In explanation of the estimate for printing and binding for the Department of the Interior. (See page 2.)

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR.

January 4, 1882.

SIR: I have the honor to submit the following estimate, with a recommendation that the necessary legislation be requested, in order to provide as early as possible for the deficiency.

For printing and binding for the Department of the Interior and its several bureaus and offices, to be executed under the direction of the Public Printer, \$58,350, being a deficiency for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1882.

This deficiency occurs on account of the failure of Congress to appropriate the amount estimated for by the department. The estimate, for \$278,350, as submitted to Congress, was made as small as possible considering the amount of work necessary to be done, but in making the appropriation only the sum of \$220,000 was provided.

The amount of business transacted in this department is constantly increasing, particularly in the Patent and Pension Offices, and to provide for this increase additional expenditures necessarily have to be made on account of printing and binding.

The cost of printing and binding for this department (not including the Census Office) during the fiscal year 1880-'81 was \$245,043.06, but in order to confine the expenses to this limit a large amount of important work was postponed and other necessary work suspended.

The estimated cost of the work ordered for this department from the Public Printer during the first five months of the current fiscal year, or up to December 1, 1881, is \$165,356.25; but during the remainder of the fiscal year the average cost of the work necessary to be ordered monthly will be considerably reduced, as the above amount includes the estimated cost for one year of certain classes of work which have been ordered for the Patent Office, and which are delivered regularly every week.

While the Patent Office is a source of revenue to the government, in order to produce this revenue, which is annually increasing, the appropriation for printing and binding is depended upon to meet the expenses of printing the specifications, decisions, Patent Office Gazette, &c., which are sold at a profit to the government. The cost of the printing and binding for that office alone, during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1881, was \$142,432.47.

Letter and statement from the Commissioner of Patents, marked respectively inclosures 1 and 2, in relation to the printing and binding for that office are transmitted herewith.

With the appropriation of this department for printing and binding, it is necessary to provide all the blanks, blank-books, official reports,

publications, &c., required for the offices under this department, as follows:

SIR: In reply to a communication of the honorable Secretary of the Interior of the 12th instant, calling for an estimate of the cost of the printing and binding that will be required for this office during the remainder of the current fiscal year, &c., I have the honor to state:

That the estimate, \$152,500, for printing and binding for the current fiscal year submitted by this office in November, 1880, to the department, and by it embodied in the annual estimates laid before Congress at the last session (see book of estimates, p. 161), was very carefully prepared from the best basis obtainable, and submitted as the minimum amount necessary to enable the office to conduct its business and properly issue its publications. The specific purposes, itemized, and total amounts were as follows:

Since the above estimate was prepared, the fiscal year 1880-'81 has expired, and the bills for the year have been rendered, showing the actual cost from June 30, 1880, to June 30, 1881, for printing and binding for this office under the several heads mentioned, to have been as follows:

Which fully justifies the above estimate for 1881-'82.

It will be observed that of the whole expenditure but \$20,185.54 was for the usual incidental expenses of an office, such as blanks, blank forms, blank books, &c., in which curtailment is possible by economy.

The great expenditure was for the printing of specifications of patents as issued, and the publications consequent thereon, as required by law, which can neither be dispensed with nor restricted; nor can the amount of work or cost be regulated by this office, but depends solely upon the number of patents issued, as do the revenues derived by government from the issuance of patents. These are steadily increasing. The number of patents issued during the year 1880 was 13,441, while the number issued during 1881 will be 16,113, an increase of over 19 per cent. A corresponding increase in the cost of the branches of work depending upon the number of patents issued would more than cover the difference between the cost of printing and binding during the year 1880-'81 \$142,432.47, and the estimate for 1881-'82, \$152,500.

Further, the bills for July, August, September, and October, the first four months of the present fiscal year, have been received. These, extended at the same rate over the full twelve months of the fiscal year, would make the cost of the classes of work just recited for the year 1881-'82 a fraction over 19 per cent. greater than the cost of similar classes of work in 1880-'81.

With the estimate of \$152,500, originally submitted, fortified by, first, the actual cost during the year 1880-'81; second, the increase of 19 per cent. in the current work of the office; and, third, by the increased cost of the work during the first four months of 1881-'82, I am only apprehensive that the sum estimated, \$152,500, will be insufficient.

