December 3, 1877.

SIR: In conformity to the requirements of sections 3669, 3670, and 3672 of the Revised Statutes, I have the honor to transmit, for the information of Congress, the estimates of appropriations required for the service of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879, as furnished by the several Executive Departments; also, statements showing the balances of appropriations unexpended on the 30th of June, 1877; the amounts appropriated for the service of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1878; the net expenditures for the quarter ended September 30, 1877; the estimated amounts that may be required to complete the service of the year, or of prior years, or that may be carried to the surplus fund; the "proceeds of Government property," and the expenditures of the moneys appropriated for contingent expenses of the Independent Treasury for the fiscal year 1877, by act of Congress, approved August 15, 1876.

In the appropriation for the year ending June 30, 1877, a reduction of one fourth, one third, one second, and two first-class clerks was made, and in the appropriation for the present fiscal year a further reduction of one fourth-class clerk was made. Since the reduction in the fiscal year 1877 the office-work has been falling behind, and during the past year there has been a falling off in the number of property returns examined of over one thousand, (1,000,) and since July 1, 1877, over eight hundred (800) returns have been received which cannot be examined owing to the inadequacy of the clerical force. This increasing delay in the examination and adjustment of the property accountability of officers of the Army is often the cause of injustice to the officers and of pecuniary loss to the United States. Other important office-work is also delayed, the same as in case of the property accounts.

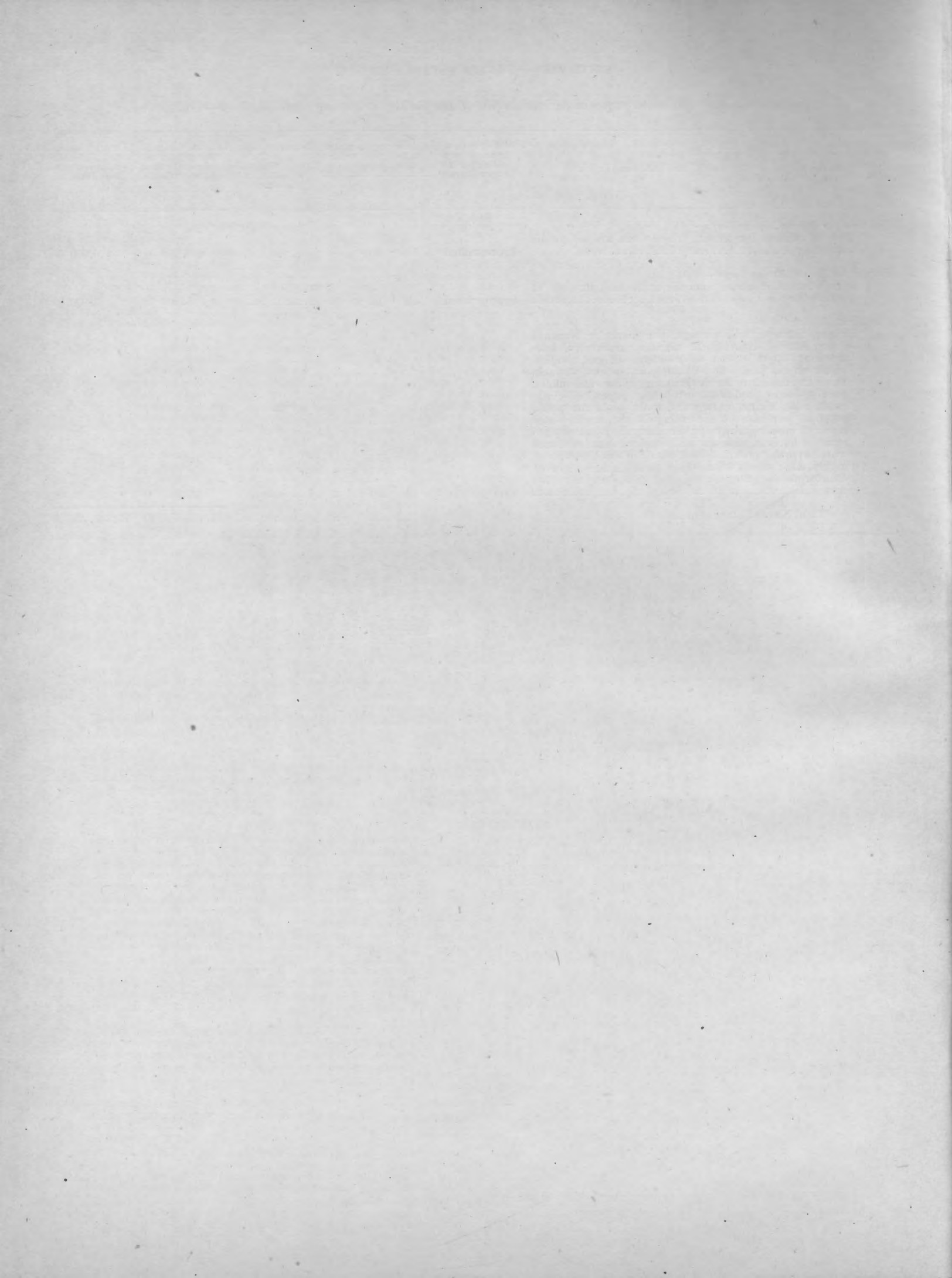

Explanation of the estimate for Salaries, Office of Second Comptroller. (See page 15.)

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,
Second Comptroller's Office, Washington, D. C., August 7, 1877.

SIR: In compliance with your request and directions, I furnish herewith estimates of appropriations required for the service of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879, by this office, as per "Estimate blank No. 1," furnished by the Chief of Division of Warrants.

It will be seen that, by the appropriation act for the current fiscal year, this office is deprived of *sixteen* of the employes assigned to it by law, as follows:

The business of the office has decreased materially since the war, but it has decreased very little since 1875, and is not likely to decrease in the future. The reduction of force aforesaid is out of all proportion to the reduction of business, and the office is hampered and crippled thereby. Under existing circumstances, I will not ask that the whole sixteen be restored; but I do respectfully ask, and urge, that there be restored one chief of division, one clerk of class four, three clerks of class three, and two clerks of class two—total, seven.

I respectfully submit, in addition, that some provision should be made for moderate additions to the Comptroller's library. This office was furnished, many years ago, with all the Federal-Court reports of that day, and with a small collection of text-books, such as are constantly needed by the Comptroller and his clerks in the performance of their duties; but the reports have not been kept up, and the text-books have become worn-out and antiquated.

If liberal appropriations were made for the Solicitor's library, and some arrangements were made by which chiefs of divisions could have the use of that library, under proper regulations, very few books would be necessary in the several bureaus. But, in any case, this office should be provided with a complete set of the Federal-Court reports and some of the appropriate modern text-books. For this I ask that provision be made in some form. Only a very small sum would be needed—say five hundred dollars, (\$500.)

As the present Comptroller will retire from office before the foregoing recommendations become operative, assuming that they are adopted by the Secretary and receive the favorable action of Congress, his individual convenience, or a personal desire to magnify his office, will not be regarded as having influenced the conclusions of this report.

APPENDIX B.

Explanation of the estimate for Salaries, Office of Commissioner of Internal Revenue. (See page 19.)

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,
Office of Internal Revenue, Washington, October 22, 1877.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith an estimate of appropriations required for the service of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879, by this bureau, and to state that the same is made to conform to the appropriation for the service of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1878.

In my opinion it is for the interests of the service that the present Congress should increase the appropriations of last year as follows:

1st. The salary of one Deputy Commissioner from \$3,200 to \$3,500.

2d. The salaries of five heads of division from \$2,250 to \$2,500.

The above changes are recommended for the following reasons: The law creating the office of Deputy Commissioner fixed his salary at \$3,500; the duties of the office are of great importance, and their faithful performance fully entitles the officer to that pay. The law creating the office of head of division states that there shall be seven heads of division in this bureau, who shall receive each a salary of \$2,500. The appropriation for the year ending June 30, 1878, allowed two heads of division at a salary of \$2,500 each, and five heads of division at a salary of \$2,250 each. There is no just ground for this discrimination; the officers fully earn \$2,500 each.

3d. The number of first-class clerks, from eighteen, at a salary of \$1,200 each, amounting to \$21,600, to twenty-eight clerks, at a salary of \$1,200 each, amounting to \$33,600.

4th. The number of messengers, from four, at a salary of \$840 each, \$3,360, to five messengers, at a salary of \$840 each, \$4,200.

5th. The number of laborers, from ten, at a salary of \$720 each, \$7,200, to fifteen laborers, at a salary of \$720 each, \$10,800.

My reasons for recommending an increase in these classes is, that the numerical strength of the office is not sufficient for a proper performance of the business of the bureau. By increasing the number of first-class clerks, some deserving persons can receive well-earned promotion from the \$900 class, and six persons now paid from the appropriation for dies, paper, and stamps, a salary of \$900 per annum, and one laborer at \$720 per annum, can be appointed on the regular roll, the force being thereby actually increased only three. In this connection I call attention to the remarks upon the subject of paying persons from said last-named appropriation, found on page 23 of the Report of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1877.

APPENDIX C.

Explanation of the estimate for Salaries, Bureau of Engraving and Printing. (See page 20.)

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,
Bureau of Engraving and Printing, Washington, D. C., October 18, 1877.

SIR: Referring to the estimates of this bureau for the next fiscal year, transmitted this day, I beg to state, in explanation of them, that, in my judgment, the compensation of the assistant chief, \$2,250, is out of proportion to his responsibilities and services. He is constantly occupied with the duties of his office, which require powers of organization and administration of a high order. The pay inserted in the estimate, \$2,500, places the office on a grade with a chief of division in the Secretary's Office. Some years ago there were two assistants, at an expense of about \$5,000, and besides, there was a chief clerk, at \$2,200. The duties imposed upon these three persons are now discharged, in large part, by the assistant chief.

Respecting the appropriation for clerical work in the office, I beg to say that I find that the present expense of that service is \$14,294 50, which is made up of five clerks, at \$1,200, or what is known as the regular roll, and five others, who are paid out of the general appropriation. I think, if the clerical force be graded so as to enable us to command such talent as is required, that, with one clerk at \$1,800, one at \$1,600, one at \$1,400, and four at \$1,200, we can do all the work—which will be a saving of \$2,894 50 a year from present expenses.

This change is desirable on another account—that the regular organization of the office should be made sufficient for the business of the office, and as little be left to discretion as possible. For this reason, a specific appropriation of \$1,800 is asked for the stenographer of the bureau, who has hitherto been paid out of the general fund, \$6 a day, when employed.

I also recommend that the four persons now known as laborers, who are doing messenger-duty in the bureau, should be designated as messengers—that being the grade of duty which they are performing, and at the customary rate paid for it in the other bureaus of the Department, \$840 each.

APPENDIX D.

Explanation of estimate for Salaries, Office of Assistant Treasurer at Chicago. (See page 22.)

OFFICE OF ASSISTANT TREASURER UNITED STATES,
Chicago, Illinois, September 15, 1877.

SIR: I have the honor to request an increase in the force of this office.

The appropriation for this sub-treasury for the current fiscal year is less than that for any other sub-treasury in the country, New Orleans excepted. The force of this office is less than that of any other, without any exception. It is believed that this sub-treasury does a larger business than either the one at Baltimore, St. Louis, Cincinnati, or New Orleans. The forces severally provided by Congress are as follows: Baltimore, 16; St. Louis, 10; Cincinnati, 10; New Orleans, 9; Chicago, 8.

But this request is not based on comparison with other sub-treasuries. It grows out of the necessities of the service. There has been no increase allowed since this sub-treasury was organized, 1873. Yet the number of receipts and the business in every respect show a very large increase.

The number for the first year were 2,934, for the last year 6,403, being an increase of 217 per cent.

The book-keeper is in pressing need of assistance; so is the clerk, whose duty it is to count and sort the money received, his special need being in the matter of minor coin. Then, too, when the messenger is on the street with a large quantity of money, as is often the case, he needs an escort. In view of these facts, I beg leave to petition for an additional clerk, at such salary as you may recommend and Congress provide.

I shall take the liberty to request Assistant-Treasurer Wyman to explain somewhat the business of this office.

I may add that the collector at this port, Hon. Wm. Henry Smith, is disposed to afford this office temporary relief, recognizing the emergency which exists.

SIR: I beg to return herewith the application made to the Secretary of the Treasury by the assistant treasurer at Chicago, under date of September 15, for an increase of force in his office.

