


SIR: In conformity to the requirements of the joint resolution of January 7, 1846, (9 Statutes, 108,) the eighth section of the act approved May 1, 1820, (3 Statutes, 568,) and the fifth section of the act of May 8, 1872, (17 Statutes, 83,) I have the honor to transmit, for the information of Congress, the estimates of appropriations required for the service of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1876, as furnished by the several Executive Departments; statements showing the balances of appropriations unexpended on the 30th of June, 1874; the amounts appropriated for the service of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1875; the net expenditures for the quarter ended September 30, 1874; the estimated amounts that may be required to complete the service of the year, or of prior years, or that may be carried to the surplus fund; and a detailed statement of the "proceeds of Government property;" also, a statement of the expenditures of the moneys appropriated for contingent expenses of the Independent Treasury for the fiscal year 1874, by acts of Congress, approved March 3, 1873, and June 22, 1874.





Salaries of Designated Depositaries— Compensation to designated depositaries at Buffalo, New York, and Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, for receiving, safely keeping, and paying out public money, at the rate of one-half of one per centum on the first one hundred thousand dollars, one-fourth of one per centum on the second one hundred thousand dollars, and one-eighth of one per centum on all sums over two hundred thousand dollars; any sum which may have been allowed to such depositaries for rent or any other contingent expenses in respect to the custody of such public money being de- ducted from such compensation before any payment shall be made therefor: Provided, That no compensation shall be allowed for the above services when the emoluments of the office of which said designated depositary is in commission amounts to the maximum compensation fixed by law; nor shall the amount allowed to any of. said designated depositaries for such services, when added to the emoluments of the office of which he is in commission, be more than sufficient to make the maxi- mum compensation fixed by law: And provided further, That the whole allowance to any designated depositary for such service shall not exceed one thousand five hun- dred dollars per annum. APPENDIX A.

Explanations of the estimates for United States Mints and Assay Offices. (See pages 21 to 23.)

I have the honor to submit herewith the annual estimates of appropriations required for the support of this office and the mints and assay offices for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1876:

OFFICE DIRECTOR OF THE MINT.

In the estimates for the office of the Director of the Mint at Washington an item of seven thousand dollars is embraced for continuing the collection of mining statistics. Prior to the current fiscal year an appropriation of fifteen thousand dollars per annum was made for that purpose. For the current year the appropriation is ten thousand dollars. The compensation of the commissioner of mining statistics is at the rate of five thousand dollars per annum, and of

The compensation of the commissioner of mining statistics is at the rate of five thousand dollars per annum, and of his assistant three thousand dollars. These rates of compensation were fixed by the Secretary of the Treasury some years ago.

The appropriations available for the current fiscal year will be sufficient to complete the work for the calendar year 1874 on the scale covered in the reports of the commissioner for the last four years, and which embraced a full account of gold and silver mines, methods of working the same, reducing ores, description of machinery and apparatus employed, and of the geology and mineralogy of the States and Territories west of the Mississippi river, and illustrated by maps and drawings.

By the first of January the appropriation will be exhausted, and, as the law prohibits the incurring of liabilities in excess of the appropriations, the services of the commissioner, and all others now engaged under this appropriation, will cease; also, the commissioner's office rent in New York.

The collection of the statistics on a modified scale will thereafter devolve on the Mint Bureau, in accordance with your instructions of July 3, 1874, placing this business under the direction and control of the Director of the Mint.

If Congress should desire to have prepared and printed annually a large book on the subject of the mining interests of the country west of the Mississippi, the appropriation should be increased rather than reduced. The subject has, however, been so fully covered during the last six years that anything more than the procuring of all useful information in relation to the general condition of our gold and silver-mining interests and amount of gold and silver, respectively, produced annually from the mines of the United States, appears to be unnecessary. It is believed that the sum of seven thousand dollars will be sufficient for the purpose, and that amount has therefore been estimated as necessary for the next fiscal year; and one-half of the amount should be appropriated to cover the expenses of collecting the statistics during the last six months of the current fiscal year.

The report of the commissioner of mining statistics is made for the calendar year. After the present calendar year the statistical and general information respecting the gold and silver-mining industry of the United States will be collected for each fiscal year, and incorporated in the annual report of the Director of the Mint.

Under the head of the same office the sum of five thousand dollars is estimated for recoinage of gold and silver coins in the Treasury. Small sums of coins, which are not in a condition to pay out again, occasionally find their way into the Treasury of the United States or some of its offices, and have to be recoined, and, as the Treasurer of the United States has to account for such coins at their tale value, an appropriation to cover the difference between their bullion and denominational value is necessary.

WAGES OF WORKMEN AND CONTINGENT EXPENSES.

In reference to the estimates under the respective heads of "Wages of workmen" and "Contingent expenses," I respectfully submit the following observations:

For the mints at Philadelphia and Denver, and the assay offices at Boise and Charlotte, no increase under these heads is estimated for.

MINT OF THE UNITED STATES AT PHILADELPHIA.

For freight on bullion the same amount is asked for as has been appropriated annually for several years past, viz., five thousand dollars; and the sum of one hundred dollars is embraced for the purchase of specimens of ores and coins to be deposited in the cabinet of the mint. Formerly three hundred dollars was annually appropriated for this purpose. The collection being an extensive one, the amount estimated will, it is believed, be sufficient for the purchase of such desirable specimens as are not in the cabinet. Under the head of "Annealing furnaces," twenty thousand dollars is estimated for the purpose of constructing two large furnaces for annealing strips and blanks, and which are necessary for the proper despatch of business at that institution.

In reference to the item last mentioned, your attention is invited to the following extract from the letter of Mr. Pollock, the superintendent:

"The appropriation for two new annealing furnaces is a necessity. They have been needed for several years, but, from motives of economy, we have endeavored to get along without incurring this additional expense. We cannot profitably do so any longer, nor without impairing the efficiency of the mint and continued embarrassment to its operations. The amount asked will be sufficient for the purpose, and will be judiciously expended."

ESTIMATES-APPENDIX.

MINT OF THE UNITED STATES AT SAN FRANCISCO.

Separate items, of twenty-five thousand dollars each, for "Wages of workmen" and for "Contingent expenses," are submitted to meet the expenses which will be incurred should the operations of refining and parting (which have been done by private enterprise since 1870) be undertaken at the new mint at the commencement of the next fiscal year. As soon as coining operations shall have been commenced at the new mint, the necessary apparatus for refining and parting by the sulphuric-acid process will be put up therein, and the refinery kept in readiness for use whenever it shall become necessary or desirable for the Government to resume refining operations at San Francisco.

Independent of the two items just referred to, an increase of twelve thousand dollars under the head of "Wages of workmen," and eleven thousand five hundred dollars under that of "Contingent expenses," is estimated for. It is expected that coining operations will be commenced in the new mint in about two months, and that a large increase of business will follow, particularly in the coinage of trade-dollars, the demand for which we have not been able to meet with the limited capacity of the old mint. Attention is invited to the following extract from the letter of Super-intendent LaGrange, submitting his estimates :

"It will be observed that this estimate is in excess of that allowed for the current year. This increase is necessitated by the following considerations: It is not to be expected that less than \$7,000,000 in trade-dollars will be required to meet the constantly increasing demand for that coin. The increased labor and material required for such a coinage would cost almost the entire amount asked in excess of this year's appropriation, but it is hoped that the superior facilities afforded by the new building will enable us to economize sufficiently to carry on the work of refining during the next year, and thus increase by about \$50,000 gold the amount paid into the Treasury as earnings of the mint, which sum would otherwise be paid to outside parties for performing the work of refining. In view of the steady increase of business at this mint, which appears likely to continue, a liberal policy in regard to appropriations would appear to be the highest prudence, for the reason that, under the existing organization of the service, it is impossible for a superintendent to expend more than is absolutely necessary to do the work required, whatever sum be appropriated; and any attempt to economize by spending less than is necessary could only result in failing in such proportion to meet the requirements of the public. These estimates are based upon carefully calculated reports of the operative officers, and in no particular exceed their figures. For the year 1876 this mint, at present charges, will probably earn \$200,000."

MINT OF THE UNITED STATES AT CARSON.

An increase of eighteen thousand dollars over the regular appropriation for the current fiscal year is asked for under the head of "Wages of workmen," and an increase of forty-six thousand eight hundred and fifty dollars under the head of "Contingent expenses." The amount estimated for "Wages of workmen" is ten thousand dollars less than the superintendent estimated to be necessary, and for "Contingent expenses" I have reduced his estimate twenty-three thousand two hundred and fifty dollars, bringing the amounts respectively in correspondence with the present rate of expenditure.

