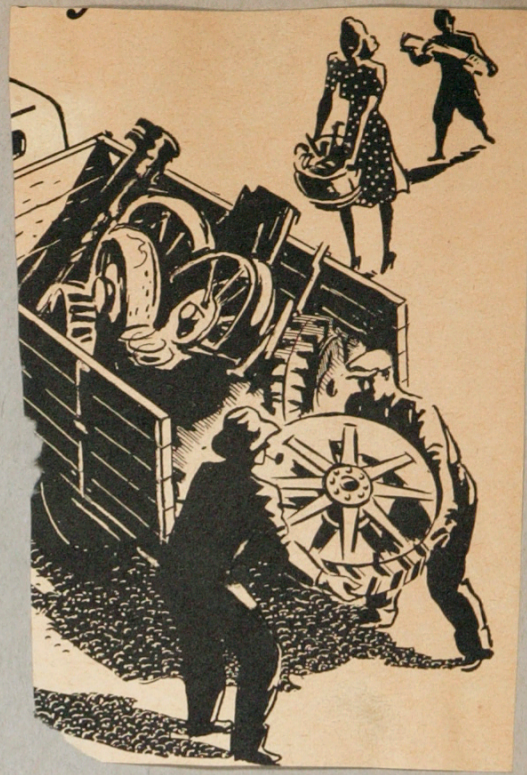

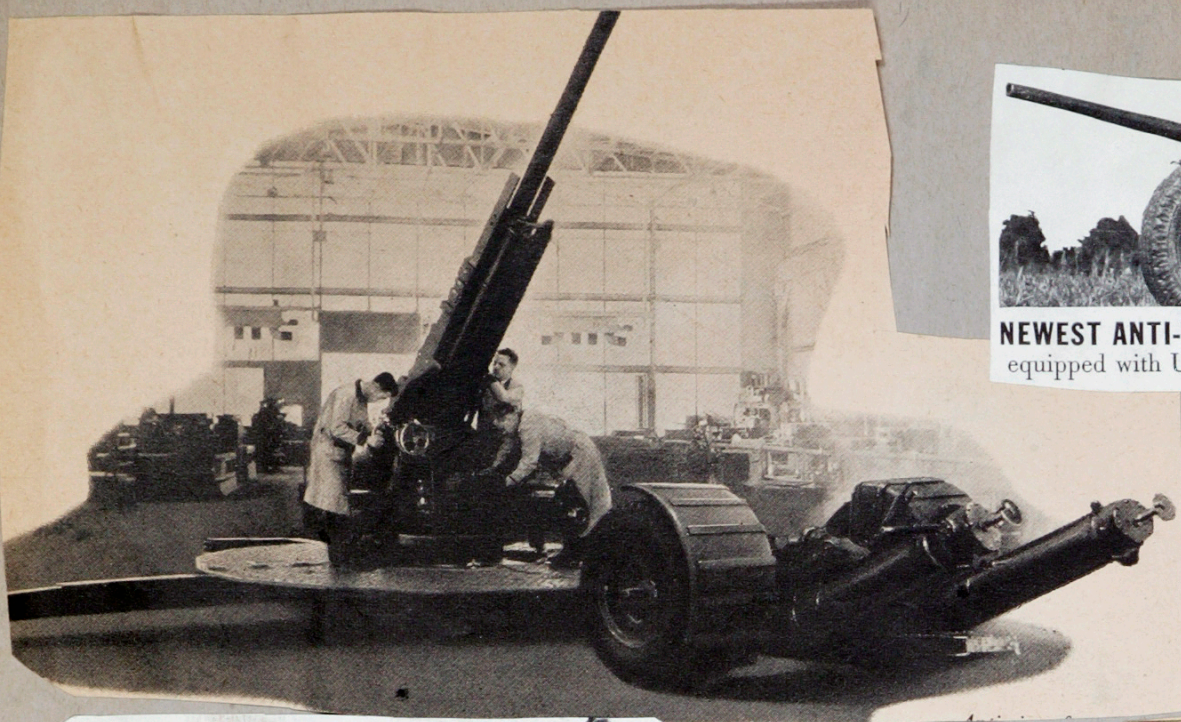

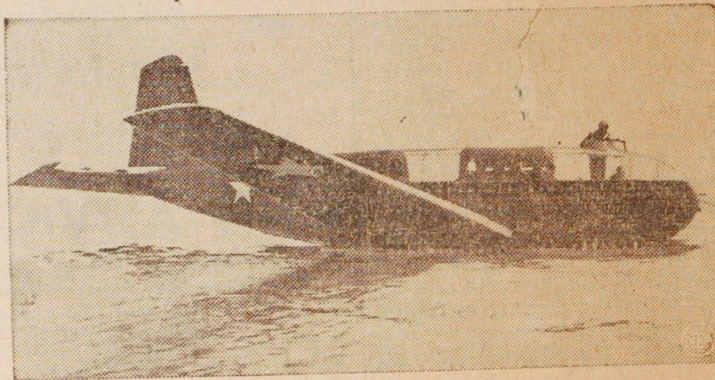




**NEWEST ANTI-TANK GUN**

'Chutist Comes Tumbling Down

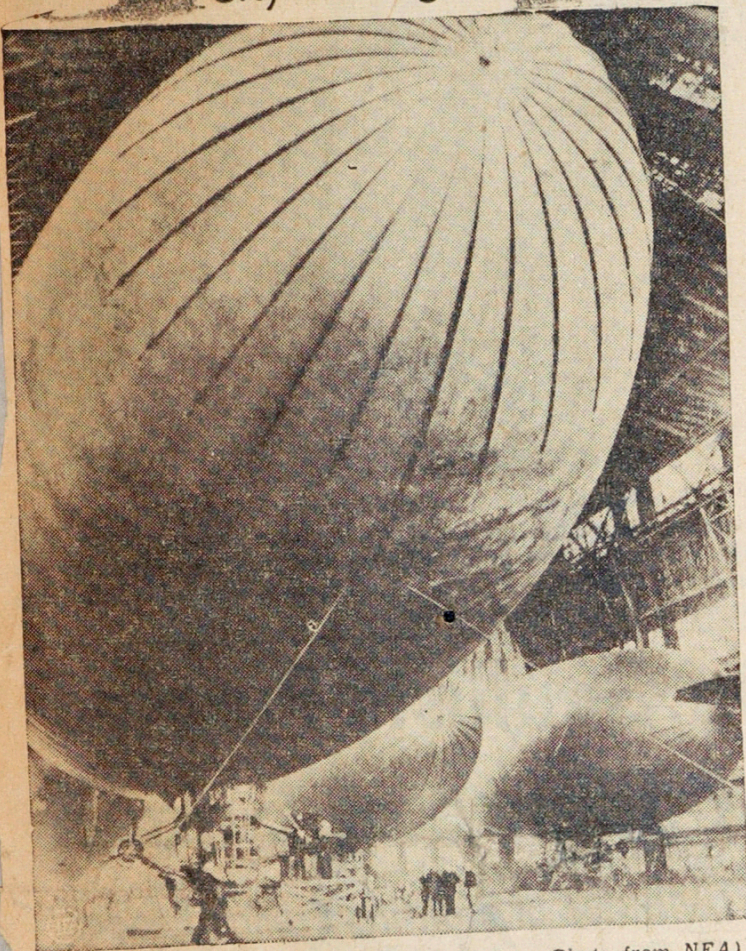

