





### SCHOOL BACKGROUND

Wright City is a small town located in Southeastern Oklahoma, between Glover and Little River. It is primarily an industrial center, producing lumber which is essential to the war effort. A large percent of the employees are on the ten percent plan.


More than seventy-five percent of the four hundred students have stamp books and are buying stamps at the regular weekly assembly programs. The teachers are encouraging this program, both by teaching and example.

Wright City graduates and students may be found in all branches of the Armed Services. Most of them were volunteers and several more will enter the services at the end of this school year.


### SALE OF DEFENSE STAMPS

Each student and teacher is actively participating in buying stamps following each week's assembly program.



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Fourth Grade








Sixth Grade

The following groups of pictures, with explanations give some idea of our contribution.

### Aeronautics Class

A General Aeronautics Class is being offered to juniors and seniors only. There are twenty-four enrolled in the class, five of the membership being girls. The class is taught by a Government Liscensed Instructor and one unit of high school credit is offered.

Wright City, Oklahoma Weekly Fire Drill Weekly Fire Drill
December 22, 1942

The regular weekly fire drill was held following sounding of the practice signal at 1:30 today.

This practice drill was perhaps the most spectacular ever held in Wright City as not a menber of the regular fire crew reported in accordance with pre-arranged plans. Instead the following Boy Scouts reported at the office of Mr. E. C. Turner for final instructions, namely:

Using the truck, a practice run with all boys on board carried the fire crew to an imaginary fire in the residential section where a section of the main line (27th) hose was connected in record time by Scouts Pete Blackburn and J. R. Womack. Scouts Gene Thompson and Doyle Lowthers manned the Hydrant Hose nozzle spraying the home of Sawyer E. Fulton with water while Scouts Peg Fulton and Herman Wood with the aid of the large Truck Ladder assisted Scouts Brunson and Bobbie Harris to the roofs of two different dwellings. Scouts Maurice Veteto and Ralph Moore manned the roof ladder, laying same with hooks correctly set on three separate roofs to be followed by Scouts Cosper with the auxilary tank hose nozzle in spraying imaginary roof fires on three roofs. Scout Loyd Allen manned the reel with Scout McCartney assisting with closing and opening the auxiliary tank valves. Scouts Harvey Ben Wooden, Thomas Crutchfield and Jack Forga acted as watchers with Scouts Robert Forga, Robert Cook, Bobbie Brunson, Bobbie Harris and Haskell Webb as individual house watchers for roof fires. The homes of E. Fulton, H. A. Wooden and M. C. Horten were used as the objects of the fire drill and practice.

This practice run and drill is the results of a school of Firemanship sponsored here by E. C. Turner and O. P. Ahhen,

This practice drill was parished The regular weekly fire drill was held following sounding of the practice signal at 1:50 today. Wright City, Oklahome Weekly Fire Drill Degember 22, 1942 in which the boys named above completed 24 clock hours of work and practice instruction along with Harvey Crutchfield and W. W. Veteto. Immediately preceeding the fire drill Mr. Turner organized the group into an Auxiliary fire brigade and administered the Spartan Oath of Allegiance to the fire department. ### Get in the Scrap

NATIONAL SALVAGE PROGRAM

The first week in October a faculty meeting was held to make plans for active participation in the National Salvage Program.

As the scrap campaign was already under way in our town most children in school were already actively participating. By means of posters, etc, each student was urged to keep up the Scrap Campaign. The collected scrap was purchased by Dierks Lumber and Coal Company and then turned over to the government.

The members of the high school boy scout troop collected 3,500 pounds of scrap iron in one day and 500 pounds of rubber.

CROWNING OF HOME-COMING QUEEN

The crowning of the home-coming queen, Mary Brodie, carried out the patriotic idea from the decorations and costumes to the crown used in crowning the queen which was made of Five dollars worth of ten and twenty-five cent defense stamps.

The Flag was advanced by a Boy Scout Color Guard as the football team and pep squad sang "The Star Spangled Banner".

The royal procession was made up of the following:

Two small heralds dressed in white and red uniforms and carrying red, white and blue bugles; two flower girls dressed in white, and red costumes; the crown bearer dressed in blue and carrying a red white and blue pillow with the crown resting on it. Then came the queen and her maids, each dressed in a red, white, or blue dress.

The queen's throne was covered in red, white and blue bunting.








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Each grade in our school has actively participated in some activity to further the war effort.

The first and fifth grades sold old glory buttons to

purchase Victory shields for their rooms.

The second and third grades made patriotic borders for their rooms. They were emphasizing the selling of defense stamps and bonds.

The other grades assisted in the scrap iron drive and

bought defense stamps.

In high school we have three mathematics classes, four science classes and a commercial department which are train-


ing students to help in defense work.

In our Home Economic Department special emphasis is being placed on the renovation of old clothing. A large number of the Home Economics girls enrolled in a Red Cross First Aid class. They are now making red cross pajamas and red cross sweaters in class, and starting units on Nutritien to meet the food shortages.

On Armistice day a special program was held at eleven o'clock, sponsored by the local American Legion Post. The program was presented in the high school auditorium and contained numbers by Rhythm Band, dressed in red and white uniforms; and a pageant "The Story of the World War", by high school students, assisted by the glee club.

Each lady teacher wore a defense stamp corsage Armistice