The superintendent of the Carson mint says: "For wages, I have also estimated for a small increase, as I anticipated an increased business, and consequently will require a larger operative force to handle it properly. I am also compelled to estimate for an increased appropriation for ordinary and incidental expenses, in view of the larger quantity of supplies that will be consumed with the working of the expected increased amount of deposits. New developments are constantly being made on the Comstock lode, and a part of the bullion extracted from the mines that are being so developed will surely find its way to this mint, to be manufactured into bars or coin."

UNITED STATES ASSAY OFFICE, NEW YORK.

An increase of fifteen thousand dollars under the head of "Contingent expenses," and the same amount under that of "Wages of workmen," is estimated for, the necessity for which is explained by Superintendent Acton, as follows:

"I submit the following in explanation of the increased amount over the appropriation for the present year desired:

1. Incidental and contingent expenses.

Amount appropriated, fiscal year ending June 30, 1875	\$45,000 00
Amount expended, fiscal year ending June 30, 1874	55,000 00
Amount estimated for fiscal year ending June 30, 1876	60,000 00

The increase of fifteen thousand dollars over the present year's appropriation is based upon the continually increasing business of this office, more particularly in silver, necessitating a larger supply of material of every description, principally coal, acid, copper, lead, crucibles, borax, &c. In addition to these, we are liable at any time to be compelled to construct new condensers, tanks, &c., and also to repair engine, boilers, and elevator, and make the necessary alterations for additional facilities in melting and refining bullion.

2. Wages of workmen.

Increase of fifteen thousand dollars over the appropriation for the present year, is thus explained: As the business of the office increases, rendering a larger appropriation for contingent expenses necessary, it is apparent that more labor must be required in the melter and refiner's operations to properly execute the work, and the appointment of additional workmen will become necessary."

The compensation of the assistant melter and refiner, eight dollars per diem, and that of the book-keeper at the same rate, is paid out of the wages appropriation. I earnestly recommend that a salary of \$2,500 per annum in each case be appropriated and made permanent. The positions are important and responsible ones, and properly qualified persons to fill them cannot be obtained at less rates.

An appropriation for "reopening the branch mint at New Orleans, to be conducted as a mint subject to the provisions and conditions of the coinage act of 1873," having been made for the current fiscal year, the amount necessary to put that establishment in condition for coinage operations is embraced in the estimates.

It is proper to state that the expenditures, except as to salaries, of the mints and assay offices, vary according to the amount of bullion deposited, and the particular operations to which the same is to be subjected, and this fact has necessarily been kept in view in estimating the amount required for "Wages of workmen," and especially that for "Contingent expenses," the latter, embracing acids, copper, lead, coal, lights, crucibles, borax, nitre, and other fluxes, repairs of machinery, fixtures, and apparatus. A part of the wastage is also defrayed out of the contingent appropriation."

chinery, fixtures, and apparatus. A part of the wastage is also defrayed out of the contingent appropriation. It is important that the amounts estimated for "Wages of workmen" and for "Contingent expenses" should be appropriated. The estimates for the same are based on the present and expected state of business; and if any reduction be made, it may subject the public to serious inconvenience. The law forbids the incurring of any expense in excess of the appropriations; and if the amounts appropriated should prove insufficient, the coinage would have to be intermitted until additional appropriations could be procured. The increase of business at the coinage mints and assay office at New York, since the coinage act of 1873 went into operation, has been very large, and necessarily required an increase of appropriations over those of former years.

With the exception of the recoinage of light gold coins, which is about completed, the business of these institutions is more likely to increase than diminish during the next fiscal year. If, however, there should, from any cause, be a reduction in the amount of bullion deposited and operated upon, the expenses will be correspondingly reduced, and the unexpended balances of appropriations covered into the Treasury of the United States.

At the Carson mint the operations prior to the last fiscal year were confined mainly to the melting and stamping of mixed bullion, which did not require much outlay for materials; latterly, however, that mint has been engaged in separating gold and silver bullion, coining the gold, and manufacturing the silver into trade-dollars and *fine* bars. A large increase in the expenses has necessarily followed.

It should be remembered that the amount appropriated for the support of the mint service is not expended without return to the Treasury. Charges corresponding as nearly as possible to the actual expenses of the respective operations on bullion are required to be deducted from the deposits and paid into the Treasury of the United States; and the Government also realizes the gain arising from the issue of subsidiary silver and the minor coins. The statements required to enable the amount accruing to the Treasury during the last fiscal year from the gold-coinage charge, and the deductions and gains referred to, have not yet all been received. It may be stated, however, that the sum will approximate to eight hundred thousand dollars.

With the foregoing explanations, the estimates of appropriations for the support of the mint service of the United States are presented, and with the hope that they will receive your approval. I cannot close the subject, however, without earnestly calling your attention to the fact that the salaries, so far as the mints and assay offices are concerned, are, in many instances, too low, and I respectfully request your consideration as to the propriety of procuring an increase of the same.

In this connection your attention is invited to the views of the superintendents of the coinage mints, and of the assay office at New York, as contained in the following extracts from their letters to me, submitting their annual estimates, and which are worthy of careful consideration.

The superintendent of the Philadelphia mint says: "I cannot refrain from again calling attention to the inadequate compensation of the officers and clerks of this institution. Leaving the salaries as appropriated in the estimates proper, I reserve for this communication an earnest appeal for justice. The estimate of the salary of the superintendent is the amount now fixed by law, which is at least one thousand dollars too low. Under the coinage act of 1873, the duties and responsibilities that had been previously devolved upon two persons, at an aggregate salary of eight thousand dollars, are now imposed upon the superintendent, at a salary of only four thousand five hundred dollars. Formerly there was a director, at four thousand five hundred dollars, and a treasurer, at three thousand five hundred dollars. Now the superintendent is charged with all the duties and liabilities of the treasurer, in addition to his own responsibilities, but without any increase of compensation. It is respectfully submitted that the superintendent's salary ought to be not less than five thousand five hundred dollars, and six thousand dollars would be more in keeping with the peculiarly delicate and responsible duties of the position. I earnestly recommend increase in the salaries of the respective heads of the operative departments of this mint; they ought not to be less than four thousand dollars each. I very much regret the unwelcome and unnecessary reduction made at the last session of Congress in the salaries of my cashier and five clerks, below the amounts tixed under the coinage act of 1873. They should, on the contrary, have been increased to the amounts very properly appropriated for the corresponding subordinates at the New York assay office. * * I may be pardoned for adding that, in the opinion of all experienced mint officers, the salary of the Director of the Mint at Washington is greatly disproportioned to the responsible duties of the position."

disproportioned to the responsible duties of the position." Superintendent LaGrange, of the San Francisco mint, says: "It will be observed that the estimate for salaries of clerks is increased by the sum of eighteen hundred dollars over the appropriation for the current year. It is believed, as heretofore expressed in the correspondence of this office, that the talent and experience required to fill the positions of chief clerk and cashier of this mint ought to command at least three thousand dollars per annum even in the service of the Government, which, as a rule, pays in all departments not more than two-thirds as much as like services command in private business. Positions relative to these in the customs, the internal revenue, and the post office in this city are paid for at rates varying from three thousand dollars to three thousand seven hundred dollars per annum, though they require no greater labor and skill, and involve much less responsibility. The clerks allowed eighteen hundred dollars for the current year receive less than workmen of ordinary skill, and the tendency of reducing salaries below a just and living rate is to drive all competent men to seek other employment, and thus embarrass, demoralize, and degrade the public service. The four clerks allowed this mint ought, in consideration of the amount of work and the degree of accuracy required of them, to receive not less than two thousand dollars per annum, which it is to be hoped Congress will allow for the next fiscal year." Superintendent Acton, of the New York assay office, says: "The amount of increase submitted is no more than a

Superintendent Acton, of the New York assay office, says: "The amount of increase submitted is no more than a just compensation to tried and faithful men, some of whom have devoted twenty years to the best interests of this office, who are perfectly familiar with all the operations calculated to add to its reputation and promote the welfare of its depositors, and it is with the hope that the services of these gentlemen may be retained that this increase is asked, a contingency doubtful under the present rate of salaries. The discrepancy between the expenditures of the fiscal year June, 1874, and the estimates for fiscal year June, 1876, on account of salaries of officers and clerks and wages of workmen, is explained by the transfer of employés from the pay-roll of the latter to that of the former."

