AUGUST 16, 1856.—Laid upon the table and ordered to be printed.

To the House of Representatives:

In compliance with a resolution of the House of Representatives of the 17th April, 1856, requesting me "to have prepared and presented to the House of Representatives, a statement showing the appropriations made by the thirty-first, thirty-second, and thirty-third Congresses, distinguishing the appropriations made at each session of each Congress, distinguishing also the appropriations made on the recommendation of the President, heads of departments, or head of bureaus, from those that were made without such recommendation; and showing what expenditures have been made by the government in each fiscal year, commencing with the first day of July, 1850, and ending on the thirtieth day of June, 1855, and, also, what (if any) defalcations have occurred from the thirtieth day of June, 1850, to the first day of July, 1855, and the amount of such defalcations severally, and such other information as may be in his power, bearing upon the matters above mentioned." I submit the following reports from the Secretaries of Treasury, War, Navy, and Interior departments, and the Postmaster General.

SIR: To enable you to comply, so far as the information is afforded by the records of this department, with the resolution of the House of Representatives of the 17th April, 1856, requesting you "to have pre-

pared and presented to the House of Representatives a statement showing the appropriations made by the thirty-first, thirty-second, and thirty-third Congresses, distinguishing the appropriations made at each session of each Congress; distinguishing also the appropriations made on the recommendation of the President, heads of departments, or heads of bureaus, from those that were made without such recommendation; and showing what expenditures have been made by the government in each fiscal year, commencing with the first day of July, 1850, and ending on the thirtieth day of June, 1855, and, also, what (if any) defalcations have occurred from the thirtieth day of June, 1850, to the first day of July, 1855, and the amount of such defalcations, severally, and such other information as may be in his power, bearing upon the matters above mentioned," I have the honor to submit a letter of the Register of the Treasury, dated on the 13th instant, and the statements marked No. 1, 2, and 3, to which it refers.

The Register has taken much pains in the preparation of these statements, and, it is believed, they are as full and complete as the compass and detail of the subject, and the time allowed, would admit.

SIR: In compliance with the reference of the resolution of House of Representatives of April 17, 1856, requesting the President of the United States "to have prepared and presented to the House of Representatives, a statement showing the appropriations made by the thirty-first, thirty-second, and thirty-third Congresses, distinguishing the appropriations made at each session of each Congress, distinguishing also the appropriations made at the recommendation of the President, heads of departments, or heads of bureaus, from those that were made without such recommendation; and showing what expenditures have been made by the government in each fiscal year, commencing with the first day of July, 1850, and ending on the thirtieth day of June, 1855, and, also, what (if any) defalcations have occurred from the thirtieth day of June, 1850, to the first day of July, 1855, and the amount of such defalcations severally, and such other information as may be in his power, bearing upon the matters above mentioned." I have the honor to transmit, herewith, the following named statements:

1st. Statement of the appropriations made by the thirty-first, thirty-second, and thirty-third Congresses, for the legislative department, and for branches of the public service under the charge of the State Department, Treasury Department, and Attorney General's Office, distinguishing, so far as the information is in possession of this office, the appropriations made at the recommendation of the President, heads of departments, or heads of bureaus, from those that were made without such recommendation.

2d. Statement showing what expenditures have been made by the government in each fiscal year, commencing with the first day of July, 1850, and ending with the thirtieth day of June, 1855. This statement is prepared from the volumes of "receipts and expenditures," for the fiscal years named, and shows the actual payments in each year from the treasury, without regard to the date of the warrants upon which the drafts were issued; and, also, the specific appropriation from which the payments were made.

3d. Statement showing what defalcations have occurred from the thirtieth day of June, 1850, to the first day of July, 1855, and the amount of such defalcations severally, in the case of all persons whose accounts are on the books of this office—being those persons whose accounts are acted upon by the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and First and Fifth Auditors, and revised by the First Comptroller and Commissioner of Customs. In preparing this statement, I have assumed the defalcations as taking place at the date of the going out of office, by the incumbent, whether by death, resignation, removal, or otherwise—although the defalcation may have actually occurred anterior to that time—but the account not adjusted and carried on the books of the treasury.

I have taken great care in the preparation of the statements, and endeavored to make them as full and complete as possible. The greatest difficulty which I encountered being the distinguishing the appropriations made upon the recommendation of the President, heads of departments, or heads of bureaus, and those that were made without such recommendation. I have made the distinction so far as I had any light on the matter, but it has been found wholly impracticable to make it complete and thorough, without delaying the statement beyond a reasonable period.

