2022 - 2023 is Open@OU

Throughout the 2022 - 2023 academic year, the University Libraries will be actively engaging campus in conversations about our open initiatives and author rights. Planned events include:

JSTOR Updates



The Libraries now provides access to JSTOR's Open Community Collections. This open access resource includes roughly 1,000 important and rare collections from libraries, museums, archives, and historical societies around the world. The materials in this collection include artworks, photographs, publications, recordings, and other artifacts. This content is available via the above link and is also seamlessly integrated into the JSTOR database along with content from Artstor.

Featured Resources

<u>PowerNotes</u> is a browser extension that allows you to annotate and highlight PDFs and webpages that are relevant to your research. Visit <u>PowerNotes.com</u> to download the extension to your browser.

<u>Lean Library</u> is a browser extension that enables more seamless access to OU Libraries online resources when searching on the open web by authenticating OU access to full text articles and journals that the Libraries subscribes to. It also connects you to the Libraries' interlibrary loan request forms for the articles that the Libraries does not have full text access to. To install Lean Library, <u>download</u> the extension to your browser and select OU as your institution.

Emerging Technology

This semester, University Libraries' Emerging Technologies team has a couple of new resources to share in the hopes of augmenting faculty research and instruction:

- Thanks to a generous donation from longtime University Libraries supporters
 Steve and Kathy Swatek, we purchased a new Artec Eva handheld 3D
 Scanner. Like other 3D capture methods, this new edition scanner will be
 available to the campus community. To see how this could augment your
 research, please schedule a consultation with Kristi Wyatt, Emerging Tech
 librarian and head of the 3D Scanning Lab in Bizzell.
- Research 3D Printing (R3DP) at Bizzell has expanded in capabilities! Examples of what we can do include 3D printing rapid prototypes for research and tactile manipulatives for course integrations. A notable and lasting project is Bones on Loan; together with <u>Cindy Gordon (BIOL)</u>, this project allows patrons to check out 3D printed bones from the circulation desk. Typical 3D prints without material considerations and under 12 hours in print time can still go through the <u>Library MakerSpace</u>. Projects that go through R3DP are typically more complicated and require a consultation for usage so that your needs can be better met. Exhibits at the University Libraries

You've Never Seen Music Like This Before Grant Fine Arts Library, August 29 - November 4



In 1928, Oklahoma artist Olinka Hrdy was asked by architect Bruce Goff to create a series of eight murals inspired by different types of music. In this exhibit, reproductions of her work are complimented by examples of how composers from the fourteenth-century through the 1970s have crafted compositions that simultaneously serve as both musical scores and works of art. Viewers are invited to use QR codes

to listen to performances and to leave their impressions of Hrdy's abstract imagery.

Embark

September 9, 5:30 p.m., Grant Fine Arts Library A 2nd Friday Art Walk Event

Embark is an exploration of sonic possibilities featuring minimalist and experimental

aesthetic featuring synthesizers, keyboard, saxophone, and the human voice. Dr. Zachary Daniels will present the first and last pieces on the program: "Embark" which gets its name from the Embark transit system in OKC, and "F, Make it Sharp" which is heavily inspired by Terry Riley's seminal work "In C." Composer Nikki Krumwiede will present her work "Crickets," which focuses on a loosely structured voice element with instrumental improvisations reflecting on the narrative presented by the vocalist.

Beginner LaTeX

September 13, 1 - 4 p.m., via Zoom

Registration required. LaTeX is software used to create documents - an alternative to word processors like Microsoft Word. LaTeX users "program" how their documents look using commands specified by the LaTeX language. The language is particularly useful for creating equations, inserting special symbols, and using multiple alphabets. You will need a computer that is able to access a web browser.