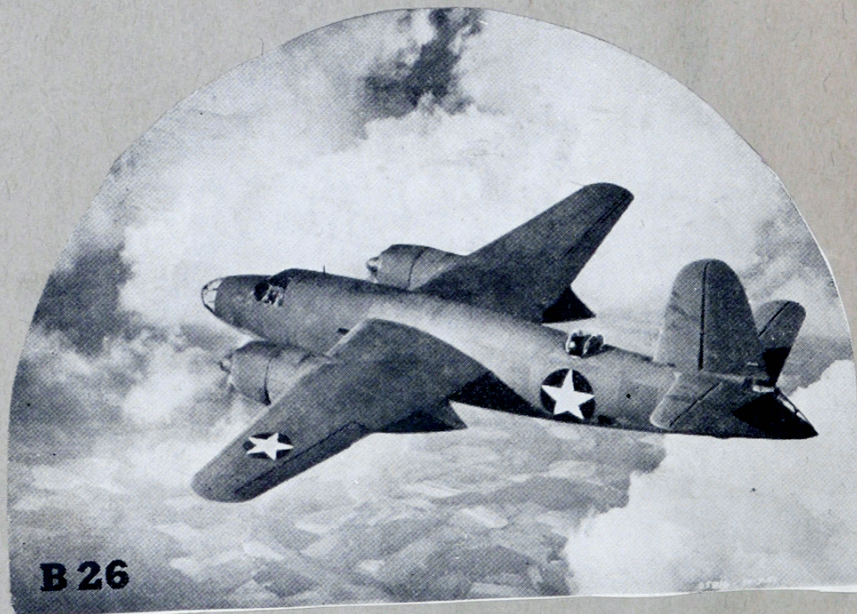

## War saving program.

The Whooey School have taken part in the war saving program. All pupils have brought scrap iron, steel, zinc, copper, rubber, brass, aluminum.

