Inita: Adding Diversity One Town at a Time

In 2014, the Oklahoma Oral History Research Program (OOHRP) at the Oklahoma State University Library teamed up with the Eastern Trails Museum in Vinita, Oklahoma, to record the memories of Attucks School alumni. Attucks School served the African American community of Vinita as a combined elementary, junior, and high school 1916-1958. It was the only secondary school in Craig County available to African Americans until desegregation. The Eastern Trails Museum has a strong collection focused on the town's early years and now through this partnership

with OOHRP, has oral histories with Attucks School alumni to help fill gaps within the historic record

providing rich context to Vinita's African American history.

Vinita

- Established in 1871
- County seat
- Population 5,743
- Strong African American community since 1910s

Lessons Learned

- The value of partnering with community institution
- Don't underestimate the time needed to process interviews
- One gathering day may not be enough
- Be aware of history of the community as much as possible

- Eastern Oklahoma Hospital for the Insane, 1913-1947
- Eastern State Hospital, 1947-present
- Northeast Oklahoma Correctional Center, 1994-present
- Will Rogers Archway (formerly the Glasshouse) Restaurant)

Attucks School

- National Register of Historic Places, 2009
- Named in honor of Crispus Attucks
- Served the African American community of Vinita through 1958
- Constructed 1916-1917
- Addition built in 1925, doubled size
- Gym built in 1939 through WPA
- Integration started 1956, completed in 1958
- Renamed Southeast Elementary School
- Currently closed

Replicating in Your Community

- 1. Define your focus
- 2. Begin cultivating partnerships with cultural repositories or community groups to:
 - identify potential narrators
 - create question guide
 - determine interview details (where, when, interviewers, etc.)
