#### School of the Air

The Oklahoma School of the Air digital collection has been published online in OU Libraries Digital Collections. The University of Oklahoma broadcast the School of the Air program through its WNAD radio station, starting in 1946 and continuing through the 1950s. Like other Schools of the Air throughout the nation, OU's goal was to provide educational radio programming to assist rural school districts. The collection

contains over 150 digitized open-reel audio tapes of recordings of the show's history segments, "Know Your Oklahoma" and "Oklahoma Portrait." The project was funded through a grant from the Council on Library & Information Resources (CLIR) Recordings at Risk program.

#### The Romanoff Collection

The Romanoff Collection at the University Libraries opened to public research in January 2023, after a generous \$2 million gift to the University of Oklahoma in late summer 2022.

The collection is part of a gift by Princess Janet Romanoff to the University that also established the Romanoff Center for Russian Studies on the OU-Norman campus,

# Michele Eodice Senior Writing Fellow, PhD Center for Faculty Excellence



Michele Eodice is the Senior Writing Fellow in the Center for Faculty Excellence at the University of Oklahoma. In this role she is a resource for faculty writers on manuscripts and proposals and offers writing retreats, writing groups and workshops, and individual faculty coaching. From 2006-2018 she directed the OU Writing Center and served as Associate Provost for Academic Engagement. From 1998-2006 she was the founding director of the writing center at the University of Kansas. Dr. Eodice is currently an editor of the online open access journal, Writers: Craft & Context, published in partnership with the University of Oklahoma Libraries

on the Open Journal Systems platform.

#### **Ivy Plus Libraries Raise Concerns over APC Models**

On March 2, the Ivy Plus Libraries Confederation <u>sent a letter</u> to the White House Office of Science & Technology Policy (OSTP) expressing strong support for <u>OSTP's move</u> to make federally funded research immediately available to the public to freely access and fully use. In the letter, the libraries applaud the goals of the Nelson Memorandum, and pledge to partner with the administration to support its effective implementation. They also urge OSTP to consider implementation pathways that directly align with the values of the research community, and express deep concerns about pay-to-publish models, specifically APCs and institutional Read and Publish Agreements.
