Wherever you see one of these flags flying, you'll know there is a fighting Ally close at hand. Here's a chance to get better acquainted with your comrades in arms. You'll see that some of the flags represent governments in exile—Belgium, Poland, Norway, The Netherlands, Greece, Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia, Luxembourg, the Philippines—whose homelands have been conquered and despoiled, but whose valiant people are still in there punching under their national battle standards. All 29 flags represent countries now at war with the Axis powers. All but one are

members of the United Nations. The one exception is Brazil, which has declared war on the Axis, but which has not yet officially joined. Twelve of the 29 represent countries in the Western Hemisphere—the United States and our neighbors of the Americas. First in the bottom row is the flag of the Commonwealth of the Philippines. Still a dependency of the United States (independence comes in 1946), the Philippines flies its flag only with the Stars and Stripes. But its brave people and their exiled government surely have won a place for their national emblem beside the other 28 Flags of Liberty.

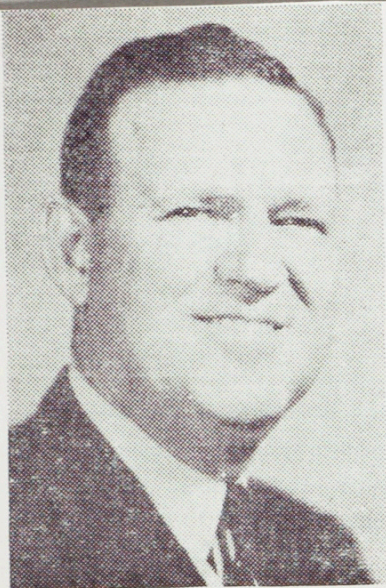

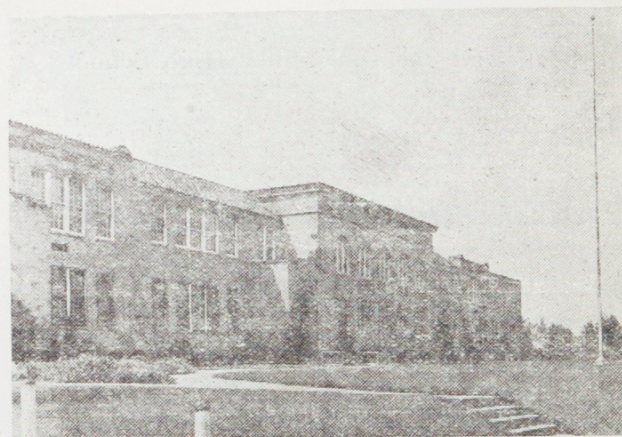
No greater responsibility can be assumed than that of directing the activities and promoting the welfare of the youth of our community.

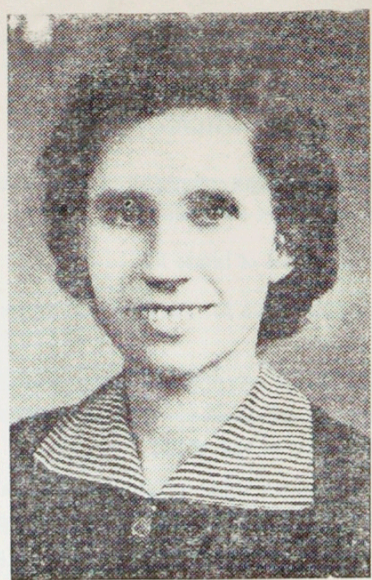
TIN CAN DRIVE

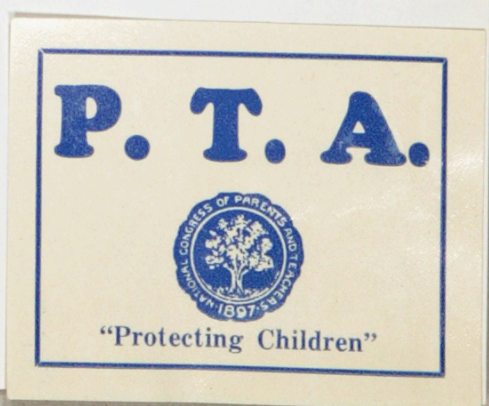