The assistant treasurer, having referred to the force authorized and employed in the offices of other assistant treasurers, I have made a comparative statement, showing from the last annual report of the Secretary of the Treasury, page 63, the transactions of the offices therein named for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1876; and showing, from the laws passed at the last session of Congress, the amounts appropriated, and the number appropriated for, at each of these offices, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1878:

It will be noticed that the aggregate of the transactions at the Chicago office are largely in excess of the aggregate of the transactions at either of the other offices named, while the force, numerically, is less than in any other, and the amount appropriated is less than in any other, except one. It is not presumed that either of the offices named has a force in excess of that required for the proper conduct of its business; but the foregoing statement is corroborative of the personal observation of the undersigned, at different times, and for several years past, that the number of employes authorized for the Chicago office is not sufficient for the work required to be done.

The receipts of minor coin for redemption at this office are considerable, and much of this has to be counted after office-hours, as time cannot always be spared to count it at other times.

You are aware that the legal-tender and national-bank notes, unassorted as to kinds and denominations, are being almost constantly transferred from the Chicago office to Washington and here assorted, the force in the Chicago office not being sufficient for such assorting; whereas, if they could be assorted there, they would be available, to some extent, for use there, or for transfer to other offices where needed.

Recently, by the closing of the pension agency at Springfield, and the transfer of its business to the Chicago pension agency, a large addition is made to the number of pension-checks to be paid by the assistant treasurer at Chicago, and a consequent large increase to the work of the book-keeper, already constantly and laboriously employed.

It cannot be doubted that the general work of the Chicago office will be gradually increased. The assistant treasurer asks for one clerk only. I think he is quite moderate in his requirements. My own impression is, that he might, with propriety, ask for two additional clerks—one as an assistant to the book-keeper and one as an assistant to the counters and sorters of money—both of them to be available for general work when not otherwise employed; and, if it can be done, he ought to be furnished with one of these additional clerks at once, or before the commencement of the next fiscal year.

APPENDIX E.

Explanation of estimate for Salaries, Office of Assistant Treasurer at New York. (See page 23.)

OFFICE OF U. S. ASSISTANT TREASURER,
New York, September 24, 1877.

SIR: I have the honor to enclose herewith estimates for the salaries of the officers, clerks, and employes of this office, for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 1878.

They conform to those submitted October 12, 1876, for the present fiscal year, both as to the number of clerks in the several classes and their compensation. With a steady increase in the volume of business, I am not prepared to recommend any reduction either in the working force or compensation as therein estimated for, believing that, in an office like this, the paramount object should be the safety of the public moneys, and that, as a means of promoting that object, there should at all times be a sufficient force to transact the public business without hurry or confusion, and that such reasonable compensation should be allowed as will enable the Government to command and retain the services of competent and trustworthy men.

It will be noticed that the estimates exceed the appropriation for the present fiscal year by the sum of \$6,850. The excess is made up of the following items:

The proposed increase in salaries covers the reductions made last year in salaries of over \$2,000, thus affecting clerks who occupy the most important and responsible positions in the office, and whose compensation, before the reduction, instead of being extravagant or unusual, was, to say the least, no greater than is paid by corporations and firms for equal ability and similar services. I respectfully recommend that these reductions be restored, believing it to be no more than just to the persons affected by them, and wise on the part of the Government.

An additional detective is needed to supply the place of the police officer formerly kept on duty at this office by the city authorities, but withdrawn last year, on the ground that his services were needed elsewhere, and that, in any event, the city was not bound to furnish an officer for special duty at its own expense. There is an advantage in having a police officer, in that he has the undoubted power of making arrests, and, if thought best, the additional detective might be dispensed with, and the appropriation for his pay applied to reimburse the city for the services of a regular police officer.

The two additional clerks estimated for in the \$1,600 and \$1,400 classes have been actually employed in our currency-receiving division for several years. It was found absolutely necessary to increase the force in that division, owing to the great increase in the deposits of United States notes, after the passage of the act of June 8, 1872. As their services cannot be dispensed with, it seems proper that they should be treated as part of the permanent force of the office, and included in the annual estimates for salaries. Hitherto they have been paid, with the approval of the Department, from lapsed salaries, that is, salaries attached to vacancies not filled; but as the existence of these vacancies is a great inconvenience, and they have only been allowed to remain unfilled to avoid the still greater inconvenience, not to say the impossibility, of reducing the force in the receiving division, I hope the Secretary will think it proper that the two additional clerks employed there should be provided for in the usual way.

APPENDIX F.

Explanation of the estimates for United States Mints and Assay Offices. (See pages 24 to 27.)

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,
Office of the Director of the Mint, Washington, D. C., October 22, 1877.

SIR: Herewith please find estimates of appropriations required for the support of the mints and assay offices for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879.

Full details and explanations in respect to the estimate for each mint and assay office will be found in the letters and statements annexed hereto, and which I respectfully request may be printed in the book of estimates.

The amounts estimated for under the various heads are, with the exceptions hereinafter referred to, the same as appropriated for the service of current fiscal year.

The increased items are as follows:

OFFICE OF THE DIRECTOR OF THE MINT.

Contingent Expenses, United States Mints and Assay Offices.—The appropriation under this head for the current fiscal year is \$900; an increase of \$100 is asked for, being necessary on account of the increased business of the office.

Recoinage of Gold and Silver Coins.—The appropriation for this purpose for the current fiscal year is only \$1,000, and which is found to be insufficient. The amount requested for the next fiscal year is \$5,000.

UNITED STATES MINT AT PHILADELPHIA.

Freight on Bullion and Coin.—Under this head an increase of \$10,000 is estimated for, the same being necessary to defray the expenses of transporting bullion and coin between the mint at Philadelphia and the assay office at New York.

UNITED STATES MINT AT SAN FRANCISCO.

Contingent Expenses.—Under this head an increase of \$37,500 is requested. After the most careful examination, and considering the large amount of gold and silver operated upon at that mint, I consider this increase absolutely necessary.

UNITED STATES MINT AT DENVER, COLORADO.

Wages of Workmen.—Under this head the appropriation for the current fiscal year is \$5,000, which is found to be quite inadequate. It was formerly \$15,000. An increase of \$5,041 is estimated for. An increase of \$1,000, under the head of contingent expenses, is also necessary.

UNITED STATES MINT AT NEW ORLEANS.

Wages of Workmen.—Under this head an increase of \$4,872 is estimated for, the same being necessary to meet the expenses of janitors and watchmen heretofore paid by the Treasury Department, in connection with the United States assistant-treasury service, which office it is intended soon to remove to the custom-house.

UNITED STATES ASSAY OFFICE AT NEW YORK.

Salaries.—Under this head an increase of \$250 is asked for, the same being intended to restore the salary of the superintendent to \$4,500.

UNITED STATES ASSAY OFFICE, HELENA, MONTANA.

Salaries.—The salary of the assayer in charge is \$2,000 per annum. An increase of \$500 is submitted, the present compensation being considered entirely inadequate, in view of the responsibilities and duties to be performed.

At present there is no clerk provided for that office, the same being necessary. One clerk, at \$1,600 per annum, is estimated for. An increase of \$1,400 for wages of workmen, and \$3,515 for contingent expenses, is also estimated for; all of which is necessary to enable that office to properly conduct the operations and business devolved upon it.

The above summary exceeds my estimate for incidental expenses, heretofore transmitted to you, by \$25,843. A desire to economize, and to meet the views of Congress, in their efforts at retrenchment, led me to under-estimate rather than over-estimate our probable wants, as appears from the details now submitted. It should be remembered, in this connection, that the mint is a manufacturing institution, and its incidental expenses are more fluctuating and varied than those of the administrative departments of the Government, and it is not possible to anticipate and specify every item of expenditure that may become necessary from time to time.

The mint, also, is a unit, and it is not possible, beforehand, to assign every item of expense to any particular part of it. We must have a general fund, to be applied as circumstances may require.

I enclose a statement of the amount paid for wages of workmen and adjusters in the months of January, May, and September, 1877, respectively, which shows that, at our present rate of working, we would need, under this head, an average of \$25,000 per month, or \$300,000 for the year, which is \$15,000 more than the amount I have named in my estimates.

SIR: I have the honor to herewith present an estimate of the amount of invoices required for the support of this office during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879.

I respectfully beg to state that the data upon which the appropriation was made for the support of this institution, under the legislative enactments approved March 3, 1877, could not have been understood. About double the amount of gold would be deposited for melting and assay, if it were possible to handle it. The only safe transit for bullion out of Montana is by Wells, Fargo & Co.'s Express, which leaves here every six or eight days. The gold brought in by miners is purchased by bankers during the two or three days before shipping-time, is expressed out of the country in its native condition, only for the reason of the insufficient working-force, and consequent impossibility of this office, under such force, to do more work than is now done. I therefore, sir, deem it a part of my duty to thus frankly and forcibly present these facts for your information.

The people appear to delight in visiting and patronizing this office. They universally express their pleasure and confidence in work done for them, but often exhibit their disappointment while being obliged to sell their crude bullion that it may pass with the shipment of the next day, and thus being deprived of the benefits of the workings of this department—all on account of the reasons as above stated. I would also respectfully represent that, should it be your pleasure to deem it proper that an effort to melt and assay all of the above-mentioned bullion would not be desirable, or if Congress, in its wisdom, should think it not best to allow the said asked-for appropriation, then, in my opinion, some 3,000 bushels of charcoal, and chemicals and labor in proportion, would not be required; more particularly so, if the Department would be satisfied for this office to continue its labor as in the past quarter.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, IDAHO TERRITORY,
Boise City, Idaho, October 17, 1877.

SIR: By paragraph 1935, Revised Statutes United States, \$1,000 is required to be appropriated annually for the contingent expenses of each Territorial governor.

In my communication to your Department of September 27, 1876, I asked for a larger sum, giving reasons therefor, peculiar to the condition of my office as I found it. The Congress, however, appropriated but \$500 to each Territory, and the same sum at its last session for the year ending June 30, 1878.

I will not send another estimate, but state—

I am using *borrowed* furniture, my predecessors having furnished none from the \$1,000 received by them.

After paying office-rent, I have \$140 per annum for all other expenses. Though my business, especially since the beginning of the Indian troubles, has greatly increased, I cannot employ a clerk, save at my own expense, the sum now appropriated being inadequate to other indispensable expenditures.

I have to request that an appropriation of a sufficient sum be recommended for furnishing my office, leaving it to the pleasure of Congress to bring the annual sum for all Territories up to the requirements of paragraph 1935.

Under present circumstances, it is necessary to the efficiency of the service of the executive department that its expenses *exceed* the sum of \$500.

For sometime to come the force of the Quartermaster General's Office should be kept up to this allowance.

The increase asked for is only the difference between the number allowed by the law above referred to and the acts making the appropriations for the clerical force of this office.

The difference between the amount appropriated by the act of June 20, 1874, viz., \$172,080, and the sum estimated for the year ending June 30, 1879, viz., \$175,320—or \$3,240 more—is occasioned by the addition to the force, since the passage of that act, of one draughtsman at \$1,800, and two assistant messengers at \$720 each. It is found that the work of this office is falling in arrears, particularly in the accounts' branch, and it is but just to the disbursing officers of the Department that their accounts and returns be examined promptly and sent to the Treasury for settlement.

APPENDIX I.

Explaining estimate for Salaries, Office of Commissioner of Indian Affairs. (See page 44.)

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR,
Office of Indian Affairs, Washington, October 23, 1877.

SIR: In connection with the "estimates" for the Indian service for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879, I have the honor to submit the following explanations relative to such items as ask for an increase of appropriation over amounts appropriated for the current fiscal year: * * * * *

Salaries, Office of Indian Affairs.—Salary of chief clerk, estimate submitted, \$2,500; increase, \$500.

The large and increasing amount of routine business which comes to the Indian office renders the position of chief clerk, at all times, laborious. In the absence of the Commissioner, the whole administration of the business of the bureau devolves, by law, upon the chief clerk. For services so exacting and responsible, not less than \$2,500 per annum should be allowed.

Solicitor for the Indian Bureau.—Estimated, \$3,000.

The numerous contracts and bonds, and other instruments relating to the disbursement of the large sums of money intrusted to this office for expenditure, should be made under the careful scrutiny of an able lawyer. Inaccurate drawing of papers, by clerks who are deficient in legal training, is certain to result in financial loss to the office and the Indians. Questions growing out of the relations between Indians and citizens, both of civil and criminal nature, are continually arising, in respect to which this office must advise and direct agents. Defaulting and fraudulent contractors escape the law for the want of a competent solicitor in the bureau to follow them up. Large sums of money could be saved to the Government annually, compared with which the salary of a solicitor would be a trifle.

In short, nearly every imaginable question in civil and criminal law, from a simple contract to the construction of treaties, from a mere assault to homicide, and from a simple deed of transfer to the adjustment of the gravest complications in land matters, this office is called upon for decision, opinion, or recommendation. Unsettled matters of great importance are still pending in the office.

To properly protect the large public interests thus involved, pertaining to both whites and Indians, will require all the time of an able officer, whose services, to be commensurate with the labor and responsibility involved, should not be rated at less than the salary recommended.

