Home Front Issue

Check these points with a Victory V

1 Raise food . . . for our fighting men, our civilian workers, our allies, and as much of your own family's year-round food supply as you possibly can.

2 Manage time . . . use short cuts, streamline housework; allow some time for church, school, and neighborhood wartime services; plan for good times now and then.

Food For Victory

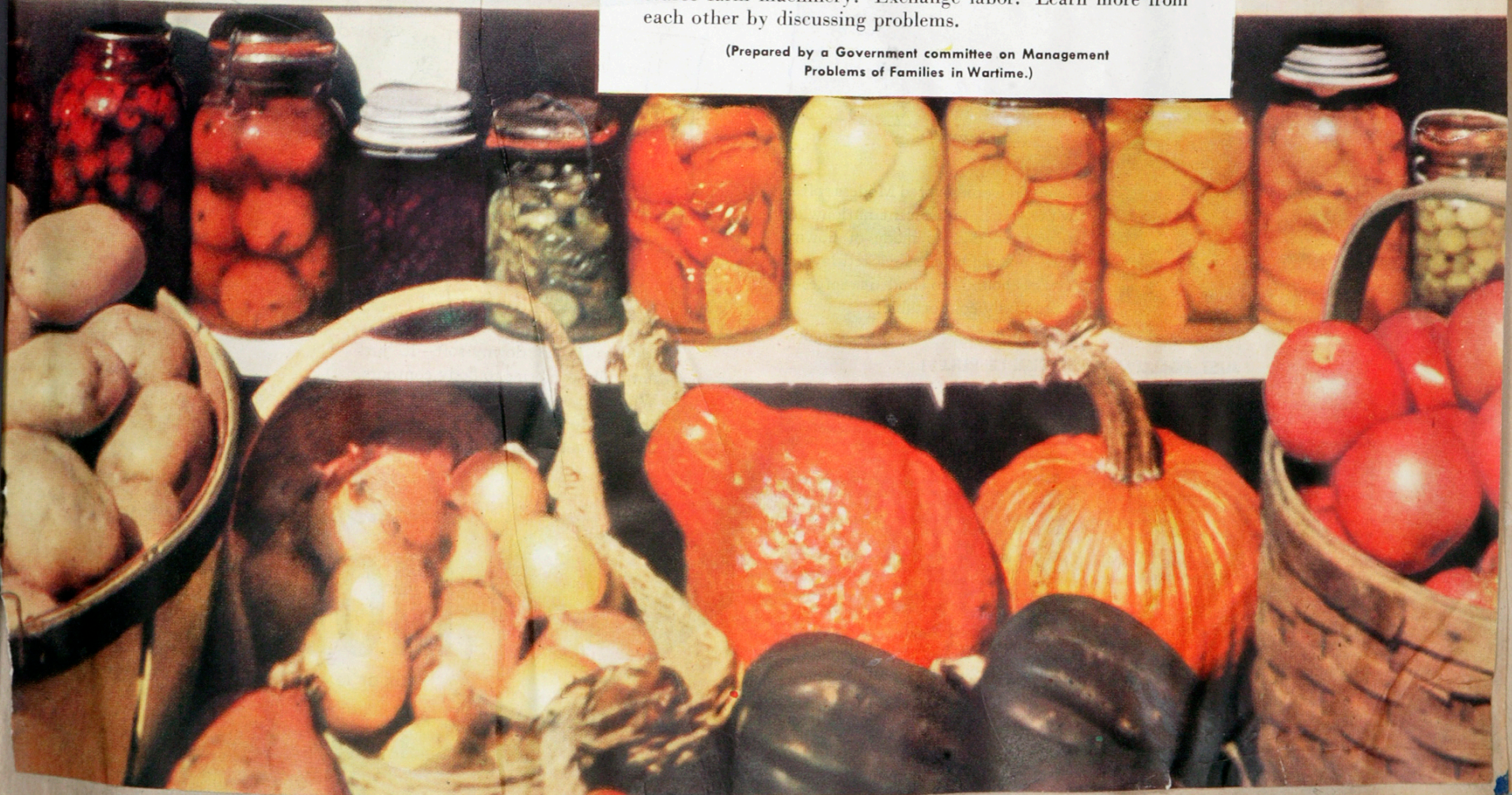
3 Manage money . . . plan ahead what you expect to take in, what you must pay out, how much you can save for maintenance, debts, war stamps and bonds.