NOTE.—The amounts stated as “estimated,” in the above statement, (pages 207 and 208,) embrace only the sums included in the annual estimates of appropriations submitted to Congress at the commencement of each session, whether for deficiencies, the regular annual appropriations, or permanent appropriations, specific and indefinite. The amount of special estimates submitted subsequently it is impossible to ascertain. The discrepancy between the amounts estimated and appropriated is to be accounted for as follows: The appropriations relating to the public debt are all permanent and indefinite, and, it being impossible to estimate what amount of stock might be presented for redemption, there has been no estimate made for it. In the sum stated above as appropriated at the second session of the Thirty-second Congress, the appropriations for the public debt exceed the amount estimated \$20,369,740 75. Besides these appropriations on account of the public debt, there are others of a similar character which amount to several millions. The discrepancy is also further caused by appropriations being made without estimate or special recommendation from any of the departments. The several amounts may, in some sessions, exceed the difference between the annual estimates and appropriations; and when this is the case, Congress has not appropriated the amounts asked for in the general annual estimates.

This statement comprises all the information that can be furnished from the records of this department on the subjects of inquiry enumerated in the resolution of the House of Representatives of April 17.

The expenditures made during the period mentioned in the resolution, will, I presume, be reported by the Treasury Department, and if it be practicable, it would be desirable to distinguish the payments made in the discharge of obligations long before incurred from the expenses of current service. Each administration necessarily has a portion of the former to discharge, but when, as has recently been the case, special efforts are made to clear off arrears, a comparatively large expenditure will be exhibited.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, *July 30, 1856.*

SIR: Complying with your instructions, on referring to this department the resolution of the House of Representatives of 17th April last, I have the honor to transmit herewith statements of the appropriations made for the Navy Department at each session of the Thirty-first, Thirty-second, and Thirty-third Congresses, "distinguishing those made upon the recommendation of the President, the head of the department or heads of bureaus, from those that were made without such recommendations."

As a general rule, I have classed as appropriations, made on the recommendation of the department, those based on estimates furnished by it to carry out existing laws, whether the laws were so recommended or not. Those for the "transportation of the mails" are exceptions. This service being extraneous to the general business for which the Navy Department was constituted, and never, so far as I can learn, having been recommended by it, I have placed the appropriations for it in the class of those made without its recommendation, though the sums appropriated have been, in part, based on estimates furnished by it, merely, however, in accordance with established law.

It will be observed that the aggregate appropriations "on the recommendation of the department," at the last two sessions, are considerably increased over those of previous years. This is susceptible of satisfactory explanation.

The increase of appropriations has been necessary, in part, to carry out objects of previous laws, for which adequate appropriations had not been made by Congress, and to meet the large expenses involved by the late expedition to Japan, and that for the survey of Behrings Straits, &c., both of which had been commenced in the fall and winter of 1852 and 1853, without sufficient means being provided by Congress for their consummation; and, in part, to meet increased wages of seamen and of laborers on our public works, and prices of materials and necessaries of subsistence.

The building and fitting of six steam frigates, in part, as an addition to our naval force, and, in part, to take the place of lost or worn-out vessels, has not only required the appropriation of six millions of dollars for their construction and equipment, but large sums for the extension of dock, navy yard, and workshop facilities, as well as for armament and ordnance stores.

The increased appropriations for "repairs of vessels in ordinary, wear and tear of vessels in commission, fuel for steamers," &c., were considered as required to place our dilapidated and idle vessels in readiness for service, and for the employment of more steam force to protect our extended commerce, and meet anticipated emergencies which might arise out of the very disturbed state of affairs in Europe.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR,

SIR: I have the honor to lay before you a statement prepared in answer to so much of House resolution, passed 17th April last, as relates to this department, showing the appropriations made at each session of the Thirty-first, Thirty-second, and Thirty-third Congresses, and the expenditures incurred during the fiscal years ending 30th June 1851, -'52, -'53, -'54, and '55, respectively.

The abstract of expenditures has been compiled principally from the annual reports of "receipts and expenditures," submitted to Congress by the head of the Treasury Department, and can be readily verified by comparison therewith.

In making up the abstract of appropriations, the department has been under the necessity of resorting to the acts of Congress for all such, not for the Indian service, as were made prior to 3d March, 1853, no account of appropriations having been kept here before that date. It has, therefore, been prepared with much labor, and occupied more time than could have been anticipated. It is believed to be accurate, however, and both branches of the statement are so arranged as to present at a glance a comprehensive view of the financial operations of the department during the period covered by the resolution.

