

With The Editor . . .

Opposition from the Oklahoma delegation to an increase in American Medical Association dues drew a lot of favorable comment at the June meeting of the House of Delegates . . . Declaring that at least 30 per cent of American doctors were not paying A.M.A. dues, Oklahoma delegates John F. Burton and Wilkie D. Hoover called upon the non-paying group to "meet its obligation to American Medicine" . . . Funds derived in this way would forestall any increase in A.M.A. dues for several years . . . The sizeable number of non-members is due to the failure of state medical associations to have compulsory A.M.A. dues . . . The result is that while the doctor may belong to his county and state society, he does not belong to A.M.A.—by choice . . . A reference committee in the House of Delegates noted that since the income of the national organization was greater than expenditures, no increase in dues for 1957 would be necessary . . . However, the Committee did report that continuation of the A.M.A.'s rate of expenditures would probably compel a dues increase in the near future . . . Many delegates congratulated Drs. Burton and Hoover on their stand . . . The opposition originated in a resolution from the Tulsa County Medical Society subsequently endorsed by the House of Delegates of the Oklahoma State Medical Association . . . For the first time in several years the Tulsa Police Department will have a full-time physician . . . Commissioner Jay L. Jones has announced the appointment of Dr. William A. Meyers, former medical director of Douglas, to the post . . . St. John's Hospital has reduced the work week of professional employees (nurses, technicians, etc.) from 44 to 40 hours . . . About 250 persons are affected . . . A message of sympathy was sent by the American Medical Association last month to the widow of Jean Hersholt, the lovable "Dr. Christian" of screen, radio and television . . . Hersholt, who died June 2nd, had previously been honored by the A.M.A. for his portrayal.

SURVEY OF CHARITY CARE COMPLETED

Tulsa Doctors Give Minimum of Half-Million Dollars in Professional Services To Indigent Patients. Average Contribution Set at Two Hours Weekly.

Members of the Tulsa County Medical Society are contributing between \$500,000 and \$600,000 worth of professional medical services annually to indigent patient clinics and other charities, a survey recently completed by the Society indicates.

This estimate does not include professional attention rendered to charity patients in the doctor's private office for which no charge was made. Neither does the figure include any allowance for bad debts, a portion of which are contracted by persons who are actually medically indigent.

The survey fixed the minimum contribution of the average Tulsa doctor to charity services at two hours per week. Many physicians, particularly those directing out-patient specialty clinics, indicated as high as ten and twelve hours per week devoted to such projects. The financial value of these services was arbitrarily fixed at \$15.00 per hour.

"By and large the public does not realize the tremendous extent of the charity services rendered by Tulsa doctors," said Dr. F. L. Flack, President of the Tulsa County Medical Society, in commenting on the study. "The significant thing is that these services are rendered during regular working hours. Most lay persons contributing their time to civic and charity projects do so in the evening, while others on a salaried basis suffer no financial loss through their participation. The doctor's contribution is doubly significant in that he contributes valuable professional time that could be utilized

in seeing paying patients."

The survey, based primarily upon the 1954 census of charity services, estimated a minimum expenditure of 35,000 hours of professional time by Tulsa doctors for charity projects. Two series of questionnaires were used to obtain the information. One was sent to each member of the Tulsa County Medical Society requesting detailed information as to the charity projects in which the doctor participated, the estimated number of hours, type of service rendered, and the estimated value of such services. These figures were checked against questionnaires sent to more than forty social service agencies and charities. These were asked to list the doctors participating in their charity services, number of hours expended, number of patients seen, and other pertinent information.

A sampling of the reports of the varicus agencies surveyed indicates the scope of the charity services rendered:

Hillcrest Medical Center: In 1954 the Hospital reported 12,203 patient visits to its out-patient clinics. These persons were seen by 96 doctors contributing their services without fee. The medical attention given these patients ranged from treatment for minor and temporary ailments and injuries to extended care for long term illnesses and deficiencies. In addition members of the Hillcrest staff on service performed numerous surgical operations and provided consulting services in anesthesiology, radiology and pathology. In-patients were seen on the

same basis by other staff general practi-

tioners and specialists.

