By the act (No. 54) making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the Government for the year ending June 30, 1874, and for other purposes.

LEGISLATIVE:

Senate:

One clerk in office of Secretary of Senate, at \$2,500 per annum.

House of Representatives:

Fifteen laborers, at \$720 per annum each; seven laborers during the session, at the rate of \$720 per annum, and one laborer at \$320; three pages, at the rate of \$3 per day while actually employed.

Public buildings and grounds:

One bridge-keeper at Chain Bridge, at \$720 per annum.

TREASURY DEPARTMENT:

Office of the Secretary:

One assistant engineer, at \$1,000 per annum; four firemen, at \$700 per annum each

Office of Commissioner of Customs:

One clerk of class four, one clerk of class three, one clerk of class two, two clerks of class one.

Auditor of Treasury for Post-Office Department:

Eight (additional) clerks of class three; three (additional) laborers, at \$720 per annum each, for money-order division.

Comptroller of the Currency:

Three female clerks, at \$720 each per annum.

INDEPENDENT TREASURY:

Office of the assistant treasurer at Boston:

One (assistant) specie clerk, at \$1,400 per annum.

WAR DEPARTMENT:

Office of the Adjutant-General:

One fireman, at \$720 per annum.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR:

Three clerks of class three, two clerks of class two, five clerks of class one, two messengers at \$720 per annum each, and three laborers whose compensation is not named.

United States Patent-Office:

Two second assistant examiners, at \$1,600 each per annum; twenty-four third assistant examiners, (in lieu of same number of second-class clerks,) at \$1,400 each per annum.

Surveyors-general and their clerks:

For salaries of surveyors-general and clerks in their respective offices increased appropriations are made for the several States and Territories, and amounts named as follows: Florida, \$1,000; Minnesota, \$1,700; Kansas, \$1,200; Colorado, \$2,300; New Mexico, \$2,300; California, \$13,000; Nevada, \$2,300; Oregon, \$1,400; Washington, \$3,000; Montana, \$2,000; Utah, \$700; Wyoming, \$2,700; Arizona, \$1,000.

One recorder of land-titles in Missouri, \$500 per annum.

POST-OFFICE DEPARTMENT:

Two clerks of class three.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE:

One microscopist, at \$1,800 per annum.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE:

Office of Attorney-General:

One clerk of class one, and one laborer at \$720 per annum.

Office of Solicitor of Treasury:

One clerk of class one.

By the act (No. 56) making appropriations to supply deficiencies in the appropriations for the service of the Government for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1873, and for other purposes.

There shall be appointed an assistant treasurer of the United States, to be located at Cincinnati, and an assistant treasurer of the United States, to be located at Chicago, with salaries of \$5,000 each per annum; whereupon the Secretary of the Treasury shall revoke the designation as depositaries of the United States of the surveyor of customs at Cincinnati and the collector of customs at Chicago.

Such assistant treasurers may, with the approval of the Secretary of the Treasury, appoint the same number of clerks and messengers, in their respective offices, and at the same rate of compensation as now provided by law for the offices of the United States depositaries at Cincinnati and Chicago, viz: At Cincinnati, one cashier at \$2,000

per-annum, one clerk at \$1,800, one clerk at \$1,500, two clerks at \$1,200 each, two clerks at \$1,000 each, one messenger at \$600, two watchmen at \$720 each, and one watchmen at \$240. At Chicago, one cashier at \$2,500 per annum, one assistant cashier at \$1,800, two clerks at \$1,500 each, one clerk at \$1,200, one messenger at \$840, and one watchman at \$720.

By the act (No. 40) making appropriations for the consular and diplomatic service of the Government for the year ending June 30, 1874, and for other purposes.

There is appropriated for salaries of consular officers, not citizens of the United States, \$10,000.

By the act (No. 31) making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian Department, and for fulfilling treaty stipulations with various Indian tribes, for the year ending June 30, 1874, and for other purposes.

There shall be appointed, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, not exceeding five Indian inspectors, to hold office for four years, unless sooner removed by the President, at a salary of \$3,000 each per annum and traveling expenses.

