A secretary of legation to Sardinia, who shall receive an annual compensation of one thousand eight hundred dollars.

By the act (Chap. CXXXVI) to amend an act entitled "An act in addition to the acts prohibiting the slave trade."

An agent or agents to receive upon the coast of Africa the recaptured Africans sent back by the United States to Africa. Compensation not stated.

By the act (Chap. OXLII) to amend an act approved the 3d day of March, 1847, entitled "An act to establish a port of entry at Saluria, in the State of Texas, and for other purposes."

A deputy collector for the port of Corpus Christi. Compensation five hundred dollars per annum and fees.

By the act (Chap. CLVII) making appropriations for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian Department, and for fulfilling treaty stipulations with various Indian tribes, for the year ending June 30, 1861.

Two teachers of manual labor schools for the Pawnee Indians. Aggregate compensation twelve hundred dollars.

Two blacksmiths, one of whom to be a gunsmith and tinsmith, for the Pawnee Indians. Aggregate compensation twelve hundred dollars.

Farmer for the Pawnees. Compensation twelve hundred dollars.

Two superintendents of Indian Affairs in California, at a salary each of thirty-six hundred dollars per annum.

Each superintendent to appoint a supervisor for his district, at an annual salary of eighteen hundred dollars, and four laborers, at fifty dollars per month.
