APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES

SENATE INFORMATION

- A. <u>Selective Tuition Increase.</u> -- The request of the University Senate, adopted on April 27, 1964, and pertaining to the question of an increase in fees in the College of Law, was conveyed by President Cross to the Regents on May 14, 1964, and was made a part of the minutes of that meeting. - B. Physical Education for Men and Women. (This is an item of unfinished business.) -- On April 27, 1964, the University Senate approved a motion that study of compulsory physical education for both men and women be continued by the Senate Committee on Courses and Curricula. On May 25, 1964, a progress report was made by Dr. Rufus Hall as the chairman of that committee.

Physical Education for Men and Women -- continued

Statement from President Cross:

May 28, 1964

At the Regents' meeting on May 14, I reported the conclusion of the University Senate that, if physical education grades are excluded from the computation of grade point averages, more students' averages will be affected adversely than will be affected favorably.

This led to a discussion of the idea that the inclusion of the physical education grade in computing the grade point average might be made optional with the student - that is, that it might be included automatically unless the student requested that it not be included.

The Regents asked me to pass this suggestion on to the Senate for its consideration.

NOTE: The problems under consideration during 1963-64 and the issue raised in the foregoing memorandum from President Cross, are matters for study during 1964-65 by the SENATE COMMITTEE ON COURSES AND CURRICULA.

COMMENTS BY PRESIDENT CROSS

At the Senate meeting on September 28, President Cross utilized approximately 30 minutes in conveying a general message on the state of the University. His comments dealt with a number of topics, including: (1) enrollment figures for the first semester of 1964-65, (2) self-study research being done by the staff of the Regents for Higher Education, (3) problems connected with vacating of the position of Dean of Students, and (4) developments in the Plan for Excellence program.

GENERAL FACULTY MEMBERSHIP FOR ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICERS

Memorandum from President Cross

June 8, 1964

General Faculty membership is held by all but five administrative officers of the University. Some hold it because their positions are covered by title in the General Faculty Charter. Others have gained membership through the nomination and election procedure provided in the Charter. The desirability of this association is well established by practice and it is my desire to extend the association to all administrative officers. In general, I believe a continuing relationship of this kind will assist administrative officers in the discharge of their responsibilities and in making a contribution to the achievement of University goals.

In accordance with the terms of the Charter of Government of the University, I recommend that the following Administrative Officers be granted status as members of the General Faculty:

SOONER CITY NURSERY SCHOOL

Statement from Professor Ginsberg

September 21, 1 64

The University of Oklahoma operates what appears to be, according to the statements of participating families, an excellent day care center for preschool children called Sooner City Nursery School. Because of its quality, the increasing numbers of University families desiring the service it offers, and a severe shortage of comparable facilities in Norman, there is intense competition for vacancies in the school. This requires a waiting list for admission and there appears to be confusion, anxiety, and misunderstanding in the minds of parents whose children's names are placed on the list.

In view of these conditions, I would recommend the following for the Senate's consideration:

1. That the Sooner City Nursery School be asked to prepare a written explanation of its enrollment procedures, criteria, and priority system for selection, to be provided to those seeking the service of the School, and published in student handbooks and other appropriate publications.

Sooner City Nursery School -- continued

2. That attention be given to expanding the day care facilities of the University, in light of the increasing demand for such services.

To my knowledge, the School does not have a written explanation of its admission policies. Some have been explained verbally and they seem, on the whole, quite rational. (Students have priority over faculty and staff members. Those connected with the University have priority over those not so connected, etc.) However, it would seem helpful to those applying if the general guidelines for admission, with provisions for exceptions, were reduced to writing and provided to them.

With regard to the second point, I understand that the School is financially self-sustaining. With this and the great demand for high quality day care services in mind, it would seem most reasonable to develop new facilities of this nature.