By the act (No. 14) regulating the compensation of the members and officers of the legislative assemblies of the several Territories of the United States, and limiting the duration of the sessions of said assemblies.

Additional officers of each branch of all territorial legislative assemblies are established, viz: One chief clerk, at \$8 per diem; one assistant clerk, one enrolling clerk, one engrossing clerk, one sergeant-at-arms, one doorkeeper, one messenger, and one watchman, who shall receive a compensation of \$5 per diem each during the sessions.

By the act (No. 27) revising and amending the laws relative to the mints, assay-offices, and coinage of the United States.

The Mint of the United States is established as a bureau of the Treasury Department, embracing in its organization and under its control all the mints and assay-offices now existing or that may be hereafter authorized. There shall be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a Director of the Mint, at a salary of \$4,500 per annum; and the Secretary of the Treasury shall appoint the number of clerks, classified according to law, necessary to discharge the duties of said bureau. The officers of each mint (to be appointed in like manner) shall be a superintendent, (which officers at the mints at Philadelphia and San Francisco shall receive a salary of \$4,500 each per annum, and at Carson City, \$3,000 per annum;) also an assayer, a melter and refiner, and a coiner, who shall each receive a salary of \$3,000 per annum; and, for the mint at Philadelphia, an engraver, whose salary is \$3,000 per annum; but the salary of the assayer, melter and refiner, and coiner at mint at Carson City shall be \$2,500 each per annum.

The superintendent of each mint shall appoint all assistant clerks (one of whom shall be designated a chief clerk) and workmen employed under his superintendence, which assistants and clerks shall receive such annual salary as shall be allowed by the Director of the Mint, with the approbation of the Secretary of the Treasury; and to the workmen shall be allowed such wages as may be customary and reasonable, according to their respective stations and occupations, to be approved by said Director of the Mint.

That the officers of the United States assay-office in New York shall be a superintendent, at a salary of \$4,500 per annum; an assayer, and melter and refiner, whose salaries shall be \$3,000 each per annum; to be appointed by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate.

And hereafter the officers of assay-offices, when their services are necessary, shall consist of an assayer and a melter, whose salaries shall not exceed the sum of \$2,500 each per annum. And the assayer may employ, under direction of the Director of the Mint, as many clerks (whose salaries shall not exceed \$1,800 each per annum) and workmen and laborers as may be provided for by law, which workmen and laborers shall receive the usual rates of compensation according to their respective stations and occupations.

By the act (No. 29) to provide for the appointment of a commission to complete the boundary line between the territory of the United States and the possessions of Great Britain not completed under the act of August eleventh, eighteen hundred and fifty-six, to carry into effect the first article of the treaty of fifteenth June, eighteen hundred and forty-six.

The President of the United States is authorized to appoint the Secretary of State, or either of the Assistant Secretaries, or the United States minister at London, or in

his discretion, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to appoint a commissioner to act jointly with such officer or commissioner as may be named by Her Britannic Majesty, for the purpose of completing the determination of so much of the boundary-line between the territory of the United States and the possessions of Great Britain as was left uncompleted by the commissioners appointed under the act of Congress of August eleventh, eighteen hundred and fifty-six, to carry into effect the first article of the treaty of the fifteenth of June, eighteen hundred and forty-six, between the United States and Great Britain.

The sum of \$5,000 is appropriated to carry out the above provisions.

By the act (No. 35) creating an additional land district in the Territory of Arizona.

A new land district, to be called the "Gila district," is established, and the President shall appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a register and a receiver therefor, who shall receive the same emoluments prescribed for like officers of Territories, viz, \$500 per annum each and fees.

By the act (No. 36) to provide for obtaining information of the condition of banks organized under State laws.

The Comptroller of the Currency is required to report annually to Congress the resources and liabilities and other data in respect to State banking institutions, and, if necessary therefor, the Comptroller is authorized to employ one clerk of class four, to be appointed by the Secretary of the Treasury.