ESTIMATES-APPENDIX.

When, in 1873, the mint laws were revised, it was generally conceded, by those conversant with the subject, that the salaries of the mint officers were not sufficient, but it was thought best not to embarrass the measure with any question of their increase, and they accordingly remained as fixed several years ago.

After a careful consideration of the subject, I am of the opinion that true policy, not less than justice to competent and faithful officers and clerks who are intrusted with very responsible duties, require that the mint salaries should be moderately increased.

APPENDIX B.

Explanations of the estimate for office of Commissioner of Patents. (See page 35.)

I have the honor herewith to transmit the estimates for this bureau for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1876.

It will be necessary only to call attention to those points in the estimate differing from the appropriations heretofore made. You will notice that I have asked that the librarian's salary shall be increased from \$2,000 to \$2,500. You understand that our library is not a circulating library. It contains about twenty thousand volumes of books pertaining to the practical arts, and is designed for the use of the examining corps, and for parties who are making improvements in the practical arts. To make the library available for these purposes the librarian must be thoroughly conversant with the wants and duties of the examiners in the Patent Office, and must be familiar with the various arts as represented in the office. Experience has demonstrated the fact that it is impossible to find persons competent to fill this important position, except they have served a considerable time in the position of an examiner. An examiner's salary is \$2,500; the consequence has been that we have either been under the necessity of detailing an examiner to the position of librarian at a salary of \$2,000, allowing him to fill professorships in some of the colleges of the District to make up the balance of his salary, or to leave the position vacant and fill the place by detailing an examiner to it. At the present time one of the examiners in the office is serving as librarian by detail; yet, the examining corps is sadly in want of his services. Again, I have asked, as you will see, for six clerks of class four, instead of seven, as appropriated for heretofore, and in place of the seventh, have asked for a financial clerk at a salary of \$2,000.

The receipts of the Patent Office amount to about three-fourths of a million of dollars per annum, all received in small fees, ranging from ten cents to thirty dollars. This amount must be collected, banked, and transferred to the Treasury by a clerk detailed for the purpose without bonds or pecuniary responsibility. The Commissioner becomes personally responsible with his bondsmen for the faithful performance of the duties of this clerk. I think his salary should be that of other financial clerks, (\$2,000,) and then he should be required to give bail in the sum of \$10,000, for the faithful performance of his duties. I have also asked an increase of fifteen clerks at \$900 each, and fifteen at \$720 each. This increase becomes absolutely necessary to properly execute the work of the office. At the present time, and for a year and a half past, I have been doing the work of the office in a manner of doubtful propriety and legality. I have been obliged to retain about fifteen vacancies in the first-class clerkships, from six to eight in the second class, and a few others of higher salaries, and use the funds thus saved in the employment of clerks at \$720 and \$900 a year, to do the work of the office, and yet the force is inadequate for such duty.

APPENDIX C.

Explanations of the estimate for Columbia Institution for the Deaf and Dumb. (See pages 42 and 122.)

I have the honor to submit herewith the usual estimates of appropriations needed for the service of this institution for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1876.

The estimate for current expenses has been made larger than the appropriation for the current year, by he amount of one thousand dollars, to enable the institution to purchase a very valuable collection of books relating to the education and treatment of the deaf and dumb, recently offered for sale in England. This library has been gathered by one of the most distinguished instructors of the deaf and dumb in England, Dr. Charles Baker, for forty years head master of the Yorkshire Institution, at Dorcaster, and contains many volumes long since out of print and out of the market.

The estimate for building purposes is intended to provide, very nearly, for the completion of our entire group of buildings, in accordance with a plan submitted to Congress eight years ago, in our Ninth Annual Report. No essential change has been made in this plan, and the cost of its execution will fall considerably within the estimate of eight years ago. I am not able at this time to present an estimate that shall exactly provide for the completion of the building, but I have every reason to believe that a small sum, to be appropriated by the next Congress, will finish the work.

every reason to believe that a small sum, to be appropriated by the next Congress, will finish the work. The amount asked for the improvement and care of the grounds is needed to provide for the laying out of the ground immediately adjoining the buildings now in process of construction, and for the general improvement of the tract known as Kendall Green, now fully paid for and made over to the Government by act of Congress of June, 1872.

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APPENDIX E.

Explanations of the estimate for Military Academy. (See pages 66 and 121.)

I have the honor to forward herewith estimate for the Military Academy for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1875. I

would respectfully state, in explanation of certain items, as follows: 1. Item under head of department of civil and military engineering, "Engraving plates, printing and binding text-books prepared for the special instruction of cadets, \$2,500." Formerly it was the practice to prepare and print on the lithographic press here such books, compilations, abridgments, and original preparations of the professor of this depart-ment of instruction as were necessary to the suitable instruction of cadets, and not to be had of publishers, or the publication of which, owing to the limited number required each year, and the little, if any, demand likely to ensue from other quarters, could not be procured, except at such cost per copy as to render it inexpedient to procure printing. The books printed by the lithographic press then in use were necessarily issued to cadets at a much greater cost than printed books of equal amount of matter obtained in the usual way. Owing to changes resulting from the introduction of new elements and conditions developed in the course of events since former publications, and particularly in recent years, it is now necessary to make such material changes in text-books as to require new publications. The method by lithograph, besides being expensive, is objectionable on other grounds. Such books pertaining to military science as are provided for instruction of cadets should be sold to them for retention for reference after graduation. I would suggest that, if practicable, an appropriation be procured that necessary books may be provided, which shall be sold to cadets at cost price from year to year, and the amount received thereby be covered into the Treasury from year to year until the original appropriation shall be replaced. The necessary supply can thereafter be kept up from stereotyped plates in the usual manner.

2. Item for the "Laying foundation for and beginning superstructure of building for a military museum, lecture-room, and examination hall, \$15,000," plans and detailed estimates for which will be forwarded as soon as ready. There is no military museum in the country. It is proposed to collect from the Engineer's department, the Ordnance department, the Quartermaster's department, and other branches of the service, and from sources otherwise, such arms and other means and appliances pertaining to the military service as may be had without cost, except that necessary for transportation to this place, as shall, when arranged, illustrate chronologically as to our own country the history of the appliances of war. Such a collection as can be now made would be of great interest and likewise of great benefit to the military student. (The collection would also embrace trophies and relics.) There will be a large amount of suitable material collected at the approaching Centennial Exhibition at Philadelphia, which can be sent here after the exhibition, upon the order of the Secretary of War, and so favorable an opportunity for laying the foundation of a museum, which will become of great value and interest, may not soon again occur. It is proposed to construct the building with a view, in part, to the future, and make it embrace meanwhile, in addition to its main purpose, provision for a lecture-room and examination hall. The examinations are now held in the library-room, which is thus diverted from its proper use for about a month of each year. There is no lecture-room or hall where all the cadets can be assembled. Such a place of meeting is very necessary. By the erection of a two-story building, the double purpose of present provision for very desirable objects herein specified, a place for a military museum, and a lecture-room and examination hall would be effected. The ultimate cost of a suitable building would be about sixty to seventy thousand dollars, according to materials used. Very respectfully, your obedient servant,

Explanations of the estimate for Trust Fund due Chickasaw National Fund. (See page 98.)

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR. Washington, D. C., April 13, 1872.

SIR: I have the honor to submit herewith an estimate of appropriation required to pay the Chickasaw nation of Indians the balance remaining due and unpaid on certain Arkansas and Tennessee State bonds, held in trust by this Department for the benefit of said Indians, amounting, in all, to the sum of \$297,890 25. The accompanying copies of the report of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and other papers, it is believed, furnish full information on the subject. By the 10th article of the treaty concluded April 28, 1866, with the Choctaws and Chickasaws, (Stats. at Large, vol. 14, p. 769,) it appears that the United States reaffirmed "all obligations arising out of treaty stipulations or acts of legis-lation with regard to the Choctaw and Chickasaw nations entered into prior to the late rebellion." * *

In my opinion, the provisions of the above article cover this case, and I therefore respectfully request the favorable action of Congress upon the estimate.

APPENDIX H.

Explanations of estimate for the Government Hospital for the Insane. (See page 122.)

For completing the river wall and raising the boundary walls at their intersection with the river wall: The iron wall has been built on just one-half of the extent of the river front, at a cost of \$10,000; but, as the average depth of water is less along the line of the remainder of the river front, it is estimated that this part of the work can be completed for \$7,788, and the cost of raising those portions of the boundary walls that were originally extended into the river and water fences, and now intersect the front wall, so that the former cannot be scaled from the latter or from the filling of earth behind it, will be \$960—the two amounts making the sum of \$8,748.