All pupils have joined the American Junior Red Cross. Some have bought war stamps.

As leaders of the war program Flonnie Bravens and Lola Mae Owens were selected as leaders of the program, with the teachers' advice.

In taking part in the war program forty-six children and two teachers have taken part in buying war bonds and stamps. Some parents have bought bonds and stamps.

For war saving bonds and stamps \$81.80 has been reported. 100% of the students have taken part in the program.

No certain device has been the best selling device. No certain scheme was decided for the best scheme for buying war bonds and stamps.

In the study of social science we often talk of the making of war ammunition and ships. In our weekly assembly we always mention the war situation and boost the bond and stamp buying.

We have planned to buy more war bonds and stamps in the future. All forty-six pupils have planned to fill out their stamp albums.

Some pupils are more outstanding in the work of the war program than others.

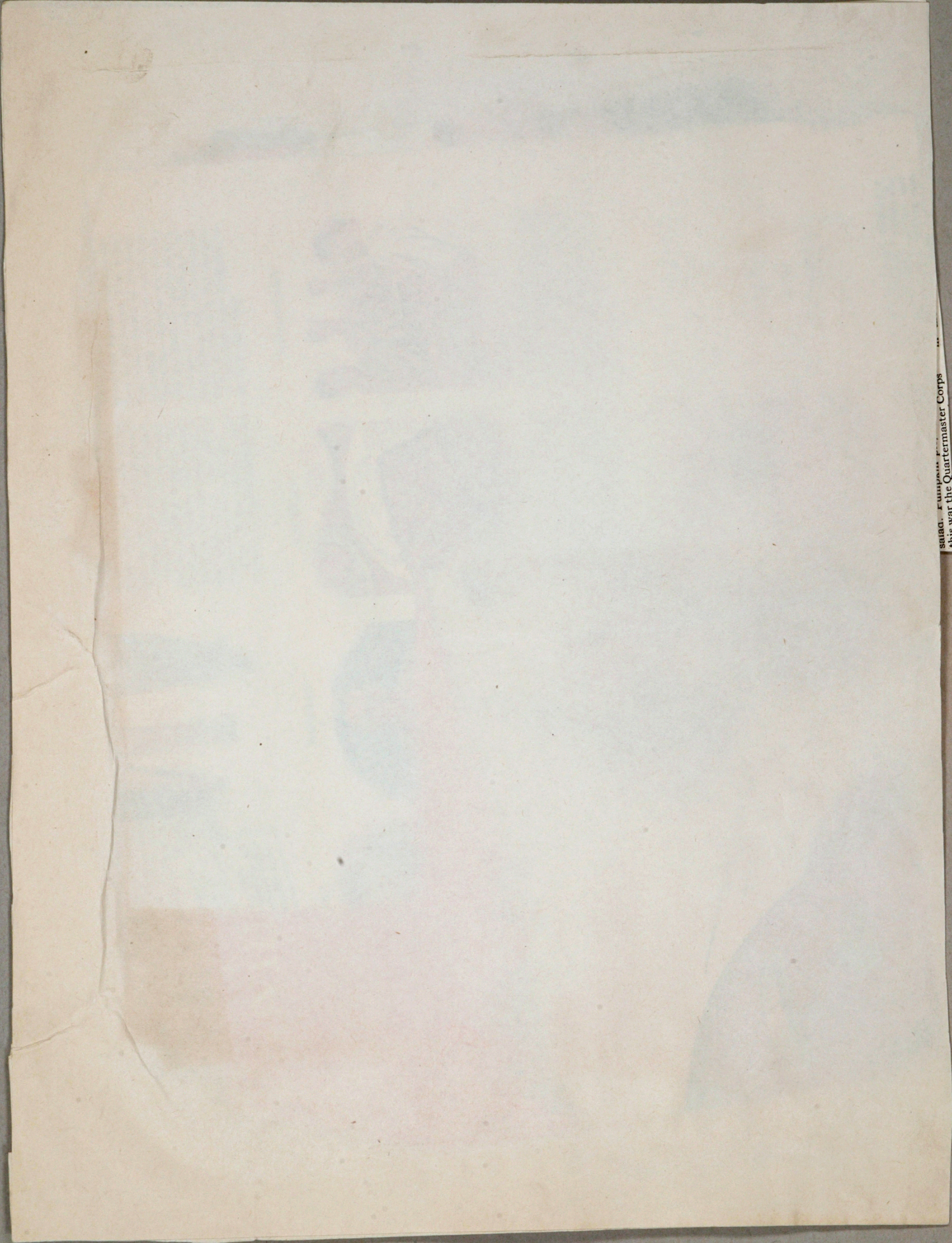
The most outstanding boy is a fifth grader, Billy Sampson.