I am informed that while the full amount estimated, \$152,500, was submitted to Congress with the estimates of the other bureaus of the

department, aggregating in all \$278,350, the sum of \$220,000 only was appropriated, and in the distribution of this amount, *pro rata*, to the several bureaus, this office is apportioned but \$120,531.70. This leaves a deficiency of \$31,968.30 to be provided.

It also appears that for work ordered and in progress, but not completed at the close of the last fiscal year, bills to the amount of \$4,792.38 have been paid from the appropriation for the current fiscal year, which was not contemplated at the time the estimate for \$152,500 was made, which makes a further deficiency of this amount, \$4,792.38.

The work of preparing an abridgement of patents directed by the act of March 3, 1881 (see chap. 148, U. S. S.), has advanced so far that if its progress is not interrupted, three volumes of 1,000 pages each, containing the abridgement, claims, and drawings of probably 12,000 patents can be issued during the fiscal year, if the necessary appropriations for printing and publishing are made. For the printing of these abridgements and claims, for the preparation of the pages of three volumes, the sum of \$6,000 is required. While the act directed the printing of an edition of ten thousand, no specific appropriation therefor was made. I have, therefore, respectfully to state that the following further sums in addition to the apportionment of \$120,531.70 from the departmental appropriation will be required for printing and binding for the Patent Office for the current fiscal year, to wit:

And to ask that the appropriation of this amount may be obtained as early as possible for the following reasons: First, the Government Printing Office is required to estimate the cost under each requisition before entering upon the work, and the practice of the department is to charge these estimates when received against the apportionment to the office ordering the work, and as a single requisition is made for the whole year by this office for the work under each of the items numbered 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 9, 10, and 11, in the above schedule of estimates, the aggregate of these yearly estimates, together with the incidental work ordered, has already more than absorbed the entire apportionment of \$120,531.70, and there is not only no margin left upon which to base necessary requisitions, but an apparent deficiency already exists; second, that the publication of the abridgement of patents may go forward as contemplated by the act directing it. The necessity for the continuation of the gradual printing of the specifications of old patents and the reprinting of those exhausted, to be attached to the drawings already reprinted, contemplated by items 7 and 8, in the estimate, has been so fully shown and is so well known to the department that other mention of this work is unnecessary in this communication except to add that the sale of these printed copies is one of the substantial sources of revenue to the office and to the government, as the price obtained therefor is more than threefold the cost. The custodian of specifications reports the receipts from this source during the past year as averaging over \$100 per day.

SIR: Owing to the large number of new distilleries registered and operated, and the increased production of distilled spirits, the expense for salaries of storekeepers, and fees and expenses of gaugers during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1881, was considerably in excess of the amount appropriated.

There are now on file in this office accounts for which there is no appropriation available, as follows:

For salaries of storekeepers.....	\$36,531 00
For fees and expenses of gaugers.....	19,946 70
Total.....	56,477 70

There are also accounts for the same period for express charges, telegraphing, stationery, attorneys' fees, expenses of distillery surveyors, and other miscellaneous expenses, which have been adjusted by the accounting officers but not paid, amounting to \$8,381.87; total, \$64,859.57.

In my annual report, on page 16, I have recommended that \$65,000 be appropriated to meet this deficiency, but as it is believed that there are a number of similar accounts accruing in this same period which have not yet been filed, I would recommend that an additional appropriation of \$68,000 for "salaries and expenses of subordinate officers of internal revenue for 1881" be requested.

APPENDIX E.

In relation to the estimate for "Distinctive paper for United States securities" (page 5).

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,
OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY,
Washington, D. C., November 1, 1881.

SIR: I have the honor to state that, in submitting an estimate in 1880, of the amount of appropriation required for distinctive paper for United States notes, silver certificates, and other securities for the fiscal year

ending June 30, 1882, the amount was stated at \$81,000 which would be required for the purchase of 10,000,000 sheets. In making the appropriation, Congress reduced the amount to \$25,000, thus providing for about three million sheets, which is at least two million sheets less than the amount required to meet the requisitions of the Treasurer of the United States for United States notes for the current fiscal year.

The large consumption of United States notes is owing to the fact that the department has been compelled, by the limited appropriations of the past few years, to use the paper as soon as it is manufactured. The notes being printed on unseasoned paper, lack durability, and are soon returned to the department, worn out or mutilated, to be replaced at the expense of the government.