By the act (No. 41) to define the limits of the collection district of the Teche, in the State of Louisiana, and for other purposes.

A new collection district is established, under the above name, and the salary of the collector thereof is fixed at \$1,000 per annum; but no collector is authorized to be appointed.

By the act (No. 53) to abolish the office of surveyor of the port of Chester, in Pennsylvania, and for other purposes.

The office of the surveyor at the port of Chester is abolished, and an inspector of customs, to reside at said port, shall be appointed, who shall have the powers of a deputy collector, and whose compensation shall not exceed that allowed by law to inspectors of customs at the port of Philadelphia, viz, \$1,460 per annum.

By the act (No. 62) to revise, consolidate, and amend the laws relating to pensions.

The President, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, shall appoint in the Department of the Interior a Deputy Commissioner of Pensions, whose salary shall be \$2,500 per annum.

By the act (No. 65) to amend an act entitled "An act making appropriations for the support of the Army for the year ending June 30, 1870," approved March 3, 1869.

The President is authorized to appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, one Assistant Adjutant-General, with the rank, pay, and emoluments of a major in the Department of the Adjutant-General.

By the act (No. 77) to provide for the establishment of a military prison, and for its government.

There is established at Rock Island, Illinois, a military prison for the confinement and reformation of offenders against the rules, regulations, and laws for the government of the Army.

The Secretary of War shall organize a board of five members, to consist of three officers of the Army and two persons from civil life, the latter of whom to hold office for three years, and shall be paid \$5 a day, while on duty, and necessary traveling expenses.

The other officers of the prison shall consist of a commandant and such subordinate officers as may be necessary, a chaplain, a surgeon, and a clerk, who shall be detailed by the Secretary of War from the commissioned officers of the Army.

By the act (No. 79) to create a port of delivery at La Crosse, in Wisconsin, and to provide for a surveyor of customs thereof.

La Crosse, Wisconsin, is constituted a port of delivery, and a surveyor of customs shall be appointed therefor, whose salary shall not exceed \$1,200 per annum.

By the act (No. 81) to make San Diego, in the State of California, a port of entry.

A new collection district in California is established, to be called the San Diego district, for which shall be appointed a collector, whose compensation shall be \$3,000 per annum.

The Secretary of the Treasury shall have power to appoint such inspectors, weighers, gaugers, measurers, and other officers as may be necessary for the collection of the revenue at said port; and the collector of said port may, with the approbation of said Secretary, appoint inspectors, whose compensation shall be one thousand dollars each per annum, for each of the ports of San Pedro and Santa Barbara, which shall continue to be ports of delivery.

By the act (No. 87) to establish a board of local inspectors of steam-vessels for the customs district of Michigan, in the State of Michigan.

There shall be a local board of inspectors designated and appointed for the customs district of Michigan, and the inspector of hulls and the inspector of boilers, composing the said board, shall receive a salary of \$900 each per annum.

By the act (No. 88) entitled "An act to amend an act entitled 'An act to provide for the redemption and sale of lands held by the United States under the several acts levying direct taxes,' and for other purposes."

Moneys derived from sale of certain school-farm lands in South Carolina shall be turned over to the Secretary of the Treasury for investment, the interest of which shall be annually expended for free schools in certain parishes in said State, which expenditure shall be made under direction of a special board of three commissioners, to be appointed by the Secretary of the Treasury, who shall receive not to exceed \$100 each per annum for their services.

By the act (No. 92) creating the collection district of Southern Oregon.

A collection district is established, with port of entry at Coos Bay, and a collector therefor shall be appointed, with a salary of \$1,000 per annum, with fees and commissions prescribed by law, not to exceed in all \$2,500 per annum.

Three ports of delivery are established for said collection district, and the said collector is authorized to appoint therefor three deputy collectors, at a salary of \$1,000 each per annum.

III.—OFFICES THE SALARIES OF WHICH HAVE BEEN INCREASED.

By the act (No. 54) making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the Government for the year ending June 30, 1874, and for other purposes.