On reference to the report of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, it will be seen that the following amounts were appropriated by Congress on account of the Indian service, for which no estimates were submitted by him:

It will also be observed that a considerable amount of what would at first appear to be expenditures of the public funds should more properly be regarded as investments, the outlay being indispensable as a revenue measure, or to provide suitable facilities for the transaction of the public business. This will more fully appear upon reference to the reports of the Commissioners of the General Land Office and of the Public Buildings, as well as to that of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs.

GOVERNMENT HOSPITAL FOR THE INSANE,
NEAR WASHINGTON, D. C., *April 25, 1856.*

SIR: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 22d instant, requesting information in answer to the resolution of the House of Representatives, passed the 17th instant, a copy of which was enclosed.

The first appropriation for the purchase of a site, and the erection, furnishing, and fitting up of a hospital for the insane of the army and navy, and of the District of Columbia, amounted to \$100,000, and was made at the first session of the 32d Congress; the second appropriation for the same purposes, to the amount of \$36,809, was made at the first session of the 33d Congress; the third and last appropriation for the above objects, was made at the second session of the 33d Congress, and amounted to \$34,532. The first appropriation was, of course, made before I took charge of the work; but it is my present recollection that the then Secretary of the Interior told me that he recommended the objects of the appropriation in a special communication to the Committee on Finance of the Senate; the second appropriation was approved by yourself in answer to a resolution calling for information upon the subject; the third appropriation was included in your annual estimates submitted at the opening of the second session of the 33d Congress.

There were also appropriated, at the second session of the 33d Congress, \$16,800, for the support, in this institution, of the insane of the army and navy, and of the District of Columbia, for the year ending June 30, 1856. The previous appropriations for the support of the

insane of the District of Columbia were disbursed by another officer, and I have no special opportunities of knowing their amount. No defalcations have occurred in the disbursement of either of the above described appropriations.

July 18, 1856.

SIR: I herewith transmit to you the statement called for by your letter of the 22d April, 1856, under a resolution of the House of Representatives of the 17th of the same month.

It will be perceived, on examination of the statement, that the large sums appropriated were for the erection of public buildings and grading and improving public grounds, which are not ordinary and current expenses, but permanent investments, benefits from which the government is constantly deriving. The Patent Office, when completed, will be a model building for durability, proof against fire, and adaptation to the purposes for which it is intended. It would be good policy on the part of the government to erect as speedily as possible substantial and fire-proof buildings for the accommodation of all the executive departments, for the destruction of any one of them by fire would doubtless occasion a loss to the government equal to the cost of erecting all the executive buildings fire-proof. The improvement of the public grounds commends itself to every one of taste, and is absolutely required to correspond with the imposing character of the public buildings. Besides, it adds to the health of the city, which is an object of earnest attention in every community, and should be especially so in this, where the executive officers of our government and the ministers of foreign courts reside, and the representatives in Congress, coming from every variety of climate, pass so great a portion of the year.

NOTE.—A considerable portion of these expenditures, it will be observed, has been incurred for the erection of public buildings and improvement of grounds owned by the United States at the seat of government. It is, therefore, in reality, an investment to that extent, the improvements being now worth, as is believed, all they have cost.

GENERAL LAND OFFICE, *July 25, 1856.*

SIR: As directed in your letter of 18th April last, covering a copy of the resolution of the House of Representatives, requesting the President to have prepared a statement showing the appropriations made by the 31st, 32d, and 33d Congresses, and also to state what, if any, defalcations have occurred from the 30th June, 1850, to the 1st of July, 1855, I have the honor to submit, herewith, statement (marked A) of appropriations on account of surveys of the public land; also, for salaries and incidental expenses of the General Land Office, and of the various district land offices, on estimates submitted by this office.

The estimates for salaries of surveyors general and their clerks, and for surveying the public lands, as shown by statement A, have been increased by general legislation connected with the great public land interest of the United States, to wit: Acts of September 27, 1850, establishing the office of surveyor general of Oregon; of March 3, 1853, the office of surveyor general in California; of July 17, 1854, that of surveyor general for Washington Territory; of July 22, 1854, establishing the office of surveyor general for New Mexico, and Kansas and Nebraska, and of February 21, 1855, creating the office of surveyor general for Utah.

