## REPORT.

The Sommittee on Military Affairs, to whom was referred so much of the annual message of the President and accompanying documents as relates to the raising of four additional regiments, and to whom were also referred the resolutions of the State of Texas, instructing their mators and representatives to urge upon Congress the passage of a law for raising and equipping a regiment of Texas mounted volunteers, have deemed it their duty to consider these subjects in connexion, as both refer to the increase of the military force of the country.

After full consideration of the subject, the committee have come to the nclusion that the present wants of the country do not require an increase of the permanent, regular military force of the country, and yet, that the emergencies of frequent Indian depredations on the frontier of Texas, the disturbances in Utah, and the hostile attitude of some of the Indian tribes on the northwestern frontier, make it andent and proper that an additional temporary force should be at once placed at the disposal of the President, to meet present emergencies and pending contingencies.

nowledging the policy of a regular military establishment for per military necessities, the committee believe, that for all temporary arposes, volunteers are fully adequate, and that their employment, in such cases, is best suited to the spirit and character of our institutions. They therefore report the accompanying bill and recommend its passage.
