





# County Over ScrapAverage

Scrap metal continued to come nto dealers yards in Payne county Monday as drive leaders attempted to compile contest figures for the United Newspapers drive which

United Newspapers drive which ended Saturday.
Payne county, with more than 3,000,000 pounds already counted, has a per capita average of about 72 pounds, which is far above the state average of 59.96 pounds, but much lower than the minimum 100 pounds out a subject of the state average of the state aver bound quota allotted.

Cimarron county, with tons of rails from 15 miles of abandoned railroad furnishing the impetus, soared into first place in the newspaper-sponsored scrap metal drive Monday with a total of 3,538,617 pounds and a per-capita mark of 968,42.

Since Cimarron is the Since Cimarron is the states from the population angle, having but 3,654 people, the 15 miles of rails, removed and sold between Oct. 1 and 12, gave it a tremendous boost. All but 437,000 pounds of the county's total ame from the rails.

J. I. Meyerson, executive assistant of the campaign which officialy closed Saturday, said he was ertain the state would go over the 00-pounds-per-person goal.

Large industrial counties of the state have been asked to make a close check of "direct shipments" made by plants. These shipments may bring the state average up to 100 pounds per capita for the contest period.

For instance, Marcare

For instance, Meyerson said, one Tulsa refinery made direct shipments of several cars a week during the contest period. The cars average 25 to 40 tons each.

Auditing of reports is going on, state headquarters said, and totals and winners of the various contests, prizes for which are \$4,000 in war bonds, will probably be announced near the end of the week.