Under these laws, and in order to extend the land system over our new Territories, comprising six new and extensive *surveying districts*, making an aggregate of *double* the number pre-existing, it became necessary to increase the estimates for this service, which was accordingly done, and portions of the land in these new surveying districts, placed under contract, the surveys of which have been and are steadily progressing, in order to open the lands to market at the earliest period.

It is scarcely possible to convey, in a condensed form, an adequate idea of the great and rapid extension of the public surveys during the period embraced by the resolution. The surveys in several States have been closed. In others, such as Iowa, Michigan, Missouri, Arkansas, and Louisiana, the net work of our surveying system has been nearly completed, whilst large portions of lands in Wisconsin and Minnesota have been surveyed during the same time.

The State of California, equal in its area to several of the old States, and where the heaviest expenditures have been made, has been intersected by our lines in various directions, extending from one end of the State to the other, and large bodies of land have been completely surveyed and returned, covering millions of acres. Rapid extensions of the surveys have likewise been made in Kansas, Nebraska, Oregon, Washington and other Territories, altogether requiring a greater outlay for service during the period in question, than for any similar one since the origin of our land system. These operations were rendered necessary by the spread of our population, and the demand must increase annually for years to come, as the country fills up. It is to be observed, also, that expenditures for this service, not limited to any present benefit, are not a tax upon the treasury, but on the contrary, a present investment for revenue, the benefit of which will be felt in the distant future, and is already seen in the great increase of receipts

from the public lands in the last two years, being over *four* fold of that derived from this source during the years ending respectively June, 30, 1852, and June 30, 1853; the receipts during the former year being but \$1,975,658, and the latter but \$1,804,653.

In the above statement, the estimates for this office show an increase in the appropriation for salaries, as authorized by the acts of March 3, 1853, and of April 22, 1854, also in the contingent appropriation necessary to meet expenses under swamp, military bounty land acts, and other legislation of Congress, involving heavy expense for records, tract books, parchment, &c.

The increase in the appropriations for salaries, commissions, and incidental expenses of district land offices, is to meet the expenses consequent upon the recent establishment of *twenty-four* new land districts, the appointment of new land officers, furnishing their offices, but principally owing to the extraordinary amount received from the sales of public lands, bringing the commissions of most of the officers up to the maximum compensation of \$3,000 per annum, and largely adding to the expenses of making deposits, from the necessity of frequency, under the precautionary regulations of the Treasury Department, tending to prevent an undue accumulation of funds in the hands of receivers. This is shown in the fact, that during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1854, the receipts from the sale of public lands were upwards of \$9,285,000, and for the year ending June 30, 1855, the receipts were upwards of \$9,126,000, thus increasing the commissions of land officers on the receipts, adding to the incidental expenses, and to the expenses of depositing.

The estimates also cover the immense labor incident to locations in satisfaction of military claims, selections of railroad land, swamp lands, and under the graduation law.

Referring to that portion of the resolution calling for a statement of the defalcations, if any, which have occurred between the above periods, it is submitted, so far as we have the means of reporting, that as regards the operations in the surveying department, involving the expenditure of several million of dollars, there has been but a single case of defalcation, of about \$12,000, amply covered by security, and that took place before the introduction of the new system of payment at that particular office, which has been adopted at all the other offices.

The accompanying statement (B) is an exhibit of the sums drawn from the treasury during the several years mentioned in the resolutions.

NOTE.—As respects the surveying department, including expenses of the surveyors offices, the following remark is submitted:

The surveys have to be made before the lands can be sold, and when once properly made the work is done. The expense then has to be incurred, and it is only a question of time when that shall be. The cost of survey enters into the cost of the land, and it should not therefore be regarded as an ordinary expenditure, but as an investment, the benefits of which are being constantly received as the lands are sold.

Most of these appropriations were made upon estimates submitted to Congress by the head of the department. The remainder are believed to have been made upon special application from or with the approval of this office, so that the office should be regarded as directly or indirectly responsible for the whole of them.

PENSION OFFICE, *July 9, 1856.*

SIR: I have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter, enclosing copy of a resolution of the House of Representatives calling for a statement of appropriations made by the 31st, 32d, and 33d Congress; and, in compliance with your instructions, enclose herewith statements of such appropriations for this office.

The statement marked A is of the appropriations for the payment of pensions of different classes. There are other classes of pensions which, by the law creating them, are made payable out of the treasury without any specific appropriations therefor, and consequently are not included in this statement.