In view of these facts, it would seem to be a measure of economy to use only seasoned paper in preparing United States securities. I therefore respectfully recommend that Congress be requested to make an additional appropriation of \$24,420 for distinctive paper for United States securities for the fiscal year 1882, which will enable the department to fill the requisitions of the Treasurer of the United States and secure a small supply of paper for use during the next fiscal year.

It is proper to state that unless an additional appropriation be granted, the manufacture of distinctive paper must cease on or before February 1, 1882, and the force at the mill be discharged.

SIR: If by a personal interview I can better explain to you the claim of Mr. E. Eveleth's daughters, I will most gladly wait upon you, but this memorandum will I think save your time and enable you to reach a just conclusion.

At the time that Mr. Eveleth was appointed commissioner, I acted as the organ of the court in explaining to him what would be the duties, compensation, &c., of the commissionership.

At that time the cases about to be referred had been before the court, and it was known to me that the claimants would recover; and it is a matter of great regret to me that I did not foresee that others might be referred in which the government would recover and the commissioner be left without remuneration for his services.

The cases where he reported against claimants were dismissed, and are no longer claims upon the fund, and his services constitute a proper charge, therefore, upon the abandoned or captured property; and I earnestly request that the secretary will investigate the claim and do justice in the premises, or that he will make such recommendation to Congress as will enable him to pay this out of the unexpended appropriation for

the defense of cotton cases which has lapsed and been covered into the Treasury.

Having been officially instrumental in getting Mr. Eveleth to do this work, I feel morally bound to see, so far as I can, that he be paid for it.

Explanation of estimate for "contingent expenses, Office of Secretary of War." (See page 9.)

WAR DEPARTMENT,
Washington City, December 19, 1881.

SIR: I have the honor to report that there is every probability of a deficiency arising in the appropriation for the contingent expenses of

the office of the Secretary of War for the current fiscal year to the amount of two thousand dollars. In explanation of this deficiency, to supply which an additional appropriation will be required, I beg to state that since the occupation by the War Department of the wing of the new State, War, and Navy Department building, the expenses of the office have been materially augmented, and during the last and present fiscal year a considerable additional expenditure has arisen out of the increase in prices of stationery supplied under the annual contract, such increase being not short of \$1,500 per annum.

During the last quarter of the previous fiscal year the appropriation was found to be inadequate for the purchase of necessary stationery, and all the stock on hand was exhausted prior to the close of the fiscal year, and it is inevitable that this will occur again this year.

It will be also necessary to have the annual appropriation for the next fiscal year increased in the like sum of two thousand dollars for similar reasons.

Explanation of the estimate for \$5,187.42 for pay of the Military Academy (page 12).

HEADQUARTERS DEPARTMENT OF WEST POINT,
UNITED STATES MILITARY ACADEMY,
West Point, N. Y., October 15, 1879.

SIR: In the year 1876 the candidates for admission to the Military Academy were ordered to report at West Point in the month of April, and passed their examination for admission in the latter part of that month, two months before the usual time. They were immediately placed on duty and under instruction to prepare them for the visit of the corps of cadets to the Centennial Exhibition at Philadelphia. But these candidates were not formally admitted to the Academy until the 14th of June, the date of graduation of the first class of that year. They were thus subjected to all the usual expenses of cadets, without receiving any pay, for a period of six weeks after they had passed their examination for admission. Some of these cadets made the deficiency good by extra receipts of money from home, while others are still in debt to the treasurer of the Academy.

Of the cadets admitted at that time, forty-two are now in the corps. Of these, nineteen might lawfully have been admitted on the 1st of May to fill vacancies then existing. The remaining twenty-three could not be admitted till the 14th of June, when their predecessors graduated.

It is respectfully submitted that the nineteen are lawfully entitled to a correction of their record of admission to the 1st of May, when they were *actually* admitted; and that the remaining twenty-three are entitled *in equity* to pay for the six weeks preceding their admission, during which time they were on duty.

If these views are approved by the honorable the Secretary of War, I re

spectfully suggest that Congress be asked to make the necessary appropriation to cover this deficiency in the pay of these cadets.

HEADQUARTERS FORT SNELLING, MINN.,

October 5, 1881.

SIR: I have the honor to report that, in accordance with the provisions of Special Orders No. 110, C. S., Headquarters Department of Dakota, I have collected the Montana Nez Perce war claims of 1877, as provided for by the act of Congress approved March 3, 1881.