LEGISLATIVE:

Senate:

The annual compensation of Senators (including Senators in 42d Congress holding office at the passage of this act) is fixed at \$7,500 each, and actual traveling expenses—*increase, \$2,500*—(exclusive of allowance for mileage, heretofore received but repealed by this act.) Secretary of Senate, \$5,000 per annum; *increase, \$680*. Principal legislative clerk, \$3,600 per annum; *increase, \$1,008*. Assistant door-keeper, \$3,000; *increase, \$408*. Postmaster, \$2,592; *increase, \$492*. Assistant postmaster, \$2,000; *increase, \$272*. Two mail-carriers, \$1,700 each; *increase, \$500* each. Superintendent of document-room, \$2,500; *increase, \$340*. First assistant superintendent document-room, \$2,500; *increase, \$1,060*. Second assistant superintendent document-room, \$1,800; *increase, \$360*. Additional compensation to the reporters of Congressional Globe, \$1,500 each; *increase, \$700*. Principal executive clerk, \$3,000; *increase, \$408*. Journal clerk, 3,000; *increase, \$408*. Financial clerk, \$3,000; *increase, \$408*. Librarian of Senate, \$2,500; *increase, \$280*. Six clerks, at \$2,500 each; *increase, \$280* each. Keeper of the stationery, \$2,400; *increase, \$280*. Assistant keeper of stationery at \$1,800, (formerly messenger at \$1,296;) *increase, \$604*. Acting assistant door-keeper at \$2,592, (formerly messenger at \$1,800;) *increase, \$792*. One special policeman, at \$1,296; *increase, \$296*. Three assistant engineers, at \$1,800 each; *increase, \$360* each.

And it is provided that the increase of salaries to the foregoing clerks, officers, and employes of the Senate shall begin with the Forty-second Congress. The pay of all the present employes of the Senate, including the employes in the Library of Congress and those under the Commissioner of Public Buildings and Grounds, now em-

ployed in the Capitol building, whose pay has not been specifically increased by this act, holding their places by appointment, or by the authority of the Committee to Audit and Control the Contingent Expenses of the Senate, is increased 15 per cent. of their present compensation on the amount actually received and payable to them respectively from the beginning of the 42d Congress, or from the date of their appointment during said Congress, and who shall be actually employed at the passage of this act.

House of Representatives :

The Speaker of the House of Representatives (after the 42d Congress) shall receive \$10,000 per annum; increase, \$2,000. The compensation of Representatives and Delegates in Congress (including Representatives and Delegates in 42d Congress holding such office at the passage of this act) is fixed at \$7,500 each and actual traveling expenses; increase, \$2,500, (exclusive of allowance for mileage heretofore received but repealed by this act.) Clerk of the House of Representatives, \$5,000 per annum; increase, \$680. Chief clerk, \$3,600 per annum; increase, \$600. Journal clerk, \$3,600 per annum; increase, \$600. Six clerks, at \$3,000 per annum; increase, \$408. Printing clerk, at \$3,000 per annum; increase, \$340. Petition clerk, at \$3,000 per annum; increase, \$840. One clerk, at \$2,500; increase, \$480. Nine clerks, at \$2,500 per annum; increase, \$340 each. Five clerks, at \$2,000 each per annum; increase, \$200 each. Door-keeper, \$3,000; increase, \$408. Additional compensation to reporters for Congressional Globe, \$1,500 each; increase, \$700 each. Chief engineer, \$2,160; increase, \$360.

All the foregoing increase of salaries shall begin with the 42d Congress.

The pay of all the present employes of the House of Representatives, and also the House reporters, whose pay has not been specifically increased by this act, holding their places by appointment under the officers thereof, or by the authority of the Committee of Accounts of the House, is increased 15 per cent. of their present compensation on the amount actually received and payable to them respectively from the beginning of the 42d Congress, or from the date of their appointment during the said Congress, and who shall be actually employed at the passage of this act.