St. John's Hospital: In 1954 a total of 12,340 outpatient clinic visits were recorded. An additional 2,200 in-patients were seen for surgical and medical attention by members of the staff on service. Again, no compensation was received by any physician for these ser-

WILLIAM J. BRYAN, JR., M.D. 1896 - 1956

Dr. William J. Bryan, Jr., 60, prominent Tulsa internist, died July 4, 1956, after an illness of several months.

Born in Abilene, Texas, in 1896, Dr. Bryan attended Castle Heights School and was later graduated from Washington & Lee University. He served as an enlisted man in the A.E.F. during World War I, which interrupted his medical education. He was graduated from Baylor University School of Medicine in 1921. His internship was served at Baylor Hospitals of Dallas, Texas, and at Church Home & Infirmary of Baltimore, Maryland. He completed a two-year residency in Medicine at the latter institution before entering practice in Tulsa in 1925. Subsequent postgraduate work was completed at Johns Hopkins University, Boston Hospital, and the University of Vienna.

Dr. Bryan was a diplomate of the American Board of Internal Medicine, fellow of the American College of Surgeons, member of the American Geriatrics Society, and a leader in the American Diabetic Association. Prominent in the affairs of Hillcrest Medical Center, he was also a leading amateur golfer and art collector. He retired from active practice in November, 1955, and was subsequently elected a Life Member of the Tulsa County Medical Society and its component organizations. Death was attributed to

Services were held July 6th at the Boston Avenue Methodist Church. Survivors include the widow, a son, and a daughter.

vices.

Tulsa County Medical Clinic: Twenty-five physicians are contributing their services to fourteen specialty clinics meeting from one to five times a week. The Clinic records about 1,200 patient visits monthly. Except for the supervisory services of the County Physician and his assistant, none of the doctors staffing the Clinic receive compensation.

Children's Medical Center: Thirty-six doctors contribute their services to the Center. Representing all specialties, these physicians made 3,281 patient visits in 1954. No compensation of any type is

paid for these services.

Tulsa Boys Home: Four volunteer physicians made over 150 visits to the Home in 1954 to provide care for inmates. A few patients from the Home were seen in the private offices of these doctors.

St. John's Vianney Training School: Twenty-seven doctors gave their attention to 1,200 patient visits by inmates at the school. Complete medical care was rendered for which no charge was made. Sister Mary, Director, reported that the School had never received a bill for medical services in 23 years of operation.

Tulsa Public Schools: Forty physicians gave free medical services to clinics in the Tulsa school system. Officials estimated that each saw a minimum of ten patients, contributing over 500 hours of attention.

Division of Child Welfare: In 1954 a total of 180 patients were seen without charge for 625 patient visits by 16 physicians contributing their services.

Frances E. Willard Home: Two physicians contributing their professional services rendered complete medical care to the inmates of the Home.

Salvation Army Home: Twenty-three doctors comprise a staff which gave free complete obstetrical care to inmates of the Home as well as all other types of attention. These include fourteen obstetricians, three pediatricians, and sixteen consultants in other specialties.

Arthritis and Rheumatism Foundation: Fourteen doctors contributed their services to the arthritis clinics sponsored by the Foundation for a total of 750 patient





PRESIDENT'S PAGE

It would not be fair if I did not by this means recognize the tremendous sacrifices and expenditure of time made by the Chairman of the Insurance Committee of the Tulsa County Medical Society and his associates. Thanks to their good work the malpractice situation is much improved. The insurance carrier has told me that his company would not carry the risk if it were not for the excellence of the local insurance committee.

How to stop things once started is our Committee's problem. A large percentage of such suits are ignited or suggested by physicians themselves in criticizing the work of colleagues. Invitations to suits are made by the shaking of the head when examining a patient treated by another doctor; the raising of an eyebrow and such encouraging remarks as "I would have done it this way" or "I had a case like this and the results were excellent" are other factors. There is frequently an answer to such remarks and it comes to the physician in the form of a subpoena and petition.