By the act of February 3, 1853, two new classes of pensions were created, for the payment of which appropriations have since been made to the amount, in all, up to the close of the 33d Congress of \$1,134,000.

This sum is included in the enclosed statement of appropriations made. There has also been transferred from other appropriations for the payment of pensions under the above act the sum of \$55,000, thus making as the whole amount included in the enclosed statement, which has been applied to the new classes of pensions under the act of February 3, 1853, the sum of \$1,189,000.

During the time embraced by said statement there have been other changes and amendments of pension laws, enlarging their operation and consequently involving greater payments, which are included in these appropriations; but they are of minor importance.

All these appropriations for the payment of pensions are made from estimates prepared by this office for that purpose. The statement marked B is of the appropriations made for payment of the salaries of the employes in, and of the contingent expenses of, this office.

The appropriation therein stated of \$60,846 66, at the 2d session of the 32d Congress, for salaries, does not show the whole amount required and applied for that purpose. Since the appropriation at the former session a change of the law respecting clerks had been made, and also provision for an increase of salaries; and by law it was provided that the payment should be made out of the treasury, without any specific appropriation therefor. Hence the specific appropriation for salaries was less.

At the next session of Congress a specific appropriation was made for the salaries of all the employes in the office. But subsequently during that session provision was made for a continued increase of salaries of clerks. That increase was paid out of the treasury without any specific appropriation, and therefore is not included in the sum of \$97,800 in the enclosed statement.

The appropriation at the 2d session of the 33d Congress was for compensation to all the employes in the office, including the fifty additional clerks provided with reference to the business created by the bounty land act of March 3, 1855.

With regard to the appropriations for contingent expenses, I would suggest that the necessities of the office, on account of the various acts granting bounty land, have at different times been varying.

The bounty land act of March 3, 1855, particularly, has occasioned a great increase of contingent expenses. The additional number of clerks rendered necessary the rent of a separate building for their accommodation.

The preparation of the engraved plates for the warrants, and the paper and printing of the same, and the additional amount of stationery and furniture required for the increased number of employes, and the business on which they have been engaged, have involved a necessary expenditure much beyond what otherwise would have been required.

In addition to this, in order to hasten the advance of the work, temporary clerks, not included in the number provided for in the appropriation for that purpose, have been employed, and their compensation paid out of the contingent fund of the office.

In connexion with the above, I may allude to another source of charge to the contingent fund of this office, within the last few years, beyond what was before. By the regulations of the Treasury Department all the expenses of primary investigations of frauds against this office, before legal proceedings for the prosecution of the offenders, are chargeable to the contingent fund of this office. Within the last few years an unusual number of cases of frauds have been investigated for prosecution, involving a large expense to this office.

The amount of expenditures for these several purposes can be more accurately furnished by the disbursing clerk of this department, in whose office the accounts are kept, than by me.

These appropriations for salaries and contingent expenses are made from estimates prepared by the office.

For the amount of the actual expenditures of this office during the period mentioned, I beg leave to refer you to the disbursing clerk of this department, who can furnish more accurate statements of the same.

There has been no defalcation in the branch of service belonging to this office during the period from July 1, 1850, to the present time.

NOTE.—Funds which had accumulated to a large amount in the hands of pension agents have been called in, and the practice of making remittances beyond the sums actually required has been discontinued. By this means, while the annual appropriations have been largely reduced, the funds provided have proved sufficient to meet the wants of the service. The appropriations are assumed to have been made upon estimates of the department, all which, however, were required to carry into effect acts passed by Congress.

NOTE.—In addition to the remarks upon abstract A, it is proper to refer to the fact that pensions under the acts of May 15, 1828, June 7, 1832, and August 10, 1848, were payable out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated prior to July 1, 1856, subsequent to which date they are only authorized to be paid out of specific appropriations. This change has been made upon the recommendation of the Secretary of the Interior, in order to guard in future against a practice which was found at times to have existed of making large remittances under those acts, there being no limit to the amount which could be so drawn, the appropriations being indefinite.

PENSION OFFICE, July 9, 1856.

Office Indian Affairs, July 30, 1856.

SIR: I have the honor to submit herewith a tabular statement prepared in this office, and so arranged, as it is believed, will, in connexion with this report, furnish the information requested in your letter of the 19th April last, as well as that called for by the resolution of the House of Representatives, passed on the 17th of the same month, a copy of which was enclosed therewith.

