Open Access with Oxford University Press

Congratulations to Dr. Laura Bray of the Center for Applied Social Research and Dr.



Tong Wang of the Division of Finance in the Price College of Business. They are the first two OU authors to take advantage of OU Libraries' "read & publish" agreement with Oxford University Press. Both authors have open access articles in Oxford journals with no accompanying open access fees or article processing charges (APCs). Under the Libraries' agreement, OU authors may publish open access at no additional cost through December 2024;

the agreement helps shift library spending from subscription-based reading toward open access publishing.

The Journal of Forensic Social Work is Now Open Access

University Libraries and the <u>National Organization of Forensic Social Work</u> have relaunched the <u>Journal of Forensic Social Work</u> (JoFSW) as an open access publication. <u>Read more</u> about the joint effort to make the journal more accessible.

"Surveillance Publishing" and Academic Publishing
As Dr. Jefferson Pooley <u>writes</u>, "full-stack publishers" such as Elsevier, Taylor & Francis, Clarivate (publishers of Web of Science), and Wiley are now data analytics firms. By inserting themselves throughout the research lifecycle to acquire user behavior data, they can slice and dice this data, selling it to a variety of consumers, including reselling data on campus researchers to university research offices.

What is Neurodiversity?

Bizzell Main Floor, April 18 - June 30



Marking a departure from language that pathologizes them, this exhibit explores the term "neurodiversity," which disability rights advocates use regarding conditions such as autism and attention

deficit and hyperactivity disorder (ADHD). Neurodiversity positions these conditions as naturally-occurring variations of the human brain and authentic forms of diversity benefitting from social supports instead of stigmatization.
