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
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
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With The Editor ...

Medical and public health circles are increasingly concerned over the possibilities of a severe epidemic of the Asiatic flu in the United States . . . The Board of Trustees of the American Medical Association last month called for the preparation of defense plans by the A.M.A. Council of National Defense . . . Following a two-day conference in Chicago in early July the Council began blueprinting a counterattack on the serious oriental disease . . . Implementation of the program is expected to be conducted through the state and county medical societies . . . Public Health Service officials believe the disease may reach epidemic proportions next Fall or Winter, especially in view of a record 1,000 persons entering the United States from the Far East each week . . . Outbreaks have already been recorded on both coasts . . . Fortunately, an effective vaccine has already been developed by the National Institutes of Health, and six pharmaceutical companies are now working to produce it commercially . . . It will employ the same technique used in manufacturing the Salk Anti-Polio Vaccine and is expected to provide eight to twelve months protection against the Asiatic-type flu . . . The adult anti-polio vaccination program planned for Tulsa County by the Tulsa County Medical Society and the National Foundation For Infantile Paralysis has been postponed to the Fall months . . . A continued shortage of vaccine forced the postponement of the program originally scheduled for last May . . . The unfortunate incident in which a Manorville, N. Y. physician sent a bill for \$1,500 for his services in the rescue of 6-year-old Benny Hooper was probably the most disastrous blow to medical public relations in the last ten years . . . It did more in a single stroke to antagonize the public than our formal public relations program can repair in years . . . What a contrast from the Lousiana doctor who, despite having lost his wife and three children, worked 72 hours to help hurricane victims . . . He refused to accept any compensation.

MEDICAL SOCIETY NOW HAS 336 MEMBERS

Tulsa County Ratio of Doctors to Population Fixed at 1-to-1,024. Only 13 New Members Admitted in Last Year.

Membership in the Tulsa County Medical Society as of August 1, 1957, stood at 336, an increase of three over the same date a year ago.

The figure includes 310 members in full or part-time practice, 13 not in active practice, six life and honorary members not now residing in Tulsa County, three members on leave of absence for postgraduate training, one in military service, and three applicants for membership.

The Society now has a total of 307 dues paying members, 25 life and honorary members, three on postgraduate study status, and one in military service. None of the latter groups are required to pay membership dues.

It is estimated there are now 321 medical doctors in full or part-time practice in Tulsa County. This figure includes 310 Society members, three applicants for membership, and eight who are not members of the Tulsa County Medical Society. Of the eight non-members, five are colored physicians. None of the eight have ever made application for membership in the Tulsa County Medical Society.

Based the Tulsa Chamber of Commerce's population estimate of 330,000 persons for Tulsa County as a whole (as of January 1, 1957), a doctor-topatient ratio of one per 1,024 may be computed. This figure is roughly the same as the minimum ratio of one per 1,000 persons of population advocated by the American Medical Association for maintenance of a desirable level of medical care.

An important factor affecting the doctor-to-patient ratio, however, is the amount of referred work from the surrounding area sent to Tulsa specialists. (Hillcrest Medical Center, for instance, reported patients from 47 Oklahoma counties during a recent year, as well as many others from Kansas, Arkansas and Texas). This has the effect of adding substantially to the patient load of many Tulsa doctors.

Officials of the Tulsa County Medical Society last month expressed the belief that most Tulsa County doctors are quite busy. The major exceptions are the newcomers to Tulsa, particularly in the surgical specialties. There is some problem of distribution of patients with certain leading physicians carrying an unusually heavy volume of practice, while other doctors could efficiently handle more patients.

A sizeable amount of medical care in Tulsa County is also being rendered by osteopaths, chiropractors and optometrists. A check of the latest Tulsa telephone directory indicates 84 osteopaths are in practice in Tulsa proper; the addition of those in the smaller towns of the County brings the total to over 100. The directory also lists 35 chiropractors, 36 optometrists (generally limited to refractions), and two naturopaths.

The number of medical doctors in Tulsa County has been roughly the same for the past four years. The membership of the Tulsa County Medical Society in 1954 stood at 328, in 1955 at 334, and in 1956 at 333.

