DISTRIBUTION OF UNIVERSITY SENATE MEMBERSHIP

Explanatory Comment

The Charter of the University Senate, as approved by the Regents of the University in 1947, provides in part as follows:

The faculty of each college and degree granting school of the University shall be entitled to representation in the Senate proportionately on the basis of a quota to be determined by the general faculty every third year beginning in 1947. However, each college and independent degree granting school shall elect at least one member to the Senate. Any member of that faculty is eligible for election as such representative if he meets the eligibility requirements prescribed hereafter. The general faculty shall elect the remaining members of the Senate.

Senate Action

Dr. Moorhead moved that consideration of the proportional distribution of membership in the University Senate for the three-year period, September 1, 1954 to September 1, 1957, be referred to the appropriate committee of the Senate. His motion was approved by the Senate.

Dr. Pray, as Chairman of the University Senate, referred the matter to the Committee on University Organization, Budget, and Publications.

Senate Action Relative to the Report of the Committee on Committees

Dr. Reese, Chairman of the Committee on Committees, moved that the nominations indicated in the above report be approved. His motion was passed by the Senate. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES

Election of Replacement for Professor J. B. Wiley

Dr. Reese, Chairman of the Committee on Committees, reported that a leave of absence granted Professor J. B. Wiley created a vacancy on the Committee for the remainder of a three-year term, 1952-53.

Dr. Ewing moved that a replacement for Professor Wiley be elected to serve only during the time that Professor Wiley remains away from the campus. His motion was approved.

COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES -- continued

Increase in the Membership of the Committee

Dr. Livezey commented on the ever-increasing scope of the duties of the Committee on Committes. He indicated that he believes that the number of people serving on the Committee should be increased.

Dr. Reese moved that Part 1 of Section E of the By-Laws of the Senate be amended so that the Committee on Committees will consist of five members instead of three. His motion was approved by the Senate.

In accordance with the procedure for amending the By-Laws of the Senate, this amendment will be distributed to the members of the Senate two weeks in advance of the next regular meeting at which time a vote will be taken on it.

ELIBIBILITY OF STUDENTS TO RECEIVE DEGREES

Letter from President Cross

July 16, 1953

Dear Professor Porter:

During the past few months, two cases have come to my attention of individuals who were eligible for suspension for poor scholarship at the time that their degrees were conferred.

The system of academic accounting permits such situations to occur by virtue of the fact that an individual who becomes involved during a terminal semester still may not lose grade points enough to take his average below the "C" necessary for graduation.

It seems to me that his situation is somewhat anomalous, in terms of the overall university concern with high level performance, and that it perhaps should be made the subject of an investigation and recommendation by the University Senate.

I ask that the Senate investigate and recommend in regard to a University-wide policy concerning the eligibility of students to receive degrees in semesters during which they are eligible for suspension.

REORGANIZATION OF THE UNIVERSITY COLLEGE COUNCIL

Letter from President Cross

Dear Dr. Browder:

June 11, 1953

I am asking the University Faculty Senate to consider the possible reconstitution of the present University College Council. The council is now composed of two representatives from Arts and Sciences, two from Engineering and one from each of the other colleges, plus a representative of the general students and another for the unclassified students.

I should appreciate it if the Faculty Senate, after study by its appropriate committee or committees, would consider the reorganization of the University College Council along the following lines:

- 1. <u>Suggested Membership</u>: One representative from each academic department in the University, under the chairmanship of the Dean of University College.
- 2. Suggested Responsibilities:
 - (a) To study all introductory courses with reference to course content, particularly with respect to the integration of introductory courses in various areas (Social Sciences, Physical Sciences, etc.).
 - (b) To develop short-term programs (one-year, two-year, etc.) especially those that cut across college lines (i. e., a combined program in Home Economics and Secretarial Science) in the University College.
 - (c) To encourage and stimulate the development of two-year programs in other colleges, both general (such as the new programs in General Business) and specialized or vocational (such as the two-year programs in Secretarial Science).

August 26, 1953

In studying University Committees this summer, I notice that of all standing committees appointed from my office each year nominations for six are made by the Faculty Senate. These committees are as follows:

- 3. Council on Instruction
- 4. Council on Planning and Development
- 5. Council on Faculty Retirement
- 6. Committee on University Libraries

There are numerous other committees, of course, and many of these I think have a considerable amount of responsibility in regard to policy. It occurred to me that the Faculty Senate should have the responsibility of submitting nominations to my office in regard to membership on these committees. I should like to receive from the Senate following the April meeting of 1954 nominations for membership on the following committees in addition to the six listed above:

- 1. Admissions and Advanced Standing
- 2. Class Schedule Committee
- 3. Student Conduct Committee
- 4. University Elections Committee
- 5. Faculty Intramural Committee (The Senate may wish to suggest that the Faculty Intramural Committee be constituted as a subcommittee of the new Athletic Council, particularly since the budget for intramural athletics has been transferred to the Athletic Council.)
- 6. Military, Naval, and Air Committee
- 7. Pan American Committee
- 8. Public Lectures and Colloquia Committee
- 9. University Scholarship Committee
- 10. Serial Publications Committee

I shall appreciate your favorable consideration of this respect.

ABSENCE DUE TO EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Letter from President Cross

Dear Professor Porter:

June 1, 1953

This letter has reference to action taken by the University Senate on May 25 concerning item D under Old Business. The Senate voted "that campus wide activities (Religious Emphasis Week, Career Conference, etc.) be scheduled at times when there is the least conflict with classes, such as late afternoons, evenings, and Saturdays."

It is not clear whether this action is intended as a recommendation to the administration of the University, or whether it is intended as a directive to the various organizations which schedule meetings on the campus.

If it is intended as a recommendation to the administration, I must admit that I would hesitate to instruct the campus organizations that their meetings must be scheduled at such times as "late afternoons, evenings, and Saturdays" as long as attendance on the part of students and participation on the part of faculty remain voluntary. I believe that it would be much better for a committee of the Senate to meet with representatives of the various organizations and attempt to work out cooperatively a schedule of meetings which would conflict to the least possible extent with class work.

If the action of the Senate was intended as directive to the various organizations, then I believe by all means that conferences should be held with representatives of the various groups before any attempt is made to enforce the directive.

Will you please place the above statement on the agenda of the Senate for the next meeting.
