## INDIAN APPROPRIATION BILL.

January 16, 1885.-Committed to the Committee of the Whole House on the state of the Union and ordered to be printed.

Mr. Ellis, from the Committee on Appropriations, submitted the following

## REPORT:

[To accompany bill H. R. 7970.]

The Committee on Appropriations, in presenting the bill making appropriations for the support of the Indian service for the fiscal year ending June 30,1886 , submit the folloving in explanation thereof:

The estimates apon which the bill is based are to be found on pages 119 to 136 of the Book of Estimates for 1886, and amount to $\$ 7,328$,049.64 , of which sum the committee recommend $\$ 5,664,135.80$, being $\$ 1,663,913 . \$ 4$ less than the estimates, and $\$ 195,267.11$ less than the appropriations for the current year.
Following is a statement showing in detail the estimates for 1886, the amounts recommended in the bill, and the sums appropriated for 1885:

## New legislation of a general character is recommended as follows: On pages 57 and 58, lines 1 to 19.

SkC. 8. That whoever shall furnish to any Indian, by barter, sale, gift, or exchange, any gan, rifle, pistol, or ammunition or munitions of war, shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined not less than one hundred nor more than one thousand dollars, and be imprisoned not less than six months nor more than two years: Provided, That this provision shall not apply to the civilized tribes of the Indian Territory; and that the Secretary of the Interior may issue such permits to Indians for the purchase of arms and ammunition for sporting purposes as he may deem proper: And provided further, That the President of the United States may, in his discretion, disarm such Indians as in his judgment may seem best to preserve peace and prevent depredations. All arms thus taken shall be received by the Secretary of War, who shall report all arms received by him, from what tribe taken, and the just value of said arms; and Congress shall appropriate the requisite funds to pay for all arms taken, and said sum shall be paid to said tribe, and, as near as may be, to the original owners of said arms, or their heirs.

## On page 58 , lines 1 to 33.

Sec. 9. That section twenty-one hundred and thirty-nine of the Revised Statates of the United States be, and is hereby, amended and re-enacted so as to read as follows:
"SkC. 2139. No ardent spirits shall be introduced, under any pretense, into the Indian country. Every person who sells, exchanges, gives, barters, or disposes of any spirituous liquors or wine to any Indian under the charge of any Indian sup erintendent or agent, or introduces or attempts to introduce any spirituous liquor or wine into the Indian country, shall be punishable by imprisonment for not less than six months nor more than two years, and by a fine of not less than fifty dollars nor more than one thonsand dollars; but it shall be a sufficient defense to any charge of introducing or attempting to introduce liquor into the Indian ceuntry that the acts charged were done by order of or under authority from the War Department, or any officer duly authorized thereunto by the War Department; but no part of this section or of section twenty-one hundred and forty of the Revised Statutes shall be a bar to the prosecution of any officer, soldier, sutler, or storekeeper, attache, or employe of the Army of the United States who shall barter, donate, or furnish in any manner whatsoever liquors, wines, beer, or any intoxicating beverage whatsoever to any Indian."
