II.—OFFICES CREATED AND THE SALARIES THEREOF.

[Prepared in the office of the Secretary of the Senate.]

By the act (Chap. VI) to establish the grade of vice-admiral in the United States navy, approved December 21, 1864.

The President is authorized, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to appoint one vice-admiral who shall be the ranking officer in the navy, and whose relative rank with officers of the army shall be that of the lieutenant general, with an annual salary of seven thousand dollars when at sea, six thousand dollars on shore duty, and five thousand dollars when waiting orders.

By the act (Chap. XLI) authorizing the President to appoint a Second Assistant Secretary of War, approved February 20, 1865.

The President is authorized, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, to appoint, for the term of one year from the passage of this act, a Second Assistant Secretary of War, whose salary shall be three thousand dollars per annum.

By the act (Chap. LIV) to create the eastern judicial district of the State of New York, approved February 25, 1865.

The President is authorized to appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a district judge for the eastern district of New York, who shall receive the same compensation as is allowed to the judge of the southern district of New York, (three thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars per annum.)

Such other officers shall be appointed for said district and court with the same fees and emoluments as are prescribed by law for other districts and courts of the United States.

By the act (Chap. LXIV) providing for a district and a circuit court of the United States for the district of Nevada, and for other purposes, approved February 27, 1865.

The President is authorized to appoint a district judge for the district of Nevada, who shall receive an annual salary of three thousand five hundred dollars.

A marshal and a district attorney for the district of Nevada, who shall receive double the fees and compensation fixed by the act of February 26, 1853, regulating the fees of clerks, marshals, and attorneys of the United States courts, provided the aggregate compensation of each does not exceed six thousand dollars per annum.

The judge may appoint a clerk, who shall be entitled to receive the same fees and allowances as are allowed to the clerks of the circuit and district courts of California.

By the act (Chap. LXXIII) making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the government for the year ending June 30, 1866, and additional appropriations for the current fiscal year, approved March 2, 1865.

In the office of the Second Comptroller of the Treasury, three clerks of class four, at an annual salary of eighteen hundred dollars each; three clerks of class three, at an annual salary of sixteen hundred dollars each; three clerks of class two, at an annual salary of fourteen hundred dollars each; three clerks of class one, at an annual salary of twelve hundred dollars each; twelve clerks, at an annual salary of seven hundred and twenty dollars each; and one laborer, at an annual salary of seven hundred and twenty dollars.

In the office of the Second Auditor, three clerks of class four, at an annual salary of eighteen hundred dollars each; twenty clerks of class three, at an annual salary of sixteen hundred dollars each; forty clerks of class two, at an annual salary of fourteen hundred dollars each; seventy clerks of class one, at an annual salary of twelve hundred dollars each; one assistant messenger, at eight hundred and forty dollars per annum; and three laborers, at seven hundred and twenty dollars per annum each.

In the office of the Third Auditor, five clerks of class four, at an annual salary of eighteen hundred dollars each; fifteen clerks of class three, at an annual salary of sixteen hundred dollars each; thirty clerks of class two, at an annual salary of fourteen hundred dollars each; and fifty clerks of class one, at an annual salary of twelve hundred dollars each.

By this act provision is made for additional clerks in the Pension Office, (the number not stated in the act,) the Secretary of the Interior to compensate them by the piece, day, week, month, or year, but the compensation not to exceed the rate of twelve hundred dollars per annum.

In the Navy Department: in the office of the chief clerk, four clerks of class four, at an annual salary of eighteen hundred dollars each; and one laborer at an annual salary of seven hundred and twenty dollars.

In the Bureau of Equipment and Recruiting, one clerk of class three, at an annual salary of sixteen hundred dollars; and one clerk of class one, at an annual salary of twelve hundred dollars.

In the Bureau of Construction and Repair, one additional temporary clerk, at an annual salary of fourteen hundred dollars.

In the office of the assistant treasurer at Boston, additional clerks (the number and class not stated) are authorized to be appointed, at an aggregate compensation of eleven thousand five hundred dollars.

By the act (Chap. LXXVI) to establish the office of Solicitor and Naval Judge Advocate, approved March 2, 1865.

The President is authorized to appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, during the rebellion and one year thereafter, an officer in the Navy Department to be called the Solicitor and Naval Judge Advocate General, at an annual salary of three thousand five hundred dollars.

By the act (Chap. LXXVIII) to amend an act entitled "An act to provide internal revenue to support the government, to pay interest on the public debt, and for other purposes," approved June 30, 1864; approved March 3, 1865.

The Secretary of the Treasury is authorized to appoint five additional revenue agents, at such compensation as he may deem just and reasonable, not to exceed two thousand dollars per annum.

The Secretary of the Treasury is authorized to appoint three commissioners to report upon the subject of raising revenue by taxation, who shall receive three hundred dollars per month for the time necessarily employed, and their travelling expenses.

By the act (Chap. LXXXV) to provide for a chief of staff to the Lieutenant General commanding the armies of the United States, approved March 3, 1865.

The President may appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a chief of staff to the Lieutenant General commanding the armies of the United States, who shall have the rank, pay, and allowances of a brigadier general in the United States army.

By the act (Chap. LXXXIX) relating to the postal laws, approved March 3, 1865.

The Postmaster General is authorized to appoint an additional special agent for the Pacific States and Territories, and two additional special agents to superintend postal matters connected with the railway mail service of the United States, who shall each receive a salary of two thousand five hundred dollars per annum, and five dollars per diem for actual travelling expenses while on public service.

The Postmaster General may, from time to time, appoint clerks for the purpose of assorting and distributing letters and other mail matter in railway post offices. The head clerks shall receive a salary of fourteen hundred dollars per annum each, and the other clerks twelve hundred dollars per annum each.