Three mail-carriers, at \$1,720 each per annum; increase, \$640 each. Superintendent and assistant superintendent of document-room, at \$2,160 each per annum; increase from \$5.76 per diem.

Public Buildings and Grounds :

Clerk in office of Public Buildings and Grounds, at \$1,400; increase, \$200. One door-keeper at President's house, at \$1,200, (formerly assistant door-keeper, at \$1,080;) increase, \$120.

DEPARTMENT OF STATE :

Chief clerk, at \$2,500; increase, \$300.

TREASURY DEPARTMENT :

Office of Secretary :

Five firemen, at \$720 each; increase, \$100.

Supervising Architect :

Supervising Architect, \$4,000; increase, \$1,000.

Second Comptroller's Office :

Second Comptroller, at \$5,000; increase, \$1,000.

Office of Register of the Treasury :

Register of the Treasury, \$4,000; increase, \$1,000.

POST-OFFICE DEPARTMENT :

One captain of the watch, at \$1,000, (formerly watchman, at \$300;) increase, \$200.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE :

Office of Attorney-General :

Law-clerk, acting as examiner of titles, \$3,000; increase, \$500.

Miscellaneous.—The salary of the President of the United States is fixed at \$50,000 per annum; increase, \$25,000. Vice-President of the United States, \$10,000 per annum; increase, \$2,000. Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, \$10,500 per annum; increase, \$2,000; and the eight Justices of the Supreme Court, \$10,000 per annum each; increase, \$2,000 each. The salary of the Secretary of State, the Secretary of the Treasury, the Secretary of War, the Secretary of the Navy, the Secretary of the Interior, the Attorney-General, and the Postmaster-General is fixed at \$10,000 per annum each; increase, \$2,000 each; and the salary of each Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, of State, and of the Interior Department is fixed at \$6,000 per annum each; increase, \$2,500 each.

By section three of the act, the salaries of the following officers are established from and after July 1, 1873 :

Supervising Architect of Treasury, \$4,000; increase, \$1,000. Examiner of Claims in Department of State, \$4,000; increase, \$1,500. Solicitor of the Treasury, \$4,000; increase, \$500. Commissioner of Agriculture, \$4,000; increase, \$1,000. Commissioner of Customs, \$4,000; increase, \$1,000. Six Auditors of the Treasury, \$4,000 per annum each; increase, \$1,000 each. Commissioner of the General Land-Office, \$4,000; increase, \$1,000. Commissioner of Pensions, \$4,000; increase, \$1,000. Three Assistant Postmas-

ters-General, \$4,000 each; increase, \$500 each. Superintendent Money-Order System in Post Office Department, \$4,000; increase, \$1,000. Superintendent Foreign Mails in Post Office Department, \$4,000; increase, \$1,000. Two chiefs of diplomatic and consular bureaus of State Department and two chiefs of bureaus of accounts and indexes and archives in State Department, \$2,400 each; increase, \$500 each.

By the act (No. 56) making appropriations to supply deficiencies in the appropriations for the service of the Government for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1873, and for other purposes.

DEPARTMENT OF STATE:

To the consuls of the United States at Havre and La Rochelle, for extraordinary services during the late war in Europe, there is appropriated such additional compensation as the Secretary of State may allow, with the approval of the President of the United States, not exceeding \$1,500 each.

There is appropriated additional pay to disbursing clerk for disbursing moneys appropriated for the building now being erected for the use of the War, State, and Navy Departments, \$500 per annum from the commencement of such duties.

By the act (No. 53) making appropriations for the year ending June 30, 1874, and for other purposes.

Those officers on the retired list of the Navy, and those hereafter retired, who were, or who may be, retired after forty years' service, or on attaining the age of sixty-two years, or those who were or may be retired from incapacity resulting from long and faithful service, from wounds or injuries received in the line of duty, from sickness or exposure therein, shall, after the passage of this act, be entitled to 75 per cent. of the present sea-pay of the grade or rank which they held at the time of their retirement. The rear-admirals provided for in the act of June 5, 1872, shall be considered as having been retired as rear-admirals.