The "statement" referred to is described as a "statement of appropriations made for the Indian Department, (being on account of fulfilling treaties made with the various Indian tribes, current expenses, general and miscellaneous objects, &c.,) by the 31st, 32d, and 33d Congresses; distinguishing those made at each session of each Congress, and also those made on Executive or departmental recommendation; and exhibiting also the amounts drawn from the treasury under each of said several appropriations during the fiscal years ending June 30, 1851, 1852, 1853, 1854, and 1855."

Some general remarks are to be made to explain this statement to persons who may desire to investigate, compare, and digest, the information to be derived from these tables.

And first: the resolution not conforming to the manner of keeping the public accounts, (the appropriations, as well as the expenditures, being entered for "fiscal years," to which they apply, whether they be for deficiencies or otherwise,) has rendered the dissection and compilation of each appropriation to its proper session a matter of difficulty and labor; and as regards this office, the appropriations being so numerous, the separate inquiry on each, whether it was asked for or not, and how much, if not all, was asked, requires care and time for a correct reply.

Greater delay than I desired has therefore resulted in forwarding this statement to your office.

A second remark is, that it will be found that the estimates for the particular appropriations, as exhibited, differ in many items, being greater or less than they would appear on the regular printed estimates submitted to Congress at the beginning of each session.

The general cause for such differences is, that by the operation of some treaty recently ratified, or on the receipt of later and more reliable information, funds that otherwise would have been due or required, have been relinquished or deemed unnecessary, or other and additional payments have become due, or funds needed.

In such cases the attention of the proper committees of Congress has been called, pending the appropriation bills, to the particular facts, and the appropriations made accordingly. On this statement the estimates exhibited are the final result of the additions or reductions in each case.

As a single instance, see estimates for the Creeks, 1st session of 33d Congress, where, at the beginning of the session, \$56,640 was asked for. Pending the appropriation, the delegates of the tribe desired that \$350,000, held in trust by the United States, under the 3d article

of the treaty of November 3, 1838, should be paid, and the interest otherwise payable thereupon cease.

Accordingly, the estimate for \$17,500 interest was withdrawn and \$350,000 asked for. The reduction appears on the first part of the statement, but the \$350,000 is carried, being a special appropriation, into part third.

Similar cases will be discovered by the careful student of this table, comparing it with the annual estimates to 33d Congress, 1st session, in items for the "Delawares," "Shawnees," "Omahas," "Ottoes and Missourias," "Miamies," "Kickapoos," "Sacs and Foxes of Missouri," and "Ioways;" and to the 2d session 33d Congress, with items for "Wyandotts," "Winnebagoes," and other tribes; with all of whom recent treaties had been made.

A third observation is, that where differences appear in other items of estimate from figures that may be found in public documents relative thereto, they may be accounted for from the fact that sometimes where estimates have been submitted conjointly separate appropriations have been made.

In such cases, on this table, the estimates have been divided, and the proper portion carried opposite to each item of appropriation.

A fourth observation is, that some few appropriations have been made on estimates of this office, (and some few, also, without such estimates,) that have not been placed on the books of the treasury, under the control of the Interior Department, and all such items will not be found on these tables.

A fifth observation is, that the resolution calls only for discrimination as to the appropriations made on estimates and those made without. The table does not show, therefore, those cases where estimates have been made and no appropriation resulted; or where the estimate for an appropriation was greater than the appropriation itself. There is, however, such uniformity in the operations of the Indian services that such instances are few and not very material.

The columns of estimates, therefore, may be considered proximately correct, as indicating the estimates made to each session.

A sixth general observation is, that, in all instances where the suggestion of an appropriation has been made to this office by any member of the Finance or Indian Committees of either House, and such suggestion has been favorably responded to, the amount of the appropriation has been considered as estimated for, and carried into the appropriate column of estimates.

A seventh observation is, that instances may be observed in the table in which there has been more drawn from a particular appropriation than appears to have been appropriated. In such cases there were existing balances to the credit of the same account before the appropriations on this table were made.

As affording facilities for comparison and elucidation, I have divided the statement into three parts: part 1st, carrying on it all the appropriations, &c., for "fulfilling treaties," and constituting thus a distinct class; part 2d, all those for salaries and regular expenses of conducting the service; and part 3d, all the general incidental ex-

penses, miscellaneous payments, claims, and all other objects not embraced in parts 1st and 2nd.

