APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES

The Journal of the Senate for the regular meeting held on March 26, 1956, was approved.

SENATE ACTION APPROVED BY PRESIDENT CROSS

President Cross has approved the recommendation made by the Senate on January 30, 1956, concerning last date for enrollment in classes. The recommendation becomes effective for the fall semester of the 1956-57 session.

President Cross has indicated approval of two recommendations made by the Senate on March 26, 1956:

- (1) Proposed Regulations to Govern Formulation of the University Calendar -- File No. 1955-56-1.
- (2) Admission to Freshman Standing in the University -- File No. 1955-56-2.

USE OF FILE NUMBERS

In accordance with a plan developed with Vice President McCarter, all significant matters considered by the Senate will in the future carry file numbers. Thus, numbers are indicated for certain of the items about which reports are presented in the following pages.

UNIVERSITY CALENDAR (File No. 1955-56-5)

Consideration of the University Calendars for the next four years was not an item included in the Agenda for the Senate meeting on April 30. However, the Senate has been concerned in recent months with the development of regulations pertaining to the calendar. The Chairman requested the Senate to indicate whether this matter should be considered in view of its not being on the Agenda. Dr. Ewing moved that the calendars for the next four years be considered as first item of new business. His motion was seconded and passed.

Dean Fellows presented the calendars as set forth in the material below. He indicated that they were prepared in strict accordance with the regulations recently adopted. Dean Fellows and Professor Artman answered questions relative to various elements of the calendars. Professor Farrar moved that the calendars be approved by the Senate for submission to President Cross. His motion was seconded and passed by the Senate. STATUS OF PROFESSIONAL LIBRARIANS (File No. 1955-56-5)

Explanatory Comment

On July 14, 1955, Vice President Pete Kyle McCarter, wrote the following letter to the Secretary of the Senate:

In 1953 Dr. McAnally sent to President Cross a petition from the Staff Association of the University of Oklahoma Library, together with his own recommendation, that the professional librarians on the Library Staff be given "academic status". Recently he has renewed this recommendation in a revised and strengthened form.

President Cross has decided to refer this question to the Senate for consideration and recommendation. Accordingly, I am sending you the Staff Association petition and Dr. McAnally's two recommendations. This office has a file of other materials, consisting of discussions by the Vice Presidents and by Dr. McAnally, which we shall be glad to make available to the committee to which the Senate refers the question.

Status of Professional Librarians -- continued

I am sending this material on to you in the hope that the Senate can take it up early in the fall and expedite action on it. I have taken the liberty of assuring Dr. McAnally that he and members of the professional staff will be given full opportunity to appear and discuss the recommendations with the Senate or its committee.

This matter was referred to the Senate Committee on Faculty Personnel.

Report of Committee on Faculty Personnel

April 16, 1956

This committee recommends the following rule for the conferring of academic rank:

"Academic Rank should be conferred only on one who gives instruction in a regularly scheduled class."

An approval of the request from the staff association of the University of Oklahoma Library would involve:

(a) granting of tenure.

(b) granting of sabbatical leave
(under the present rule, tenure and sabbatical leaves cannot be granted to
those whose teaching in regularly scheduled classes is incidental to their
other work.)

Senate Action

Professor Farrar, Chairman of the Committee on Faculty Personnel, presented the report of his committee and commented relative to the problems involved. He moved that the University Senate adopt the report as a recommendation to President Cross. His motion was seconded.

Dr. McAnally was present to discuss this matter from the point of view of the professional librarians. He presented information and data to substantiate his opinion that academic rank for professional librarians is essential to improvement of library facilities at this University. A lengthy discussion of the entire problem was engaged in by the members of the Senate following Dr. McAnally's remarks. The Senate then approved the report of the Committee on Faculty Personnel. This action in effect disapproves the proposal that professional librarians be granted academic rank.

MEMBERSHIP OF THE BUDGET COUNCIL (File No. 1955-56-3)

Explanatory Comment

On January 4, 1956, the Fine Arts Council submitted to the University Senate a proposal to amend Pargraph (a) under the heading Membership of the Budget Council in the Faculty Handbook; the amended paragraph to read as follows:

"Nine members of the faculty appointed by the President from a list of at least eighteen nominated by the University Senate, two of whom should be from the faculties of the following constitutent colleges and schools: Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Fine Arts, Law, Medicine, and Pharmacy; to serve three-year staggered terms, three terms expiring each year. Initial appointments shall be for one, two and three-year terms."

On January 30, 1956, at a regular meeting of the Senate, Dean Kerr commented relative to the foregoing proposal. The matter was then referred to the Committee on University Organization, Budget and Publications for study and a report.

Report of the Committee on University Organization, Budget and Publications

April 9, 1956

Dr. Jim E. Reese, President Faculty Senate

Dear Dr. Reese:

The Committee on University Organization, Budget and Publications wishes to submit the following report at the next meeting of the Faculty Senate:

"The Committee believes that the members of the Budget Council should represent the interests of the University as a whole rather than represent an individual department, school or college. To adopt a requirement that nominations be made from certain departments may create the impression that those nominees should represent the interests of that department. Therefore, the Committee believes that such a requirement should not be adopted.

The Committee does believe, however, that the Budget Council cannot represent the interests of the whole University if too many members are from the same college. A majority of the membership should never be from any one college. Therefore the Committee recommends that:

'Not more than four members of the Budget Council may be from the same college'."

CRITERIA FOR FACULTY PROMOTIONS AND PAY RAISES (File No. 1955-56-4)

Dear Dr. Reese:

As Secretary of the local chapter of the American Association of University Professors, I am respectfully submitting a resolution passed by the chapter at a recent meeting held on December 6, 1955. The resolution in essence requested the University Senate to review the criteria for faculty promotion and pay raises with a view toward clarification and possible changes.

During the meeting some members commented that some of the criteria were ambigious and difficult to apply. Specific reference to this regard was made to "evidence of service to the University" (number 8) and "citizenship in and loyalty to the United States, and interest in civic affairs" (number 10). Also there was some question about the relative weight of each criterion in determining promotions and pay raises.

Committee Recommendation

In a system where salary levels and promotions in rank are handled by committee recommendations, it is probable that the members of the evaluating committees must rely, to a considerable degree, on documentary evidence in forming an entries

Criteria for Faculty Promotions and Pay Raises - continued

This evidence, as compiled and furnished by the basic budgetary unit, should substantiate the faculty member's value, both direct and indirect, to the Univeristy.

The present evaluating criteria, as established by the Senate, are considered adequate when used as the basis for a qualitative measure of ability. To attempt a quantitative application of these criteria is basically unsound, as an emphasis on any one factor is practical only when the area in which the service is rendered is given full consideration.

Considering, therefore, the difficulty in attempting a quantitative measurement of human ability, we recommend that no change be made in the existing criteria for promotion in rank and increase in salary. It is further recommended that the various budget committees consider these criteria as a composite summary of accomplishment and weigh the various factors involved with due regard to the individual's area of activity and opportunity for service.
