The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 11306) granting a pension to William Brooks, have examined the same and report.

The report on which this bill was passed by the House is concurred in, and is as follows:

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HOUSE REPORT.

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 11306) granting a pension to Willis Brooks, have considered the same, and report:

The War Department reports that Willis Brooks was a private in Captain House's company, Major Webb's battalion, Alabama Volunteers, Creek War, from June 2, 1836, to September 1, 1836.

M. D. Boyd and T. C. Phillips, citizens of Ashley County, Ark., swear that they have been acquainted with the claimant for forty years, and know that he is seventy-four years old, a cripple, and unable to work; also that he is in needy circumstances, having no income or means of support.

The bill seems to be a meritorious one.

The bill is reported favorably, with a recommendation that it do pass.