The expenses of the Indian office, pay of Commissioner, clerks, messengers, &c., form a supplemental statement, No. 2.

Remarks on Statement No. 1, part 1.

It will be observed by a glance at this part of the statement that the appropriations by the 33d Congress for fulfilling treaties with Indian tribes, and the estimates that correspond thereto, are in the aggregate considerably greater than those for the two Congresses preceding.

This is referable to the negotiation and ratification of new treaties, in 1854 and 1855, under which the Indian titles to large tracts of land have been extinguished in Kansas and Nebraska; and the treaties with the Winnebagoes, the Chippewas of Lake Superior, the Chippewas of the Mississippi, and the Wyandotts, have also required large appropriations, in return for which the government has received a full equivalent.

The new treaties in Oregon and Washington Territories, and the inauguration of the policy of colonizing the Texas Indians, have also required heavy appropriations.

In addition to the payments for lands, in the case of the semi-civilized frontier tribes, the policy was introduced of substituting aggregate payments, in a few instalments, in purchase of subsisting annuities of a permanent character.

The basis of this purchase was highly advantageous to the United States, then, as now, engaged in purchasing its outstanding stocks at a high premium, and was also beneficial to the Indians, who, about to receive permanent separate homes, require money to improve their lands, purchase stock and farming implements, and build houses &c.

These payments to them are worth far more than a yearly interest on principal sums at 5 or 6 per cent., and yet are not costing the United States near so much as the government readily would have paid for the purchase of a stock similarly conditioned.

To separate all causes of increase in detail would involve greater prolixity than ought to characterize this report, and hence only the results of the combined causes above mentioned are pointed out below, viz: the actual appropriation and estimates being reduced by what they would have been had not the new treaties intervened.

To the first of these sums there may with propriety be added \$135,050, appropriated by the act of 31st May, 1854, to supply deficiencies, this sum being needed to enable the department to remit and pay moneys under the Sioux treaties of 1851, at the proper season of each year.

The aggregates, then, are \$664,971 81 and 1,023,920 85. The estimates and appropriations to the first session of the 33d Congress, viz: \$1,505,762 76, less \$664,971 81, are \$840,790 95, and those to second session, viz: \$1,804,332 52, less \$1,023,920 85, are \$780,411 67. The increase of annuities in 1854 and 1855, as just shown, embraces the financial stipulations of thirteen new treaties with fourteen tribes, and six with tribes west of the Rocky mountains.

The causes of the large increase in this class of appropriations and expenditures are thus, to a great extent, beyond the regulation of the Executive or department; and for this increase of payments a more than corresponding equivalent is secured to the United States, and is flowing into the treasury as part of the revenue from lands.

Remarks on part 2d.

This part of the statements embraces the ordinary and regular expenses for paying and sustaining in duty the various officers of the government connected with the Indian service, (excepting the pay of Commissioner and his clerks, &c.)

The aggregate of appropriations exhibit a decided increase in these expenses. The Indian service has become of late years almost co-extensive with the boundaries of the country.

Additional agents in Utah and New Mexico and on the eastern slope of the Rocky mountains have been authorized by law; and the officers in California, and in Oregon and Washington Territories have been increased in number and rank. The annual compensation of all is, therefore, greater now than six years ago.

As illustrative of the growth of this branch of the public service, it may be noted that the following officers were created by the Thirty-third Congress:

Additional annual expense for pay of these officers, and involving a corresponding increase in the number of interpreters, and an increase in contingent and travelling expenses. This increase brings with it an increase in the number of letters received and sent, the number and amount of accounts acted on, and all other office duties.

It is proper, however, to state that all the funds appropriated to meet salaries authorized by law are not always drawn from the treasury, there being occasional vacancies in office. In some of the class of appropriations now under review, large balances have accumulated from this cause; and on the 30th June, 1855, these balances had accumulated to such amounts that it has only been necessary to ask of the 34th Congress, at its first session, the appropriation of several sums, the aggregate of which is less than one-half the sum appropriated for this entire class of objects at the last session of Congress.

Remarks on part 3d.

A comprehensive glance at the third part of the statement No. 1 of appropriations, &c., for general expenditures, special payments, claims, &c., induces the conviction that within the past few years that class of appropriations and expenditures has diminished nearly as rapidly as the regular appropriations and expenditures have increased.