Three Chiefs of Divisions.—Estimate submitted, \$2,100 each; increase, \$300 each—\$900.

Chiefs of divisions in the Indian bureau are under great responsibility, while on their executive ability mainly depends the efficiency of the clerical force of the office which is placed under their immediate direction. Services of a like character in the Treasury Department are paid for at the rate of \$2,250 and \$2,500 per annum.

Book-keeper, Finance Division.—Estimate submitted, \$1,800; increase, \$200.

The salary of the book-keeper of the Indian Office is not fixed by law, and is at present but \$1,600 per annum. It is hardly necessary to state that this sum is inadequate compensation to procure the services of an experienced accountant, who is expected to keep a strict account, ready of reference, under the many heads and sub-heads of appropriations, of the receipts and disbursements by this office, and its seventy-six agents and superintendents, of six million dollars annually.

One Assistant Messenger.—Estimate submitted, \$720.

The law provides for only one assistant messenger and laborer. This force is not sufficient to prepare fuel, attend fires, and keep in order twelve rooms, besides performing the strictly messenger service required to carry on the business of the office.

APPENDIX J.

Explanation of the estimates of the Commissioner of Patents. (See pages 45 and 46.)

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR,
United States Patent Office, Washington, D. C., October 9, 1877.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith the estimates of appropriations necessary for this office for the year ending June 30, 1879. * * * In explanation of the increased amounts asked for under certain heads of appropriation, and of variation in others, I have the honor to submit the following:

The office of librarian, created by law, (section 440, R. S., p. 74,) is not provided for in the existing appropriation. The large and valuable scientific library of this office is constantly consulted by inventors, attorneys, and examiners, and requires the efficient superintendence of an educated and intelligent librarian.

I have asked for the appropriation of the salary fixed by the statute, \$2,000 per annum. I have asked for an increase in the number of copyists, from forty to sixty, at a salary of \$900 per annum each. At the present time, a larger number than sixty is borne upon the rolls, at the expense, principally, of the contingent fund, which, at the outset, and whilst the number of copyists remained at forty, was made sufficiently large to permit of the temporary employment of such an additional number of copyists as might be demanded by the increasing business of the office. This temporary expedient has practically become permanent, because there has been no decrease in office business, and the services of the full number of copyists on the rolls are in constant demand. By making the appropriation asked for, the force is not increased, but the additional copyists simply transferred from the contingent to the regular rolls.

The increase in the estimate of contingent expenses, from \$60,000 to \$80,000, is, in great measure, for the construction of permanent model-cases in place of those destroyed by the fire, and of others of a temporary character, in which surplus models are now stored. At the time the fire occurred, both the office and inventors, who had occasion to examine models, were annoyed very much by the crowded condition of many of the classes, as arranged in the cases. Much confusion and loss of valuable time resulted from this source, which will necessarily continue, in an increased degree, so long as the north and west galleries remain untenable, for the accumulating models belonging to these galleries must find temporary storage in the cases remaining, and which are already overcrowded. Immediately after the permanent repairs of these wings have so far progressed as to permit their occupancy, it will be necessary to rebuild, as rapidly as possible, substantial cases, such as will be in keeping with their use and surroundings, in order that the overloading, which those yet remaining are, in the meantime, subjected to, may be entirely avoided. The value of the models to the large class of inventors and attorneys who rely upon them almost exclusively for search and comparison, requires that they shall be placed, as soon as possible, in that condition which will permit a rapid and thorough inspection. Skilled workmen will also be necessary for restoring to proper condition such metal models as the fire injured, but did not destroy.

For these objects, not only will the increase of \$20,000 I have given be necessary, but also such sum as will be saved to the contingent fund, by the transfer of clerks from it to the permanent roll.

My estimate of the appropriation needed for producing photo-lithographic copies of current and back issues of patented drawings, is \$30,000—a decrease of \$2,500 over that of the present fiscal year.

The office has experienced a serious loss, in the almost entire destruction of the bulk of photo-lithographic copies it had on hand. There was every prospect that, at the end of the present year, we would have had complete sets of every patented drawing, but, unfortunately, the fire has prevented this consummation. As the destruction of the models in a large class of highly-important industrial patents has left the office with only the original drawings upon which to rely and base its searches, the rapid reproduction of the copies of such drawings is extremely necessary; for, under the circumstances, the loss of the originals would be well nigh irreparable, and the office cannot afford to assume any risks in the matter.

A portion of the money necessary to secure the rapid reproduction of copies of the drawings forms an item in a deficiency estimate accompanying this, and to which I shall have the honor to refer hereafter; but as the work cannot be all accomplished during the existing fiscal year, I have estimated that the sum of \$30,000 will be required for its completion during the year beginning July, 1878.

For photo-lithographing the drawings of current issues I have asked for \$40,000.

The actual amount paid for this work during the last fiscal year was \$30,150 20; some of which was done in a very imperfect manner under a contract at a low rate, which was subsequently annulled, because of the failure of the parties to comply with its terms, respecting the character of the work and the promptitude of its execution.

The same amount of work under the present contract, at ten mills per copy, would cost \$45,000. The issues will increase in number yearly, and it is hardly probable that the price for first-class work, expeditiously and safely done, can be reduced much below ten mills per copy.

For the Official Gazette I have asked for \$40,000.

The cost of the illustrated portion of the Gazette this year, under the best terms I could obtain by proposals from responsible parties, will be (under the contract) \$19,000, leaving \$6,000 only for the pay of employes.

This sum is inadequate for this purpose; the minimum monthly pay of the employes necessary to edit, proof-read, prepare copy, mail, and keep the necessary records of the Gazette, is about \$1,600, or a yearly total of \$19,020. This, added to the \$19,000 above referred to, makes a total of \$38,200 as the minimum amount at which the Gazette can be properly prepared and published.

For tracings of drawings I have asked for \$5,000 only.

Before the close of the present fiscal year all tracings of drawings of back issues will be completed, and no further appropriation for tracings for photo-lithographic copies will be required. The only tracings hereafter will be such as may be necessary, from English and other foreign patents, to fill orders received by the office, for which a price more than sufficient to cover the cost of tracing will be paid by the purchaser.

APPENDIX K.

Explanation of the estimates of the Commissioner of Education. (See page 46.)

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR,
Bureau of Education, Washington, D. C., October 8, 1877.

SIR: I have the honor to submit the following remarks on the increased sums estimated to be necessary for the services of the Bureau of Education for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879:

This office was established on the petition and at the request of the educators of the country a few years since, "for the purpose," as detailed in the law, "of collecting such statistics and facts as shall show the condition and progress of education in the several States and Territories, and of diffusing such information respecting the organization and management of schools and school systems, and methods of teaching, as shall aid the people of the United States in the establishment and maintenance of efficient school systems, and otherwise promote the cause of education throughout the country."

The diversity of educational methods among us arises from the nature of our institutions, and is a great advantage. It has, however, this embarrassment to the student of education, namely, the fact that the information given by the educational officials of the several States and municipalities, and by the authorities of the different educational institutions throughout the country, in regard to their systems, methods, and statistics, shows equal if not greater diversity, and affords no opportunity for a just comparison.

This office affords the only agency for summarizing these diverse but valuable statements. It is admitted by all investigators that, by a brief examination of the statistical tables appended to the annual reports, fuller and more accurate information in regard to the educational systems in the different States can be obtained than could otherwise be got, with much pains, from a study of the many official reports of the numerous educational officials and school authorities in the United States.

The methods designed and adopted, so far as the inadequate means at his disposal permit, by the Commissioner for carrying out the provisions of the law are—

1st. The systematic collection of the statistics of all public schools in the several States, cities, and towns in the United States; of all other private or public institutions of learning, elementary, secondary, or superior, in the United States; and, in addition, of all information, either relating to the public-school systems, or to the public or private institutions, that bears upon the general interests of education.

2d. The preparation of annual reports in which the official reports of all the public-school authorities of the several States are condensed, and in which, in addition, the special statistics, which have been so carefully collected by this bureau, are all arranged and tabulated, so that the whole forms a compact but comprehensive summary of the actual facts of the educational condition of the whole country.

3d. The preparation and publication of special reports, containing historical, statistical, and practical material in reference to special instrumentalities of education; as, for example, the special report upon public libraries in the United States, recently published, and the forthcoming special reports upon industrial art education, and on medical education; other similar special reports upon subjects for information in reference to which constant application is being made to this bureau, are designed and will be prepared and published whenever the means furnished the bureau will permit.

4th. The preparation and publication of circulars of information on topics of special technical value to educators, but not requiring the elaborate treatment of a special report.

In addition to all these imperative duties, there devolve, of necessity, upon this office the essential routine duties common to all public offices, namely:

A large correspondence, which, in this office is both domestic and *foreign*, embracing an unusually wide range of topics; the keeping of files and records of such correspondence; the collection and care of a library; the packing and distribution of reports and other documents; the reception of visitors, &c.

The regular force allowed to this bureau is not larger than would be needed to do this routine work, were nothing else demanded.

In reference to the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) asked for "collecting statistics," &c., it is perhaps proper to say that this amount was inserted in one sum by the Committee on Appropriations, in lieu of an itemized statement in the estimates furnished by the Commissioner when entering upon the duties of the office. Experience has shown that it was a wise change, as he has thus been enabled to procure desirable information, on special subjects, from the different sections of our own country and from foreign countries, and to employ persons of special fitness on special topics, and in this way has been able to secure far greater, more varied, and more valuable returns *than* (even with a much larger sum) *would have been otherwise possible*.

The tabulated statistics at the end of the annual report are made up from replies sent by each institution in answer to inquiries sent out by this bureau, and *are to be found in no other publication*. To any person at all familiar with statistical work, no explanation will be needed to convey an adequate idea of the labor of annually collecting and tabulating such an array of facts.

The reading-matter preceding these statistics is annually abstracted from some sixty thousand (60,000) pages of state, city, and local official reports, as well as from material furnished directly to the office.

The Commissioner's personal statement, which forms the first portion of the volume, summarizes and tabulates in condensed form the principal facts contained in the abstracts and statistical tables of the report. That a great deal of conscientious labor has been expended upon the production of the annual reports, will be evident to any one who examines them. That the result has been approved by the educators of the country, has been demonstrated by their voluntary testimony at their various conventions, by the demand for these reports, which is far larger than can be supplied, and also by numerous and gratifying assurances, personally and by letter. The clerical force of the office is now hardly sufficient to meet the daily routine of the ordinary official duties, if no reports were made. But the communication of information by reports and otherwise is as much a part of the duty of the office as the collection and preparation of that information; indeed, without the publication of that information, the office wholly fails to meet the educational demands in answer to which the office was created. The requirement to make reports and give information is, moreover, positive—the printing is ordered; but beyond, there never has been proper provision for the large branch of labor and expense involved in their packing, directing, and mailing. This work, therefore, of wrapping, directing, packing, and mailing has, so far, drawn upon the clerical labor of the office, and interferes with its other duties. If the office meet the demands upon it for the ensuing year, the documents distributed will outnumber those of any previous year.

The library of the office demands attention. It should be stated that, in 1870, there were not one hundred volumes belonging to it; that it has never had a librarian; that the library is of a purely technical character, intended to contain only those works relating to the subject of education, and useful in preparing reports; and that, while absolutely essential to the efficient administration of the office, it affords the only opportunity of the kind in the country for comprehensive research on this subject. It is now without catalogue and without index. Its proper care and its efficient use, either by the office or by special students, of the subject of education, require both cataloguing and indexing. For a considerable time there has not been opportunity to count the pamphlets and books received; but it is believed they number not far from thirty thousand. The increase—all that could be expected under the circumstances—I am sure, would be much more rapid if persons in different portions of the country interested in it could be assured of a catalogue of what it contains, for their use.

The office has also an educational museum, for the care of which no provision is made by law. The articles it contains illustrate educational methods, apparatus, text-books, furniture, buildings, and statistics, both domestic and foreign. These articles have been furnished partly by different foreign governments, who desire similar articles from this country for their information and guidance. Nearly every civilized country except our own has a museum of this kind for the preservation and display of such articles. I need only mention the South Kensington Museum of Great Britain as an example of the better sort.

This office has had no means of making any return for donations from foreign nations, and has not been able to accede to their requests in this respect. The usefulness of a distribution of such articles, in limited number, among our State educators, also, cannot be doubted.

It is due that I should add that this office, established at the request of State and other educational officers, who would naturally be most jealous and sensitive of any mistake in its management, has grown only with the growth of their approval and co-operation. The amount of money appropriated for it annually would not pay for a tenth of the work required in the gathering and preparation of the statistics and other information published by it. Having done this much by their own voluntary action, they are naturally not satisfied that Congress does not, year after year, appropriate means necessary to do the limited clerical work their demands upon it require.