For a coal-vault in rear of the east wing of the hospital edifice: The demand for increased accommodations has rendered it necessary to fit up two of the original coal-rooms for diuing-rooms, and to use the remaining two as workshops; and it has, for several years, been necessary to deposit most of the coal used for heating the house in a huge, unsightly pile a short distance outside of the windows of patients' rooms. By using the foundation walls of the house for two sides of the vault, it is estimated that convenient storage room for five hundred tons of coal can be secured for the moderate amount of this estimate. This and the preceding estimate were submitted last year and struck out in the general revision of the estimates on all the departments ordered by Congress soon after it met in December, 1873.

For general repairs and improvements: The amount asked under this head will be required for the painting and repairs necessary to preserve the extensive buildings of the hospital on account of ordinary wear; for such repairs and additions to the furniture, bedding, fittings, and conveniences of the wards as are constantly necessary on account of the destructive habits of the class of patients treated in institutions of this character, and for such additional means and facilities for the medical and moral treatment of the inmates as are suggested by experience and the progress of this branch of the healing art.

For the repairs and improvement of the main entrance to the hospital: The main door of entrance to the hospital opens to the north upon an eminence of ground 170 feet above tide, and by it all patients are admitted to the institution and take their final departure—their friends and the general public go and come.

Entering the house in cold and stormy weather, as the entrance is now constructed, is found to be an injurious exposure to many patients and other delicate persons, and it is deemed a necessary sanitary measure to reconstruct the main doorway with such means of protection, in inclement weather, as will avoid the evil of the present arrangement. In connection with this improvement, it is intended to construct such a window over the main entrance as will give the room over the front corridor the light and cheerfulness that are necessary to make it healthful and practically useful.

For supplying the hospital with water from the Potomac Aqueduct: This estimate embraces the following items: 6-inch pipe across the river, \$3,960; pump and setting, \$1,500; boiler and setting, \$1,200; pump-house, \$1,500; reservoir to hold 100,000 gallons, \$1,840; total, \$10,000. The extension of the hospital and outbuildings, all of which are supplied with water by artificial means, and the large number of patients for whose treatment Congress has here provided, render a larger and more reliable supply of water urgently necessary to the protection of the property of the institution against destruction by fire, and an improvement of the quality of the water supply a necessary sanitary measure; and it is deemed fortunate that both necessities can be fully and permanently met by the moderate expenditure proposed for this purpose. From one-fourth to one-third of the present water supply is obtained from springs near the hospital buildings; the remaining three-fourths or two-thirds is raised directly from the Anacostia river, the water of which is abominably dirty. To keep the spring water, which is excellent, separate from the river water, would necessitate two entire sets of pumps, main and service pipes, and reservoirs and tanks. This is, of course, impracticable. The water is often so low at low tide that, with our present means, it is not practicable to pump from the river, the channel of which is on the side opposite the hospital; and if a fire should occur at such time, it might not only prove impossible to preserve these costly buildings from destruction, but the lives of hundreds of helpless persons would be put in jeopardy. When the hospital is adequately supplied with water from the Potomac aqueduct—to which the institution is supposed to be entitled in common with the other Government buildings—the principal defect in its economy will be removed. The means to raise and store water are rendered necessary by the fact that the Potomac water will not rise to the hospital by nearly 100 vertical feet.

APPENDIX I.

Explanation of estimates for Coast-Survey Service. (See page 136.)

UNITED STATES COAST SURVEY OFFICE, Washington, D. C., November 2, 1874.

SIR: In accordance with your directions to reduce, for reasons you have elsewhere stated, the estimates for the Coast Survey for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1876, I have the honor herewith to submit estimates for that service, reduced to the lowest practicable limits consistent with any degree of efficiency and economy.

For the support and maintenance of the Coast Survey, the amount has been reduced from \$893,000 to \$825,000, the amount estimated by my predecessor for the present fiscal year, a reduction of \$68,000. For the construction of vessels, so necessary for the work, the estimate has been reduced from \$696,000 to \$450,000, a reduction of \$246,000, equal to 35½ per cent., a total reduction of \$314,000.

I respectfully beg to state, however, that these reductions will more than proportionately lessen the results of the year and increase their particular cost.

I respectfully request that the full report and statements submitted September 15 with the original estimates, together with this letter, may be printed in the Appendix of the published estimates.

SIR: I have the honor to forward herewith the usual preliminary report on the operations of the Coast Survey for the year ending June 30, 1874, and submit detailed estimates for the work of the Coast Survey for the year ending June 30, 1876. The accompanying report contains—

1. A general statement of the operations of the Coast Survey during the year ending June 30, 1874.

2. A general statement of the proposed operations of the Coast Survey and estimates in detail for the work of the year ending June 30, 1876.

3. General statement of reasons for submitting and asking for the amount of the estimates.

GENERAL STATEMENT OF THE OPERATIONS OF THE COAST SURVEY FOR THE YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1874.

In the detailed estimates the work for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1876, will be stated in geographical order, beginning on the Atlautic coast of the United States at the northeastern boundary and terminating on the coast of Texas. On the Pacific coast the sites will be named in the reverse order, beginning at San Diego and terminating with the coast of Alaska.

As a practical illustration of the estimates, an abstract is here presented showing the sites in which the field work and hydrography are now in progress, and including mention also of the sites in which the same parties worked during last winter and spring in the southern sections of the Atlantic and Pacific coasts and on the Gulf coast of the United The recapitulation includes, as the operations now in hand, deep-sea soundings in the Gulf of Maine, between States. Nova Scotia and Cape Cod; topography of Mt. Desert Island, and soundings in its vicinity; detailed survey of the shores of Eggemoggin Reach; of islands east and west of Deer Isle and Isle au Haut; of the eastern shore of the Penobscot between Castine and Bucksport; hydrography at the head of Penobscot Bay; determinations of height, and of the co-efficient of refraction at the primary station near Camden, Maine; tidal observations at North Haven, Penobscot Bay; hydrography of the vicinity of Jeffrey's Ledge, Cashe's Ledge, and Jeffrey's Bank, including surface and deep-sea temper-atures; determination of geographical points by triangulation in New Hampshire; tidal observations at Boston navy yard; special observations and topographical survey near North Adams, Mass., for determining differences in the inten-sity of gravitation; hydrography of the vicinity of Monomoy, coast of Massachusetts; special test of sailing courses in Narragansett Bay, for the Coast Pilot; detailed survey of the shores and soundings in Taunton River, Mass.; shore-line survey and soundings, with observations on tides and currents in Providence Harbor, R. I.; detailed survey and soundings in Thames River, Conn., above the navy station at New London; topography of the shores of New Haven Harbor; posi-tions of light-houses determined at the eastern entrance of Long Island Sound, N. Y.; hydrographic development of the channel westward of Plum Island; special observations on tides and currents in the waters of New York Bay and Harbor; development of a shoal in the Swash channel off Sandy Hook; shore-line survey and soundings at Port Jefferson, Long Island; tidal observations continued at the station on Governor's Island, near New York city; reconnaissance for determining points eastward of Hudson River, and between Albany and Lake Champlain; shore-line survey and hydrography of Lake Champlain from previous limits of work southward to Whitehall; latitude and azimuth determined at Rouse's Point, Crown Point, and Hudson, N. Y.; shore-line survey and soundings continued in Great South Bay, Long Island; magnetic declination, dip, and intensity determined at Ithaca and Oxford, N. Y.; at Bethlehem, Pa., and at Cape May, N. J.; detailed survey of the shores of Barnegat Bay and soundings in its southern branch; hydrography of the bar at Little Egg Harbor, N. J.; latitude and azimuth at Keyport and Barnegat, N. J.; positions of light-houses to be determined at Cape May, and in Delaware Bay at Maurice River, Mispillion Creek, and Hereford Inlet.