A malpractice suit is not one of the rights and privileges that go with the services of a physician who has done everything possible for the care of a sick or injured person. I am unalterably opposed to settling claims without merit on a nuisance basis and think they should be contested to the bitter end. To do otherwise would be submitting to banditry.

It may well be said this is old stuff, and that you have heard it before, but I submit it needs repeating over and over. I have done several hundred hernias and hysterectomies, but I still read and study about them. Malpractice—its prevention and defense—should be a part of the regular studies of every doctor. By familiarizing ourselves with it we are better prepared to strike against it.

NEW MEDICAL BUILDING MAY BE CONSTRUCTED ON UTICA

Another effort to zone South Utica between 17th and 18th streets for a medical building was initiated last month as Mrs. Velma G. Purcell filed a zoning application with the Tulsa Metropolitan Area Planning Commission.

The prominent Tulsa real estate woman said she would build a medical office building on the southeast corner of 17th and Utica if zoning can be obtained. Mrs. Purcell also plans to construct a hotel to accommodate relatives of out-of-city patients. The site of the latter will probably be on the northeast corner of 17th Place and Utica avenues.

Although twelve property owners were reported to have signed a petition favoring the zoning, opposition is expected from the majority of the nearby Swan Lake district residents. An effort to zone the area by Dr. Charles E. McCracken, Tulsa dentist, has repeatedly been unsuccessful during the past two years. The property is generally considered ideal for such purposes because of its proximity to St. John's Hospital. Hillcrest Medical Center, and medical buildings in the Utica Square area.


SOCIETY HAS 333 MEMBERS

visits annually.

Y.M.C.A.: Members of the medical profession examined 400 boys from the central Y.M.C.A. for the summer camp program last year, while another 100 boys were examined without charge by colored physicians at the Hutcherson Branch, Underprivileged boys are examined without charge by volunteer physicians for other phases of the Y.M.C.A. athletic program.

Salvation Army Red Shield Club: Over 300 boys were examined last month for the summer camp program by a panel of

eighteen volunteer physicians.

Oklahoma Commission for Crippled Children: Twenty-seven doctors give free care in the Commission's own clinics while numerous others contribute to polio

clinics in various hospitals.

National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis: All recipients of care are treated without charge by volunteer physicians in polio clinics. In the polio school clinics of 1955, over 85 doctors gave an average of five hours each to inoculate several thousand children with Salk Anti-Polio Vaccine. The net value of this service was estimated at \$7,000.00.

Oklahoma Emergency Relief Board: Thirty-six doctors serve Board clients without fee, doing physical examinations and providing medical reports as re-

quested.

Division of Public Assistance: Eight doctors give their time to the Division clients for limited medical service.

Camp Fire Girls: Officials of this agency reported 200 free pre-camp examinations were given in 1954 by five volunteer physicians.

Children's Home and Welfare Association: Eight doctors contribute free medical care to recipients of the Associa-

tion program.

Tulsa Lions Club; Free pre-camp examinations for crippled indigent children attending the Lions Summer Camp were given by a panel of eight doctors in 1955 and 1956.

St. John's Tumor Clinic: Seventy-three doctors were listed as contributing services to the Tumor Clinic without fee for more than 4,000 hours annually. This

Tulsa Boy Scouts: Tulsa doctors contribute services for final check examinations at the Boy Scout Summer Camp at Locust Grove, Oklahoma, each summer. Several hundred scouts are seen at that time. Tulsa physicians also have contributed services to individual troops for group pre-camp examinations.

Variety Club Health Center: Daily clinic care for negro indigents provided

by volunteer physicians.

Tulsa County Heart Association: Thirty-two doctors provided medical services at eleven clinics for a total of 1,752 patient visits.