A complete abstract of all the claims made, and which should, in my opinion, be allowed, is herewith inclosed, together with the evidence supporting them, amounting to the sum of \$6,879.

Several claims, which did not come within the meaning of the law, I have rejected. These I do not deem it necessary to transmit. The claims for horses and arms lost in the military service and amounting to the sum of \$3,750, were, in accordance with the provisions of Special Orders No. 110, turned over to Col. T. H. Ruger, Eighteenth Infantry, commanding District of Montana, for such action as is required by the law.

As soon as these claims are returned to me by Colonel Ruger they will be transmitted to you.

Under the second section of the act five claims for pensions will be approved by me; four of these are now in my possession, and the fifth will probably reach me in a few days, when these will be sent you.

[Special Orders No. 110.]

I. In accordance with instructions from the office of the Adjutant-General of the Army, under date of May 9, 1881, as soon as practicable after the 1st of July next, Col. John Gibbon, Seventh Infantry, will proceed to Helena, Mont., taking station at that place, and visiting such other points in the Territory of Montana as he may find necessary in carrying out these orders under the act approved March 3, 1881, entitled "An act for the relief of the citizens of Montana who served with the United States troops in the war with the Nez Percés," &c. Colonel

Gibbon will collect all claims under the act cited, with the evidence necessary for their adjustment; he will investigate and report what claims should be allowed to individuals under this act, and to what amount. First Lieut. J. W. Jacobs, regimental quartermaster Seventh Infantry, will accompany Colonel Gibbon to assist him in the performance of this duty.

Such of Colonel Gibbon's reports, &c., as may, under the act cited, require the action of the commander and chief quartermaster of the District of Montana will, on completion by Colonel Gibbon, be transmitted by him to the commanding officer District of Montana for such action as the act referred to requires, on completion of which the papers will be returned to Colonel Gibbon.

Colonel Gibbon will make a full report of all the action taken under this order, embracing that required by the act cited.

The papers and evidence in each claim will be made up separately, and the whole will be accompanied by a full list of all claims under this act, giving the amount claimed and that to which, under all the evidence obtained, in his opinion the claimants are justly entitled. Post commanders will furnish Colonel Gibbon such transportation as may be necessary in traveling to carry out the above orders.

AN ACT for the relief of citizens of Montana who served with the United States troops in the war with the Nez Percés, and for the relief of the heirs of such as were killed in such service.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That each volunteer who joined the forces of the United States, in the Territory of Montana, during the war with the Nez Percé Indians, shall be paid one dollar per day during the term of such service, from the time that he left his home until he was returned thereto, including all time spent in hospital under treatment by such as received wounds or other injuries in such service.

SEC. 2. That all persons who were wounded or disabled in such service, and the heirs of all who were killed in such service, shall be entitled to all the benefits of the pension laws, in the same manner and to the same extent as if they had been duly mustered into the regular or volunteer forces of the United States.

SEC. 3. That all horses and arms lost in such service shall be paid for at their actual value, to be duly ascertained by the commanding officer of the District of Montana: *Provided*, That no payment shall be made for such losses except upon the statement of the commanding officer of the United States troops, or such other officer of the Regular Army as might be in control of the volunteers at the time of such loss, and such other proofs as may be required by the commanding officer and the United States quartermaster for the District of Montana to establish the fact that such losses were made in the service of the United States.

Explanation of estimates for arrears of pay and bounty (page 15).

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,
SECOND AUDITOR'S OFFICE,
Washington, D. C., January 7, 1882.

SIR: In transmitting the accompanying estimate of deficiencies in appropriations, I have the honor to invite your attention to my letter of December 20, 1880, printed on page 35 of Ex. Doc. No. 44, H. R., Forty-sixth Congress, third session, in relation to the necessity and justice of making an appropriation in advance for the payment of arrears of pay and bounty due to soldiers of the regular and volunteer forces. I then estimated that the sum of \$300,000 would be required to pay claims to be certified by the accounting officers of the Treasury Department up to June 30, 1882. By act of March 3, 1881, the sum of \$250,000 was appropriated for this purpose, being \$50,000 less than the estimate. The amount drawn from the Treasury up to this date is \$204,417.78, leaving a balance of \$45,582.22 available for the remainder of the current fiscal year. The Paymaster-General has been requested to cause \$40,000 of this balance to be drawn out of the Treasury and placed to the official credit of the paymaster charged with the duty of paying arrears of pay and bounty, to meet claims already certified or in process of settlement. This will reduce the available balance to \$5,582.22, and the appropriation will probably be exhausted on or before April 30, 1882, after which date payments will necessarily be suspended until a further appropriation shall have been made by Congress.