General Surgery continues to be the most populated specialty with 48 doctors listing themselves in that classification. Internal Medicine ranks second with 40, followed in order by Obstetrics & Gynecology, 25; Pediatrics, 19; Anesthesiology, 17; Orthopedic Surgery, 11; Radiology, 11; Urology, 9; Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat, 9; Psychiatry, 8; Ophthalmology, 8; Neurosurgery, 5; Pathology, 5; Industrial Medicine (full-time), 5; Dermatology, 4; Plastic Surgery, 3; Public Health, 3; Proctology, 2; Thoracic Surgery, 2; Allergic Diseases, 2; Chest Diseases, 1; and Otolaryngology, 1. Three members fall into a miscellaneous category.

General practitioners number 72.

A number of physicians listed as general surgeons do a supplementary general practice, while a sizeable number of general practitioners do varying amounts of surgery. Certain general surgeons have special interests in other types of specialty surgery. In making the above computations, only broad classifications were used. Similarly, Internal Medicine has not been broken down into sub-specialties as Gastroscopy, Arthritic and Rheumatic Diseases, Chest Diseases, Cardiology, etc.

Of the major changes taking place during the last year, the most significant was the number of new members admitted to the Tulsa County Medical Society—13, the lowest since the close of World War II. New members admitted were Drs. Bernard E. Guenther, Robert K. Endres, John C. Kramer, Coleman H. Rosenberg, Konstantin H. Geocaris, Thomas C. Finn, Jr., Curtis N. Clifton, V. William Wood, William E. Dr. William S. Crawford, Dr. M. C. Etherton, and Dr. Daniel M. Mac-Donald announced their retirement during the period under study.

The medical census quoted above doe not include 23 interns and 16 resident at St. John's Hospital and Hillcrest Medical Center.

Nine colored doctors are now serving the negro community of Tulsa County, estimated at 24,000 persons.

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
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POSTGRADUATE SYMPOSIUM SCHEDULED AT McALESTER

PRESIDENT'S PAGE

Much is being said and written today about the high cost of medical care. This subject was explored by a recent article in the U. S. News and World Report entitled "Do Doctors Charge Too Much Or Not Enough?"

According to this analysis physicians fees in the opinion of the consuming public have been going up and up, but actually during the past 20 years medical charges have risen only 78 per cent in comparison to a 101 per cent increase in the cost of living. A doctor today visiting in the home charges on the average little if any more than the minimum for a plumber or TV service call. (In my experience the plumbing and TV service charges are usually greater than the minimum).

What has the medical profession as a vendor of medical care accomplished for the American Public at this most moderate charge? Protection and preservation of nation's most important and fundamental asset, good health. has been secured to a degree second to none in time and space. All for a financial outlay which is far less than we as a nation spend for cigarettes, alcohol or amusements.


It is true that the consuming public caught in a spiral of inflation as we are today is worried about all expenditures, no matter how important or fundamental. The wise approach would seem to be to permit the public to budget medical expenses by comprehensive health plans which spread the cost over large segments of the population under standards of good medical care established by the profession itself. Then fees for service could be standardized with the cost of living index and raised or lowered accordingly.

The "do-gooders" and "leftists" under this system would have no more arguments for the socialization of medicine, and it should meet the needs of medical programs sought by labor and similar organizational groups.

NEW LOAN AND PHOTODUPLICATION MECHANISMS OF THE NATIONAL LIBRARY OF MEDICINE


For some time the administrative officers of the National Library of Medicine have been considering some change in the Library's loan and photoduplication service. Finally, a plan has been developed and approved by the Board of Regents to go into effect on September 1, 1957.

One of the first libraries to circulate its work and one which has raised its photocopying service to a high level, the National Library of Medicine has shown its concern with making its facilities available to those who need them, wherever they may be. The possibility of providing photocopies has the advantage of making material available outside the building while still keeping the collection together.

The new loan policy is in two parts: (1) Hereafter no materials will be loaned to individuals "over the counter" for use outside the building; (2) The interlibrary loan service and photoduplication service will be considered as two phases of the same plan. All requests must be channeled through other libraries; no requests for loans of original works or orders for photocopies from individual borrowers will be honored. The National Library of Medicine will decide in each case how to fill inter-library loans—by sending the original or by furnishing microfilms or photoprints. All loans under this system, whether of the original or photocopies, will be entirely free to the borrowing library except for postage charges for return of original material. Photocopies will eliminate the express charges now incurred by the borrowing library and will provide them with permanent copies for their files.