UNITED STATES ENGINEER OFFICE,
Geographical Surveys West of the One-Hundredth Meridian, in the field, June 30, 1877.

GENERAL: I have the honor to suggest that the amounts asked for the continuation of geographical surveys west of the one-hundredth meridian may be estimated for upon the Army appropriation bill. The immediate results of this work are first made available in the War Department, although, subsequently, reports and maps, directly issued and reproduced by publishers, reach the country at large. Year by year more calls are made by the Quartermaster's department, Pay department, and other branches of the War Department, for information in connection with their operations, where distances, with consequent expense, are a large factor, and the greater exactness given to the former regulates more fully the relations between the Government and the individual, being the contractor, (where supplies are thus shipped,) while in most instances brought under my notice economy, because of shortening distances results. The best means of direct communication between posts in the several military departments, covering the entire frontier, often remains a subject of doubt, and the systematic prosecution of a topographical survey lends year by year information to these various departments, whereby the facility of their operations, whether those ordinarily necessary, or against the hostile Indians, or others, is enhanced. The plan and methods pursued in the work under my charge have been advanced by officers of the military service, and the administration and execution of works of topographical survey are likely best to thrive under their discipline, which, as shown by the history of large European surveys, has been availed of for periods of years. While the prosecution of this survey is not essential to the maintenance of the Army proper, there comes a reason for placing its means of support upon the Army bill, since this bill usually receives at the hands of Congress, during a long session, earlier consideration than the sundry civil bill, upon which the item of appropriation for the past few years has been placed.

This latter act, during the long sessions of the Forty-third and Forty-fourth Congresses, only received the approval of the President during the month of June in each year; and survey parties should take the field each season during the month of May.

Geographical Surveys West of the One-Hundredth Meridian, in the field, June 30, 1877.

GENERAL: Referring to the estimates submitted with my annual report of June 30, I have the honor to suggest that any appropriation made in their fulfilment be rendered available immediately upon the passage of the act. The survey season, during which parties may work to advantage in the field, usually begins May 15 and terminates November 15. To carry on the operations of the survey with full economy, advantage should be taken of the entire period. The appropriations made and rendered applicable for the seasons of 1876 and 1877 were but a small quota of the estimates, and while the amounts now available are sufficient for the reducing of the field-notes already gathered and up to the close of the fiscal year, still no money can be set aside for subsequent field enterprises.

The estimate for the purchase of sites for field observatories at small or nominal rates becomes necessary, since one permanent field observatory has been built at Ogden, Utah, and two others are contemplated, besides quite a number of heavy stone monuments and meridian-marks, needing protection, have been planted at various points. All of these marks should be properly cared for, and being upon lands in most cases where the Government has relinquished title, the author-

ity of Congress is required before any purchases, however small, can be made. The survey has, during the last expedition season, been divided into three sections, with a small office force in Washington. The sections are separated by considerable distances, but so arranged as to permit of a favorable prosecution of the work in the western political divisions to be occupied. Consequent to the receipt, storage, and partial reduction of field records, temporary office-room, as has heretofore been estimated for, becomes necessary. The estimates presented, with the exceptions herein noted, are in no important particular different from those submitted for several years past.

APPENDIX O.

Explaining estimates of the Chief of Ordnance, U. S. A. (See pages 71 to 73.)

ORDNANCE OFFICE, WAR DEPARTMENT,
Washington, August 30, 1877.

SIR: I have the honor to submit estimates in detail for the service of the Ordnance department of the Army, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879, with the following explanatory remarks:

The appropriations for the use of this department should be largely increased over those of the present fiscal year. The functions of the Ordnance department are not limited to the mere supply of arms, &c., to our small Army, but are commensurate with the whole country. Its duties are national in their character and application. They are intended to prepare the nation for war. And, in deciding upon the moneys to be expended by it, the wants of the country at large, in the event of war, should be seriously considered, and not the comparatively small demands of an Army of twenty-five thousand (25,000) men.

ARSENALS.

The appropriation this year of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) for the repairs of smaller arsenals, &c., (fifteen in number,) is entirely inadequate.

If the policy of Congress in regard to these arsenals is followed much longer, it will result in great loss to the Government in the deterioration of these valuable properties. The recommendation made by this bureau for several years, and the action of a board appointed under act of Congress, strongly recommended by the Secretary of War, should be carried out. It is this: to concentrate the manufacturing operations of the department at three arsenals and the armory, retain a few smaller arsenals for receipts and issues at central points, and sell all the others. I recommend the retention of Benicia arsenal, on the Pacific; Rock Island arsenal, in the Mississippi valley; the national armory, at Springfield, Massachusetts; the Frankford arsenal, Pennsylvania; and the erection of an arsenal in the vicinity of New York, *out of the proceeds of the sales of those not required.* The Allegheny, Watervliet, Watertown, and Washington arsenals should be sold. The Indianapolis, Kennebec, Fort Monroe, Augusta, and, San Antonio arsenals should be retained as places of deposit, repair, and issue. The concentration of our manufactures at a few points is essential to an economical administration of the affairs of the department.

SMALL-ARMS.

I have submitted an estimate of nine hundred thousand dollars (\$900,000) for this object, and earnestly recommend that the appropriation of this amount be asked of Congress. During the ten years preceding the war, from 1852 to 1861, an average of two hundred and fifty-one thousand dollars (\$251,000) per annum was appropriated for the manufacture of arms, when the wants of a smaller Army than the present, and the cheapness of the arms then made, permitted the gradual accumulation of them in store. On August 15, 1877, our returns show only thirteen thousand (13,000) Springfield rifles and carbines on hand of the approved service-model. The demands from the Army, and requisitions from the militia on their respective quotas, will probably take twelve thousand (12,000) or fifteen thousand, (15,000,) leaving in store at the end of the present fiscal year none whatever.

We have on hand many hundreds of thousands of muzzle-loading rifle muskets, of obsolete patterns, and a limited number of repaired breech-loaders; but modern wars must be fought with the most approved weapons, and none less perfect than the new model Springfield will satisfy our soldiers. The principal European powers are, at the present time, replacing the arms used in the late wars on the continent by more improved models on the latest inventions, each nation striving to surpass her neighbors in the power and perfection of her arms. Such costly rearmaments show the great importance that is ascribed to securing the best arms in their gigantic preparations for a possible conflict. Ought this country to be so blind to the possible wants of the future as to be willing to depend on obsolete weapons in store and the precarious supplies in the market?

I deem it most vital to the interests of the nation that the manufacture of arms by this Department be steadily continued in quantities sufficient to render a gradual accumulation of them in store a certainty. That a better arm than the Springfield may some day be invented is not at all improbable, and a magazine gun will no doubt be the arm of the future; but until such an arm, suitable for the military service, has been perfected and approved, a reserve stock of Springfields is a necessity.

ARMAMENT OF FORTIFICATIONS.

Under this head I have submitted an estimate of nine hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$950,000) for the next fiscal year. The conversion of smooth-bore guns into efficient 8-inch rifles has progressed satisfactorily. The coiled wrought-iron tubes used in the conversion have been imported, but a trial of a gun with a tube of domestic manufacture has given

the best results, and proved conclusively that our product is equal to the imported, notwithstanding the long experience in such work in English shops. Dependence can now be placed on the private enterprise and skill of our own people for the tubes for 8-inch rifles, and, in the preparation of guns of that nature, our material, labor, and machinery will meet all our requirements.

The 8-inch rifle, with American tube, has successfully withstood over five hundred (500) rounds with battering charges, and remains in serviceable condition, and the 9-inch gun, with the same exterior model as the 8-inch, and consequently with thinner walls and less weight, was fired five hundred and two (502) rounds, which far more severely tested the system. It must now be conceded that the strength and value of conversions, by using coiled wrought-iron lining-tubes for 8-inch rifles, have been proved and established. The success which has attended these experiments at Sandy Hook, in the effort to utilize our smooth-bore cast-iron guns by converting them into rifles of great power and efficiency, is a source of great satisfaction, and this uniform success justifies us in the conclusion that equally satisfactory results will follow our trials with the higher natures of 10-inch and 12-inch rifles, which are now in course of preparation. If our anticipations are realized in the success of these larger calibres, the Department will have developed a system of heavy ordnance, at small expense, which will compose an armament for our forts fully able to cope with foreign guns of equal calibre. Such a system will bring the manufacture entirely within the capacity of our private founderies, using our own raw material, and with no dependence on foreign establishments.

POWDER-DEPOT AND MILLS.

An estimate of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) has been submitted for the purchase of a site for a powder-depot and mills, and commencing the erection of suitable buildings. The absolute necessity for this appropriation has been frequently stated and reported on heretofore, and special reference was made to it in my last annual report. The annual deterioration of gunpowder stored in our forts is about twelve per cent., and the prevention of this deterioration would, in a few years, more than repay the expense of establishing a suitable depot for its preservation. For experimental powders, the erection of a Government mill would be to the interest of the United States and of private manufactories, in enabling this Department to carry on experiments and fix standards for future guidance. It would be an economical measure, enabling the Department to make its own powder, in time of peace, at a less cost than now paid to private mills. Powder for heavy ordnance is made specially for the purpose, and requires special appliances and machinery for its manufacture. It is not marketable, and the quantity required being so limited as not to excite competition, high prices result.

ROCK ISLAND ARSENAL.

Attention is invited to the following remarks by the commanding officer of the Rock Island arsenal, in regard to the difficulties attending the work of constructing the arsenal under the system of making appropriations that has existed heretofore. This system is to make specific appropriations for many and specific parts of the work yearly:

"Under act of July 12, 1870, the work appropriated for must be done, if done at all, within the year for which the appropriation was made. Also, the estimate for the appropriation must be made one year before the work is to begin. In making an estimate, then, the condition that all parts of work will be in one year hence is carefully considered, and then a careful estimate is made of the amount of work (and its cost) that could be done on the various parts of the work with the greatest economy and advantage.

"It is apparent, without proof, that such a system is inconsistent with the best economy. Accidents, which no prudence or wisdom can foresee, will occur to interfere with and upset plans—such as changes in prices of labor and materials; strikes; failures of contractors to furnish materials at times and in quantities required; and difficulties in procuring foundations, and in other engineering work.

"A worse difficulty, inseparable from the system, grows out of its lack of adaptation to the legal fiscal year. Appropriations are available only from July 1 to June 30, and in the middle of this occurs, in this climate, nearly six months of weather in which out-door building-work is impracticable. There is, then, after some delay for making contracts, &c., only about three months of good weather in the fall, and from two to two and one-half in the spring, for all work must be completed and gradually brought to a close before the end of June. Work must then cease and workmen be discharged in the best of the season to wait till new appropriations are available. It appears that Congress must have foreseen the difficulties when the act was passed, for public buildings were especially exempted from its operation, and subsequently river and harbor improvements, also, in act approved June 20, 1874.

"It is respectfully submitted that none of these need relief from the operation of the law more than the work of constructing the arsenal, and it is, therefore, earnestly urged that appropriations for the arsenal be made permanent, or at least available for two years. If this is done it will furnish relief from most of the difficulties enumerated above. (See remarks in accompanying estimate opposite 'for shop I,' and for furnishing power to shops.) Further, great additional economy and advantage could be effected in the work of construction, if the whole amount required to complete all the arsenal buildings were appropriated at once and placed at the disposal of the Secretary of War, to be used in such quantities each year as will permit the work to be done cheapest and in the best manner.

"It is believed that the truth of this statement would be made clear by a fair consideration of the difficulties enumerated above, in connection with the remarks opposite the estimate 'for shop I,' in the accompanying estimate; and also in connection with the fact that the estimates for each year are liable to be cut down, and items stricken out, so that plans for economical work are interfered with; different parts of the work are not done in each year simultaneously, as they ought to be, and often a less amount of work is done than can be done with the highest economy. Under such circumstances large gangs of carefully-selected, tried, and organized workmen and foremen have to be discharged and are dissipated.

"The United States loses the advantage which permanent employment gives, of getting the best workmen at low wages, and only a small amount of work is done in some years with the machinery and means provided for doing a larger amount, while the cost of maintaining these means is nearly permanent.

"It is believed that the adoption of the course recommended, instead of the system now pursued, ought and would save to the United States not less than ten per cent. of the whole cost of the work, and probably more. It is generally admitted that the armory and arsenal are to be completed. If so, the sooner it is done the better, and probably no time will come when the low prices of labor and materials will permit its accomplishment so cheaply as now, or when the employment it would furnish to laboring classes would be so great a boon as now.