By the act (Chap. XC) to establish a bureau for the relief of freedmen and refugees, approved March 3, 1865.

The President shall appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, a Commissioner who shall have charge of the Bureau of Freedmen, Refugees, and Abandoned Plantations, and receive an annual salary of three thousand dollars.

The Secretary of War shall assign to the Commissioner one chief clerk, at two thousand dollars per annum; two clerks, at eighteen hundred dollars per annum each; two clerks, at sixteen hundred dollars per annum each; and five clerks, at twelve hundred dollars per annum each.

The President may appoint, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, an assistant commissioner for each of the States declared to be in insurrection, not exceeding ten in number, who shall each receive an annual compensation of two thousand five hundred dollars.

By the act (Chap. XCI) to incorporate a National Military and Naval Asylum for the relief of the totally disabled officers and men of the volunteer forces of the United States, approved March 3, 1865.

The business of the corporation shall be managed by a board of twelve directors, who shall appoint a governor, a deputy governor, a secretary, and a treasurer, and such other officers as the institution may require—compensation not fixed by the act.

By the act (Chap. XCIV) to provide for two assistant local inspectors of steamboats in the city of New York, and for two local inspectors at Galena, Illinois, and to re-establish the board of local inspectors at Wheeling; and also to amend the act approved June 8, 1864, entitled "An act to create an additional inspector of steamboats and two local inspectors of steamboats for collection districts of Memphis and Oregon, and for other purposes," approved March 3, 1865.

There shall be designated and appointed, in the mode prescribed by law, two assistant local inspectors of steamboats in the city of New York, with an annual compensation of twelve hundred dollars each; and two local inspectors of steamboats at Galena, Illinois, with an annual compensation of eight hundred dollars each.

By the act (Chap. XCV) to provide for the publication of the opinions of the Attorney General of the United States, approved March 3, 1865.

The Attorney General is authorized to appoint a competent person to edit and prepare for publication the opinions of the Attorney General of the United States—compensation not stated.

By the act (Chap. XCVII) relating to the clerkships in the Post Office Department, approved March 3, 1865.

There shall be appointed a chief clerk in each of the offices of the three Assistant Postmasters General, at an annual salary of two thousand dollars each.

In lieu of the temporary clerks now employed in the Post Office Department, the Postmaster General is authorized to appoint two clerks, at sixteen hundred dollars per annum each; two clerks, at fourteen hundred dollars per annum each; and five clerks, at twelve hundred dollars per annum each.

By the act (Chap. XCVIII) amendatory of the acts relative to the Attorney General's office, and to fix the compensation of his assistant and clerks, approved March 3, 1865.

Instead of the clerical force now employed in the Attorney General's office, the Attorney General is authorized to employ one chief clerk, at two thousand two hundred dollars per annum; two fourth class clerks, at eighteen hundred dollars per annum each; two third class clerks, at sixteen hundred dollars per annum each; one first class clerk, at twelve hundred dollars per annum; and such temporary clerks as may, from time to time, be needed, whose allowances shall not in any one year exceed the sum of one thousand dollars.

II.—OFFICES, THE SALARIES OF WHICH HAVE BEEN INCREASED, WITH THE AMOUNT OF SUCH INCREASE.

By the act (Chap. LXIV) providing for a district and a circuit court of the United States for the district of Nevada, and for other purposes, approved February 27, 1865.

The compensation allowed to the marshal and the district attorney of the United States for the district of Oregon is increased from two hundred dollars per annum and fees to double that amount, provided the annual compensation of each shall not exceed the sum of six thousand dollars.

By the act (Chap. LXXIII) making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the government for the year ending 30th June, 1866, and additional appropriations for the current fiscal year, approved March 2, 1865.

The salary of the messenger in the office of the Assistant Treasurer at St. Louis is increased four hundred dollars; and the salaries of four watchmen in the same office are increased one hundred dollars each.

The salary of the Assistant Secretary of State is increased, after the expiration of the current fiscal year, from three thousand to three thousand five hundred dollars per annum.

The salary of the Assistant Secretary of the Interior, at the end of the current fiscal year, is increased from three thousand to three thousand five hundred dollars per annum.

The salaries of the two Assistant Secretaries of War are increased, at the end of the current fiscal year, from three thousand to three thousand five hundred dollars per annum.

The salaries of the three Assistant Postmasters General are increased, at the end of the current fiscal year, from three thousand to three thousand five hundred dollars per annum.

The salary of the Assistant Attorney General is increased, at the end of the current fiscal year, from three thousand to three thousand five hundred dollars per annum.

The salary of the additional Assistant Secretary of the Treasury is increased, at the end of the current fiscal year, from three thousand to three thousand five hundred dollars per annum.

By the act (Chap. LXXXIX) relating to the postal laws, approved March 3, 1865.

The compensation of the special agent of the Post Office Department in the Pacific States and Territories is increased from five dollars per diem to two thousand five hundred dollars per annum, and five dollars per diem for actual travelling expenses while in the public service.

Special agents of the Post Office Department are hereafter to be allowed, in addition to their regular salaries, for necessary travelling and incidental expenses while engaged in the public service, a sum not exceeding five dollars per diem.

By the act (Chap. XCVIII) amendatory of the acts relative to the Attorney General's office, and to fix the compensation of his assistant and clerks, approved March 3, 1865.

The salary of the Assistant Attorney General is raised from three thousand to three thousand five hundred dollars per annum.

By the act (Chap. CXXIV) to increase the pay of midshipmen and others, approved March 3, 1865.

The pay of midshipmen, after their final academic examination, is raised from five hundred dollars to eight hundred dollars per annum.

The pay of acting masters' mates (hereafter to be styled mates) is raised from forty dollars per month to sixty dollars per month.
