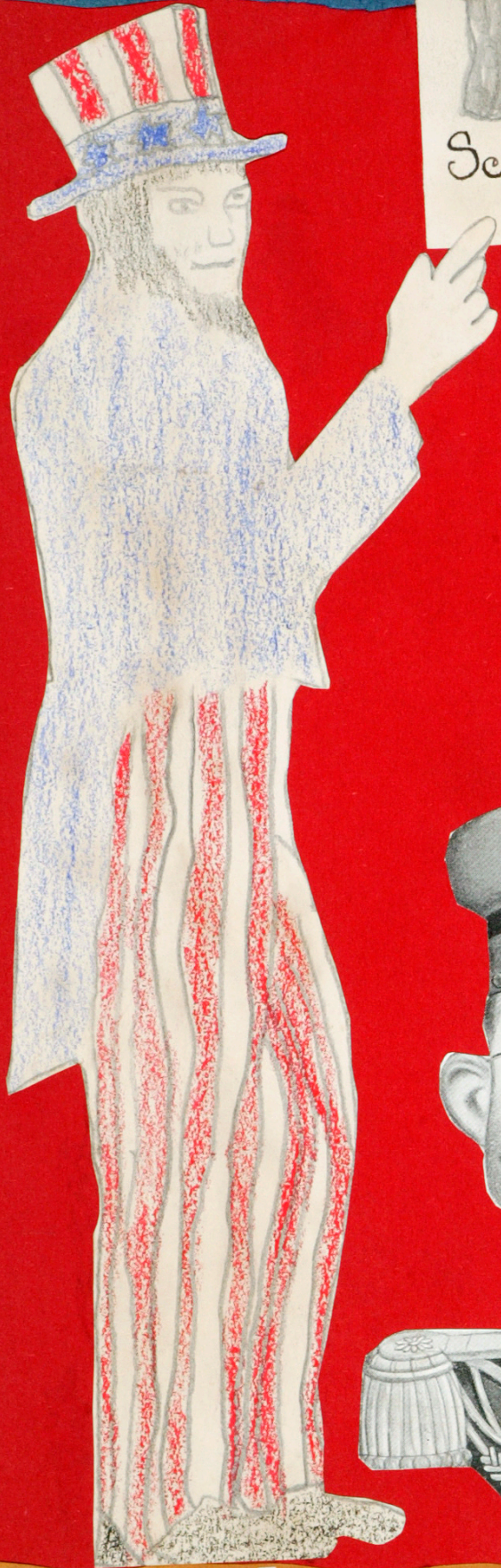