I estimate that \$350,000 will be needed to pay such claims for arrears of pay and bounty as shall be certified up to June 30, 1883, as follows:

For the remainder of this fiscal year.....	\$50,000
For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1883.....	300,000

The sums required for clothing are made necessary by the increased cost of material under contracts, present year, over the contract prices of last year upon which the estimates were based, by the increased cost of manufacturing the material into garments, and by the introduction this year of the new clothing bag in place of the old knapsack, a change which was made after the appropriation for clothing present fiscal year had passed.

The increase asked for contingencies is caused by the greater demand made at the stations and at the assistant quartermasters' offices for the various articles that come under that head, and the slight increase in the cost of these articles. The amount asked for contingencies in the estimates submitted for the present fiscal year was reduced five thousand one hundred and eighty-four dollars (\$5,184).

An additional sum for transportation and recruiting is required in consequence of an unexpected demand having been made upon that appropriation for the transportation of troops across the isthmus of Panama, the opening of an additional rendezvous, and a general increase in the transfer of troops.

The amount required for forage was and is caused by the demand made upon the Quartermaster's Department to supply forage in kind to the officers entitled to it under the act of February 24, 1881 (21 Stats., p. 347), restoring forage to officers serving east of the Mississippi River.

On account of the employment of additional clerks and the large in-

crease of business in several bureaus of the department a much larger quantity of supplies is required than was anticipated when the estimate for the current fiscal year was prepared. With this appropriation supplies of stationery are purchased, under contracts, for the following offices:

Office of the Secretary;
 Patent Office;
 Pension Office;
 General Land Office;
 Indian Office;
 Bureau of Education;
 Office of Commissioner of Railroads; the offices of 67 Indian agents,
 and for 97 local land-offices.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith a copy of communication of Mr. M. Gardner, chief of the draughting division of this office, in relation to the condition of the appropriation for photolithographing the weekly issues of drawings of patents, designs, and trade-marks, and also in reproducing exhausted copies of drawings.

These publications can neither be dispensed with nor their number restricted, as they furnish the only available means by which the provisions of law relating to the issuance of patents can be carried into effect. The issuance of patents must cease when the office is no longer able to attach to patents copies of the specifications and drawings, as provided in section 4884 Revised Statutes.

The estimates for deficiencies contained in Mr. Commissioner Marble's letter of October 1, 1881, were carefully prepared from the best basis obtainable at that time, but as now appears the same will be wholly inadequate, owing to the unexpected ratio of increase in the number of patents issued since his estimate was made. Provision must be made for this work without delay, otherwise serious embarrassments must ensue.

I also invite your attention to the report (copy forwarded herewith) of Mr. H. T. Fisher, in charge of the abridgment of patents, from which it appears that a large number of briefs or abridgments of patents prepared in accordance with the act of March 3, 1881 (chap. 148), are now ready for publication.

I would respectfully recommend, in view of the great importance of

this work, that steps be taken as soon as possible to make the results of this work available to the public.

The bills for the patent size for the months of January, February, March, April, May, and June, 1882, will be due each respective month, and, agreeably to contract, must be paid in monthly installments. The same is true of the bills not yet paid for the library edition for November and December, 1881, and January, February, March, April, May, and June, 1882.

The balance on hand, viz, \$2,446.24, will not be sufficient to cover the bill for the current issues of January, 1882, which will be due about January 25.

The necessity for a deficiency appropriation is imperative, as the work for the year is but half done. The increased amount over that asked for last year is due, principally, to the increase in the number of patents issued during the first half of the present fiscal year, and to the large number of orders for the library edition furnished to subscribers, State libraries, and each United States district court as provided by law.

Patents must issue to patentees on the day they bear date in due form, that is to say, with a *fac-simile* copy of the drawing and specification, duly signed and sealed.

If, as I understand, no appropriation can be anticipated, then the issuance of patents must cease at the close of the current month, unless the work be provided for by an appropriation which shall be at once available.