4 Keep fit . . . America needs you strong, so eat enough of the right foods; be sure drinking water is safe; get enough rest and sleep; plan for needed medical and dental care.

5 Fight waste . . . of food, clothing, fuel, light, equipment, furnishings. Take care of what you have. Trade surplus home-grown food with neighbors or give to schools for lunches. Turn in old metal, rubber, rags, also fat that cannot be used for food.

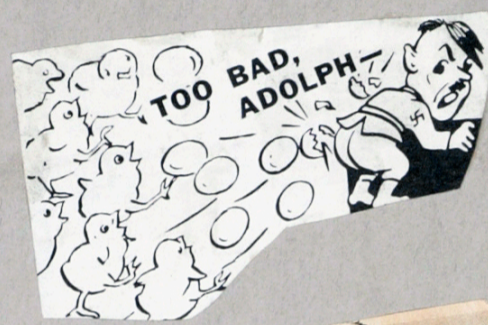
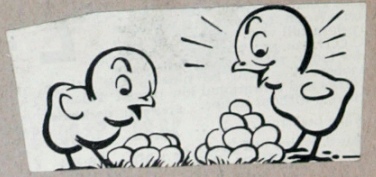
6 Work together . . . plan with neighbors for selling farm products and for buying together needed equipment and supplies. Take turns making automobile trips and using scarce farm machinery. Exchange labor. Learn more from each other by discussing problems.

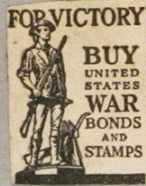


JUNK MAKES FIGHTING WEAPONS

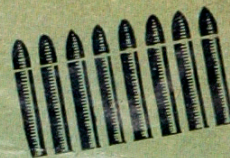

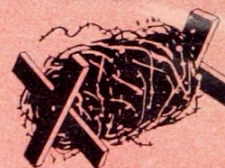
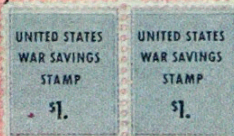

will buy two \$1 stamps or 48 yards of barbed wire



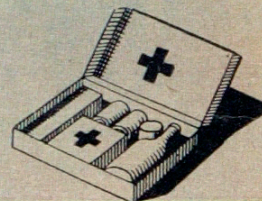
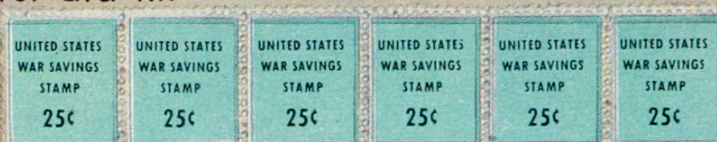

will buy six 25¢ stamps or 1 first aid kit



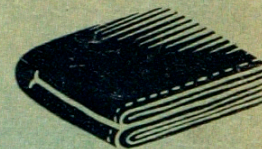
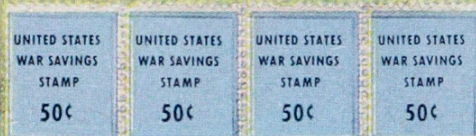
sewing machine clean and well-oiled, taking better care of all furnishings—freshening up old curtains, blankets, slip covers, rugs and carpets instead of replacing them



will buy four 50¢ stamps or 1 warm blanket for a soldier or sailor



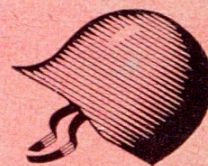
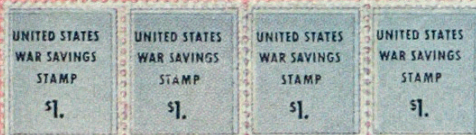
closets and putting every scrap of good material to use—learning correct methods of laundering, doing more of laundering at home, learning to press and spot clean suits and saving on pressing bills



will buy four \$1 stamps or 1 steel helmet



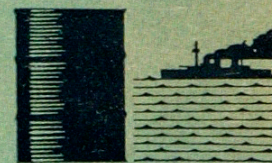
