UL Announces Digital Scholarship and Data Services Unit

The Digital Strategies and Innovation Division reorganized four areas of its front-facing service units this summer into one combined streamlined unit, now named <u>Digital</u> <u>Scholarship and Data Services</u> (DSDS).

Combined in the new unit are formerly distinct areas: Emerging Technologies services, Data Analytics, Visualization, and Informatics Syndicate (DAVIS), Digital Scholarship, and Informatics services.

The UL's information professionals in DSDS can provide assistance with data creation, data management, data manipulation, 3D services, informatics, and visualization. The unit will be expanding service offerings in emerging technologies as they fill vacant positions and enhance expertise.

Open Access News

Subvention Funding Updates

- **Open Access Book Publication:** The fall application period for newlyestablished funding to support the publication of open access books is open now through October 16. This funding is provided by the Dodge Family College of Arts & Sciences, the University Libraries, and the Vice President for Research and Partnerships. Learn more.
- Hybrid and Open Access Subvention Funding Changes:
 - Applications for hybrid and open access subvention funding must be received *prior to publication*. More publishers are unwilling to including funding acknowledgement statements in articles that have already been

published, or may require that acknowledgement after publication can only be accommodated via erratum.

Tools for Vetting Open Access Journals

The Libraries' <u>Open Initiatives & Scholarly Communication</u> monitors developments in the open access landscape. We note that there has been attention lately on *guestedited special issues of open access journals*, specifically on their rapid proliferation. We want to encourage OU authors to thoughtfully select publication venues, whether open access or paywalled.

New Databases

- <u>Exploring Race in Society</u> provides content related to race, ethnicity, diversity, and inclusiveness in society, covering topics such as affirmative action, food insecurity, environmental justice, voting rights, and much more.
- <u>CORE</u> is a not-for-profit service providing "access to the world's largest collection of open access research papers, collecting and indexing research from repositories and journals."
- <u>America's News</u> includes access to over 3,600 national, regional, and local news sources, including *The Oklahoman* from 1981 onward.
- <u>Black Life in America Series 3: 1976-Today</u> explores six decades of African American history, culture, and daily life.
- <u>Hispanic Life in America Series 3: 2010-Today</u> is a digital archive of primary source documents related to the Hispanic American experience.
- <u>Environmental Science and History Digital Archive</u> includes unique and rare archival collections from multiple global sources, including the Royal Anthropological Institute and New York Academy of Sciences.

Chronicle Series Exposes Challenges with Digital Courseware

A recent three-part series by *The Chronicle of Higher Education* reporter Taylor Swaak takes a deep dive into how the use of digital courseware in U.S. higher ed has grown, in many ways unaccountably, raising issues from outsourcing instruction, to data privacy, to creating a "homework tax" on students. Courseware accounted for a quarter of Pearson's \$4.7 billion in revenue in FY22, 40% of Cengage's \$1.5 billion in revenue for FY23, and one-third of McGraw-Hill's total customer invoices for FY23. Oklahoma's Women Warriors Western History Collections, Monnet Hall Room 300, Through January 2024



The Western History Collections has installed a new exhibition co-curated by two of its graduate research assistants, Megan Green and Melissa Weiss. The exhibit focuses on three women and their efforts to fight for what was important to them. The "Fighting for Norman" case looks at June Benson's work as the first woman elected as a mayor in Oklahoma, along with her ongoing civic engagement after her two terms as Norman's mayor from 1957 to 1960. The "Fighting for Equality" case focuses on women's rights activists' attempts to rally support

for the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) in Oklahoma from 1972 through 1982. The Shirley Hilbert-Price Collection featured in the case includes a wide range of materials used to advocate for the ERA. The "Fighting for Justice" case features Anita Hill and her experiences at the University of Oklahoma during and after her testimony before the U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee's Supreme Court confirmation hearings about the sexual harassment she experienced while working for Clarence Thomas. Professor Hill's testimony bolstered conversations about sexual harassment across the nation and continues to be a litmus test for judging how much progress has been made since 1991 on gender-based harassment.