Earlier in the year, the same parties made progress by surveys on the southern coast and its waters, and these include examinations of sailing courses in the harbors of Chesapeake Bay, and compilation of notes for the Coast Pilot; the topography of Marbury Point, District of Columbia, including site of the U.S. Naval Magazine; supplementary plane-table work along the east side of the Potomac at Washington and Bladensburg; determination of the magnetic elements at Washington City; local triangulation of the Upper Potomac, connected at Sugar-loaf Mountain, Maryland, with primary triangulation in Virginia; determination of points by triangulation (yet in progress) along the Blue Ridge, in Virginia; reconnaissance (yet in progress) for stations between Staunton, Va., and the Ohio River; detailed survey of the shores and soundings in James River, Virginia, from Warwick River entrance upward to Sandy Point, including the lower part of the Chickahominy; topography of Norfolk, Portsmouth, and Gosport; shore-line survey and hydrography of Nansemond River, Virginia; development of the channel between Craney Island and the main land; inspection of plane-table operations in the field; tidal observations at Fortress Monroe; sailing-courses south of Cape Henry, Virginia, determined for passing the Lookout and Frying-pan Shoals, and additional notes for the Atlantic Coast Pilot; triangulation (yet in progress) in Pamplico Sound; triangulation, plane-table survey, and hydrography of Chowan River, Albemarle Sound, North Carolina; detailed survey of the north shore of Pamplico Sound in the vicinity of Swan Quarter Bay; hydrography of Pamplico Sound westward of Gull Shoal Rock; soundings in Pungo River; inspection of the plane-table operations; hydrography of Beaufort Bar, North Carolina, including the approaches, the harbor, North River, and Newport River; soundings in the western channel of Cape Fear River, and development of changes in that vicinity; detailed survey of the coast of South Carolina near Cape Roman, including Oyster Bay; harbor entrances between Winyah Bay and Savannah River, examined for sailing courses, and notes for the Coast Pilot; shore-line survey, hydrography, and special observations on the currents of Savannah River, Georgia; astronomical observations at Savannah for determinations of longitude by the telegraphic exchange of clock-signals; inspection of plane-table operations in this section, north and south of Charleston, S. C.; hydrography of Fernandina Bar and its approaches, and of the Atlantic coast below St. John's River entrance; detailed survey of Halifax and Hillsboro' Rivers, including Mosquito Inlet and the adjacent coast of Florida, astronomical observations at Key West for determining longitude by clock-signals; determination of longitude at the entrance to Charlotte Harbor, Florida; triangulation and topography advanced on the east side of Tampa Bay, including Manatee River; hydrography of Tampa Bay from the Gulf entrance upward to Mangrove Point; inspection of the plane-table operations in the same quarter; longitude determined at Cedar Keys, Fla.; and at a station near Atlanta, Ga.; azimuth at Cedar Keys, and triangulation from thence to St. Mark's, along the Gulf coast; development by soundings, of a shoal off Point St. George; soundings in the Gulf approach to West Pass, (St. George's Sound, Florida,) and hydrographic survey of St. Vincent's Sound; height of the Atlanta base above sea-level determined, and triangulation (yet in progress) continued northeast and northwest of the base line; reconnaissance for stations in the vicinity of Lookout Mountain, and for triangulation points near the course of the Ohio River; triangulation and hydrography of the Mississippi River between English Turn and Carrollton, La.; triangulation (yet in progress) for determining points in Missouri westward of St. Louis; reconnaissance for points of triangulation in Wisconsin; measurement of base, triangulation, and shore-line survey of Sabine Pass, Texas; hydrography of Pass Cavallo, including the bar, and of San Antonio Bay, Texas; and tidal observations continued at St. Thomas, (West Indies.) On the Pacific coast of the United States the operations of the present year include the development of a sunken rock off Point Loma, near San Diego, Cal.; plane-table survey of the coast of Santa Barbara Channel from Newport Slough northward and westward to Bolsas River, including part of the course of Santa Ana River; the topography of Santa Cruz Island; soundings between that island and Santa Rosa; survey of the coast of California between Point Conception and Point Arguello-also in the vicinity of Point Sal, and northward of Piedras Blancas, and near San Simeon; off shore soundings between the Santa Barbara Islands and Monterey Bay; the addition of topographical details on the shores of Monterey Bay and Half-Moon Bay; determination of the positions of light-houses between Santa Cruz and Point Reyes; hydrography and current observations on the bar and inside of San Francisco Bay; discovery and development of a rock near the Middle Farallon; tidal observations at Fort Point, near San Francisco; latitude, azimuth, and triangulation (yet in progress) to pass northward of San Francisco to Helena; and, as yet in progress, hydrography between Point Reyes and Cape Mendocino; coast topography near Noyo River entrance; soundings south of Mendocino Bay and south of Trinidad; coast topography between Rocky Point and Klamath River entrance; reconnaissance south of Point St. George; in-shore and off-shore hydrography near Port Orford, coast of Oregon; survey of the shores

and soundings in Umpquah River, and selection of site for a base line near that entrance; topography of the coast south of Columbia River towards Tillamook; tidal observations in the vicinity; hydrography of the principal channels and survey of the banks of Columbia River above previous limits; tidal observations continued at the permanent station at Astoria, and at Port Townshend, W. T.; hydrography of Budd's Inlet from Tumwater northward to Dana's Passage; survey of the shores and soundings in Duwamish Bay southward of West Point; hydrography of Puget Sound, W. T.; and development of facilities for navigation on the coast of Alaska Territory.

The office work has been kept fully up to the field-work of the preceding season. The computations of the current geodetic, trigonometrical, and tidal observations have made due progress, including the preparation of records and results for publication; tide tables for all seaports of the United States, for the year 1875, have been published; the drawing of thirty-five charts has been in progress, and that of seventeen has been completed. Ten new copperplate charts have been commenced, forty-six have received additions, and eleven have been completed. Three new charts have been engraved on stone, and ten have been published by photo lithography. An aggregate of 20,500 copies of charts has been issued in the course of the year. The first volume of the Coast Pilot, or Sailing Directions for the Atlantic Coast from Eastport to Boston, is now passing through the press.

Within the present year ninety-two manuscript charts have been traced on special call, either for the use of the Government or for applicants who refunded the cost of copying.

The estimate for the survey of the Atlantic and Gulf Coasts of the United States is intended to provide for the following:

Field Work.—To continue the topography of the western shores and islands of Passamaquoddy Bay and its estuaries. and the coast and islands between Castine and Mount Desert, and the shores of the Penobscot River between Castine and Bangor; to continue the determination of the heights of some of the principal trigonometrical points between Boston and the St. Croix, with the co-efficients of refraction; to complete the hydrography of Penobscot Bay and River, and continue the soundings to the eastward of Mount Desert; to make a hydrographic and topographical survey of Portsmouth Harbor; to make such additional triangulation as may be required for the topographical and hydrographic surveys, and the determination of the positions of new light-houses from Cape Cod to the eastward; to continue the resurvey of Monomoy and Nantucket Shoals, and the off-shore hydrography; to continue the off-shore hydrography between Cape Cod and Grand Manan and special examination for the sailing lines for charts; to continue the tidal observations, and to make such astronomical and magnetic observations as may be required; to continue such topographical and hydrographic surveys of the coast between Cape Cod and New York as may be found necessary; to make a survey of the Connecticut River from its mouth to Hartford; to make such examinations as may be required in New York Harbor, with such other surveys in its vicinity as may be required; to continue the observations on tides and currents; to extend, if practicable, the plane-table survey of the Hudson River above Haverstraw; to make the requisite astronomical observations; to continue the triangulation between the Hudson River and Lake Champlain; to complete the survey of Lake Champlain: to continue the topographical and hydrographic surveys of the coast of New Jersey; to continue the resurvey of the hydro-graphy of the Delaware Bay and River; to connect the Atlantic triangulation with that of the Chesapeake Bay, near the boundary line between Maryland and Virginia; to continue the detailed survey of the James River, Virginia, including the hydrography, and continue the plane-table survey of the Potomac River; to continue the supplementary hydrography between Delaware Bay, from Cape Henlopen to Cape Henry, and in the Chesapeake Bay, and to continue tidal observa-tions; to continue the triangulation of Pamplico Sound and the topography of its western shores between the Roanoke Marshes and Swan Quarter; to measure a base of verification and determine azimuth for the coast triangulation south of Cape Lookout; to make the astronomical and magnetic observations requisite; to continue the off-shore hydrography between Cape Henry and Cape Fear, that of Pamplico Sound and its rivers, and that of Core and Bogue Sounds, and of the entrance to Cape Fear River; to extend northward the primary triangulation along the Blue Ridge; to continue the topographical survey southward of Cape Roman; to determine azimuth for the triangulation of the coast of South Carolina and Georgia; to complete the detailed survey of the sea islands and water passages between Charleston and Savannah, and to make tidal observations; to make a hydrographic resurvey of Georgetown (S. C.) Harbor and approaches, and to continue the off-shore hydrography between Cape Fear (N. C.) and the St. John's River, Florida; to continue southward, from Mosquito Inlet, the triangulation, topography, and hydrography of the sea-water channels adjacent to the eastern coast of the Florida peninsula; to make the requisite astronomical observations; to continue the off-shore hydrography of the Florida peninsula, and to complete soundings in the vicinity of the reefs and keys; to continue the soundings, observations for sea temperatures, and dredgings in such portions of the Gulf Stream as may be deemed advisable between the west end of Cuba and Nova Scotia; to continue dredging along the coast within the same limits, in conjunction with the United States Commissioner of Fisheries; to continue the astronomical and magnetic observations requisite between Cape Florida and Pensacola, and the triangulation, topography, and hydrography of the western coast of Florida, south of Tampa Bay, and in Charlotte Harbor, and of the coast of the peninsula between Cedar Keys and Appalachee Bay, and between Appalachee Bay and St. Andrew's Bay; to run lines of soundings and make observations of sea temperature in the Gulf of Mexico, and develop the hydrography of the Gulf coast included in the field operations; to connect the trigonometrical survey of Mississippi River at New Orleans with that of Lakes Borgne and Pontchartrain; to determine geographical positions and make astronomical and magnetic observations required; to extend the triangulation, topography, and hydrography westward of the Mississippi delta, and continue the hydrography of the Gulf of Mexico between the mouth of the Mississippi and Galveston, Texas; to extend the triangulation, topography, and hydrography of the coast of Texas westward from Sabine Pass and south of Corpus Christi; to measure a base of verification and make the astronomical and magnetic observations requisite between Sabine Pass and the Rio Grande; to continue the hydrography of the approaches to the coast and of the bays and passes.

