SIR: I have the honor to request that the estimates of deficiencies for the fiscal year 1891 and prior years, under the title of Foreign Intercourse, which were prepared by the accounting officers of the Treasury, and are embraced in House Executive Document No. 205, Fifty-second Congress, first session, be re-submitted to Congress at its present session, and that there be similarly resubmitted, similar estimates which were embodied in Senate Executive Document No. 139, Fifty-second Congress, first session.							
The necessity for these estimates being particularly well known to your Department, where they were wholly computed and prepared, I hope that their resubmission will be accompanied by an urgent recommendation from your Department in their behalf.

Unexpected emergencies have arisen, such as the necessity for replacing the entire outfit of fire hose in the two buildings.							
The present force of employes is insufficient to properly carry on the work of the Museum, since reductions detrimental to the service have been made, in order to obviate the necessity for a larger deficiency estimate. More watchmen are required in order to insure the safety of the collections, and more laborers and cleaners to keep the exhibition halls in a presentable condition. The regular clerical work of the Museum has fallen in arrears, owing to the fact that it has been necessary for the clerks to devote much of their time to matters connected with the World's Columbian Exposition. It will be necessary, about February 1, to restore to the Museum roll the names of at least 9 employes temporarily engaged in work for the Exposition, and now paid from the Exposition appropriation.

Last year, when the appropriation was \$1,000 more than this year, and the greatest care was used to prevent waste, it was found necessary to close the offices on several occasions, on account of lack of fuel to heat the building. A deficiency of \$2,000 is therefore asked for.							
It was necessary to reduce the number of telephones in order that money should be available to renew the wires, which, from long use, had become entirely worn out.

SIR: By the act of August 30, 1890 (26 Stat. L., 388), Congress appropriated \$3,000 for an elevator for the Pension building. Of this sum there remains available \$2,917.25. Due advertisement under the law was made for proposals, and the amount of the bid for the required elevator, complete, was \$4,108.75; hence the accompanying estimate for a deficiency appropriation of \$1,300 is forwarded, in order that the Department may be enabled to procure an elevator for the Pension building, as already contemplated by law.							
In this connection I beg to call your attention to an appropriation now on the books of the Treasury to the credit of this Department of \$3,000 "for the purchase and putting in position of two boiler-iron water tanks, with necessary pipe connections from pumps" (25 Stat.