The estimate for this class of work for the current fiscal year was \$40,000, which was based upon the actual requirements of the previous year. Thirty-five thousand dollars only was appropriated. The estimate must be exceeded to meet the legitimate expenses of the present year.

The issues of patents for the present year exceed those of the past year 19 per cent.

The rule providing that models may be dispensed with in applications where the subject of invention can be understood by a drawing has increased the number of sheets of drawings about 25 per cent. by requiring additional figures to properly show the invention.

The following comparative statement of patents and sheets of drawings for the years 1880 and 1881 is submitted:

The work has been paid for at the same rate per copy during several successive years.

The necessity for a deficiency appropriation for the continuance of the work of reproducing exhausted copies is also very urgent. Orders for copies are largely on the increase, both singly and by classes, and sufficient work of this class is now in hand to expend the balance of the appropriation for "copies of drawings" by March 1, 1882.

These orders have attained such proportions in some cases as to render the edition of one hundred and fifty copies inadequate. The work of reprinting exhausted copies must be suspended unless an appropriation be made which shall be available when the present work in progress is completed.

All orders for copies under the rules must be prepaid; hence, it is obvious that the interests of inventors and the general public require that the office should be able to furnish copies of patents promptly in any class of inventions. They can only be obtained through the office, and the numerous letters received demanding the filling of orders show the expediency of furnishing the office with the means to fulfill its duty to the public in a prompt and business-like manner.

The class of work performed under this appropriation includes the reproduction of copies of which the edition has been exhausted and the unfinished work of reprinting those destroyed by the fire of September 24, 1877.

The fact should be borne in mind that the money thus expended is returned to the United States Treasury in payment of copies. About \$40,000 has been received the past year for copies of specifications and drawings.

SIR: I respectfully call your attention to the state of the work in this division [abridgments], and the need of additional funds to carry it forward to completion.

We have now a sufficient number of abridgements finished to make one bound volume of ten to twelve hundred pages, and the force is actively engaged in preparing matter for another of similar size.

It is very desirable for many reasons that the first volume should be sent to press as speedily as possible, but this cannot be done on the small appropriation of last session, which will barely suffice to keep my present force (fourteen persons) in pay till the close of the year.

I have carefully estimated the amount required to print and bind the two volumes we shall have prepared before the regular annual appropriation will be made available, and find that it will be about \$7.75 per page, or, in the aggregate, about \$16,000. This estimate provides for an edition of five thousand per volume.

APPENDIX Q.

In relation to the estimate for "Furniture and fixtures, National Museum" (page 17).

SMITHSONIAN INSTITUTION,
Washington, D. C., January 14, 1882.

SIR: I beg respectfully to request that the following item be inserted in the deficiency estimates now being made up by the department for transmission to Congress, viz: To expedite the work of constructing the exhibition cases in the new building for the National Museum, \$30,000.

In explanation of this request, I would state that no actual deficiency exists, but that the sum above mentioned is required as an addition to the appropriation for furniture and fixtures for the present fiscal year (that of 1881-'82), which has already been pledged for cases in course of construction under contract.

In this connection, I would submit the following statements:

1. About 250 cases have been arranged for, and for the most part de-

livered, affording an aggregate exhibition—and storage—capacity equal to 35,000 running feet of shelving 1 foot wide, or nearly 1 acre.

2. These cases are contracted for, to be delivered in an incomplete condition, it having been found cheaper to import glass, and to purchase locks, hinges, and interior fittings for the same from the manufacturers. It has also been found that the cases can be finished, polished, and set up in a more satisfactory and economical manner by mechanics working under the personal supervision of the officers of the Museum than by contract.

3. The Museum has now in its employ a considerable force of men, who, by careful training, have gained experience indispensable to the proper performance of this work, and their discharge at the present time would render necessary the employment of unskilled labor when the work is resumed.

4. A large quantity of plate and crystal glass for these cases, which was imported at a time when glass was much cheaper than at present, is now lying in the building, and unless this can be speedily used it is liable to deterioration. In addition, other materials, as oil, paints, brushes, &c., on hand, are also liable to mishap.

5. Although a large number of cases are provided for, the greater part of the immense floor space is as yet uncovered. One of the peculiarities of the architecture of the building is that the 17 large halls are separated from each other by partitions composed entirely of exhibition cases, and particular attention has, therefore, been directed to building cases of this description; and many other special forms needed for immediate use are yet to be ordered.

