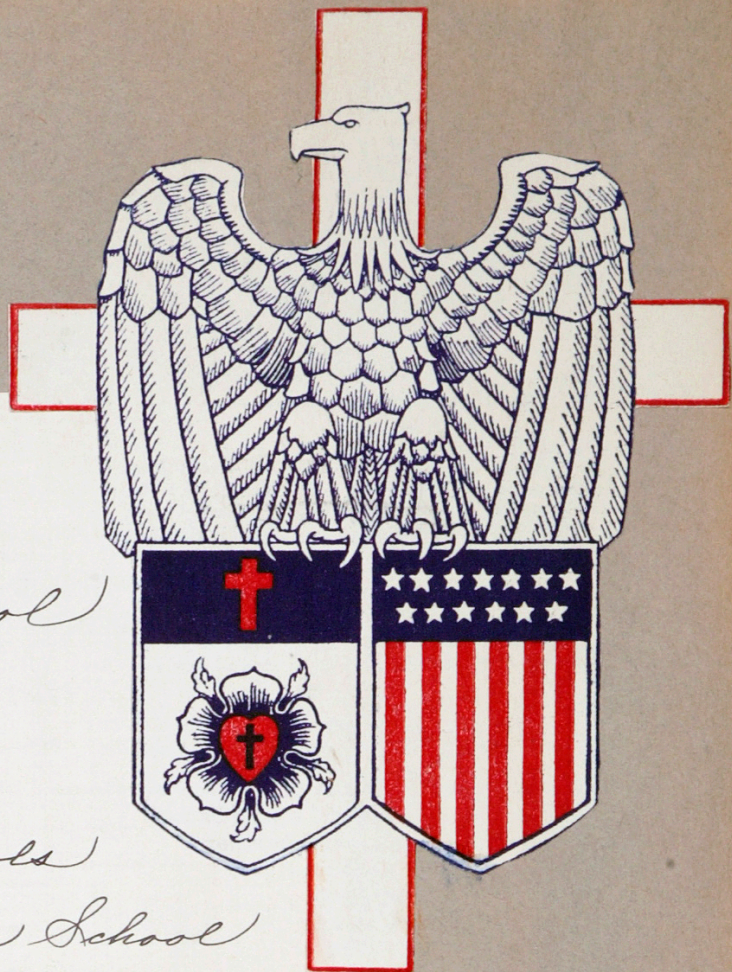

help the war effort.

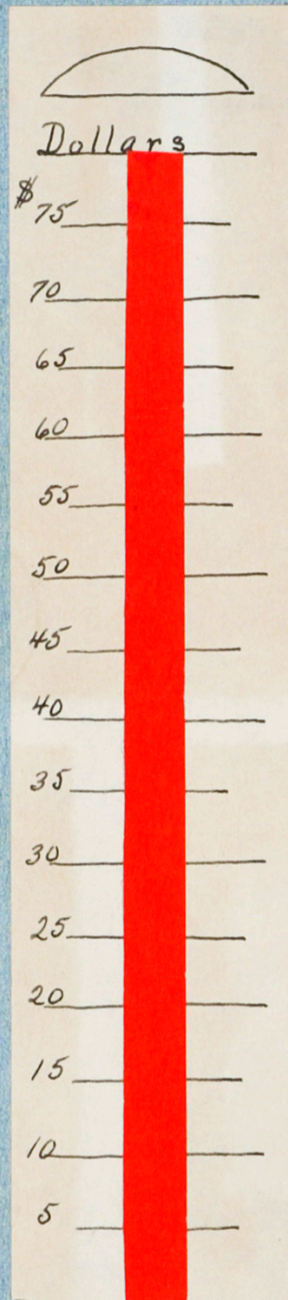
In addition to the above

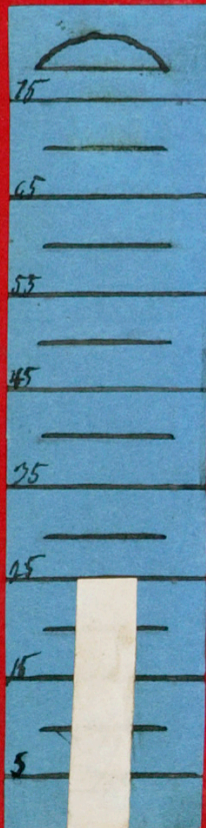

Dollars in Bonds and Stamps



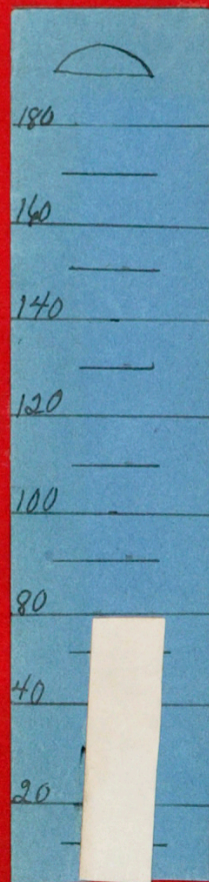

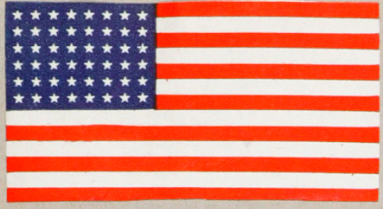

SCRAP



County's Scrap Drive Gains Impetus; Per Capita Figure Hiked To 14 Pounds

New Donations Raise Total To 353,537 Pounds

The county's all-out scrap campaign Thursday continued to gain impetus, officials reporting total donations of 353,537 pounds, or 14 pounds per capita for county citizens, having been officially receipted for at accredited salvage yards.