“Following is a full estimate of the cost of completing the construction of the arsenal and armory :

“Four finishing shops, (‘G,’ ‘H,’ ‘I,’ and ‘K,’) like those already built, at \$453,000 each; deduct \$80,000 already appropriated for shop ‘G’.....	\$1,732,000 00
“Four storehouses, at \$178,000 each.....	712,000 00
“These buildings are to contain three stories and a basement, 235 feet by 60 feet, with two porticoes, 15 feet by 60 feet, to be built of stone, to be practically fire-proof, and contain power elevators.	
“One fire-proof office.....	78,000 00
“The other buildings yet required are: Hospital, including surgeon’s quarters, (stone;) three sets of permanent officers’ quarters, (stone;) laboratories; four magazines complete, and post-stables. The total estimated cost of these is.....	218,000 00
“There is also required to complete necessary railroads, wagon-roads, avenues, water-pipes, sewers, and other necessary work on grounds.....	90,000 00
“Total.....	2,830,000 00

“This estimate does not include machinery and shop-fixtures.

“If this whole amount were appropriated to complete the armory and arsenal, it is believed it could be accomplished with the best economy by devoting five years to the entire work, and that about the amount estimated for above, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879, viz., \$599,100, could be used with the best advantage and economy in that year.”

APPENDIX Q.

Explaining estimates for the Indian Service. (See pages 95 to 114.)

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR,
Office of Indian Affairs, Washington, October 23, 1877.

SIR: In connection with the "estimates" for the Indian service for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879, I have the honor to submit the following explanations relative to such items as ask for an increase of appropriation over amounts appropriated for the current fiscal year, and also to such items as were included in the last appropriation bill but have been dropped from this estimate, viz:

* * * * *

CURRENT AND CONTINGENT EXPENSES.

Pay of agent at Hoopa Valley—estimate submitted, \$1,500. This appropriation is necessitated by the re-establishment of the Hoopa Valley agency, in accordance with recommendations of both civil and military officers. The attempt made last year to consolidate this agency with that of Round Valley failed, owing to the determined opposition of the Indians to removal.

Pay of agent for Western Shoshones—estimate submitted, \$1,500. The Western Shoshones are being gathered on a reservation in Nevada recently set apart for their use. The citizens of Nevada will thereby be relieved of the annoying presence of these hitherto homeless vagrants. This work requires the services of an agent.

Pay of agent for the Gros Ventres—estimate submitted, \$1,500. The Gros Ventres were formerly located at Fort Belknap agency, which was abolished June 30, 1876. They are friendly to the whites, and, on account of their long hostility to, and fear of, the Sioux, cannot be induced to join the Fort Peck agency. They are now in the vicinity of Fort Benton, and are at the mercy of the hostiles. In this emergency they are being cared for by the War Department, so far as practicable, until an agency can be established for them.

Pay of agent for the Mission Indians in California—estimate submitted, \$1,500; increase, \$900. The deplorable condition of the four thousand Mission Indians in Southern California and their need of an agent is well known. It has been found impossible, with the \$600 appropriated by act of March 3, 1877, to secure a competent and trustworthy agent, and to retain him long enough in the service to make the knowledge and experience gained by him of any practical benefit to the office or the Indians. By the time he understands what is to be done he finds that he cannot afford to do it at \$600 per annum.

Pay of an interpreter for the Western Shoshones—estimate submitted, \$300. In collecting the Western Shoshones upon the reservation above referred to, the service of an interpreter is next in importance to that of an agent.

Pay of interpreter for the Gros Ventres in Montana—estimate submitted, \$300. The business of the agency above proposed to be established for the Gros Ventres cannot be carried on without the aid of an interpreter.

Pay of special interpreters—estimate submitted, \$1,000. It is frequently found necessary to engage interpreters for temporary service in localities where such service is not provided for by law or appropriation.

Pay of clerks for the Dakota superintendency—estimate submitted, \$2,800. This clerical service is required in the office of the superintendent of Indian affairs for Dakota.

FULFILLING TREATIES WITH INDIAN TRIBES.

Pay of matron for the Omahas—estimate submitted, \$600. The Omahas have a flourishing school, supported entirely by their own funds; they should be aided, to the extent of this small sum, to provide a competent matron, whose services will materially increase the efficiency of the school.

Repairs of grist and saw-mill for the Pawnees—estimate submitted, \$300. The Pawnees were removed to the Indian Territory two years ago. Means for providing lumber for new houses, and for grinding grain raised by their own labor, should not be lacking. There are no tribal funds from which the expense of making these repairs can be met.

Support of Poncas—estimate submitted, \$10,000; increase, \$2,500. The Poncas have lately removed to the Indian Territory. They left their homes in Dakota, where they were comfortably located, with the greatest reluctance. Justice requires that, in return for the sacrifice made, they should receive special aid in becoming settled in their new homes. This fund is to provide schools, stock, farming implements, employes, &c.

Pay of employes for Sioux—estimate submitted, \$47,000; increase, \$22,000. These employes are required for seven agencies, having in charge twenty-five thousand Indians. To furnish each agency with the allowance of one clerk, physician, blacksmith, carpenter, farmer, two teachers, and two laborers, will require, for the sixty-three employes, at an average salary of \$715 per annum, \$45,000. To these must be added at least thirty employes, including millers, engineers, commissary clerks, herders, butchers, additional laborers, and watchmen. Even then this allowance of one employe to two hundred and eighty-four Indians can hardly be considered as fulfilling the Sioux agreement of February 28, 1877, where the United States agrees "to provide all necessary aid to assist the said Indians in the work of civilization, to furnish to them schools and instruction in mechanical and agricultural arts, as provided by the treaty of 1868."

Pay of matron for Santee industrial school—estimate submitted, \$800. Without the services of a matron the efficiency of the Santee industrial school will be seriously impaired.

For furnishing iron and steel for Sioux, \$1,000. This amount for iron and steel for blacksmith-shops and repairs was guaranteed the Sioux by treaty of 1868.

Subsistence of Sioux of different tribes—estimate submitted, \$1,230,000; increase, \$105,000. Twenty-five thousand Sioux are to be subsisted from this fund. Placing the cost of the ration guaranteed them by the agreement of February 28, 1877, at the low estimate of 13½ cents, \$1,231,000 will be required to feed them for one year. Supplies of soap, tobacco, hominy, &c., must also be occasionally issued.

Buildings at seven Sioux agencies—estimate submitted, \$40,000. Article 7 of the Sioux agreement of February 28, 1877 requires that all employes residing upon the reservation "shall be lawfully married and living with their respective families." To erect suitable buildings for the occupancy of such employes will require not less than \$40,000. This item should receive not only favorable, but also early attention.

Subsistence and civilization of Yankton Sioux—estimate submitted, \$80,000. Hitherto the estimate for the subsistence of the Yankton Sioux has been included in the estimate for the "Sioux of different tribes," but it is herewith presented separately. They are not parties to the treaty of 1868. To furnish them the regular Sioux ration will require \$98,550. It is believed, however, that, owing to the progress made by the tribe in civilization, the sum asked for will be sufficient. Of this a large portion will be issued in return for labor, the results of which will advance them still further towards self-support.

Support and civilization of the Gros Ventres—estimate submitted, \$30,000. This is not properly an estimate for increase of appropriation, but the presentation, in a separate item, of what for the last two years has been included under the head of "Sioux at Fort Peck, Assinaboines and Gros Ventres." For the needs of the Gros Ventres, see remarks under "Pay of agent for Gros Ventres." This amount is due them under provisions of article 8 of unratified treaty of July 13, 1868, which the Gros Ventres have considered binding and have kept in good faith.

Subsistence of Poncas—estimate submitted, \$34,000. This item is included in the amount asked for subsistence of the Cheyennes, Arapahoes, Apaches, and other Indians in the Indian Territory. The Poncas number seven hundred and fifty, and, until they can be again started in farming in their new location, are entirely dependent on the Government for support.

Pay of employes at the Southern Ute agency, Colorado—estimate submitted, \$5,000. This agency has been established within a few months. The employes provided for by the Ute treaty are not sufficient to conduct the Los Pinos and White River agencies.

Support of schools not otherwise provided for—estimate submitted, \$100,000; increase, \$70,000. For four-fifths of the Indian population of school-age no educational facilities whatever are now provided. For four-fifths of the remainder only day-schools are provided, whose civilizing influence over Indian children, as compared with the influence of boarding-schools, is so small that no excuse but want of funds can justify the substitution of one for the other.

Transportation of Indian supplies—estimate submitted, \$225,000; increase, \$6,000. The experience of the past year has shown that the amount appropriated (\$219,000) is inadequate to defray the necessary expenses of transporting goods and supplies for the Indian service, and that the above increase is required.

Incidental expenses of the Indian service in Arizona—estimate submitted, \$65,000; increase, \$40,000. By the reduction of this appropriation, for the past two years, the work of civilization among fourteen thousand Indians, on four reservations, has been brought to a standstill, and to obtain subsistence the Indians have been forced to leave their reserves, much to the annoyance of settlers. The Indians on the Colorado River reservation have for the last two years received no supplies whatever from the Government, but salt. All assistance in the way of employes, agricultural implements, stock, buildings, payment for labor, &c., for these fourteen thousand Indians must come from this fund; also at least \$3,000 each, for the incidental expenses of the three agencies in the Territory.

California—estimate submitted, \$60,000; increase, \$35,000. The demands on this fund consist of the incidental expenses (including travelling expenses of agents, and hay and wood for agency use) of four agencies; the clothing and subsistence of seven hundred Indians, the employes for three agencies; and all the assistance in the way of opening farms, building houses, furnishing stock and farming implements, and running mills and shops, which should be furnished the six thousand Indians who must look solely to this fund for help. Of these the Mission Indians are in most wretched condition; the Tules and Tejons need especial aid in getting established on their reserve, to which they have removed during the year, thus saving to the Government the annual rental of \$1,920 paid for the "Madden farm," which they formerly occupied. Provision must be made for the Hoopa Valley agency, which, owing to its discontinuance, was not estimated for last year.

Colorado—estimate submitted, \$10,000; increase, \$6,000. This increase is made necessary by the establishment of

the Southern Ute agency—making three instead of two agencies to be maintained—and for necessary additions to the treaty-employed force for the White River agency.

Dakota—estimate submitted, \$16,000; increase, \$1,000.

Idaho—estimate submitted, \$10,000; increase, \$7,000. This sum is barely sufficient to pay necessary travelling expenses of three agents, and for incidental expenses (including hay and wood) for three agencies, and to provide a needed addition to the employé-force at Lemhi and Fort Hall, for which treaty provisions are insufficient.

Montana—estimate submitted, \$10,000; increase, \$4,000. Required for the incidental expenses of the new Gros Ventre agency, and for the other four agencies in the Territory, and for pay of employés at those agencies not otherwise provided for.

Washington—estimate submitted, \$30,000; increase, \$20,000. On this fund the four thousand five hundred Indians of the Colville and Puyallup agency are entirely dependent for employés, assistance in agriculture, clothing, medical supplies, support of mills and shops, &c. It must also supplement the inadequate treaty funds of three other agencies, and defray all the incidental expenses of the seven agencies in the Territory, whose Indians are located on fifteen reservations, widely separated.

Wyoming—estimate submitted, \$2,000; increase, \$1,000. Necessary to provide wood and hay for agency, furnish temporary employés, and defray incidental expenses of the Shoshone agency in Wyoming.

Nevada—estimate submitted, \$27,100; increase, \$17,100. No progress in locating the two thousand Western Shoshones upon their reservation can be made unless funds are provided for opening farms, building houses, purchase of stock, farming implements, and seed, and for paying salaries of employés; agency buildings ought also to be erected. For this work the increase asked for (\$17,100) is a meagre estimate. The readiness shown by these Indians to engage in civilizing pursuits, as soon as opportunity is offered, will, it is believed, enable this office to expend for their clothing and subsistence only the \$5,000 due them by treaty.

New Mexico—estimate submitted, \$30,000; increase, \$10,000. For employés for the Cimarron, Abiquin, Mescalero, and Navajo agencies; also for travelling expenses of agents, hay and wood for agency use, and incidental expenses of the respective agencies.

Oregon—estimate submitted, \$50,000; increase, \$35,000. The reduction of this incidental fund for two years has operated most unfortunately at the Siletz and Grand Ronde agencies. The two thousand Indians, who were making rapid progress in civilization, have seen their employés discharged, and their mills and shops closed, and themselves obliged to leave their reservations in order to gain subsistence. The Alseas and Neztuccas complain, with bitterness, and reason, that the promises of farms and houses, on condition of their removal to Siletz, are still unfulfilled, and that another winter of exposure is before them. Besides the entire support of these Indians, this fund must also be called on to so supplement inadequate treaty-funds at three other agencies, that they may do the work of civilization for which they were intended, and to defray all the incidental expenses of the six agencies of the State, and the travelling expenses of the respective agents.

Utah—estimate submitted, \$20,000; increase, \$10,000. The Indians of the Uintah agency, in Utah, are peaceable, and, to a considerable extent, engaged in civilized occupations. With the proper and necessary aid in the way of skilled employés, agricultural implements, schools, &c., but little assistance will be required by them after a few years.

