2,000,000 Pounds of Scrap Flood County Salvage Yards

Kay Leaders Declare Figure to Mount When Students Make Out Full Reports

NEWKIRK-More than 2,000,000 pounds of scrap flooded into salvage

yards throughout Kay county during the first two weeks of the all-out drive sponsored by newspapers, an unofficial survey disclosed Saturday.

The unofficial poundage was placed at 2,217,646 for all salvage yards in the county, but leaders declared the figure was probably far below the amount that will be officially recorded when the drive ends next Sat-

Nevertheless, even the unofficial total gave the county an average collection of 47.09 pounds per person and leaders pointed toward a final figure that might reach considerably above a 100-pound average.

The ace in the hole for the next week will be the salvage drives under way in nearly all school districts in the county where students gathered up huge piles of scrap during the first five days of their two-week

campaign.

The collections on the school grounds will continue growing until next Friday night when the school salvage drive will close. Teachers immedaitely will forward to Mrs.

Ted R. Fisher, county superintendent, the total amount of the scrap collected and the per capita pounds for each student in their schools.

Summary Is Prepared

A summary of the scrap collections at all schools in the county will be submitted to A. L. Crable, state superintendent of public instruction, for consideration for the 50 awards and recognition honors offered by state newspapers.

Mrs. Fisher said Saturday that statements on weights collected by each school and signed by the teachers were sufficient to make the final report official in the tabulation to be submitted to Crable.

Recent reports from several rural schools showed Kildare district 50, with more than six tons, Washunga, district 89, with more than one truck load, and Banner, district 35, with exactly 4,831.5 pounds.

Students Go All-Out

In independent districts Newkirk students went all-out in the campaign and collected 73,309 pounds of scrap in the first 24 hours of the drive that started Thursday afternoon. The collection was an average of 146.5 pounds per pupil.

At Ponca City the


was an average of 146.5 pounds per pupil.

At Ponca City the schools Friday had a total of 241,643 pounds, or an average of 58.9 pounds per student. At Kaw City the school children brought in more than 60,000 pounds in four days.

The biggest boost yet reported in the current drive came from Ponca City where the Continental Oil company turned over 1,376,000 pounds, or 688 tons, since the opening of the newspaper campaign September 28. The large receipts were provided by a reconstruction program under way at the company's refinery, company officials explained.


School at Three Sands Plans Annual Carnival
