Mr. DE LANO, from the Committee on Pensions, submitted the following

REPORT:

[To accompany H. R. 3588.]

The Committee on Pensions, to whom was referred the bill (H. R. 3588) granting a pension to Mary J. Mann, have considered the same and beg leave to submit the following report:

The claimant's late husband, John W. Mann, is shown by the records of the Second Auditor's Office, Treasury Department, to have been enrolled June 9, 1836, in Capt. John S. Richbourg's company, Alabama Militia, Creek Indian war, to serve three months, and mustered out with the company July 28, 1836.

Mr. McRae, a Representative in Congress from the State of Arkansas, states that the claimant is quite old and feeble, and entirely dependent upon relatives for support. She asks a pension at the same rate as is allowed by law to the widows of the soldiers of the war of 1812.

There are numerous precedents for this legislation, and your committee recommend that the bill do pass.
