

Sin: The accompanying report is respectfully submitted in compliance with so much of your instructions of the 6th September last, as requires a statement of the unexpended amount of any appropriation for any purpose or object under my charge, at the last dates to which report have been received; together with the amount that will necessarily be expended for such purpose or object up to the 1st day of January next. The report is prepared in duplicate, and according to the form furnished by the chief clerk of the War Department.

PAYMASTER GENERAL'S OFFICE, November 1, 1842.

Sin: I have the honor herewith to submit the estimates of the Pay Department for the first six months of the year 1843, and for the new fiscal year, commencing the 1st of July, 1843, and terminating the 30th of June, 1844.

Paper A, is the estimate for the pay and allowances of the army from the 1st of January, 1843, to the 30th of June following, embracing the present organization, and two thousand supernumerary privates of the late organization, amounting to - \$1,053,086 88

From which I have deducted 484,000 dollars under the head of pay, 80,000 dollars under the head of subsistence, and 20,000 dollars under the head of forage; making a

total deduction of - - - 584,000 00

being the surplus of former appropriations not required for the year 1842, and leaving a balance of 5469,086 88 to be appropriated.

Paper B, is the estimate for the pay and allowances of the army for the new fiscal year, commencing the 1st of July, 1843, and terminating the 30th of June, 1844, amounting to 1,935,103 dollars. This is 467,072 dollars less than the estimate for the year 1842, and differs from it in the following particulars:

Paper C, is an estimate for the pay and allowances of the Military Academy for the first six months of the year 1843, amounting to 52,907 dollars 80 cents; and paper D, the estimate for the same, from the 1st of July, 1843, to the 30th June, 1844, amounting to 106,145 dollars. The only difference between this, and the estimate for 1842, is in the item for the pay of the commander of the corps of cadets; this being sixty dollars less than the previous estimate.

Paper E, is the estimate for the expenses of the Paymaster General's office, for the first six months of the year 1843, amounting to 3,912 dollars 50 cents; from which I have deducted 362 dollars 50 cents, being a surplus of former appropriations for contingencies not required for the year 1842. Paper F, is an estimate for the expenses of the same, for the fiscal year ending the 30th of June, 1844, amounting to 7,825 dollars; being the

same as the estimate for the year 1842.

Each estimate has references to the laws, &c., as required by the 14th section of the act of 26th August, 1842. The references on the estimates for the army and Military Academy are to the volume of military laws compiled by Colonel Cross. This was considered most convenient, inasmuch as several laws have to be referred to, in connexion with many of the items, all of which are contained in the volume named; it being also the volume heretofore used by the Committee of Ways and Means. The references on the estimates, for office expenses, are to the volumes of the Unites States laws.

· EXPLANATIONS AND DETAILS OF THE FOREGOING ESTIMATE.

1.—ARMAMENT OF FORTIFICATIONS.

Required for the purchase of sea-coast and garrison guns and mortars for the different forts on the seaboard, and on the gulf and lake frontiers, and for the purchase of the materials for, and the manufacture of, gun carriages. This includes also the compensation of the superintendent at the foundries, provided for by the 5th section of the act of 23d August, 1842, chapter 186, page 114. Annual appropriations for this object have been made for many years past, and the armament prepared as far as the funds

would permit.

It has been often stated, and is well known, that a very large sum could be advantageously devoted annually towards completing the armament of the fortifications, and that many years will be required to effect that object with the limited means usually allowed to it; nevertheless, only a small sum is now embraced in this estimate, from an apprehended deficiency of means that can be conveniently devoted thereto, and under instructions to place all the estimates for the ordnance service at the lowest possible amount consistent with a continuance of operations. These remarks are made to explain the cause of a reduction in the several items usually embraced in the estimates from this office.

2.—ORDNANCE AND ORDNANCE STORES.

The estimate under this head is intended for the purchase of field artillery, and of the materials for, and the manufacture of, field carriages and caissons; for the purchase of accourtements and equipments for cavalry, artillery, infantry, and riflemen; of shot and shells for field service, and materials for the preparation of ammunition. The usual annual appropriation for these objects has been \$100,000.

3.—ORDNANCE SERVICE.

This amount is required for defraying the ordinary expenses attending the preservation of arms and of other ordnance stores and public property at the arsenals and depots; for preparing ammunition for the usual service of the troops; for the purchase of fuel, stationery, and forage, and for incidental expenses at the arsenals. The usual annual appropriation for this purpose has been \$100,000.

4.-NATIONAL ARMORIES.

The usual annual appropriation for the manufacture of arms at these places has been \$360,000.

5.—IMPROVEMENTS AT SPRINGFIELD ARMORY.

Annual appropriations for keeping in repair the national armories, and providing new machinery, have been made for many years. The details of this estimate are as follows:

Sir: In compliance with your directions of yesterday's date, to be furnished with an estimate, in duplicate, of the amounts required to be appropriated for arrearages, and half-pay pensions, payable through this office, I have the honor to state: That, of the appropriation of \$600, made the 18th February, 1841, for arrearages payable through the Second Auditor's office, a sufficient balance remains to meet all demands that may be made on it up to the end of the year 1843. But as whatever sum may remain unexpended at that period will be carried to the surplus fund, I would beg leave to recommend that an amount of \$500 may be asked for, to discharge such claims as may be presented for settlement between the 1st day of January and the 30th of June, 1844.

The sum asked for is merely conjectural, being founded on previous

demands; nor is there any special act of Congress to refer to.

Under the law of the 3d March, 1817, "to provide for the prompt settlement of public accounts," the Secretary of the Treasury, under date of the 13th of that month, assigned to the Second Auditor "the adjustment of the arrearages of the military accounts which accrued between the 30th day of June, 1815, and the 1st day of January, 1817," and his instructions have been sanctioned by many subsequent appropriations by Congress.

The payments of half-pay pensions made through this office are too limited to require a special appropriation. Should any claim of that description be made, it can, as heretofore for the last few years, be paid out of

the amount estimated for by the Third Auditor.

Note.—It is understood that the Government is obligated to support, for the exclusive benefit of the Indians, smiths' establishments. That support requires a smith, an assistant, a striker, (tools, if necessary,) and iron, steel, and coal, for the use of the shops; for, without these, the appropriation for a smith would be of no use to the Indians.

The department estimates as necessary for each shop: I ton of iron, at \$120; 250 lbs. steel, at \$50; and coal, at \$50. Some agents estimate for a larger sum for these items as necessary. The law of June 30, 1634, fixes the rate of pay to smiths, \$480; assistants, \$240; and for tools and use of shop, \$120. It also fixes the rate of pay to farmers, mechanics, and teachers, at from \$480 to \$600; and the department adds an allowance to farmers, for services of their wives as indispensable helps, so as to increase their pay to \$800 a year.

This estimate conforms precisely to the act of August 26, 1842; but it would be in better proportion if, in the office of the Secretary of War, the sum of \$250 were taken from the item for extra clerks for the half year, and half of it added to the item for blank books, binding, and

stationery, and the other half to that for miscellaneous items; making the one \$425, and the other \$400.

Accounts, amounting to \$195 57, have been presented for arrearages of subscriptions to newspapers, discontinued in consequence of the limitation in the act of August 26, 1842, which cannot be paid in consequence of that limitation. There are other similar accounts outstanding, the amount of which is not known, but which, probably, does not exceed \$50. The money is justly due, and ought to be paid, and authority should therefore be given to pay them out of the amounts estimated, and to be appropriated for the contingent expenses of the office of the Secretary of War for the first six months of 1843, which can probably be made sufficient.