The aggregates are as follows;

Appropriations by 31st Congress, \$3,385,115 49; by 32d Congress, \$2,035,797 75; by 33d Congress, \$2,278,738 41. Aggregate amount drawn on account in the three fiscal years ending June 30, 1853, \$5,296,747 50. Aggregate amount drawn on account for two fiscal years ending June 30, 1855, \$1,451,323 37. If attention was directed to separating again the items of appropriation exhibited on class 3d, distinguishing those made during the period for subsisting and colo-

nizing Indians, and the general expense of pacification, presents, &c., from those for arrearages, claims, &c., it would still more particularly be shown that a constant increase has attended the expense of the regular administration of the service, whilst there has been a decided decrease in the payments on claims, &c., particularly within the past three years. On glancing at the amounts drawn during the five years, viz: for year ending June 30, 1851, \$2,728,217 86; during year ending June 30, 1852, \$2,555,217 86; during year ending June 30, 1853, \$3,721,428 60; during year ending June 30, 1854, \$1,343,513 94; and for the year ending June 30, 1855, \$2,722,360 31. The policy prevailing during the two years last mentioned of drawing funds from the treasury only as required for actual payment is indicated, and that policy has resulted in a great decrease of the amounts drawn; a decrease which is greater for the year ending June 30, 1854, than it would have been had a similar policy prevailed during the administration of this department by your predecessors in office; inasmuch as the actual disbursements of the year ending June 30, 1854, were, to a considerable extent, made by means of funds that had been drawn from the treasury prior to the 4th day of March, 1853.

Upon the statement No 2 of appropriations, estimates, and amounts drawn for the pay of the Commissioner and the clerks and messengers in his office, &c., only two brief observations are appropriate.

The act passed and approved March 3, 1853, provided for the classification of the clerks and an increase of their pay. An additional compensation was accorded to a portion of the clerks and to the messengers, &c., by the acts of 22d April and 4th August, 1854. These enactments account for nearly all the increase in appropriations, estimates, and disbursements for pay of clerks, &c.

By your direction, in June, 1854, this office was removed to the building on 7th street, opposite the city post office. The rent paid, the expenses of removing to and fitting up the rooms, and the hire of necessary watchmen induced an extraordinary expense during the year ending June 30, 1855.

As a concluding observation, I may be excused for saying that the general results on these statements do not show so large an increase in the entire appropriations and disbursements under the supervision of this bureau as I had expected. The actual jurisdiction of this office, through the various agents and superintendents during the past three years, has become more direct where it had been established, and greatly extended, as to the area of territory and number of tribes which its policy embraces, particularly in Oregon and Washington Territories, and within the limits of Kansas and Nebraska. A large increase of agents and employés has been necessary, and heavy expenditures for presents to the wild tribes have been required. The current office business, in its files, records, registers, number of accounts, and all other tests of amount, is now double what it was three years ago, and still increasing, and when considering that all, and more than all, the increase of the appropriations and expenditures in this branch of the service during the period reviewed is accounted for, as hereinbefore shown, for purchase of lands, and pre-payment of liabilities to Indian tribes, long since incurred, I feel at liberty to

express my gratification that the statements now submitted exhibit results so creditable to the administration and so accordant to the best interest of the government and the people.

SIR: Referring to my report of yesterday, with which was submitted a statement in reply to the resolution of the House of Representatives, so far as the means were at my disposal properly to do so, and in reply to the concluding suggestion in your letter of the 19th of that month, that I should report if any defalcations occurred in this branch of the service since July 1, 1850, and the amount in each case, and what has been done to protect the interest of the United States, I have the honor to state, that the individual accounts of officers charged with Indian moneys are not kept in this office in a manner that will enable me to report with that certainty and accuracy that should characterize a reply to the resolution in that respect. The attention of the Treasury Department has doubtless been directed to that branch of the inquiry, as the accounts of officers in the Indian service are of file in the Second Auditor's office.

The names of several individuals who are now out of office, and after a reasonable time have not satisfactorily accounted for all the public moneys placed in their hands, are known, and might be stated from recollection; but in matters that are so linked with the reputation and private characters of individuals, I deem it improper to make up a list in that way.

The demand for, and collection of, balances due the United States from Indian agents, superintendents, &c., now out of office, devolves on the officers of the treasury; and I would respectfully recommend that the response to that branch of the resolution be left to that department, so far as relates to the Indian service. The fact that there is a balance claimed by this office to be due the United States from a party, can scarcely be considered a "defalcation" till after an adjustment of his accounts, and a demand for the payment of such balance has been made, and the payment refused or unreasonably delayed.
