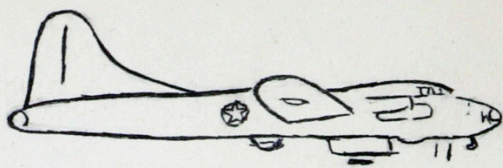
# The European Conflict Becomes a Global War.

WAR ACTIVITIES at ST. JOSEPH ACADEMY

Take care of children.

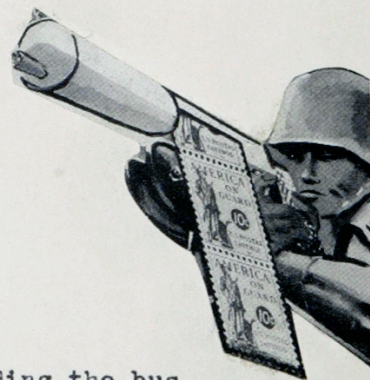