Chief engineers having the same rank as medical and pay directors and inspectors afloat, when at sea, have the same pay.

By the act (No. 40) making appropriations for the consular and diplomatic service of the Government for the year ending June 30, 1874, and for other purposes.

There is appropriated for salary of minister accredited to Guatemala, Costa Rica, Honduras, Salvador, and Nicaragua, to reside at such place, in either of the States named, as the President may select, \$10,000; increase, \$2,500 per annum.

Secretary of legation at St. Petersburg, \$2,625; increase, \$325. Consul at Vienna, \$5,000; increase, \$3,500.

By section 2 it is provided that, when any diplomatic or consular officer of the United States shall die in a foreign country in the discharge of his duty, there shall be paid to his widow, or, if no widow survive him, then to his heirs at law, a sum of money equal to the allowance now made to such officer for the time necessarily occupied in making the transit from his post of duty to his residence in the United States.

By the act (No. 12) to fix the compensation of gaugers and measurers at the port of Boston.

The compensation of gaugers and measurers at the port of Boston shall be the same as provided for like officers at port of New York; increase, \$515 per annum.

By the act (No. 14) regulating the compensation of the members and officers of the legislative assemblies of the several Territories of the United States, and limiting the duration of the sessions of said assemblies.

The members of each branch of each territorial legislature (excluding the District of Columbia) shall receive a compensation of \$6 per day during the sessions, (which are limited to forty days duration;) increase, \$2 per diem.

The presidents of the councils and speakers of the houses of representatives shall each receive \$10 per day; increase \$2 per diem.

From and after July 1, 1873, the salary of the governors of the several Territories shall be \$3,500 each, being an increase of \$1,000 per annum each to the governors of the Territories of Arizona, Colorado, Dakota, Idaho, Montana, New Mexico, and Utah, and an increase of \$500 each to the governors of the Territories of Washington and Wyoming.

The salary of the secretary of the several Territories is fixed at \$2,500, an increase of \$700 each to the secretaries of Colorado, Dakota, and Wyoming, and an increase of \$500 each to the secretaries of Arizona, Idaho, Montana, Utah, and Washington.

By the act (No. 23) to regulate the employment of engineer soldiers on extra duty.

Enlisted men of engineers in the Army shall receive with respect to extra-duty service the same compensation therefor as other enlisted men of the Army.

By the act (No. 52) to provide for the better care and protection of subsistence-supplies.

The Secretary of War is authorized to select from the sergeants of the line of the Army who shall have faithfully served therein five years, three years of which in the grade of non-commissioned officer, as many commissary-sergeants as the service may require, not to exceed one for each military post or place of deposit of subsistence-supplies, whose duty it shall be to receive and preserve the subsistence-supplies at the posts, under the direction of the proper officers of the Subsistence Department, and under such regulations as shall be prescribed by the Secretary of War. The commissary-sergeants hereby authorized shall be subject to the Rules and Articles of War, and shall receive for their services the same pay and allowances as ordnance-sergeants.

By the act (No. 62) to revise, consolidate, and amend the laws relating to pensions.

The Secretary of the Interior is authorized to appoint a duly-authorized surgeon as medical referee, who shall have charge of the examinations and reports of examining surgeons, whose salary shall be \$2,500 per annum; increase not stated.

The Secretary of the Interior is further authorized to appoint qualified surgeons (not exceeding four) to perform the duties of examining surgeon, who shall be borne upon the rolls as clerks of the fourth class, (at \$1,800 per annum;) increase not stated.

By the act (No. 45) making appropriations for the support of the Military Academy for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1874.

Professors of the United States Military Academy whose service at the Academy exceeds ten years shall have the pay and allowances of colonel, and all other professors that of lieutenant-colonel; and instructors of ordnance and science of gunnery and of practical engineering shall have the pay and allowances of major; and hereafter there shall be paid to said professors 10 per cent. of their current yearly pay for each term of five years' service in the Army and at the Academy; but such addition shall in no case exceed 40 per cent. of said yearly pay.
