## **Western History Collections**

Beginning in spring 2023, Western History Collections at University of Oklahoma Libraries plans to undergo widespread collection preservation measures that will render significant portions of the collections unavailable for a period of time. As a result of the unavailability of a significant portion of these collections, it will be necessary to cancel the upcoming cycle of research fellowships for the summer of 2023, including the Masterson, Haley, and Dale Society fellowships.

## **Alternative Textbook Grant Applications Open**

The University Libraries <u>Alternative Textbook Grant</u> application runs **through March 6.** The grant program incentivizes instructors to adopt, modify, or create <u>open</u>
<u>educational resources</u> (OER) instead of using costly course materials.

Since 2014, the Alternative Textbook Grant has given OU instructors the ability to use texts that meet their course learning goals and objectives rather than adjusting their learning goals/objectives to fit the limitations of a text. The grant has also saved OU students money in course materials costs. OU Libraries awards up to \$2,500 for successful applications, and some colleges award discretionary funds to supplement the total award amount.

## **University Libraries & College of Architecture Receive Gift**

A multimillion-dollar gift will be donated to OU Libraries and the College of Architecture in honor of an OU alumnus and architect. Bob Faust, who died in 2020, studied architecture at Tulane University and transferred to OU to learn under <a href="Bruce Goff">Bruce Goff</a>, a former OU architecture professor, according to an OU News press release. Faust's wife, Sherry, dedicated a gift to the university to support the <a href="American">American</a>

<u>School Archive</u>, a collection committed to preserving essential materials related to that architectural movement, according to the release. <u>Read more</u>.

#### **Artstor**

Artstor's content and resources are moving to the JSTOR platform. Currently, 96% of Artstor's content is available on JSTOR. In the coming months, the remaining 4% will migrate and the Artstor website will be fully retired on August 1, 2024. The JSTOR platform will retain the same functionality as Artstor. A <u>feature comparison</u> and <u>FAQ</u> are available now to help with the migration.

#### **China Academic Journals**

Due to legal developments in China, some journals in the China Academic Journals database are temporarily unavailable. Content is being restored as the database vendor amends each publisher contract in accordance with new requirements regarding author permissions. To see the list of impacted journals, view the most recent <u>title list</u>. This process may vary depending on the publisher and the title list will be updated over time.

## New Resources at the UL

#### The Romanoff Collection

The Romanoff Collection at the University Libraries opened to public research in January 2023, after a generous \$2 million gift to the University of Oklahoma in late summer 2022.

The collection is part of a gift by Princess Janet Romanoff to the University that also established the Romanoff Center for Russian Studies on the OU-Norman campus, creating the only academic entity named after the Russian royal family in the United States. Read more.

#### **ProQuest Databases**

The Libraries' ProQuest databases provide a wide range of functionalities that assist scholars and instructors. Some you may not be aware of include:

- Supporting multiple citation styles, including APA, Chicago, MLA, and Turabian
- Setting preferences such as <u>search interface language</u>
- Setting <u>publication</u> and <u>search</u> alerts
- Information on using **ProQuest in Canvas**
- Using the <u>My Research</u> tool to save, manage, and organize content and materials you find and create in ProQuest databases

#### **New Works in Public Domain**

On January 1, 2023, copyrighted works from 1927 <u>entered the US public domain</u>. These works include Virginia Woolf's *To the Lighthouse*, Thornton Wilder's *The Bridge of San Luis Rey*, Fritz Lang's *Metropolis*, and more.

### Douglas D. Gaffin, PhD Professor Emeritus of Biology Department of Biology



Doug Gaffin is Professor Emeritus of <u>Biology</u> at OU. He has served as Dean of <u>University College</u> and Interim Dean of the <u>Honors College</u>. Dr. Gaffin studies scorpion sensory biology, with a focus on navigation. He is extremely proud of the many undergraduates who have worked in his research laboratory, over twenty of which became authors on published papers before they graduated from OU. Dr. Gaffin has received the David Ross Boyd Professorship, the Regents' Award for Superior Teaching, and the Outstanding Freshman Advocate Award from the National Center for the First-Year Experience. He loves volleyball,

camping, playing the banjo, and hanging out with his wonderful wife Dr. Mariëlle Hoefnagels.

Dr. Gaffin is also a four-time recipient of OU's subvention funding to help support the open publication of his research, including his recent articles "<u>Synaptic Interactions in Scorpion Peg Sensilla Appear to Maintain Chemosensory Neurons within Dynamic Firing Range</u>" and "<u>Evidence of Learning Walks Related to Scorpion Home Burrow Navigation</u>."

<u>In Dr. Gaffin's profile</u>, he shares his thoughts on publishing "in the open," the resulting connections he's made with other scholars, and his findings from an informal impact metric analysis.

#### **Nature Announces Rules for ChatGPT Use**

*Nature*, along with all Springer Nature journals, has formulated two principles on using large language models (LLMs): first, that no LLM tool will be accepted as a credited author on a research paper, and second, that researchers using LLM tools should document this use in the methods or acknowledgements sections. America's institutions maintain control of the remains of hundreds of thousands of Native Americans as well as sacred items. A federal law, the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act, was meant to help return them, but decades after its 1990 passage, many tribes are still waiting. Read more.