Central superintendency—estimate submitted, \$6,000; increase, \$2,000.

Expenses of Indian delegations visiting Washington—estimate submitted, \$5,000. This small sum will not tend to encourage the bringing of Indian delegations to this city, but since the best interests of the service occasionally require that Indians be brought here for personal conference, provision to a limited extent should be made for the expenses of such visits.

Removal of Indians—estimate submitted, \$25,000. A fund should be placed at the disposal of the Department with which to consolidate Indian agencies whenever desirable and practicable; thus the expense of maintaining so many separate establishments will be gradually lessened.

Buildings at Colville agency—estimate submitted, \$5,000. There are no buildings of any description upon the reservation set apart for the Indians of this agency. Buildings are as essential to an agency as is the Capitol to Congress.

Additional compensation to Indian agents—estimate submitted, \$20,000. The disproportion between the service required and the salaries allowed agents having in charge large and difficult agencies is a serious obstacle to an efficient and honest administration of Indian affairs. The appropriation of this sum will, for the first time, enable this office to make a difference in the compensation allowed for an agency of eleven thousand and one of four hundred Indians; it will save to the service men of tried integrity and ability, and of large experience in Indian affairs, and will enable the bureau to raise the grade of capacity required in its agents throughout the service.

Wagon-road on the Ute reservation, Colorado—estimate submitted, \$1,500. The road from the old to the new location of the Los Pinos agency, in Colorado, is, for a part of the way, almost impassable. This outlay for repairs will soon be saved in the reduced cost of transportation.

Pay and rations of Indian police—estimate submitted, \$50,000. The plan of employing Indians for police duty has been tried at several agencies, and has everywhere met with such success that funds should be provided for its adoption at every agency. In enforcing the commands of agents, in maintaining order, in the suppression of the whiskey traffic, and in the prevention of depredations by white thieves, an Indian police will save to the Government's civilization fund many times the amount of the small salaries paid; it will become an important factor in the breaking down of tribal relations, and be a valuable civilizing agent, by teaching the lesson of self-government.

Pay of clerks at agencies not otherwise provided for—estimate submitted, \$15,000. The elaborate and complicated agency-accounts required by the accounting officers of the Treasury, which must be made by the agent in triplicate, together with the large amount of clerical work connected with the conduct of the business of most Indian agencies, will fully employ the time of one person. If the agent is compelled to do this work himself, either the interests of his Indians will suffer, or his papers will reach the office out of season and out of shape, or, as has been the case, the agent will resign.

Civilization of Indians, \$50,000. In addition to the fund at the disposal of the bureau, at least fifty thousand dollars will be required to teach the Indians the arts of peace, and to enable them to become self-supporting. The money properly expended under this head will tend materially to reduce the cost of supporting the Indians. It is intended to furnish them with cattle and all the implements of husbandry, saw-mills, and grist-mills. The removal of the Sioux to the White River country alone, and setting them up in farming, will more than absorb the \$50,000 asked for.

Buildings at Ponca agency—estimate submitted, \$40,000. The Poncas, whose removal has been referred to above, have received in exchange for their one hundred and fifty houses in Dakota only cloth teepees. If the Poncas are left

thus exposed to pass their first winter in a new climate, they will have little reason to believe in either the faith or humanity of the Government. These buildings must be provided sometime; if provided at once, a vast amount of suffering and sickness will be saved the Indians, and the charge of disgraceful neglect will be saved the Government. Agency buildings are also imperatively needed and are included in this estimate.

Buildings for the Gros Ventre agency—estimate submitted, \$7,500. (See remarks to item "Pay of agent for Gros Ventres.")

Building for boarding-school for the Flandreau agency—estimate submitted, \$5,000. The Flandreau Sioux, after severe struggles, are supporting themselves by farming. The day-school among them has met with but partial success, owing to the long distances between the homes of these Indian farmers. They need, but are too poor to build, a house for a boarding-school, and deserve this much of aid from the Government.

Buildings for the Mescalero Apache agency, New Mexico—estimate submitted, \$5,000. These buildings, which include a house for a day-school, are greatly needed; the sum asked for is small. At present the Department is renting an agent's office and storage-room for about one hundred dollars per month.

Relief of J. B. Monteith—estimate submitted, \$625 75. (Explained in estimate.)

Total increase asked for, \$830,045 75.

Items included in last appropriation bill dropped from present estimate, viz:

Pay of one agent in Nevada, \$1,500; (one agency abolished.) Pay of agent at Southern Apache agency, New Mexico, \$1,500, and pay of interpreter at Southern Apache agency, New Mexico, \$300; (agency abolished.) Fulfilling treaty with Chippewas of the Mississippi—pay of physician, \$1,200; medicines, \$300; (limitation of treaty.) Gilling twine, \$800; (estimate reduced from \$1,200 to \$400.) Fulfilling treaty with Crows—estimate for one thousand roaming Indians, reduced from \$10 to \$5 per capita, \$5,000. Fulfilling treaty with Omahas—blacksmith-shop and tools, \$300; (limitation of treaty.) Fulfilling treaty with Northern Cheyennes—Arapahoes, \$18,000; (the eighteen hundred "Indians, roaming," hitherto estimated for, are now located on reservations.) Interest due Osages on net avails of trust and diminished reserve lands sold, \$43,380 58; (special estimate to be made for this item hereafter.) Grist-mill on White Earth reservation, \$5,000; (further appropriation for that purpose unnecessary.) Fulfilling treaties with Miamies of Kansas, \$4,949 12; (dropped in accordance with provisions of act of March 3, 1877, Statutes at Large, p. 292, par. 7.) Fulfilling treaty with Tabeguache, &c., bands of Utes—buildings for the Southern Ute agency, \$10,000; (further appropriation for that purpose not required.) Civilization and subsistence of Indians on Malheur reservation, \$5,000; (not deemed necessary.) Support and civilization of Sioux at Fort Peck agency, \$15,000; (not deemed necessary.) Collecting and subsisting Apaches of Arizona and New Mexico, \$50,000; (not deemed necessary.) Settlement, subsistence, and support of Shoshones and Banocks and other bands in Idaho and Southern Oregon, \$5,000; (not deemed necessary.)

Total reduction, \$167,229 70; net increase asked, \$662,816 05.

APPENDIX R.

Explaining estimates for Public Buildings under the Treasury Department. (See pages 121 and 122.)

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,
Office of the Supervising Architect, October 23, 1877.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith estimates of appropriations required for the service of the fiscal year ending the 30th day of June, 1879, amounting in the aggregate to four million seven hundred and sixty thousand seven hundred and twenty-nine dollars and twenty-five cents, (\$4,685,729 25.) [This includes the estimates for heating apparatus, vaults, safes, and locks, and plans for public buildings, which will be found under the title of "Miscellaneous," *post.*]

While the public interest would be served by having appropriations for all public buildings made as early in the coming session of Congress as possible, it is especially desirable that appropriations for buildings specified in Estimate No. 2, (from custom-house Boston, Mass., to Assay Office, Helena, Montana, inclusive,) may be made at an early day, as work is already suspended on some of these buildings, and will soon be suspended on the others, in consequence of the inadequate appropriations made by the last Congress.

I desire to call special attention to the necessity for the purchase or condemnation of additional land for the building in course of erection at Fall River, Mass., the estimate for which is based upon the price per foot paid for the present site. On the adjoining property, in the rear of the building and in close proximity thereto, is located a large frame building occupied as a carriage factory. A portion of this property, not less than twenty (20) feet in width, should be secured as a means of protection against fire, and for use as a driveway for mail-wagons.

The estimates herewith submitted are made, as desired by you, with a view to approximate in amount those submitted for the current fiscal year, but I desire to state that to prosecute the work to the best advantage and secure the best results larger appropriations than those estimated would be required. This is particularly the case as regards the larger works and those buildings which could be completed the coming year, but for which an amount for continuation only is estimated.

APPENDIX S.

Explanation of estimate for Buildings and Grounds, Military Academy. (See pages 139 and 140.)

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF WEST POINT, UNITED STATES MILITARY ACADEMY,
West Point, N. Y., August 29, 1877.

SIR: I have the honor to submit herewith my estimates for the Military Academy for the year ending June 30, 1879. The estimates for "buildings and grounds" are very large in the aggregate, because they are the accumulated necessities of several years. The hospital, sewerage, and gas-works should have been completed before this time, their necessity having been recognized several years ago. The water supply has never been sufficient. Last year it was totally exhausted, so that in case of fire not a gallon of water would have been available to extinguish it.

The cadet-barracks are not large enough to accommodate the number of cadets authorized by law. Three cadets have to live in a room which was designed for only two. This crowding seriously interferes with study, and is detrimental to discipline and health.

The officers' quarters have never been sufficient for the number of officers on duty at the Academy. In some cases two families are crowded into a small house, some officers have to live in the cadet-barracks, and others at the hotel. For many years the attempt has been made to eke out the supply by use of the appropriation for repairs and improvements. I think it better to ask a specific appropriation for the purpose.

Careful estimates have been made in all cases, and the several sums asked for are, in my opinion, necessary at the present time. I therefore deem it my duty to submit the full estimates for what I consider essential to the welfare of the Academy, and hope that Congress may see fit to appropriate the amounts required.

I also respectfully request that the appropriations for "buildings and grounds," or at least those for water supply and sewerage, may be made available immediately upon the passage of the act. It is very important that these works be completed as soon as practicable.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith a sketch of the township of Highland, Orange county, N. Y., showing the position of Round Pond and the proposed line of pipe for conveying the water to the post. The sketch is a copy of a portion of the county map corrected. A careful survey of the lake and the proposed line leading from it has been made under my direction by Lieutenant H. S. Taber, Corps of Engineers, and furnishes the following information:

Area of lake at surface, 498,111 square feet, or 11.43 acres.

Depth of lake near width, 29 feet.

Quantity of water available, placing outlet 23 feet below surface, 48,023,875 gallons.

Quantity of land draining into lake, and which it is desirable to purchase, (additional to area of lake,) 41 acres.

Height of lake above reservoir at post, 715 feet.

Length of proposed main, exclusive of siphon, 20,697 feet 6 inches.

The present consumption of water at this post is less than 100,000 gallons daily.

This lake will furnish 400,000 gallons daily for four months, which covers the dry season. Its depth can be increased 10 feet at a trifling cost.

The water has been analyzed under the direction of Surgeon B. J. D. Irving, U. S. Army, and pronounced of good quality.

Respectfully forwarded to the Secretary of War, through the Adjutant General of the Army, in connection with the estimates for the year ending June, 1879.

This will give an ample supply of pure water at a very moderate cost, (only one-half the cost roughly estimated before the survey was made.) The distributing reservoir (the Delafield) will give sufficient head to send the water to the top of all the buildings on the post, thus giving perfect security against fire. But some of the distributing-pipe and plumbing now in use is too weak to bear such pressure, and more must be added. It is for these reasons that the estimate of \$10,000 is added to that necessary for bringing the water from "Round Pond" to the "Delafield reservoir." It is impossible to make any accurate estimate of the amount which will be required, for it cannot be known until the pressure is put on how much of the pipe will have to be replaced. Ten thousand dollars will certainly be sufficient, and of course no more money will be used than proves to be necessary.

APPENDIX T.

Explanation of the estimates for Government Hospital for the Insane. (See pages 141 and 168.)

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS.

The present buildings and apparatus for providing meats, bread, washing, and baking were designed for an institution accommodating three hundred and fifty patients, and the officers and employes requisite for that number, and have since been but slightly enlarged and improved, while the number of patients, officers, and employes to be provided for has more than doubled. The proposed enlargements and improvements are necessary to the convenience and efficiency of these fundamental branches of the hospital service, and it is estimated that they can be executed for the limited sum that is asked for those purposes.

It is necessary to annually expend at least the sum of this estimate (\$10,000) in painting and general repairs on account of ordinary wear, in repairing and replacing the furniture, bedding, and convenience of the wards and kitchens, and in providing such new agencies for the better medical and moral treatment of the patients as are approved by experience.

The Government Hospital for the Insane has proper accommodations for only five hundred and sixty-three patients. At the close of the last year there were seven hundred and sixty-five under treatment, or two hundred and two in excess of its proper capacity, and there is, under existing laws, a steady demand for increased accommodations. The excessive overcrowding of the institution gives rise to much preventable irritability, turbulence, and discomfort of the patients, and greatly increases the liability to outbreaks of serious violence and endemic disease. Such a brief statement of the situation of the hospital is thought to demonstrate the imperative necessity of its enlargement in some manner. The board of visitors and superintendent have given much attention to this important question, and have no hesitation in strongly recommending the plan of enlargement contemplated by this estimate. Of the seven hundred and sixty-five patients now under treatment, five hundred and eighty-three are men, and one hundred and eighty-two are women; and as the number of men is so large, and so much in excess of the number of women, the former are disposed to monopolize the use of the entire grounds surrounding the buildings. This situation renders it necessary to contract the exercise-grounds of the women to the smallest practicable compass, and to place many irritating restrictions upon the personal liberty of both sexes, which would be entirely unnecessary if each sex occupied a separate building surrounded by its own ample grounds. It is therefore proposed to place the department for women on the farm of one hundred and seventy-five acres lying on the east side of the public road, where there is an excellent site for the purpose, and relinquish to the exclusive use of the men the present building surrounded by one hundred and eighty-five acres of land, whose water-front of three thousand feet offers facilities for boating, fishing, and bathing.