Office Work.—To compute results from the field observations made along the Atlantic and Gulf Coasts, including astronomical, geodetic, geographical, magnetic, and tidal work; to continue the reproduction of the original topographical charts and to plot the hydrographic charts; to continue the drawing of the general chart of the coast from Quoddy Head to Cape Cod, and of charts No. 1 and No. 2, showing the coast of Maine, between St. Croix River and Petit Manan Lighthouse; to continue drawing and engraving of charts No. 3 and No. 4, which include Frenchman's Bay, Blue Hill Bay, Isle au Haut Bay, Penobscot Bay, and their approaches, also of local charts of Moose-a-bec Reach, Mount Desert Island, Eggemoggin Reach, Penobscot Bay East, Penobscot River, the vicinity of Monomoy Shoals, and to begin the drawing and engraving of a chart of Portsmouth Harbor, N. H.; to begin the drawing and engraving of charts of the Thames River, of Connecticut River to the head of navigation, and of Port Jefferson, and complete the drawing and engraving of a chart of New Haven Harbor, and to commence a new chart of Long Island Sound; to continue the engraving of chart No. 21, showing the coast between Sandy Hook and Barnegat Inlet; the drawing and engraving of No. 22 and No. 23, between Barnegat and Cape May, to make additions to the charts and sketches between New York and Cape Henry; to begin the drawing and engraving of a new chart of Delaware Bay and River, and to complete that of James River, below City Point; to continue the drawing and engraving of the general chart of the coast between Cape Henry and Cape Lookout, and of charts No. 37, No. 39, No. 42, No. 43, No. 44, No. 45, No. 46, and No. 47, showing parts of the Atlantic coast between Cape Henry and Cape Lookout, including Pamplico Sound; to commence engraving the general chart of the coast between Cape Hatteras and Cape Roman, and to continue the drawing and engraving of that of the coast between Cape Roman and the St. Mary's River, and of charts No. 51 and No. 52, between Cape Fear and Winyah Bay; to begin the drawing and engraving of a new chart of Georgetown Harbor, S. C., and to make additions to the charts and sketches between Cape Henry and the St. Mary's River; to continue the drawing and engraving of the general chart of the coast from St. Mary's River to Cape Canaveral, and of charts No. 58, No. 59, and No. 60, from Cumberland Sound to Cape Canaveral, and to make additions to the charts of the coast between St. Mary's River and Cape Florida; to continue the drawing and engraving of charts No. 79, No. 82, No. 83, No. 86, and No. 87, showing parts of the Gulf coast between Chassahowitska River and Pensacola entrance, and of the chart of Tampa Bay; to begin the drawing and engraving of the chart of St. Joseph's Bay, and continue the chart of St. Andrew's Bay; to continue the drawing and engraving of charts No. 91, No. 92, No. 93, No. 94, and No. 95, showing Lake Borgne, Lake Pontchartrain, Isle au Breton Sound, and the Mississippi River between New Orleans and the Gulf of Mexico, and of the general chart showing the sea approaches to the Mississippi River; to begin the drawing and engraving of the chart of Barataria Bay, and of the general chart of the coast of Louisiana and Texas from Atchafalaya Bay to Galveston; to continue the drawing and engraving of that between Galveston and the Rio Grande, and of charts No. 109 and No. 110, showing Aransas Bay, Copano Bay, and Corpus Christi Bay; for materials for drawing, engraving, map printing, for electrotyping, photographing, for instruments and apparatus Total for the Atlantic and Gulf coasts, involving work on the coasts of the following States, viz: Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, and Texas, will require \$415,000.

The estimate for the survey of the Pacific Coast of the United States is intended to provide for the following progress:

Field Work .-- To make the requisite observations for latitude, longitude, azimuth, and the magnetic elements at stations along the Pacific Coast of the United States; to continue off-shore soundings on the coast of California, Oregon, and Washington Territory, and tidal observations at San Diego, San Francisco, Astoria, and such other localities as may be necessary; to continue the primary triangulations from Monterey Bay to the southward; from Point Conception to the northward, or to the Santa Barbara Islands; and from San Pablo Bay to the northward; to continue the reconnoissance for primary triangulation from San Buenaventura to San Diego, from Russian River to the northward, and from Columbia River north to Puget Sound, and south up the Willamette Valley; to continue the coast triangulation and topography from Point Lasuen toward San Luis Rey and that of Santa Barbara Islands; to continue the detailed survey of the coast north and south of Point Conception; to continue the secondary triangulation and topography between Point Buchon and San Simeon; to continue hydrography between San Diego and Point Conception, between Point Conception and Monterey Bay, the hydrographic changes in San Francisco Bay and its approaches, the hydrography between Cape Mendocino and the Klamath River, between Cape Sebastian and Port Orford, north and south of and in the approaches to the Columbia River, and the hydrography of Puget Sound, Washington Sound, and adjacent waters; to observe currents along the coast and take soundings and temperature observations in the California branch of the Kuro Siwo current, and to execute such other hydrography as local demands may require; to continue the tidal observations at the Golden Gate, and observations on the ocean currents along the coast of California; to continue hydrographic work within the limits of field operations; to continue triangulations and topography between Bodega Bay and Point Arena; between Cape Sebastian and Orford, southward from Tillamook Head, and from Shoalwater Bay northward; to complete the detailed survey between Cape Sebastian and Crescent City, and off-shore hydrography at Crescent City Reef; to measure a base line and continue the triangulation, topography, and hydrography of the Strait of Fuca, Puget Sound, and Washington Sound; to continue the reconnaissance of the coasts and islands of Alaska, with observations for tides and currents; to make the requisite astronomical and magnetic observations, and to continue hydrographic explorations in the vicinity of the Aleutian Islands, the Shumagin Islands, and the Kadiak group, with observations on tides and currents. Office Work.—To make the computation from the observations made in the field, including astronomical, geodetic,

geographical, magnetic, and tidal observations; to continue the reproduction of the original topographical sheets, and to plot the hydrographic charts; to draw and engrave the additions on the general chart of the Pacific Coast of the United States; to continue the drawing and engraving of the charts of the coast from San Diego to Point Conception, No. 1, No. 2, and No. 3; to engrave local charts of Catalina Harbor and Isthmus Cove, of San Pedro Harbor, of Arabeim and Hueneme Landings, and of San Luis Obispo; to complete the engraving of a new chart of San Francisco entrance and Harbor, from resurveys; to continue the drawing and commence the engraving of charts of the coast from Point Arena to Cape Mendocino, No. 8, of that from Cape Mendocino to St. George's Reef, No. 9, and of that from St. George's Reef to the Umpquah River, No. 10; to complete the engraving of a chart of Humboldt Bay; and to make additions to the charts of Columbia River, Shoalwater Bay, Puget and Washington Sounds, and to the Charts of the northwestern coast. Total Western Coast, will require \$290,000.