6. Not only will a delay in the completion of these additional cases enhance the difficulties in the way of a speedy opening of the Museum, but suspension of work thereon will be disastrous, since there are but a few manufacturers in the United States capable of building such cases satisfactorily and economically, and these, having but a limited capacity for work, can construct only a few at a time. The lumber requires to be kiln-dried, and for this and other reasons the time for constructing a single lot of cases necessarily extends over a period of four or five months. Besides, glass must be imported, and hardware for interior fittings must be specially constructed.

Moreover, the tendency at present to an advance in prices of skilled labor, lumber, iron, &c., renders it extremely desirable that contracts should be given out at a date as early as possible. Any delay will necessitate a discharge by some of the manufacturers at least of workmen specially trained for the work required by these cases.

7. Should the cases now on hand not be immediately completed, the work of putting the specimens on exhibition will undoubtedly and necessarily be suspended for five or six months, and to this extent of time fulfillment of the general desire that the Museum shall be opened to the public at as early a day as possible will be delayed, while, on the other hand, should these cases be finished at once it is believed that a large quantity of the most interesting material can be presented for the inspection of visitors before the approach of another winter.

APPENDIX R.

Explanation of the estimate for "Current expenses, U. S. Entomological Commission" (see page 17).

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR,

SIR: I have the honor to state that in the accounts of the United States Entomological Commission for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1881 there remain unpaid bills to the amount of \$1,107.29, and I would therefore respectfully urge that this sum be included in the deficiency estimates for that year.

This amount represents expenses incurred in excess of the appropriation. There were in all 25 persons engaged in the work of the commission in different parts of the South and West. In order to keep within the appropriation, the several agents of the commission were directed not to exceed certain special amounts in their expenses in carrying out their instructions. In many instances, however, from the very nature of the work, which was novel and experimental, the exact cost, especially in perfecting machinery and devices for use in the Southern cotton-fields, could not be ascertained beforehand, and the accounts at the close of the year showed the above excess.

In closing up an investigation of this character, where important results often depend on small additional expenditure, or where so many are employed in widely remote parts of the country, the deficiency became unavoidable.

The accounts, with the certificate of the disbursing agent to the effect that they have not been settled by him, and were necessarily excluded from his account, are on file.

In relation to certain estimates by the Commissioner of the General Land Office (page 19).

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR,
GENERAL LAND OFFICE,
Washington, D. C., January 6, 1882.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith, for presentation to Congress, estimates of deficiencies in the appropriations for salaries, fees, and commissions of registers and receivers; for the reproduction of old and worn-out plats; for salaries of surveyors-general and their clerks in Dakota and Louisiana; and for contingent expenses in the offices of the surveyors-general of Arizona, Nevada, and Dakota; all for fiscal year ending June 30, 1881. By the act of June 16, 1880, there was appropriated the sum of \$386,000 for the payment of salaries, fees, and commissions of registers and receivers for the year 1881, which sum has been exhausted.

The salaries, fees, and commissions of registers and receivers are regulated by law, and cannot in any instance exceed the sum of \$3,000 per annum each. There are now ninety-seven local offices, and a large number of them earn the maximum; the balance ranging from one-half that amount upwards. The returns of registers and receivers are very closely scrutinized by this office and that of the First Comptroller, and the fees and commissions are based upon the amount of land disposed of and the work performed by them in connection with contests, &c.; \$97,000 per annum are required to pay the salaries (which are \$500 each) of these officers, leaving a balance of \$289,000 of the appropriation available for fees and commissions, which is wholly inadequate for that purpose.

I have also to state that the appropriation for the reproduction of old and worn-out plats and the completion and perpetuation of the same for this and local land offices, having become exhausted, the work upon the same had to be discontinued, and now remains in an incomplete condition.

In order to facilitate and avoid delay in the completion of these records an additional appropriation of \$15,000 is required. This is in the nature of a deficiency for the completion of this work under a former estimate of the whole cost of the same made by this office.

The deficiencies in the appropriations for salaries and contingent expenses in the offices of surveyors-general were caused by the unexpected and unforeseen increase in the business of the same.

The business in connection with disposal of the public lands is increasing every year, and I earnestly request that the attention of Congress may be called to the necessity of appropriating sufficient money to defray the expenses which are provided for by law, in order that deficiencies may hereafter be avoided.