Provisions for the treatment of the insane of each sex in buildings and grounds entirely separate from those occupied by the other sex, have been made in the cities of Philadelphia and New York, and in the State of Michigan, and the conductors of those institutions bear the strongest testimony to the unqualified advantages of such separation.

CURRENT EXPENSES.

The average number of free patients under treatment in the hospital during the last fiscal year was seven hundred and thirty-five. That number, with an average of thirty-five independent or pay-patients, was as many as could be lodged in the establishment by using most of the corridors and day-rooms on the male side of the house as dormitories, besides putting two and sometimes three patients to sleep in many rooms intended for one inmate only. As it will be physically impossible to provide for a larger number of patients, the average of last year is made the basis of the estimate for the next year. The estimated cost of the free, or Government, patients, in addition to the value of the products of the farm and garden above the current expense of producing them, is \$4 33 $\frac{1}{3}$ per week, and, at that rate, the amount required to support an average of seven hundred and thirty-five patients, is \$166,075.

If the District authorities are still required to pay one-half of the expense of supporting the indigent insane of the District, admitted after July 1, 1876, as the terms of the appropriation acts have required them to do during the last and current years, it is estimated that one-half of the current cost of supporting that class of patients will be, in the year 1878-79, \$10,206, which, deducted from \$166,075, leaves \$155,869 to be appropriated by Congress.

APPENDIX U.

Explanation of estimates for Coast-Survey Service. (See pages 156 and 157.)

U. S. COAST-SURVEY OFFICE,
Washington, October 19, 1877.

SIR: I have the honor to submit herewith estimates for continuing the work of the coast and geodetic survey and standard weights and measures of the United States for the year ending June 30, 1879.

The accompanying papers are—

I. Estimates in detail for the work of the coast and geodetic survey during the next fiscal year, preceded by a brief statement of the progress made during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1877.

II. Estimates for continuing the construction of the United States standard weights and measures for the next fiscal year.

III. Estimates of deficiencies required to obtain the most economical and effective results in the work of the coast and geodetic survey during the last half of the present fiscal year.

The sums submitted as deficiencies for the present fiscal year have been called for in consequence of the greatly-reduced appropriations for the current fiscal year, a reduction that has forced the suspension of most important classes of work, for which there is a constant public demand.

The aggregate of the estimates now submitted, although greater than the amount appropriated for the current year, is nearly the same as that of estimates for the present year, but is greater than the amount appropriated.

The two schooners for which estimates are submitted—one in the deficiencies for the present year and one in the estimates for the next fiscal year—are greatly needed for the special work of observing sea-currents, and to replace in part ten old and worn-out vessels sold, the proceeds of which have been covered into the Treasury.

The aggregate of the estimates now submitted, although greater than the amount appropriated for the current year, is urgently required. Resurveys of most important localities, as Long Island Sound, New York Harbor entrance, Delaware Bay and River, and others, in all of which great changes have occurred since the charts were issued, call for a sum in addition to the amount necessary to maintain the regular progress of the survey of the coast. The prompt publication of the charts and other results of the work, accumulated through years, requires an increase in the number of computers, engravers, and draughtsmen in the office. Even the amount of estimates herewith submitted will not suffice to meet all the requirements incident to the rapid development of the country and the constant demands for information from all parts of the United States.

The estimates for rents of the buildings at present occupied for the operations of the coast and geodetic survey and the standard weights and measures are continued at the same amounts as for the past seven years, because it is deemed unwise to seek for buildings less fire-proof than those now occupied, even at reduced rents.

As usual, a brief statement will be given of the operations of the fiscal year preceding that for which estimates are now presented in detail. The work done in the year ending June 30, 1877, has included hydrography of the sea-coast of Maine near Mt. Desert Island, and soundings in Eggemoggin Reach and Isle au Haut Bay; tidal observations at the entrance of Penobscot Bay; topography of the shores of the Penobscot from Hampden to Bangor; soundings near the entrance of Saco River, Maine; triangulation in the vicinity of Mt. Washington, New Hampshire; tidal observations at Boston, and, off the coast, tidal currents observed in the Gulf of Maine; the triangulation of Taunton River, Massachusetts; tidal observations at Providence, Rhode Island; topography of the vicinity of New Haven, Connecticut; primary triangulations across the Hudson River near Albany; tidal observations at Governor's Island, Brooklyn, and Sandy Hook; observations with the pendulum at New York City; supplementary soundings in Gedney's channel; triangulation in northern New Jersey; the hydrography of Barnegat Bay, including Tom's River, New Jersey; sailing-notes for navigation between Sandy Hook and Cape May, and for Delaware Bay and River; triangulation in eastern Pennsylvania; sailing-notes for the coast of Maryland and Virginia, and for the estuaries of Chesapeake Bay; determination of the positions of life-saving stations between Cape Henlopen and Cape Charles, Virginia, for insertion on charts; special shore-line survey and hydrography of the harbor of Baltimore City for United States Commissioners; determination of the magnetic elements at Washington City; surveys in the vicinity of Smith's Island, Chesapeake Bay, for the Boundary Commission of Maryland and Virginia; topography of the shores of the James River, Virginia, from City Point upward to Kingsland Creek, and of the northeastern approaches to Norfolk; tidal observations at Fortress Monroe; selection of station points in West Virginia for geodetic work; primary triangulation along the Blue Ridge in Virginia and North Carolina; hydrographic examination between Hatteras and Oregon Inlet, and of the Fryng-Pan Shoals, North Carolina; soundings in Ocracoke Inlet, and hydrography extended in Pamlico Sound, Currituck Sound, and East Lake, North Carolina, and in North Landing River, Virginia; latitude and azimuth determined at Long Shoal Point and at Hog Island, North Carolina; hydrography completed in Core Sound and Bogue Sound, North Carolina; topography of the vicinity of Cape Fear River at Wilmington, North Carolina; primary triangulation across the boundary between North Carolina and South Carolina; examination of harbors and sounds for sailing-notes between Cape Fear and St. Mary's River, Georgia; tidal observations at Fernandina, Florida; survey of St. John's River, Florida, from Jacksonville southward to Hogarth's Bay; hydrography of the coast approaches between Matanzas Inlet and Mosquito Inlet, Florida; survey of the coast and sea-water channels near Cape Cañaveral, with parts of the Banana River and Indian River; topography and hydrography of the western coast of Florida from Cedar Keys northward to Horseshoe Point; hydrography of the Gulf coast from Pine Point westward to Choctawhatchee, including St. Andrew's Bay and its approaches; determination of points by triangulation in Kentucky between Cumberland Gap and Lancaster Court-house; measurement of base-line and selection of points in Tennessee for triangulation between Knoxville and Nashville; triangulation in the northwestern part of Alabama; hydrographic development of the Gulf of Mexico by numerous lines of deep-sea soundings and temperature observations; topography of the shores of Barataria Bay, Louisiana, and extension of the triangulation towards the Mississippi River; special hydrographic survey of Cubitt's Gap, and from thence to the head of the Passes, Mississippi River, and of Southwest Pass; detailed survey of the shores and waters of that river between Bonnet Carre and Point Houmas; height of the water recorded regularly at New Orleans with a tide-gauge; reconnoissance for geodetic points in Illinois, and through Missouri westward towards the Wasatch Mountains; points determined in the vicinity of Madison, Wisconsin, and establishment of a permanent magnetic observatory in connection with the university at that place; and, on the coast of Texas,

the triangulation of Laguna Madre from Corpus Christi Bay southward to Baffin's Bay. On the Pacific coast of the United States, beginning at the southern boundary of California, the work of the year has included reconnoissance for triangulation points between San Diego and Santa Barbara; topography of the western part of Santa Catalina Island; inspection of field parties near the shores of Santa Barbara channel; connection of Anacapa and Santa Barbara Island, by triangulation, with stations on the main coast of California; hydrography of the approaches to San Miguel and Santa Rosa Island; supplementary soundings in the vicinity of Santa Monica, California; inshore hydrography eastward of Point Conception, and lines of soundings across the Santa Barbara channel; topography of the coast north of Point Conception towards Point Arguello; reconnoissance for triangulation between Los Angeles and Point Arguello; tidal observations at Fort Point and at Saucelito, San Francisco Bay; geodetic measurements and determination of latitude and azimuth at Mt. Diablo and Mt. Helena; reconnoissance for geodetic points between the Sierra Nevada and Salt Lake City; topography of the coast of California from Timber Gulch northward to Stewart's Point Landing; reconnoissance for triangulation points in the Court Range of mountains north of Mt. Ross and Sulphur Peak; hydrography of the coast of Oregon from False Tillamook northward to Columbia River entrance; topography of the shores and soundings in the Columbia River between Cathlamet and Cottonwood Island; tidal observations at Astoria and at Port Townsend, Washington Territory; erection of signals for triangulation across the waters of Washington Sound and the Strait of Fuca; additional soundings along the shores of Whidbey Island and Admiralty Inlet, Washington Territory; topography of the shores of Admiralty Inlet and Colos Passage from Point Orchard south to the entrance of Commencement Bay; inspection of topographical work in this section; and, as yet in progress, the hydrography of Commencement Bay, Washington Territory.

The compilation has been kept steadily in hand of sailing-notes and other maritime data pertaining to the Coast Pilot, for navigation along the seaboard of California, Oregon, and Washington Territory, and also for the Coast Pilot of Alaska.

Progress commensurate with the field-work has been made in the work of the Coast-Survey Office, which comprises the computations of all geodetic, trigonometric, tidal, and magnetic observations, including the arrangement for publication of the records and results; the drawing of the hydrographic charts from the records of soundings; the reduction of the original topographical and hydrographic maps for publication; the engraving, electrotyping, printing and issue of the same, as well as the maintenance of the instruments used in the survey. Tide-tables of the principal ports of the United States for the year 1878 have been published; the drawing of sixty-one charts has been in progress, of which number twenty-eight have been completed, including sixteen charts for publication by photo-lithography; nineteen copperplate engravings have been begun; one hundred and nine engraved plates have received additions, and twenty-one have been completed; an aggregate of eighteen thousand eight hundred and forty-two copies of charts has been issued; two thousand eight hundred and thirty copies of the Coast-Survey reports have been distributed; and the second volume of the Atlantic-Coast Pilot, comprising the coast from Boston to New York, has been in preparation, and will be published before the close of the year.