For extending the triangulation of the Coast Survey to form a connection between the Atlantic and Pacific Coasts of the United States, and assisting in the State surveys, involving work in ten States, will require \$85,000. For repairs and maintenance of the complement of vessels used in the Coast Survey, will require \$55,000. For continuing the publication of the observations made in the progress of the Coast Survey, will require \$10,000.

For general expenses of all the work, viz: Rent, fuel, for transportation of instruments, maps and charts, for miscellaneous office expenses, and for the purchase of new instruments, books, maps, and charts, will require \$38,100.

The annexed table shows, in parallel columns, the appropriation for the fiscal year 1874–'75, the amount estimated for that year, and the estimate herein submitted for the fiscal year 1875-'76.

In explanation of the estimates submitted for the Coast Survey, both in relation to the annual expenditures and the vessels required, I have the honor to state that when placed in charge of the Coast Survey, in February last, I found my predecessor had submitted estimates for the present fiscal year based upon the strictest principles of the relations between economy of expenditures and largeness of results, and predicated upon a policy endorsed by Congress through a series of years.

These estimates, in the aggregate \$825,000, were reduced by Congress, in the general policy, (at that time so needful,) in its appropriations, to but \$706,000 for the regular work of the Coast Survey, a decrease of \$119,000, or $14\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. below the amount of the estimates.

This reduction has necessarily restrained me from the execution of much work greatly wanted, but now postponed to the next fiscal year. All the omitted work of this year, as well as the work due to the next, must be executed in the coming year to place the Coast Survey in the position it would have occupied had the appropriations of this year equalled the estimates submitted, and so carefully prepared by my predecessor.

One of my first duties after being appointed was to make a careful investigation and estimate of the amount of work yet to be done to complete the survey of our now actual coasts; to compare this amount with that already executed, as well as the time consumed in the latter and that estimated to be necessary in the former. A comparison of the actual spaces covered by the various classes of work now finished and those to be done, would

A comparison of the actual spaces covered by the various classes of work now finished and those to be done, would not yield a true ratio of their respective times. For at first the Coast Survey had, from the necessity of the case, to be commenced on a very limited scale, and many years had to elapse before a full organization could obtain and the work be carried forward, from many centres, in the several sections of both coasts, by trained officers. In fact, the organization, the methods, and the officers, had to be created by the eminent men who have preceded me. The splendid results justify their works.

In 1832, when the Coast Survey really made a beginning, Texas and California, with 1,500 miles of sea-coast, and more than four times that number in harbor lines and island shores, as also Alaska, with its enormous length of ocean shores, were foreign territories. For ten years the work necessarily advanced tentatively and slowly, and subsequently, having received the endorsement of the highest scientific and practical authorities in both this country and Europe, was fully approved by Congress, which, during the years 1856, 1857, 1858, 1859, and 1860, made such increased appropriations as utility and economy demanded.

In 1842 the work of the Coast Survey was being executed in four States. In 1874 the Coast Survey, thoroughly organized, is working in twenty-six States and two Territories, and capable of producing, with its present constants of expense, the largest amount of and most economical results. In face of the difference in the value of money, the average salaries of assistants and sub-assistants in 1874 is no greater than in 1842.

The experience of the Coast Survey enables a very close estimate to be made of the time and cost required to complete the survey of our now actual coast. I have carefully gone over the finished and unfinished work of the Coast Survey, compared cost and time, and find the Coast Survey has been at work for forty-two years, and that two-thirds of the coast has been surveyed, exclusive of Alaska. I conclude, after making due allowance for unforeseen delays, that the survey of the now actual sea-coast of the United States remaining unsurveyed, can be completed in twelve years, if the moderate means asked for are supplied. These means are but the restoration of the *value* of the annual appropriation to that of the average of the years 1856-'57, 1857-'58, 1858-'59, and 1859-'60, with two more vessels than were at that time in the Coast Survey. A comparison of the actual cost, in number of dollars, of any class of works in 1858 and 1874, is no measure of relative economy.

The following statistics give the cost of articles and rates of wages and compensation between the periods 1854-'58 and 1869-'74, as taken from official printed documents:

Seamen.-Navy wages of seamen have been increased from time to time from \$12 per month in 1854, to \$21 50 per month in 1874, 79 per cent. Average increase of seven other classes of wages in five States, 71 per cent. Average cost, per ton, in Baltimore, of merchant vessels, hull and spars, in 1858, \$24 50; in 1874, \$53; an increase of 116 per cent.

From these data it is quite evident that money (gold as well as notes) has depreciated greatly in value, and that the present currency has not more than three-fifths the power of getting work accomplished, or the purchasing value of the currency of 1858. The average appropriation for the Coast Survey for the years 1856–'57, 1857–'58, 1858-'59, and 1859-'60 was \$537,000, equal in value to \$895,000 in 1874. The appropriation for 1874–'75 is, for the regular work, but \$706,000; equal in value to about \$423,600 in 1858, or about 27 per cent. less in value than the average appropriations for the years above named.

To the work of the Coast Survey in its earlier years, others, its natural outgrowth, have been added, for which appropriations have been made, and are now estimated for, in addition to the classes of work for which appropriations were made in 1858. Deducting those portions of the appropriation from the total, the aggregate amount estimated for the years 1875–76 would be less in value than the average appropriations for the years 1856–57, 1858–59, 1859–60, by \$140,000, or more than 16 per cent. less than the estimates submitted. With an increase of 25 per cent. the results can be increased 65 per cent., for, as the constants of expense for the work remain nearly the same, almost the entire additional amount can be applied directly to field work and to the production of charts and maps.

VESSELS.

In the years 1856-'57, 1857-'58, 1858-'59, and 1859-'60, the Coast Survey, by the genius of Hassler and Bache, had become developed into a fixed organization, for the support of which Congress made almost constant equal appropriations, averaging for these former years \$537,000 per annum. The war, by withdrawing the naval officers who had by law, when they could be supplied by the Navy Department, the execution of the hydrography, added to which, many of the civil assistants of the work were employed as topographical officers to several corps of the Army operating in different parts of the country, disarranged this organization. Although the system of the organization was thus materially interfered with, the work continued upon its old basis, in spite of the various efforts made by my predecessor since the close of the war to restore the conditions of the organization as it existed in the years referred to before the war; but from the want of sufficient appropriations to supply the deficiencies in the number of vessels, the inability of the Navy Department to furnish the required number of officers, and other causes, the restoration of the conditions referred to has not been possible. The law requires that the hydrography of the Coast Survey shall be executed by the officers and men of the Navy Department now stands ready to supply the required complements, but there is a great deficiency of vessels for the purpose, and estimates are submitted for but two more than Congress deemed necessary in 1858. From the accompanying copies of letters from the Secretaries of the Navy and the Treasury, it will be seen that no vessels of the classes required for Coast Survey work can be supplied from the Navy or the revenue marine.

The absolute necessity for more vessels for the rapid execution of the work is evident from the following comparison, but two more than obtained in 1858 being estimated for: In 1858 the Coast Survey had five sea-going steamers on the

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Atlantic and Gulf Coasts; in 1874 there are but two, with one building. Estimates for two more are submitted, to raise the number to that of 1858. In 1858 the Coast Survey had twenty-five schooners and small steamers on the Atlantic and Gulf Coasts; in 1874 there are twenty-four. In 1858, before the work was fully organized there, the Coast Survey had on the Pacific Coast one sea-going steamer and three schooners, quite sufficient for the then scale of work upon that coast; in 1874 there are one sea-going steamer and three schooners, two of them too old and decayed to be trusted at sea. In the last few years, under the direction of my immediate predecessor, the land portion of this coast has rapidly progressed, but from want of vessels the shore work has advanced greatly beyond the hydrography, and now over three hundred miles of the land work of the coast is finished, awaiting the completion of the hydrography to enable maps and charts to be issued. This hydrography can, of course, only be accomplished by vessels, which the Coast Survey has not, nor the means to obtain them.