The new mechanism will go into effect on September 1st. No photoduplication coupons will be sold after that date. Outstanding coupons will be honored or refunded upon request. These plans were revealed by Colonel Frank B. Rogers, Director, at the recent meeting of the Medical Library Association in New York, which was attended by the Librarian of the Tulsa County Medical Society.

For leisure reading during the hot summer months the Library of the Tulsa County Medical Society recommends a book from its historical and biographical sections. Many excellent biographies of leading medical personalities, as well as a number of selected histories of medicine, paint a vivid picture of the medical world of yesterday and today. For lighter reading the Library offers several books of humorous reminiscences, including the delightful "Doctor In The House," which every M.D. will enjoy. Let the Medical Library help make your summer reading more enjoyable.



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

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AUXILIARY GIVES \$1,154.16 TO CHARITABLE PROJECTS

The American Medical Education Fund received \$334.76, the largest single contribution of the group. 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MEMBERS FAVOR REDUCTION IN NUMBER OF MEETINGS

In a postcard poll conducted last month by the Program Committee members of the Tulsa County Medical Society voted three to one in favor of reducing regular meetings from a monthly to quarterly basis.



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Editorial

THE ART OF SAVING TIME

In a recent study of efficiency in the doctor's office the American Medical Association concluded that physicians are wasting valuable professional time by failing to delegate semi-technical medical and business activities to office personnel.

A highly competent secretary, the AMA believes, can relieve a physician of performance of all or nearly all business, office and semi-technical medical activities connected with his practice. While the doctor remains responsible for supervision of these functions, he can devote a maximum time to the care of his patients and other productive activities. There is almost no ceiling to the responsibility that an outstanding secretary can take over for a physician, the survey noted. The concensus of opinion among some 500 doctors interviewed was that it is penny-wise and pound-foolish to employ an incompetent aide.

The crux of the problem seems to lie in an inadequate number of properly trained persons available for employment, the doctor's own reluctance to surrender some of his responsibilities to the personnel, and to some extent low pay scales for medical office personnel.

The AMA suggests a greater force of better-trained aides in the future could

be effected by:

1. Specialized training courses in high school and college (perhaps leading to a degree) with emphasis upon the generally accepted secretarial skills, business office activities peculiar to the medical office, and development of personal qualities important to this line of work.

2. Organization of refresher courses in medical office administration for employed medical secretaries and assistants (such as those recently conducted in Tulsa and Oklahoma City by the Medical Assistants Society of Oklahoma).

3. Persuading individuals currently employed as medical secretaries to increase their effectiveness on their jobs through additional training in school and/or on

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the job.

What appears to us to be of greater importance is the need for an educational program among doctors themselves. The advantages and potentials of employing well-qualified medical secretaries must be stressed. Many physicians need to be taught the techniques of utilizing professional time to best advantage; this requires an ability to delegate those tasks which can and should be performed by the office personnel. For many doctors a training program in the proper delegation of office responsibilities is sorely needed.

There is an occasional and costly carelessness in the interviewing methods of doctors seeking new employees. Most physicians could profit by a short course (preferably given by an experienced personnel supervisor) in the technique of interviewing job applicants. The development and administration of standard personnel policies in the medical office, no matter how small, is worthy of attention.

Finally, some doctors must be impressed with the need of adequately renumerating the competent employee; most office inefficiency results from the employment of incompetents necessitated by sub-standard pay scales.

Much is to be gained to a program directed to the conservation of professional time through an increased reliance upon competent office personnel.



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

St John's Hospital of Tulsa received its 50,000th pint of blood from the Tulsa County Red Cross Blood Center last month. The unit was the 91,708th donated at the Center since its opening in 1949.

For the first six months of 1957 blood donations at the Tulsa County Red Cross Blood Center reached a record total of 7,757. (This figure is in terms of actual bloods used and does not include donors rejected for medical reasons, unsuccessful bleedings, discards, etc.). The net gain over 1956 is nearly 1,000 pints for the six-months period. Center officials are anticipating a blood usage of 15,500 pints for the year, an increase of nearly 2,000 over last year.




CAUDLE HEADS DENTISTS

Doctors and dentists are urged to set aside the afternoon on their calendars, noting that it falls on a Wednesday instead of the usual Thursday.



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
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