as the community was too small. It was impossible to meet the \$900. goal that was set by the leaders, but as much as possible was raised, and still plan to raise more in the future.

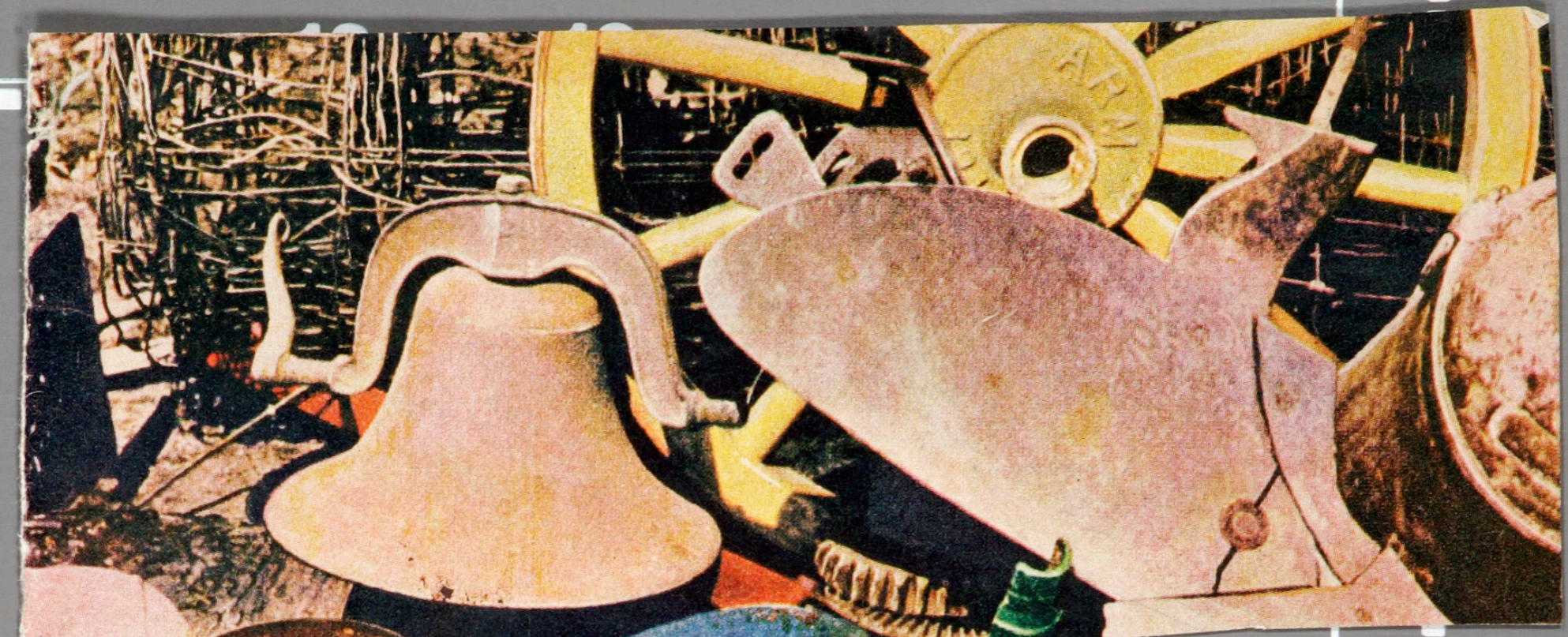

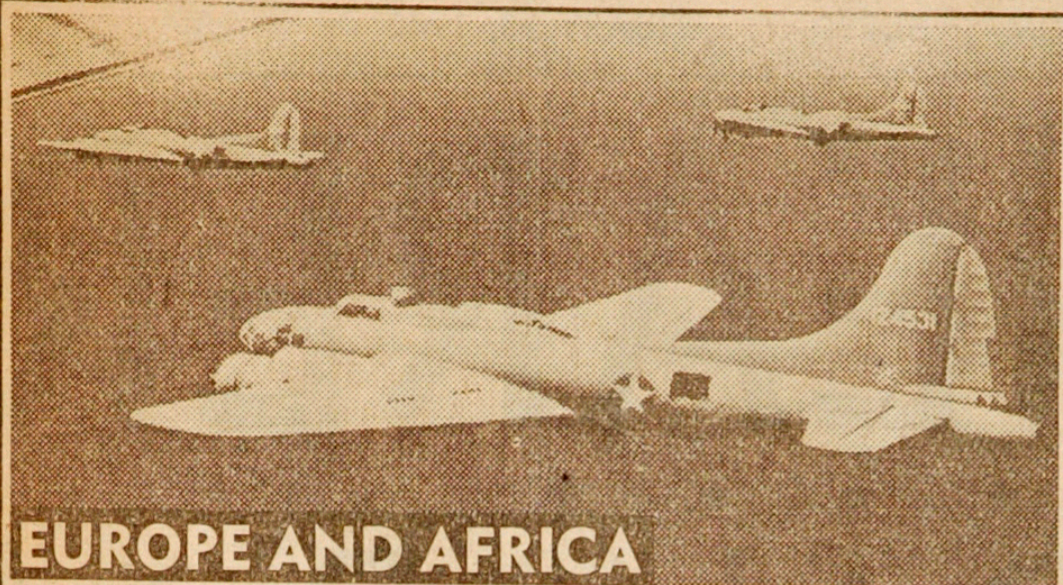

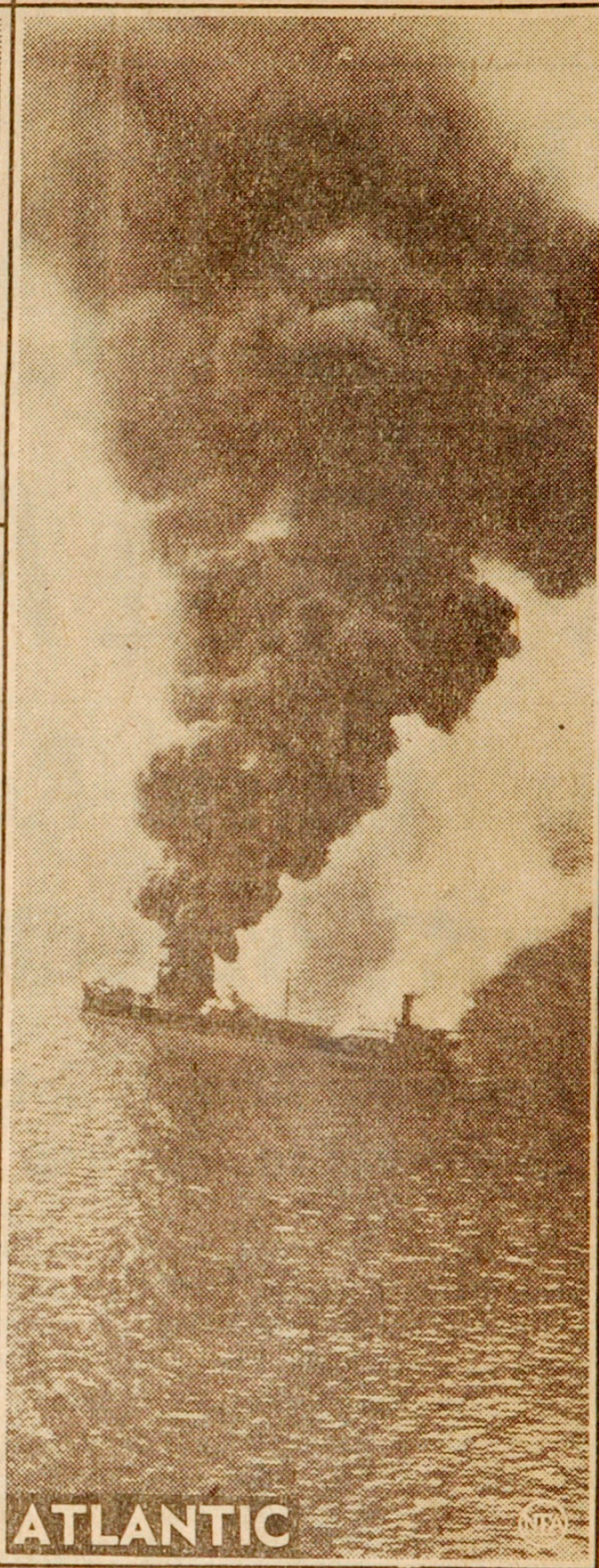

In Africa and Europe Flying Fortresses and other allied planes are bombing the axis in Tunisia, Libya, Germany, Italy and occupied areas while our troops make gains on desert fronts. In Russia, Soviet snow soldiers and other Red Army troops are pushing the Germans back from Leningrad to the Caucasus. In the South Pacific the Japs are being driven back in New Guinea and the Solomons while our bombers blast their bases here and in China and Burma. But in the Atlantic, United Nations ships continue to go down while British and American forces seek an answer to the U-boat problem.