In 1858, all the vessels were comparatively new, none being over eight or nine years old. In 1874, there are twelve from eighteen to twenty-five years old, rotten, worn out, and worthless, utterly valueless for any use, reducing the available number to nineteen, compared to thirty-four in 1858. With the number of vessels estimated for and the sale of the twelve useless ones, the total number of vessels in the Coast Survey would be thirty-six, the total in 1858 having been thirty-four. The number of vessels on the Atlantic and Gulf Coasts will be decreased, the number on the Pacific Coast will be increased, but the total number for all coasts will be but two more than in 1858. Without some unexpected casualties, no more special appropriations for the construction of vessels will be required to complete the survey of the present limits of the coasts of the United States, and appropriations for those for which estimates are submitted are urged from the positive necessities of the work, and besides, it must be considered that a full year must elapse after the appropriation becomes available before the vessels can be ready for use.

The average receipts from the customs for the years 1857, 1858, 1859, and 1860, were \$52,106,740 56. In 1873, these receipts were \$188,089.522 70, or 261 per cent. increase, gold. The increase of Coast Survey appropriations reduced to gold is but 11 per cent. Although these relative amounts are not entirely logical as bearing on the appropriation for the Coast Survey, yet they tend to show with what rapidity our external commerce has increased and is increasing, amassing, with the coastwise trade, figures which but a few years ago would have been deemed incredible; and they also tend to show the imperative necessity of completing the survey of our coast in the shortest possible time, consistent with proper economy and due accuracy of work. The same ratio of appropriation for the Coast Survey to the customs receipts in 1874 and 1875, as obtained in 1858, would give \$1,938,570, or more than 100 per cent. over the amount for which estimates are submitted. The enormous extent of the coasting trade along the coasts of the United States, now estimated to exceed 40,000,000 tons transported per annum, demands for its greater security the speediest completion of the work, as is evident from the constant calls upon the office for detailed charts and sailing directions of those parts of the coasts not yet surveyed.

The estimates submitted are based upon the actual necessities of the work, the constantly increasing demands for charts of the unfinished parts of the coast, and the value of the average appropriations made by Congress in the years 1856-57, 1857-58, 1858-59, and 1859-60, after years of trial, deliberate investigation, full discussion, and mature judgment. The work is essentially temporary in character—the number of miles of coast known, the cost and time for completion a mere question of arithmetic.

The present purchasing value of currency is not more than three fifths that in the years above named. The average of appropriations for these years was \$537,000, an amount equal to three-fifths of \$895,000, for work of the classes executed in 1858. To this add \$140,000 for work since added and required, and we have a total of \$1,035,000. The total amount estimated for, is \$893,000—less by \$142,000, or 14 per cent.

The work cannot proceed with just economy and speed without a proper supply of vessels, and estimates for but two more are submitted than are required to restore the efficient number actually in the Coast Survey in 1858. With all the vessels completed for which estimates are submitted there will be required in addition to the regular estimates submitted for the years 1875 and 1876, about \$75,000, or a total of \$968,000, with which annual appropriation the whole survey of the coast can be completed in twelve years, leaving no further work to be executed except the publishing of charts, results of the work, and the resurveying of the changeable harbors and portions of the coast, which would involve no great expense.

Good charts, light-houses, and buoys, by rendering navigation safe, reduce expenses of insurance, detention, pilotage, &c., and thus cheapen transportation. In the coasting trade alone of 40,000,000 tons, valued at only \$20 per ton, equal to \$800,000,000, if the expenses of transportation are reduced by one per cent. upon its value, we have a sum of \$8,000,000 per annum saved, or double the annual cost of the Coast Survey and Light-house system combined, or over eight times the cost of the Coast Survey, if its annual cost was to be ceaseless, instead of ending in twelve years.

Feeling confident that Congress wishes the speedy termination of this work, as a measure of necessity to our enormous and constantly increasing commerce, as well as a matter of general utility and economy, and trusting they may receive its approval, I have deemed it my duty to submit these estimates for the most rapid and economical completion of the survey of the coasts of the United States.

APPENDIX J.

Explanation of estimates for Fisheries. (See page 137.)

SIR: I beg leave to enclose the estimates for the continuance of the United States Fish Commission for the next year. For some years past the special appropriation for the propagation of shad has been made as a deficiency item, in view of the fact that the service was generally performed at the end of the fiscal year, and the amount left from the regular appropriation in the "Sundry civil expenses" bill was found insufficient to permit the work to be done on the desired scale.

As there are many objections to the continuance of this procedure, I have combined both in the regular estimates for the coming year; and I have ventured to ask for an increase in the amount for shad-hatching over that of last year, as, if the item be sanctioned and the appropriation made available on the passage of the act, I shall be able to do twice as much as during any previous season, especially in the Southern and Southwestern States, which have hitherto been excluded from the benefit of the appropriations, in consequence of the lateness of the date at which they have become available.

I have also included an estimate for the preparation of a series of illustrations of the American fisheries and their products for exhibition at the Centennial Exposition at Philadelphia in 1876. The object is one of great interest and practical importance, and a proper presentation can only be made by Government aid.

It is proposed to furnish a complete series of illustrations or models of all the different kinds of vessels and boats of every grade used in the various fisheries on the coast and in the interior, together with the apparatus employed, of whatever kind, including not only what relates to the fishes properly so-called, but also to the whales, seals, oysters, lobsters, sponges, etc.

Such an exhibition has always constituted an important feature in the national displays at foreign exhibitions; and unless steps are taken immediately by the Government towards that object, there is no probability that anything of the kind will be prepared for the particular occasion in question.

The collection will also embrace specimens of the various products of the fisheries, both in their crude and manufactured condition, with illustrations of the objects themselves, including plaster casts, carefully colored, of life-size of such fishes as cannot be otherwise properly exhibited. This collection will finally form, appropriately, a portion of the National Museum at Washington.

APPENDIX K.

Explanation of the estimate for Construction of Military Telegraph Lines. (See page 138.)

SIR: I have the honor to submit herewith estimates for the construction, and continuing the construction, maintenance, and use of military telegraph lines for the connection of military posts and stations, for the better protection of immigration, the frontiers and settlements from depredation. These lines are intended to be constructed and worked by enlisted men. I cannot too highly recommend their use as a measure of economy for the Army, while greatly increasing its powers, and as one of the most efficient means for developing the country, now dangerous, by rendering it safe. Aside from these benefits, it seems probable, from experience already had, that they will become in some sections, at least in part, self-supporting.

APPENDIX L.

Explanation of the estimates for "Refunding to States expenses incurred in raising Volunteers," and "Horses and other property lost in the military service." (See pages 138 and 139.)

SIE: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 20th instant asking what amounts will probably be required to meet claims settled in this office during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1876, payable from the appropriations "Refunding to States expenses incurred in raising volunteers," and "Payment for horses and other property lost in the military service." In reply, I have to state that the probable amounts required will be as follows, viz: For payment of claims refunding to States expenses incurred in raising volunteers, five hundred thousand dollars, (\$500,000,) and for payment for horses and other property lost in the military service, three hundred thousand dollars, (\$300,000)—*i. e.*, the amount required for claims for lost horses will be one hundred thousand dollars, (\$100,000,) and for steamboats and other vessels, railroad engines and cars destroyed, two hundred thousand dollars, (\$200,000,) making a total of three hundred thousand dollars, (\$300,000,) as above stated.

STATEMENT OF THE PROCEEDS OF GOVERNMENT PROPERTY, PUBLISHED IN CONFORMITY TO THE FOLLOWING PROVISIONS OF LAW:

SEC. 5. That all proceeds of sales of old material, condemned stores, supplies, or other public property of any kind, shall hereafter be deposited and covered into the Treasury as miscellaneous receipts, on account of "proceeds of Government property," and shall not be withdrawn or applied except in consequence of a subsequent appropriation made by law; and a detailed statement of all such proceeds of sales shall be included in the Appendix to the Book of Estimates. But this section shall not be held to repeal the existing authority of law in relation to marine hospitals, revenue-cutters, the clothing fund of the Navy, or the sale of commissary stores to the officers of the Army. And it shall be the duty of the Register of the Treasury to furnish to the proper accounting officers copies of all warrants covering such proceeds, where the same may be necessary in the settlement of accounts in their respective offices. (Act of May 8, 1872, 17 Statutes, 83.)

SEC. 1. That the fifth section of the act approved May eighth, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the Government for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, shall not be held to apply to materials, stores, or supplies sold to officers and soldiers of the Army, or to exploring or surveying expeditions authorized by law; and that said section shall not be held to repeal such part of paragraph 1032, Revised Army Regulations of eighteen hundred and sixty-three, as provides that expenses of sales of military stores or supplies regularly condemned will be paid from their proceeds. (Act of June 8, 1872, 17 Statutes, 337.)