J. M. Dolph, chairman, explained that this figure included none of the scrap collected by school children in an extensive drive Tuesday.

Schools Are Tabulating

Scrap gathered by the young school army still was being hauled from powering piles at respective city schools to salvage yards, delaying final tabulations of the total collected.

Scattered reports from schools, however, listed some 46,000 pounds for the high school, 20,000 pounds for Capitol, and two tons for the Lutheran institution which is not a member of the city school system.

Final tabulations for the schools were expected to well surpass the 100,000 pound mark, substantially adding to the county's total in the newspaper-sponsored drive.

Urged To Turn In Scrap

Dolph pointed out the drive will continue through October 17, and urged residents throughout the county to accelerate, not slow down, in efforts to glean all possible Logan scrap for the nation's war machines.

All county communities were urged to send in all scrap collected to accredited salvage yards as fast as it is gathered, thus aiding in raising the county's standing in the state-wide contest for which prizes will be awarded.

Prizes also are posted for schools turning in the largest amount of scrap during the drive. Adults, as well as children, may continue to turn in scrap and have it credited to any school they desire until the drive closes.

The county sheriff's office Thursday was seeking a destruction order for six stills seized in recent raids. All metal from the stills will be donated to the scrap drive.

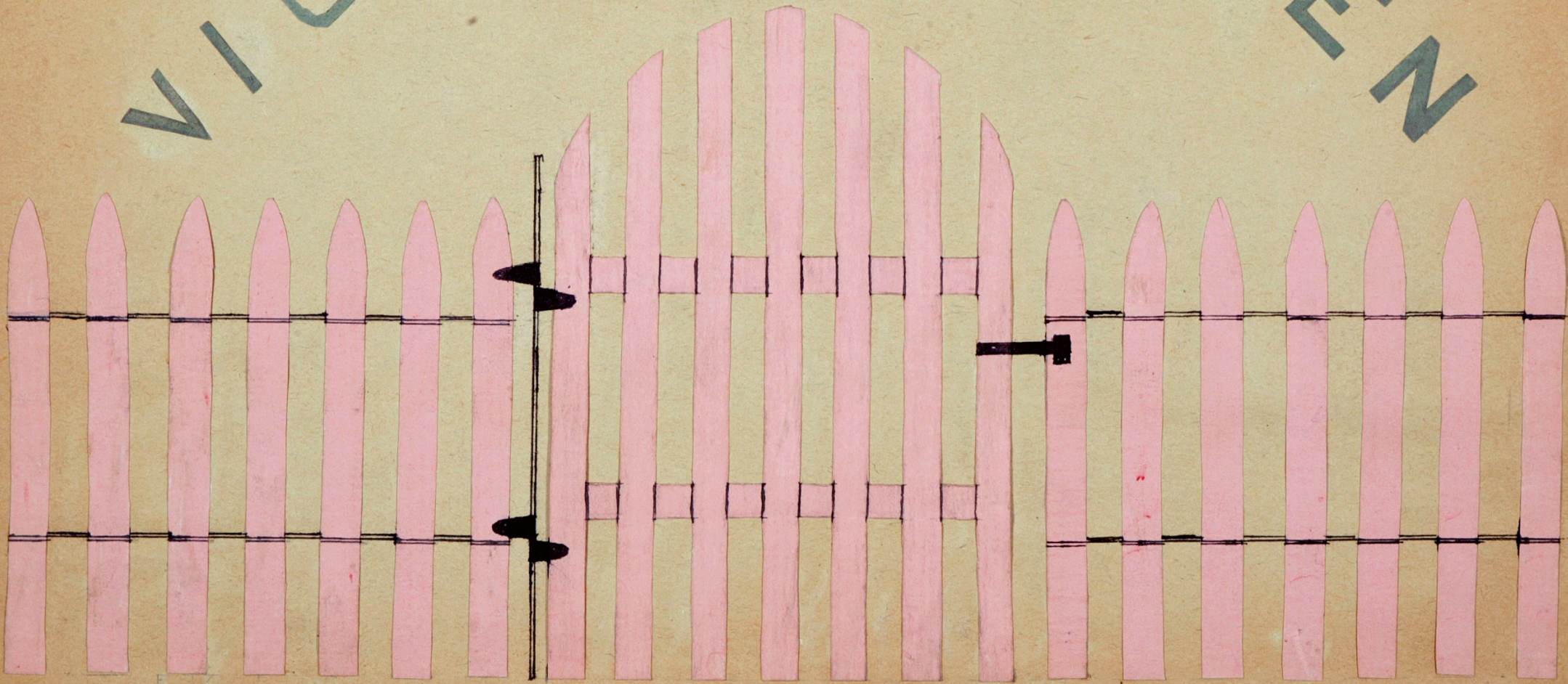

How I can Help to win the War

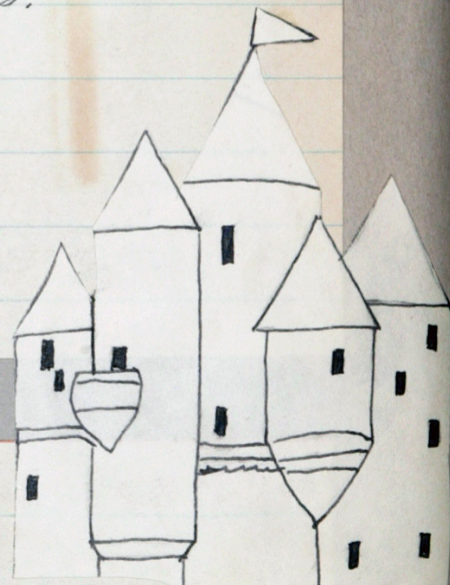
