ACM Announces New OA Publishing Model for ICPS

ACM, the Association for Computing Machinery, has announced it will <u>transition its International Conference Proceedings Series</u> (ICPS) to a fully Open Access (OA) publishing model beginning January 1, 2024. Making its ICPS program Open Access represents an important step in ACM's comprehensive shift to full OA publication of all content in the ACM Digital Library, which is planned for completion by December 2025. UL Digital Collection: Indians for Indians Radio Show

The Indians for Indians radio show was broadcast from OU's WNAD radio station from 1941 through 1976. Created by Don Whistler, who was chief of the Sac and Fox Tribe, the show was an intertribal forum for Native self-expression. Recordings of approximately 200 of the broadcasts have been archived in OU's Western History Collections. In 2018, the OU Libraries received a Council on Library and Information Resources Recordings at Risk grant to digitize these recordings and make them accessible online. View the collection here.

Dr. Sandra Tarabochia

Associate Professor of English



Sandra Tarabochia is an associate professor of English in Rhetoric and Writing Studies at the University of Oklahoma. She is currently an editor of the online open access journal *Writers: Craft & Context*, published in partnership with the University of Oklahoma Libraries on the Open Journal Systems (OJS) platform.

Dr. Tarabochia is the author of *Reframing the Relational: A Pedagogical Ethic for Crosscurricular Literacy Work*, published

Dr. Tarabochia is one of few researchers to use poetic inquiry, an arts-based research methodology, to study the lives of writers. She facilitated poetic inquiry workshops at the 2021 Watson Conference and 2022 International Congress on Qualitative Inquiry and has a chapter on poetic inquiry forthcoming in *Improvisations: Methods and Methodologies in Lifespan Writing Research*, the first book in a series sponsored by the Writing Through the Lifespan Collaborative.