The estimates for continuing the survey of the Atlantic and Gulf coast of the United States during the year ending June 30, 1879, are intended to provide for the following progress:

Field-Work.—To continue the topography of the western shore and islands of Passamaquoddy Bay and its estuaries; of the coast eastward of Penobscot Bay towards Narraguagus Bay, and of the shores of the Penobscot near Bangor; for the determination of heights at some of the principal trigonometrical points between Boston and the St. Croix, and of coefficients of refraction; to complete the hydrography of Penobscot Bay and River, Isle au Haut, Blue Hill, and Frenchman's Bays, and continue soundings in the coast approaches eastward of Penobscot Bay; to continue a topographical and hydrographic survey of Portsmouth harbor; to make such additional triangulation as may be requisite for that and other surveys on the eastern coast, and determine the position of new light-houses between Eastport, Maine, and New York; to continue soundings along the coast of Maine and other off-shore hydrography between Cape Cod and Manan, and make special examination for the sailing-lines for charts; to continue the observations of sea and tidal currents in the Gulf of Maine; to continue tidal observations and to make such astronomical and magnetic observations as may be required; to continue such topographical and hydrographic resurveys of the coast between Cape Cod and New York as may be found necessary; to continue the survey of the Connecticut River from its mouth to Hartford; to make such examination as may be required in New York harbor, and such surveys in its vicinity as may be found necessary, including a topographical and hydrographic survey of the south coast of Long Island; to make at this port observations on tides and currents; to extend the plane-table survey of the Hudson River above Haverstraw; to continue the triangulation between the Hudson River and Lake Champlain; to make the requisite astronomical observations; to continue the topographical and hydrographic surveys of the coast of New Jersey and of Delaware Bay and River; to connect the Atlantic triangulation with that of Chesapeake Bay, near the boundary line between Maryland and Virginia; to complete the detailed survey of James River, Virginia, including the hydrography, and continue the plane-table survey of the Potomac River; to continue southward the main triangulation along the Blue Ridge parallel with the coast, including astronomical and magnetic observation; to continue the supplementary hydrography between Cape Henlopen, Delaware, and Cape Henry, Virginia, and in Chesapeake Bay; and also the tidal observations; to measure a base-line of verification and determine azimuths for the coast triangulation south of Cape Lookout; to make the requisite astronomical and magnetic observations; to continue the off-shore hydrography between Cape Henry and Cape Fear; to continue the hydrography of Pamlico Sound and its rivers, and that of Bogue Sound, and sound the entrance to Cape Fear River, and continue the photography of its shores to Wilmington; to extend northward the primary triangulation parallel to the coast in Alabama; to continue the topographical and hydrographic survey of rivers near the coast of South Carolina and Georgia; to determine azimuths for the triangulation of the coast of South Carolina and Georgia; to continue the detailed survey of the sea-islands and water-passages between Charleston and Savannah and to make tidal observations; to continue the off-shore hydrography between Cape Fear, North Carolina, and the St. John's River, Florida; to continue southward from Cape Cañaveral the triangulation, topography, and hydrography of the eastern coast of Florida, including Indian River; to continue the triangulation, topography, and hydrography of the St. John's River; to make the requisite astronomical observations; to continue hydrography off the eastern coast of Florida, from Mosquito Inlet to the southward; to continue soundings and observations for sea-temperatures in such parts of the Gulf Stream as may be deemed advisable between the west end of Cuba and Nova Scotia, and dredging along the coast within the same limits in conjunction with the United States Commission on Fish and Fisheries; to continue the astronomical and magnetic observations requisite between Cape Florida and Pensacola; to complete the hydrography of Charlotte Harbor; to complete the triangulation, topography, and hydrography of the western coast

of Florida, between Cedar Keys and Tampa Bay, and between Tampa Bay and Charlotte Harbor; to continue the same classes of work to the southward of Charlotte Harbor; to run lines of soundings and make observations of sea-temperatures in the Gulf of Mexico, and develop the hydrography of the Gulf coast, included in field operations; to connect the trigonometrical survey of the Mississippi River at New Orleans with that of Lake Borgne and Lake Pontchartrain, and continue the trigonometrical, topographical, and hydrographic survey of Lakes Pontchartrain and Maurepas, and of the Mississippi River, above New Orleans, to the head of ship-navigation; to determine geographical positions and make astronomical and magnetic observations requisite; to extend the triangulation, topography, and hydrography of Louisiana westward of the Mississippi delta, and continue the hydrography of the Gulf of Mexico between the mouth of the Mississippi and Galveston, Texas; to continue the triangulation, topography, and hydrography of the coast of Texas westward between Sabine Pass and Galveston and between Corpus Christi and the Rio Grande; to measure a base-line of verification and make the astronomical and magnetic observations requisite between Sabine Pass and the Rio Grande; to continue the hydrography of the approaches to the coast of Texas; to continue the triangulation connecting the surveys of the Atlantic and Pacific coasts and to furnish points for State surveys; to continue the determination of the positions of new light-houses and life-saving stations along the coast between New York and the Rio Grande; to continue the field-work for the description and verification of the work for the Coast Pilot; to continue the organized system of magnetic observations required for a complete magnetic survey and to run lines of levels connecting points in the main triangulation with the sea-level.

Office-Work.—To compute results from the field operations executed along the Atlantic and Gulf coasts, including astronomical, geodetic, geographical, magnetic, and tidal work; to continue the publication of the Coast Pilot for the Atlantic and Gulf coasts; to prepare the predictions of tides for 1879 for the same; to continue the reproduction of the original topographical maps, and to plot the hydrographic surveys; to continue the drawing and engraving of the general chart of the coast from Quoddy Head to Cape Cod, to complete the engraving of the western part of this chart; to continue the drawing of coast charts 1 and 2, coast of Maine, between the St. Croix River and Petit Manan light; to continue the drawing and engraving of chart No. 3, which includes Frenchman's Bay, Mt. Desert Island, Blue Hill Bay, Isle au Haut Bay, and their approaches, also local charts of Mt. Desert Island, Eggemoggin Reach, and Penobscot Bay east; to complete engraving the chart of Lake Champlain; to continue the drawing and engraving of a new chart of Long Island Sound, and of charts No. 22 and No. 23, between Barnegat and Cape May; to make additions to the charts and sketches between New York and Cape Henry; to continue the drawing and engraving of a new chart of Delaware Bay and River, and to complete that of James River; to continue the drawing and engraving of the general chart of the coast between Cape Henry and Cape Lookout; and of charts No. 38, No. 39, No. 42, No. 45, No. 46, and No. 47, showing parts of the coast between Cape Henry and Cape Lookout, including Pamlico Sound; to finish the engraving of the Atlantic-coast sailing-chart No. II, from Cape Hatteras to Key West; to continue the engraving of the general charts of the coast between Cape Romain and Cape Cañaveral, and of charts No. 51 and No. 52, between Cape Fear and Winyah Bay; to continue the engraving of a new chart of Georgetown Harbor, S. C., and to make additions to the charts between Cape Henry and the St. Mary's River; to continue the drawing and engraving of charts No. 59 and No. 60, from St. Augustine to Cape Cañaveral, and to make additions to the charts of the coast between St. Mary's River and Cape Florida; to continue the drawing and engraving of charts No. 81, No. 82, No. 83, No. 84, No. 85, and No. 86, showing the Gulf coast between Cedar Keys and Pensacola entrance, and to complete the charts of Tampa Bay; to engrave the chart of St. Andrew's Bay; to complete the engraving of charts No. 92, No. 93, and No. 95, showing Isle au Breton Sound and the Mississippi River, between New Orleans and the Gulf of Mexico, and the general chart showing the sea approaches to the Mississippi River; to publish by photo-lithography on a large scale the maps of the Mississippi River, showing its levees above New Orleans to Point Houmas; to continue the drawing and engraving of the general chart of the coast of Louisiana and Texas, from Atchafalaya Bay to Galveston; to continue the drawing and engraving of that between Galveston and the Rio Grande, and to complete chart No. 110, showing Corpus Christi Bay; for material for drawing, engraving, map-printing, for electrotyping, photographing, for instruments and apparatus.

Total for the Atlantic and Gulf coasts, involving work in twenty-nine States, will require \$425,000.

The estimates for continuing the survey of the Pacific coast of the United States are intended to provide for the following progress:

Field-Work.—To make the requisite observations for latitude, longitude, azimuth, and the magnetic elements at stations along the Pacific coast of the United States; to continue off-shore soundings along the coast of California, Oregon, and Washington Territory, and tidal observations at San Francisco, Port Townshend, and such other localities as may be necessary; to continue the main-coast triangulation from Monterey Bay to the southward, or from Point Conception to the northward, and from San Pedro towards San Diego, including the islands off that part of the coast; to continue reconnaissance for the main triangulation of the coast from San Pedro to Point Conception, from Russian River to the northward, from Columbia River north to Puget Sound, and south up the Willamette Valley; to complete the reconnaissance and continue the primary triangulation through the Sacramento and San Joaquin Valleys, and measure a base-line; to continue the coast triangulation and topography from Newport, Los Angeles county, towards San Diego, and that of the islands off that coast, to measure a base-line; to continue the tertiary triangulation and topography of the coast north of Point Arguella towards Point Sal, and the tertiary triangulation and topography from Point Buchon towards San Simeon; to continue the hydrography between San Diego and Monterey Bay; to develop the hydrographic changes in San Francisco Bay and its approaches; continue the triangulation and topography of the coast between Bodega Bay and Point Arena; complete hydrography between Cape Mendocino and the Klamath River; and continue that between Cape Sebastian and Point Orford; to observe currents along the coast and take soundings and temperature observations in the California branch of the Kuro Siwo current, and execute such other hydrographic work as local demands may require; to continue tidal and current observations at the Golden Gate, and observations on the ocean currents along the coast of California; to continue the triangulation, topography, and hydrography of the Columbia River; to complete the detailed survey between Cape Sebastian and Crescent City, and off-shore hydrography at Crescent City Reef; to measure a base-line and continue the triangulation of the Strait of Fuca and the topography and hydrography of Puget Sound, and adjacent waters; to continue the triangulation eastward to connect the surveys of the Pacific and Atlantic coasts, and measuring a base-line; to continue the reconnaissance of the coasts and islands of Alaska with observations for tides and currents; and to make the requisite astronomical and magnetic observations; to continue the field-work for the description of the coast and verification of the Coast Pilot of the coasts of California, Oregon, and Washington Territory; to

continue the organized system of magnetic observations required for a complete magnetic survey; and to run lines of levels connecting points in the main triangulation with the sea-level.

Office Work.—To make the computations from the observations made in the field, including astronomical, geodetic, geographical, magnetic, and tidal observations; to continue the publication of the Coast Pilot of the Pacific coast; to prepare tidal predictions for 1879; to continue the reproduction of the original topographical maps, and to plot the hydrographic surveys; to draw and engrave the additions on the general chart of the Pacific coast of the United States; to continue the drawing and engraving of the charts of the coast from San Diego to Point Conception, No. 1, No. 2, and No. 3; to continue the engraving of a new chart of San Francisco entrance and harbor, from resurveys; to continue the drawing and engraving of charts of the coast from Point Arena to Cape Mendocino, No. 8, of that from Cape Mendocino to St. George's Reef, No. 9, and of that from St. George's Reef to the Umpquah River, No. 10, Shoalwater Bay, Puget and Washington Sounds; to complete the drawing and engraving of the chart of Columbia River to Kalama, and to continue that of the local harbor charts of the coast, with those of the northwestern coast; for material for drawing, engraving, map-printing, for electrotyping, photographing, for instruments and apparatus.

Total for the Pacific coast, involving work in five States and Territories, will require \$275,000.

For repairs and maintenance of the complement of vessels used in the Coast Survey will require \$50,000.

For continuing the publication of observations made in the progress of the Coast Survey will require \$10,000.

For general expenses of all the work, rent, fuel; for transportation of instruments, maps, and charts; miscellaneous office-expenses; and for the purchase of new instruments, books, maps, and charts, will require \$40,000.

SIR: I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your directions to reduce the estimates for continuing the coast and geodetic survey during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879, to the lowest possible limits consistent with the economical and efficient execution of the work.

I beg to state that the estimates submitted in October are such as, in my judgment, after the fullest consideration of the necessities of the work and its economical progress, would best conduce to a completion in a reasonable period of time. As the work is to be confined to certain limits, and the organization of the force is thorough, the more rapidly it is executed the greater the economy, the less the total cost, and the more quickly will the public have use of the results.

I would also add that eighty per cent. of the amount of the estimates exceeding the appropriation for this year would be applied directly to field-work, and would yield as results not less than two and a half times the amount obtained from the present appropriation. The cost of placing a party in the field and the cost of taking it out of the field is the same, whether the party works one month or ten months. If the cost of placing a party in the field is \$500, and the cost of keeping it in the field is \$500 per month, withdrawing it from the field at a cost of \$500 gives an aggregate of \$1,500 in one month. If we add to this an additional \$1,500, we quadruple the amount of field-work by merely doubling the expenditure. Upon these grounds my estimates were submitted in October.

The appropriation for the current year proves to be entirely inadequate for the work without a radical change in the organization, and tends to loss in economy and delay in the completion of charts of the coasts. I have, therefore, after personal explanation, with your consent and direction, reduced the estimates from the amounts submitted in October to the amounts which were appropriated for the year ending June 30, 1877, after a most careful examination of the work by a sub-committee of the Committee of Appropriations of the House of Representatives, at the head of both of which was the present Speaker. Even the amount then appropriated was a great reduction from previous appropriations. The consequence of lessened appropriations has been that the survey of large portions of coasts, and other important work that would now have been finished, remain to be surveyed and completed.

I respectfully submit revised estimates, with an aggregate equal to that of the actual appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1877.

SIR: In compliance with your letter of August 1, 1877, I have the honor to enclose herewith the estimates, in duplicate, for the continuation of the United States geological and geographical survey of the Territories, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879.

The work of the survey, as stated in my letter transmitting the estimates for the present fiscal year, has been in the country north of the Union Pacific railroad, and embraced portions of Wyoming and Montana. It is my purpose to continue the exploration of this region north of the railroad, and to embrace in its scope of investigation that portion of country demanding immediate examination to meet the wants of the Government.

The continuation of the work in the locality named, north of the 40th parallel, will be even more remote from the base of supplies than this year, therefore necessitating a greater outlay for transportation.

The needs of the survey have been carefully calculated, and the estimates herewith submitted, which are the same as those transmitted for the last six years, are regarded as only sufficient to prosecute the work creditably, in accordance with the plan, areas to be examined, and results to be elaborated.
