Mr. WALDO, from the Committee on Revolutionary Pensions, made the following

REPORT:

The Committee on Revolutionary Pensions, to whom was referred the petition of certain citizens of Wabash, Kosciusko, Grant, and Huntington counties, in the State of Indiana, respectfully report :

The petitioners claim to have been in the service of the United States in the war of 1812, or under General Wayne during his campaign against the Indians, and they ask to be placed upon the same footing as the soldiers of the revolutionary war, or that such other provision may be made for them as Congress may deem equitable and just. The subject-matter of this petition was duly considered by this committee upon the petition of Thomas McQuaide and others, so far as it relates to the soldiers of the war of 1812, and the relief proposed by the committee is contained in a bill reported by them to the House, and now pending in the Committee of the Whole on the state of the Union, No. 152. By another bill now pending in the same committee, provision is made for the soldiers who served under General Wayne. The objects embraced in this petition having been thus disposed of, the committee ask to be discharged from the further consideration of this subject, and recommend that the petition be laid upon the table.
