REIURNING TESTS TO STUDENTS
Report of Committee on Student and Public Relations
May 4, 1960
The Student and Public Relations Committoe believes that the Student Senate resolution recommending a two-week time limit on the reporting of examina tion and quiz results is, in general, a valid one. The committee believes that the student should be allowed to see the graded paper, projoct, or examination within a reasonable period of time. However, the committee believes that such a time-limit regulation can be administered only at the level of the various departments and schools, therefore it recommends that the student senate resolum tion be approved in principle by the University Senate.

If this recommendation is approved by President Cross, it is further recommended that the matter be referred to the chairmen and directors of the various departments and schools through a memorandum from the President's Office.

R. O. T. C. REQUIREMENTS

Report of the Committee on Courses and Curricula
May 5, 1960
The Comittce on Courses and Curricula has received, studied and discussed material on the voluntary R. O. T. C. program at the University of Wisconsin referred to it by the chairman of the Senate. The material was sent to the Senate through the President's Office by a comittee of the University Regents currently studying our R. O. T. C. requirement. The Regents' committee was thus indicating its willingness to hear faculty opinion of the Wisconsin program, but was not issuing a formal invitation to an arranged meeting.

The Committee on Courses and Curricula recomends to the Senate:

1. That the Senate-which is on record as favoring voluntary $R$. O. T. Co-mot commit itself with regard to that aspect of the Wisconsin plan which puts $R$. $O$. T, $C$. on a voluntary basis. The committee recommends this because at Wisconsin compulsory $R$. O. T. C. will be re-established if the number of students entcring advanced $R . O$. $T$. C. falls below 75 per cent of current enrollment. Voluntary R. O. T. C. therefore is thus being accepted on a very tentative basis only.
2. That the Scnate refer to the Council on Instruction that aspect of the Wisconsin plan which establishes a radically revised curriculum for those students interested in going through both basic and advanced R. O. T. C. The Committec, howover, cndorscs the principle of introducing University instruction into the curriculum to replace military instruction.
3. That mombers of the Senate familiarize themsclves with the Wisconsin plan by studying the materials we have pertaining to it. These are too extensive to be reproduced, or efficiently condensed; they are available in Room 106, Buchanan Hall.

RATES FOR EQUIPMENT RENTAL AND DEPLRTMENTAL SERVICES Report of the Committee on University Organization, Budget, and Publications

May 10, 1960
At the University Senate meeting of November 30, 1959, the matter of charges to instructional departments for photographic services, visual aids services and equipment utilization, and rental rates for typewriters and office machincs was referred to this committee for invostigation. Committee members have met on several occasions with the following individuals: Dr. A . H. Doerr, Associate Professor of Geography; Mr. Dud Giezentanner, University Business Manager: Mr. J. C. Mayfield, Manager of the University Book Exchange; and Mr. John J. Long, Coordinating Director, Educational Materials Services. At these meetings, detailed summaries and analyses of the procedures, operation, and charges for services supplied by the agencies involved and the rental rates for equipment were submitted and discussed.

In justification of present procedures and charges the following items were given consideration:

1. Selaries or wages for personnel providing services and equipment maintenance have increased in recent years.
2. Costs for replacement of equipment have gone up and continue to go up.
3. It is desirable to maintain adequate supplies of modern machines and avoid the accumulation of unserviceable or obsolescent equipment.
4. Any changes in rental and service charges would be reflected in increased or decreased individual department budget "C" allocations with no net relief to any department.
5. Adverse influence of present procedures, service and rental charges on extent of usage by individual departments. This is particularly pronounced in the case of visual aids, where there has been a very marked decrease in the use of films and projection equipment by instructional departments, concurrent with the change from the previous plan of making no direct charges for services and equipment to the present policy of specific charges for same.

RECOMMENDITIONS: The Committee recommends the following:

1. With regard to photographic services and rental on typewriters and office machines, that the University administration exercise at all times due dilligence towards keeping these service and rental charges to a minimum consistent with rendering good and efficient service, considering the possibility of adopting a longer amortization period for retiring machines.

2. With regard to visual aids, that the administration give consideration to a return to the former policy of no direct charges to instructional departments for such services and rentals, in order to encourage use of such facilities.
