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## Survey Motivation

Changing seasonal weather patterns and increases in climate-related severe weather have resulted in billions of dollars in damages to property as well as injuries and loss of life across the United States. These climate and weather patterns are expected to continue in the coming decades, depending on the magnitude of global warming, ushering in more frequent heat waves and intensifying the water cycle, which will result in more extreme weather events including severe winter storms, flooding, severe wind, hail, drought, and fire weather (i.e., land and weather conditions that are conducive to wildfires) (IPCC, 2021). Humans do not exist independent of Earth systems, and Earth systems no longer operate independently of human influence, as evidenced by the proposal of a new geologic era - the Anthropocene (Crutzen, 2002). This increase in natural catastrophes and large-scale disasters, both observed over the last few decades and expected in the near future, cause repetitive stress and strain on society in rebuilding and mitigation efforts and create disproportionate vulnerabilities for individuals (Thomas et al., 2019). There are a few studies that focus on how attitudes and behaviors are impacted by natural disasters (e.g., Maki et al., 2019; Rudolph \& Kuhn, 2018; Sun et al., 2019); however, most of these studies analyzed data that are limited in sample size, and generally looked at on an aggregated level rather than individual-level attitudes and behaviors. This is not always ideal because data on individual attitudes and behaviors can be used to inform climaterelated interventions and policies, as well as increase understanding of the willingness of individuals to help others in need, post-disaster. As a first step towards filling data needs, we conducted an online survey - the inaugural wave and pilot study of the Social, Political, Earth \& Environmental Survey - in 2023 (SPEER23 Survey).

## Key Components of the SPEER23 Survey

## Tolerance Scales

The primary aim of this survey is to collect data that allow us to assess the impact of climaterelated phenomena on levels of tolerance (the willingness to accept others) held by individuals. A good deal of theoretical work suggests that climate-related disasters have the potential to affect tolerance levels in individuals. Drawing on theories of cultural tightness/looseness (Gelfand, 2018) and terror management (Burke et al., 2013; Landau et al. 2004; Solomon et al., 2015), our overarching hypothesis is that extreme weather exposure reduces individuals' social and political tolerance. To assess general tolerance, we improved upon measures of tolerance found in existing surveys, such as the General Social Survey (GSS) and the American National Election Studies (ANES) by using measures of both political and social tolerance that were assessed in separate steps in the SPEER23 Survey. First, respondents were asked to select their "least-liked" from a list of ten hypothetical individuals belonging to different groups - half left-leaning, half right-leaning. The respondents were reminded of their least-liked choice and then asked a series of questions to assess both political and social tolerance. This "least-liked" approach-which has been advocated by multiple scholars on tolerance (see Djupe, 2015; Eisenstein, 2006; Sullivan et al., 1982) is often the gold standard of tolerance measurement because it measures the concept of "tolerance forbearance," meaning the willingness to grant rights to someone from a group that is least liked by the respondent. The tolerance items on the SPEER23 Survey improve upon the ones available in the GSS because measures in the latter survey only ask about support for stigmatized groups but do not ask whether or not the respondent "likes" members of that group. Exhibiting tolerance towards a group that a respondent likes the least indicates a much "higher bar" of tolerance. Finally, on the SPEER23 Survey we asked each respondent if they personally know anyone from their least-liked group and if they indicated that they do, we then asked about the nature of their relationship. This final step allows us to discern tolerance based on contact with stigmatized groups versus general perceptions. To assess left/right tolerance, the SPEER23 Survey also contains thermometer scales that are common to the ANES. We improved upon these measures by adding groups that are not commonly included for multiple years on the ANES cross-sectional surveys.

## Tolerance Vignettes

We also are interested in how the attributes of the individuals who message about climate and climate-mitigation strategies influence reactions to, and endorsement of, climate-related information and interventions. To assess tolerance for left/right climate mitigation messaging, the SPEER23 Survey includes a series of photo vignettes. This type of visual vignette has been used in social science research to investigate attitudes towards ingroups and outgroups (Havekes et al., 2013). Vignettes are increasingly popular in social research, although visual (e.g., photo) vignettes are used much less often than textual ones (Facciani et al., 2022). Respondents were randomly assigned one of two photos for each of four vignettes. (All respondents completed four vignettes.) Photos in the vignettes varied by urbanicity of location (first vignette), occupation (second vignette), race (third vignette), and gender (fourth vignette).

After viewing the photo for a particular vignette, respondents indicated how much they trust the messaging from the person shown in the photo.

Weather, Climate, and Ecological Items
The SPEER23 Survey includes several items that measure attitudes about and experiences with the environment, weather and climate. In particular, the survey includes a module of measures that gauge respondents' recollection of past experiences with, and expectations of a variety of weather events and disasters. Items making up the New Ecological Paradigm also were included.

## Other Items

The SPEER23 Survey also includes social, religious, psychological, political, and demographic questions. Social measures include scales for social capital and racial resentment. Religious questions include ones asking about religious service attendance, religious beliefs, biblical literalism, religious affiliation, and Christian nationalism. Psychological questions measure social dominance orientation, moral foundations, fears, conspiracy, and cultural worldviews. Political items measure party affiliation and left/right orientation. Finally, socio-demographic background questions ask about age, race, ethnicity, sex, gender, family structure, marital status, education, income, urbanicity, and region. A summary of the questions, their location in the survey questionnaire, and their basic purpose is shown in Table 1.

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## Data Collection

The SPEER23 Survey was administered by Qualtrics using funds from the University of Oklahoma. Respondents (adult citizens of the United States who were not incarcerated) were recruited from existing Qualtrics panels using an "opt-in" sampling strategy. Qualtrics used quotas for respondents based on age, race, sex, education, and geographic region to achieve a sample that is approximately representative to that of the United States adult population based on census data. Data collection occurred from May 12, 2023, to June 16, 2023. To ensure data quality, several validation measures were implemented. These included removing responses with straight-line answers, setting a minimum survey completion time, incorporating two attention verification questions, and adding a control question in the moral foundations section regarding the morality of being good at math. A final sample size of 2188 was achieved.

Panelists were recruited form a variety of sources and received compensation in accordance with the terms of their agreement with Qualtrics. Examples of compensation given by Qualtrics include airline miles, "points" at a retail outlet, cash, and gift cards. Panelists were invited to participate via email or though the Qualtrics platform. The estimated time of completion was 22 minutes.