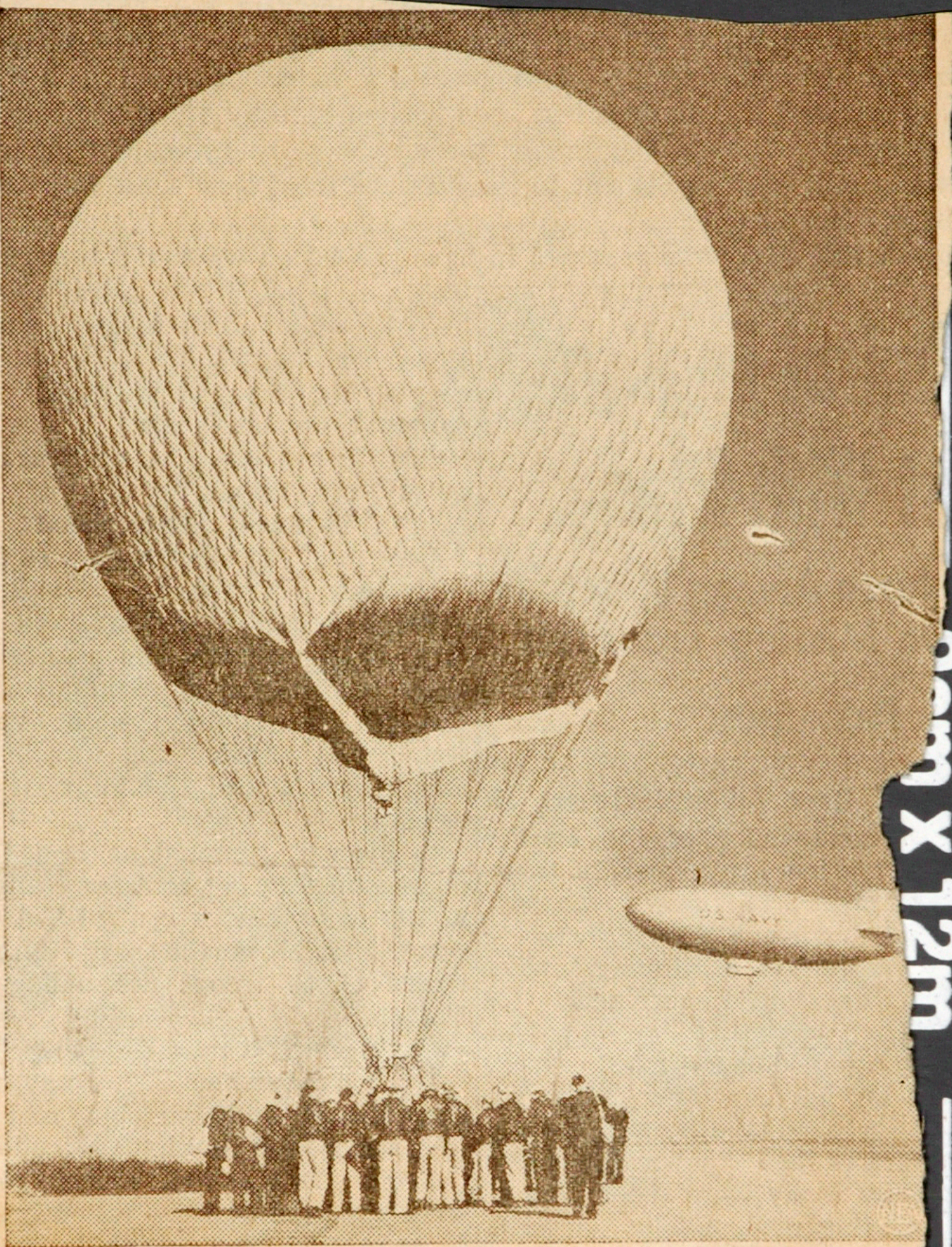