Other organizations reporting free medical service for charity or underprivileged persons included the Family & Childrens Service, Travelers Aid Society, Young Women's Christian Association, the American Legion, the Oklahoma Division of the American Cancer Society, the American Red Cross, Tulsa County Public Health Association, Tulsa Marriage Clinic, and the Veterans for Foreign Wars.

City-Wide Delivery Sunday, 10-1, 4-9:30 Weekdays, 8:30-9:30 Several other organizations which purchase medical care at sub-standard fees reported an excellent degree of cooperation from Tulsa doctors.

The time spent by doctors in teaching nurses and interns was also tabulated. Sixty-three doctors reported they had participated for an average of two hours weekly.

Contributions of professional service by many individual doctors were quite commendable. One obstetrician reported the delivery of 52 babies at St. John's Hospital for obstetrical clinic cases and estimated the value of such services at regular fees would have been \$6,900.00. In addition, he gave 50 hours to the Salvation Army Home and Hospital, 20 to the St. John's Tumor Clinic, 100 hours to the St. John's gynecological clinic, 7 hours to vaccinating school children for poliomyelitis, and spent 100 hours teaching interns and nurses. This is cited as a fairly typical contribution of an active specialist.

A heart specialist reported he gave 120 hours annually to the Congenital Heart Clinic at St. John's Hospital, 52 hours annually to the Rheumatic Heart Clinic at Hillcrest, and 25 hours annually to the Adult Heart Clinic. Another 24 hours was given at Children's Medical Center, 20 hours to the Lincoln School Diagnostic Clinic, 60 hours on charity service at St. John's, 6 hours in teaching nurses and interns, and 6 hours in giving anti-polio shots. The specialist estimated another 50 hours annually were devoted to charity patients seen in his private office.

Asked to estimate the time given to charity patients in the office, physicians averaged 50 to 75 hours annually while many individual doctors stated from 100 to 200 hours annually were given for this purpose.

The estimates were for actual care rendered only and did not include time spent in administrative positions such as membership on the board of directors of a clinic or agency.





COUNTY CLINIC SEEKING RECORD ANNUAL BUDGET

The Tulsa County Medical Clinic has requested \$191,500 for operation during the 1956-57 fiscal year. The sum is \$36,544 more than was received for the last

fiscal year.

As this issue went to press, it was expected the request would be trimmed considerably by the Excise Board. The budget calls for \$63,500 in salaries and personal services, \$125,000 for maintenance, and \$3,000 for capital outlay. For the previous year the Excise Board had allocated \$61,124 for salaries, \$90,832 for maintenance, and \$3,000 for capital outlay. Of the total amount of \$154,959 allocated last year, the Clinic did not spend \$17,259. Dr. C. Thomas Thompson, Medical Director, said the increases were for improvements in facilities and equipment, additional personnel, and slight salary increases for certain employees.




The Tulsa County Red Cross Blood Center is considering the manufacture of quick frozen single dose plasma for treatment of hemophilia and similar diseases, it was reported last month by Dr. Betty Conrad, Medical Director. Dr. Conrad said the project would depend upon a demonstrated need for it in terms of prospective patients served.

The Center would draw blood, centrifuge and aspirate it within a few hours and quick freeze it. This would enable it to be kept for approximately six months at temperatures of -20 degrees, yet preserving the effect of the anti-hemophiliac globulin. It can be manufactured in both specific and non-specific types, the latter being made, however, from AB Type, which is fairly rare. The non-specific plasma can be given without the

necessity of blood typing. Dr. Conrad urged Tulsa County Medical Society members to advise her how many hemophiliac patients they had at the present time and if such plasma would be of use in those cases. Doctors should call Dr. Conrad at LUther 4-4281 and advise the name of the patient, age, weight, blood type, and name of parents. If there is sufficient indication of the need for the project, the Center will be able to start manufacture with the addition of a small amount of equipment to be provided by the national blood program of the American Red Cross. The anti-hemophiliac plasma would be given free to Tulsa County residents.


