Mr. BEALE, from the Committee on Invalid Pensions, made the following

REPORT:

The Committee on Invalid Pensions, to which was referred the petition of Richard Doughty, report:

The petitioner claims pension in consequence of disability occasioned by riding on horseback, without stirrups, the distance of twenty-two miles, in a retreat from an attack of Indians, while in the service of the United States during the late war.

There is a physician's certificate of his present disability, amounting to one-third; but there is not only no discharge for disability, but no proof, either from the officers or soldiers of the army, or of any other person of the injury being received as stated by the petitioner.

The claim is rejected.
