Washington, February 23, 1886.

SIR: Referring to the estimate submitted by this office for clerical force for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1887, I have to say that upon a further examination of the duties and qualifications of the force employed it is evident that some of the clerks now receiving salaries of \$1,000 per annum are well deserving of an increase to \$1,200, while some of those receiving \$1,400 are not deserving of more than \$1,200 In order, therefore, to a proper readjustment of the force, so that justice may be done to all, I have to recommend that the number of clerks at \$1,400 be reduced from thirteen to ten; that the number at \$1,000 be increased from nine to fifteen, and that the number at \$1,000 be reduced from twelve to nine.

No increase in the number of clerks or in the appropriation asked for will be needed to carry out these recommendations, as will be seen by the following statement:
