JOINT RESOLUTION relative to the printing and distribution of the annual estimates.

SIR: I have the honor to submit herewith an estimate for deficiencies in the appropriations of the last session of Congress, arising from the increase of force authorized by an act of Congress approved July 17, 1862, and called into the service of the United States by the President on the 4th of August, 1862, and from the increased price of certain supplies required for the army.

The estimate submitted on 23d May last, upon which the appropriation for the fleet of steam rams was made, provided for the maintenance of that fleet until the 30th of September, 1862, only, by which time it was hoped that the Mississippi river would be open and the fleet could be dispensed with. The failure of the attack on Vicksburg, however, has made it necessary to retain this fleet in service, and an item of \$450,000 is included in the estimate of deficiencies, in order to provide for the expenses of the fleet during the nine months from 30th September, 1862, to 30th June, 1863.

REMARKS IN EXPLANATION TO THE FOREGOING ESTIMATES.

Purchase of arms for volunteers, &c.—The amount of this item is deduced from the average past expenditure, during the last four months, of the amount appropriated by the act of Congress of July 5, 1862, which will not materially vary, it is supposed, during the remainder of the fiscal year. The estimates for the current fiscal year were not based on the supposition that the army in the field would be as large as it has been deemed necessary to make it, and hence the required additional appropriation for arms, &c.

Purchase of gunpowder and lead.—The same remarks apply to this item as to the previous one. A large quantity of lead and powder has been procured and is in store, but it is deemed advisable to keep up the supply, by purchasing additional quantities to replace that which is consumed.

SIR: I have the honor to lay before you an estimate of the funds required for the medical and hospital department of the army for the remainder of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1863.

The estimates for this department for the current fiscal year, laid before Congress at its last session, amounted to \$6,220,984.

The amount appropriated by the act approved July 5, 1862, was \$5,705,984.

According to the statement which I had the honor to submit on the 19th instant, the accounts and requisitions approved in this office during the period from July 1 to October 31, 1862, amounted to \$5,502,809 02.

The amount of accounts approved since the first of the present month is \$822,195 07, making, from July 1 to the present date, \$6,325,004 09, which exceeds the whole appropriation \$619,020 09.

The claims constituting this excess, of course, have not been paid, but remain suspended in the various examining offices of the treasury.

In addition to the great magnitude of the service and the accidents of war, several circumstances have contributed to make the expenditures of this department, for the last five months, unusually large. The balance remaining to the credit of the medical and hospital department on the 1st of May, 1862, was \$293,546 99, which was entirely exhausted by the middle of that month. Thus there remained to the 30th of June a month and a half, during which nothing was paid, and the accumulated claims of that period considerably exceeded a million dollars, and to meet which there was only the small sum of \$125,000 appropriated by the act of July 5.

On the 11th of June, 1862, General Orders of the War Department, No. 64, transferred the settlement of claims for the board of sick soldiers in private hospitals from the subsistence to the medical and hospital department, on which account there has been paid since July 1 the sum of \$35,036 48, which would otherwise have been charged to the appropriation for the subsistence of the army.

Under the authority of the act of July 5, 1862, a considerable number of citizens have been employed as hospital attendants, with pay at the rate of \$20 50 per month, instead of withdrawing enlisted men from field duty, an extra pay of \$7 50 per month. The persons of this class now number 3,000, the excess of whose pay over that of enlisted men, as drawn from the medical and hospital department, is \$39,000 per month. At the same time there is a saving to the pay department of the same amount, and the immediate cost to the government is the same.

The inadequacy of the medical staff of the army for the present exigencies of the service has necessitated the employment of a large number of citizen physicians under contract, at a cost to this department since July 1, 1862, of \$300,691 53.

The number of private physicians now employed is about 1,000, the pay of whom, at an average of \$80 per month, amounts to \$80,000 per month, which would naturally be expected to be drawn from the appropriation for the pay of the army.

There have also been paid during the present fiscal year, for ice, milk, butter, fruits, &c., for use of the sick and convalescent in hospitals, \$74,882 68, and for hospital clothing \$67,938 56, expenditures which were not deemed necessary during the peace establishment.

When these points are taken into consideration, together with the fact that hospital accommodations for 60,000 patients have been provided almost from the foundation, I am confident that the expenditure indicated above, large as it is, will not appear to have been either extravagant or injudicious.

BUREAU OF TOPOGRAPHICAL ENGINEERS,

SIR: In answer to the letter of Brigadier General C. P. Buckingham, A. A. G., directing that the chiefs of bureaus report to the Secretary of War, as soon as practicable, an estimate for the deficiencies of appropriations of their respective bureaus for the remainder of the fiscal year, I have the honor to state that the existing balances of appropriations for the service of this bureau are deemed quite sufficient for the remainder of the present fiscal year, with the exception of that for "surveys for military defences," for which an additional amount of fifty thousand dollars is required. It is suggested that there be appended to the law the words *including the purchase of campaign maps, manuscript surveys of railroads, canals, &c., of lines within the States in rebellion*, to obviate difficulties in the settlement of accounts; the practice of the accounting officers of the treasury being to disallow purchases of such maps from the appropriation in question, whilst it is not disputed that any amount may be expended for making the survey and map of the country embraced therein.

COAST SURVEY STATION NEAR WEST CHESHIRE, CONN.,

November 6, 1862.

SIR: I have the honor to forward for your examination the estimates for the Coast Survey for the next fiscal year, with a few remarks, and would respectfully request that my letter may be printed, as usual, with the estimates of appropriations, so that it may be in the hands of the Committee of Ways and Means. My report is not printed until late in the session of Congress, or after its close.

It has been necessary to ask an appropriation for the pay and rations of the engineers of the Coast Survey steamers, as the balance on hand during the present fiscal year will be exhausted at its close.

STATION NEAR WEST CHESHIRE, CONN.,

November 5, 1862.

SIR: I have the honor to submit for your examination the estimates for the work of the Coast Survey for 1863-'64, and to request that, if approved, they may be inserted in your estimates of appropriations. They are adapted to the plan of working approved by you, by which all the aid possible is rendered by our organization to the operations of the army and navy, and the regular progress of the survey is carried on wherever protection can be had for them, or is not needed.

The amount of the estimates is but little more than half that of 1860-'61, and is much diminished from that of 1861-'62, as will be seen by the comparative table at the close of this letter. The items are the same as, or less than, those approved last year by the Executive and by Congress, with the addition of one for the pay of engineers of the Coast Survey steamers, not now provided, as formerly, by the Navy Department. The surplus of the year before last, from which these officers were paid in 1862-'63, will be exhausted during this fiscal year.

These estimates will enable us to continue the regular work of the survey wherever our parties can move freely; to continue steadily all the office-work, on, however, a reduced scale, so as to work up all the information already collected, and to place it in appropriate and simple form in possession of the officers of our government, civil, military, and naval; to give important aid, by charts and by the personal experience of our officers, to the fleets and expeditions upon the coast; to revise the surveys in localities known to be changeable; to collect new information by reconnaissance ashore or afloat; and to keep up the essential organization of the survey, which has, by the testimony of the most enterprising naval and military officers, proved itself so valuable. The statements of the use made of the Coast Survey parties in different important military and naval expeditions will be given in my annual report, with the

acknowledgments made by their chiefs. The services at Port Royal and in the lower Mississippi were only a fractional part of those rendered.

In the directions of the Treasury Department for the year I was instructed to continue, as far as practicable, the operations heretofore ordered, and have succeeded as far as the limited means permitted. The means, and not the opportunities of working, have, as was intended, limited the work executed, while, by an economical administration of the appropriation, no considerable opportunity, it is believed, of usefulness was lost for want of means.

Three Coast Survey steamers have been kept at work during nearly the whole season—the *Corwin*, the *Bibb*, and the *Vixen*; being, when not actually employed by the survey, used by the Navy Department. The services of the *Bibb*, under command of Assistant C. O. Boutelle, were acknowledged by Admiral DuPont, in his official report of the action at Port Royal. The familiarity of her commander with that part of the coast made his personal services of the greatest importance. The *Sachem*, loaned to the Coast Survey by the Navy Department, in place of the *Hetzel*, was also officered and manned by the Coast Survey, and accompanied the expedition to the lower Mississippi, rendering services warmly acknowledged by Admiral David D. Porter. The *Corwin*, when not engaged in her regular work at Hatteras and in the Potomac, was under the orders of Admiral Goldsborough, and performed good service in the York river and its tributaries, the Pamunkey and Mattaponi. The details of these and other matters of the kind belong to my annual report; but I would remark here that no opportunity was lost to furnish officers familiar with the parts of the coast visited by our fleets and armies, as will appear from the tables in my annual report showing the employment of the assistants and other officers of the survey, and from the particulars of their work, under the head of the different sections.

The operations generally have been executed by the civilians attached to the survey; all the army officers, and all but two of the naval officers, having been returned to their respective services. One of the two officers of the navy attached to the survey, Captain B. F. Sands, has been recently detached. We have lost, by death, the gallant Lieutenant Colonel W. R. Palmer, who had remained most acceptably in charge of the Coast Survey office, though serving as aide-de-camp to General McClellan until the army of the Potomac moved forward to Manassas. Six of the assistants, sub-assistants, and aids have, under your authority, received leave of absence, without pay, to join the volunteer or regular service, and have shown great capacity in their several positions. Their services will elsewhere be particularly referred to.

No losses of vessels or other property have been incurred during the year; but the three vessels seized at Charleston and in Texas the year before have not been restored. Four sailing vessels have been loaned to the Navy Department and three to the revenue service during the year, at times when there was great exigency for the use of light-draught vessels.

Sixteen officers of the survey, of different grades, have been detailed for service, chiefly topographical, with the army of the Potomac, near Washington, on the peninsula, and on the upper Potomac; with the army of the Rappahannock, near Fredericksburg and at Manassas; with the army of Maryland and Virginia, on the eastern shore and at Norfolk; with the army of North Carolina, at Hatteras, Roanoke island, Newbern, Beaufort, N. C., &c.

The regular work has gone on upon the Florida reefs, and parties were at and near Key West, ready to co-operate with the army had active operations been undertaken on the western coast of the peninsula.

The regular work upon the Pacific coast has gone steadily forward.

Of seventeen assistants, fourteen sub-assistants, and eighteen aids, serving in the field or afloat, fifteen assistants, eleven sub-assistants, and fifteen aids have devoted the whole or a part of the year to the regular progress of the survey,

and eight assistants, ten sub-assistants, and fourteen aids (thirty two officers) have rendered service in connexion with the operations of the army and navy, generally in addition to their regular duties.

Of course, this latter-named service was not without its special dangers. Sub-Assistant Dorr narrowly escaped accident when the lamented Wagner was mortally wounded, and one of the soldiers of Mr. Dorr's plane-table party was killed in front of Yorktown. The plane-table which Mr. Dorr was using was shattered to pieces.

Sub-Assistant Oltmanns was badly wounded in the reconnaissance of Pearl river, and while attached to the steamer *Sachem*, under command of Assistant F. H. Gerdes, and to the flotilla of Commodore (now Admiral) D. D. Porter.

The bravery of Mr. J. S. Bradford, Mr. C. H. Boyd, and their comrades, alone saved them from capture on James's island, putting several prisoners into their hands.

Of the officers who have thus served, the chiefs of parties, Assistant Charles O. Boutelle, under Admiral DuPont, and Assistant F. H. Gerdes, under Admiral Porter, have made themselves especially useful, and have won the special commendations of the gallant officers under whom they served.

During the past season more than the usual number of parties have been at work in Maine, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, and Virginia, pushing the work on that part of the coast to completion.

In my letter of last year I stated that, under favorable circumstances, surveys could be made by parties accompanying the fleets. Such circumstances occurring with Admiral DuPont's command, enabled us to survey the Stono river and entrance; Skull creek, connecting Port Royal harbor with Savannah river, and Calibogue sound; to resurvey the bar of Fernandina or St. Mary's. The party connected with Admiral Farragut and Admiral D. D. Porter were enabled to resurvey and mark the bars at the entrance of the passes of the Mississippi, and to make some minor surveys. Buoys were placed promptly for the use of the vessels of the fleets and of the transport vessels.

I have taken the opportunity presented by the visits of inspection of the chief engineer, General Joseph G. Totten, to inform myself personally, through the kindly official and personal relations between us, of the progress and direction of the plans of defence of the coast, with a view to special reference thereto in the progress of the surveys. I was much gratified to find that, as far as we had advanced, the progress was in the right direction, though I could not but recognize that the information obtained would enable me in future to make the connexion more intimate than in the past, where no such exigencies as are now probable seemed to be among the possibilities of the times. I should be only too glad to make rapid provision for these exigencies could adequate means be furnished. Perhaps some opportunity may yet occur to carry out such a purpose. It is certain that accurate maps must form the basis of well-conducted military operations, and that the best time to procure them is not when an attack is impending or the army waits, but when there is no hindrance to or pressure upon the surveyor. That no coast can be effectively attacked, defended, or blockaded without accurate maps and charts has been fully proved by the events of the last two years, if, indeed, such a proposition required practical proof. The persons employed upon the various coasts being in the service of the government, their personal experience has been available in the various and complicated duties of pilotage, for lighting beacons, buoys, &c., in times of exigency, and during the derangement of regular modes of supply, inspection, &c.

The Hon. Secretary of the Navy acknowledged, in his report, the services of the Superintendent of the Coast Survey as a member of a commission in reference to places of blockade, &c.; and has since, with your approval, placed him on an important commission for selecting a site for a navy yard "for iron-clads

and iron vessels, to lay the foundation of an iron navy." The indispensable usefulness of the Coast Survey results to these two commissions was generously acknowledged by votes of each without dissent.

The acknowledgments of the hydrographical and topographical notes prepared by the Coast Survey, lithographed, and with the maps and charts illustrating them, furnished to the principal military and naval officers, have been numerous and very complimentary. During the year (November to November) 25,434 copies of the Coast Survey maps and charts have been furnished for distribution by the active chief of the hydrographic office to the naval vessels, and 1,476 have been delivered to captains and pilots in the government transport service.

Maps compiled from the surveys of the coast, and from other authorities, have been published by the process of color-printing, and have been so popular as, at the low prices for which they have been issued, more than to pay for themselves.

The estimates now submitted are intended to provide for the usual progress on the coast from Passamaquoddy to the capes of Virginia, and the progress which seems most probable from thence to the Rio Grande. They also provide for parties to aid the fleets and armies operating on the coast, in pursuance of the plan which you have fully approved, and which has, under your direction, proved so useful. Flexibility in a work like this is a most important feature, and that you have successfully impressed upon it. If I have erred in the estimates it is in restricting them too much, the safest side upon which to err under the circumstances.

I suppose that one more appropriation, of about the amount now asked, will enable us to complete the survey of the Florida reefs and keys. There is now a gap in the hydrography of this dangerous part of the coast, which I expect to be able to have completed this season. It may require the application of the small appropriation for the triangulation across the peninsula, which cannot be used, under present circumstances, for completing the work for which it was designed, for this purpose. All these matters of detail will be set forth in my annual report.

The estimates include, as usual, separate items for the Atlantic and Gulf coast, Florida reefs, and western coast of the United States, without, however, the facilities formerly extended by the War and Navy Departments by the detail of officers.

Estimates in detail.

For general expenses of all the sections,* namely, rent, fuel, materials for drawing, engraving, and printing, and ruling forms, binding, transportation of instruments, maps, and charts; for miscellaneous office expenses, and for the purchase of new instruments, books, maps, and charts. \$19,000

SIR: I have the honor to submit herewith the accompanying estimates of funds for the support and maintenance of the light-house establishment for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1864.

The estimates are exhibited in tabular form, from No. 1 to No. 5, inclusive, with explanatory tables in detail, marked A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I, K, L, M, and N.

It has been deemed proper to submit the estimates of last year without abatement, except in two items, (amounting to \$180,000,) where the expense is constant and not so likely to be affected by varying circumstances. This course is considered to be eminently prudent, in view of expenditures which may be reasonably anticipated, for restoring aids to navigation which have been removed or discontinued by the insurgents, and which restoration experience has proved to be invariably attended with heavy outlay. It is proposed to defray such expenses out of the appropriations for current maintenance of the light-house establishment without calling upon Congress for special appropriations for the purpose.

There being likewise a balance in the treasury to the credit of the appropriation for fuel and quarters for officers of the army serving on light-house duty, sufficient to cover the probable wants of the service under that head, no estimate under that head is submitted.

Heretofore a portion of the Cob-dock lot of the navy yard, New York, has been occupied by the light-house establishment as a depot for buoys and supplies, &c., &c.; but recently, in consequence of projected improvements of this lot by the Navy Department for the ordnance service, it became necessary to order the vacation of the premises so occupied. At present a part of a building in the city of New York is used for the purposes of the light-house establishment as above.

New York is one of the principal depots of the light-house establishment for apparatus, &c., &c., of every kind required for the light-houses, light-vessels, &c., of the whole coast, and it is of great importance that there should be a lot, with buildings upon it, near the city, more convenient than the rooms at present used, and adapted to the safe-keeping of the valuable property belonging to the United States, in depot for the use of the light-house establishment. These objects cannot be secured without a separate lot, with suitable water front, and the estimate of \$50,000, to meet the expense of purchase of lot and erection of proper buildings, is respectfully submitted.

OMAHA INDIAN AGENCY.

Nebraska, September 20, 1862.

SIR: I have this day examined the Indian appropriation bill, as I find it in our territorial newspapers, and do not observe that any appropriation has been made to pay the claim of Ta-sah, (White Cow.) I fear it may lead to trouble, or at least give rise to serious complaints from the Omahas. They attach as much importance to this small matter as though it involved thousands of dollars, and they cannot be made to understand why it is not paid, when the department has so often admitted its justice. I have never had a talk with the Omaha chiefs but what they reproach the government with the delay. The tribe makes common cause for the claimant, and I deem it most unfortunate for the interests of the public service among the Indian tribes in this portion of the country that the payment of this small but admittedly just claim has not been provided for.

The Omahas use their influence among the other tribes to keep the peace on the frontier; and located, as they are, between the whites on the south, and the wild tribes on the north, it is highly important that they should not have just cause to complain. Let me assure you that too much importance cannot be attached to this matter.

Is there not some fund out of which this claim can be paid? If this cannot be done, will not the honorable Commissioner write me a letter, that I may read to the tribe, which will show an interest in the matter, and convince them that the claim will soon be settled. It will aid me in restoring good feeling, and show them that the Indian department is mindful of the interests of the tribe.

SIR: My attention has been called by Agent Irish, per his letter enclosed by you on the 25th ultimo, to the claim of Ta-sah, or White Cow.

This claim of White Cow has been twice estimated for to Congress, this office thus acknowledging its justice, and doing all within its province to secure the payment thereof; but no means have been placed at my disposal to pay the claim, and until a special appropriation therefor is made, it is entirely out of my power to award to Ta-sah that justice which is acknowledged to be his due.

At an early period after the assembling of the next session of Congress the attention of that body will be again called to Ta-sah's case, I hope, with such success as to cause the payment of his claim; in the meantime Agent Irish will explain to the claimant and the chiefs of the Omahas the multiplicity of the duties of the great council of the whites during the present troubles of the country, and that, while the members thereof are disposed to give ear to all the complaints of their red children, particularly to those of the Omahas, whose loyalty and good faith are cheerfully acknowledged and appreciated, it must not be considered that the fact of Ta-sah's being kept out of his money longer than may appear necessary indicates any wanton neglect on the part of the government.

I am anxious that the agent may be successful in conveying to the Indians the correct idea of the connexion between this department and Congress, and

that the failure to have the claim of Ta-sah satisfied so far does not arise from any indisposition to do justice, but from the inability to give the various matters before Congress a full consideration under the unparalleled pressure of public business at the last session.

Placing the foregoing facts before him, I shall have to rely upon Agent Irish in using them in such a manner as to conciliate the Indians, and to effect on them a clear understanding of the case.

Some time last spring or summer the goods for the Indians under Agent Twiss were stopped at Topeka, Kansas, by Governor Robinson, of that State, who turned over to the United States marshal the guns, powder, &c., intended for those Indians.

I stowed the guns, powder, and bullets at Fort Leavenworth with the ordnance officer, who gave me a receipt for the same. But the powder was five kegs short, which the United States marshal certifies were feloniously taken from the house in which he had them stowed at Topeka. These articles are yet at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, subject to the order of the department.

SIR: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter bearing date 9th August last, enclosing a copy of letter to you from Caleb B. Smith, Secretary of the Interior, dated July 18, 1862, in which I am instructed to forward to your office, by the 1st day of October next, estimates for funds required by treaty stipulations and for other purposes for the Indian service in my superintendency, &c.

In compliance with said instructions I herewith enclose said estimates, as nearly as can be arrived at with the information in my possession. The amount estimated for the removal and subsistence of Indians is based upon the expenses already incurred in the removal of some nine hundred within the last one hundred and twenty days, which were collected by troops under Colonel Lippett in Humboldt county, which expense, I infer, is properly chargeable to the Indian department, but the exact amount of which I have no means of ascertaining in time to forward to your department by 1st of October, as instructed. I therefore forward the estimates as best I can arrive at the several sums necessary, viz:

Should the reservations in the northern district be reduced to two, (Smith River and Round valley,) as I have formerly recommended, and the other reservations sold, the money or proceeds arising from said sales will nearly or quite pay for Smith River and Round valleys, and the number of employes, teams, and farming tools be reduced, so that about one-third of the otherwise required sum might be taken from said estimate; leaving about one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) the total sum necessary for Indian purposes in the northern district of California.

SIR : I herewith transmit for your consideration my annual estimate for funds required in this superintendency during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1864. I have included in this estimate the sum of \$10,000 for the purpose of purchasing farming utensils, teams, seed, clothing, iron, steel, &c., for those Indians now located on reservations, and with whom treaties have been made but not ratified.

I think I have presented sufficient facts in relation to these Indians in my annual reports, as well as official correspondence, to justify an appropriation for this amount at least. I will endeavor with this amount to make such investments for these Indians as will secure to them the same rights and privileges as others now under treaty.

I would also call your attention to the amount asked for repairs of agency buildings. The amount is very insignificant, yet it will aid materially in repairing the buildings so that they could be used.

There should be \$1,000 expended at each agency on public buildings, in order to make them respectable. Great inconvenience has been experienced by the agents during the past year on account of the dilapidated condition of the buildings. I would, therefore, earnestly recommend that an estimate be submitted to Congress for this purpose.

Should it not be used, however, the difference in the appropriation between the force we employ and that the law allows will, of course, remain in the treasury. Third. The estimate of appropriations for collecting the revenue from sales of public lands is omitted entirely this year, the balances on hand being believed sufficient to meet requirements to 30th June, 1864.

Fourth. Claims for the two, three, and five per cent. to certain States, and for refunding, &c., will rest for the present on the existing balances, and hence no appropriation in that respect is now called for.

The surveying estimates will be submitted in a separate letter.

EXPLANATION OF THE FOREGOING ESTIMATES.

1. The amount of \$10,000, together with \$12,000 of unexpended balances over and above all surveying liabilities in Florida, Louisiana, Wisconsin, Iowa, Illinois, Missouri, and Minnesota, is to be apportioned as follows: to the State of Minnesota \$9,000, and Wisconsin \$9,000, exclusive of \$2,000 each for incidental expenses of the respective surveyors general's offices.

2. Of the \$25,000 the sum of \$15,000 is estimated for California, and \$10,000 for Nevada Territory, to be applied chiefly to the survey of localities along the Pacific railroad and telegraph line, required by the 7th section of the act of Congress approved July 1, 1862, Laws, 1861-'62, page 493, and to such other as the progressive settlements may actually require the surveys.

3. \$10,000 is estimated for the extension of standard lines east of the Cascade mountains, and subdivisions of the public lands in the valleys of Powder and Grande Ronde rivers, the tributaries of Snake river, where considerable settlements are reported to exist, and are awaiting surveys.

4. \$10,000 is estimated for the extension of standard lines and subdivisional surveys east of the Cascades, in order to reach the settlements officially reported to exist in the valleys of Walla-Walla, Tukannon, Pataha, and other localities, with the view to developing the agricultural resources of the country in the direction of gold mines situated on Salmon, Clearwater, Bitter Root, and other rivers, where upwards of 50,000 miners are engaged in developing mineral resources of the country, and thousands of others are expected to arrive.

5. \$10,000 is estimated to be applied chiefly to the survey of the localities along the Pacific railroad and telegraph line, required by the 7th section of the act of Congress approved July 1, 1862, Laws, 1861-'62, page 493, and to valleys of tributaries of the Arkansas river north of the river where settlements are reported to exist, and demand the extension of the lines of public surveys.

6. \$12,500 is estimated for Kansas, and \$12,500 for Nebraska, to be applied chiefly to the localities along the Pacific railroad and telegraph line, required by the 7th section of the act of Congress approved July 1, 1862, Laws, 1861-'62, page 493, and for the survey of standard and subdivisional lines as may be absolutely required for the public service.

7. \$10,000 is estimated for the survey of the public lands in such portions of the Territory actually settled upon by pre-emptors and others.

8. No estimate is submitted for the survey of public lands in New Mexico, owing to existing balances of former appropriations, occasioned by the disturbed condition of the country during the past and present year.

SIR: I herewith transmit the usual annual estimates for the fiscal year ending the 30th of June, 1864.

The last two items, being for fitting up, finishing, repairing, and painting the saloons in the north and south wings of the Patent Office building, and furnishing them with cases suitable for the reception and convenient exhibition of patented models, may, perhaps, require some explanation. The imperative necessity for more room for the proper exhibition of the models is shown very conclusively in a letter from the machinist, a copy of which is hereto annexed, and marked A.

The saloon in the south wing is at present partially used; but if supplied with proper and suitable cases the available space would be greatly increased.

The room itself stands very much in need of repairs and of painting, and the amounts asked for, it is thought, will be sufficient for these purposes.

The saloon in the north wing will require to be plastered and finished, and then to be supplied with cases, all of which, I am confident, can be done for the sum stated in the estimate.

The interesting records of valuable inventions, displaying the ingenuity and skill of the inventive genius of our country, are required by law to be preserved in the Patent Office, and therefore should not be, as in many cases they now are, crowded together in a way calculated to injure, if not entirely destroy, many of them; but sufficient and appropriate accommodation should be provided for their safe-keeping, whilst at the same time they should be so placed as to render access to them easy, and thus, without danger of injury, facilitate their exhibition and examination. These objects, so important and indeed so necessary, can be fully attained if the means asked for can be placed at the disposal of the office.

SIR: The undersigned would respectfully ask your attention to the fact of the absolute necessity for more room for the preservation and exhibition of models of patented inventions.

By an act of Congress in the year 1859, directing the removal of the collections of the different exploring expeditions to the Smithsonian Institution, a large amount of space was secured to the office in the large hall of the main building or south front, but that has proved insufficient for the wants of the office, as all of the space is now occupied by these interesting records, which are increasing in number at the rate of nearly four thousand a year. Every care possible is taken for the preservation of these miniature machines, but unless more room should be secured, instead of arranging them singly upon the shelves it will be absolutely necessary to place them upon each other, in which event thousands of them must, in consequence of their delicate structure, become mutilated and many entirely destroyed. In fact it is requisite already with some of the cases, owing to their crowded condition, to remove a number of the models from them in order to reach the desired one, and a large number

of them have been placed on top of the cases, exposed to the dust, there being no room for them inside.

The large hall in the north front of the building, recently occupied as a hospital, is now vacant; it could be finished in a comparatively short time, and I would respectfully suggest the propriety of having immediate measures taken for its completion, and furnished with cases suitable for the reception of models. It would be ample for the accommodation of about twenty-five thousand models, allowing a superficial foot for each one.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith, estimates of funds required for the Indian service for fulfilling treaty stipulations, and for general incidental expenses thereof, for the fiscal year ending June 3, 1864.

The estimates would have been submitted at an earlier day, were it not that they were necessarily delayed, in consequence of the non-receipt of the estimates from superintendents and agents who are located in a remote region of the country.

In view of the present state of affairs, and after a careful examination of the wants of the Indians as reported, I am of the opinion that \$25,000 can be made to subserve the wants of the Indians in Nevada Territory, and nearly the same amount for each of the Territories adjacent thereto where no treaty stipulations exist.

Copies of the estimates of superintendents and agents, which are of a discretionary character, are submitted herewith, also copies of communications having reference to the estimates of a miscellaneous character, the various sums thus estimated for I deem needful to this branch of the government service.

EXPLANATIONS OF ESTIMATE.

Armament of fortifications.—The object of this item of the estimate is to procure sea-coast and garrison cannon, and the means of mounting and equipping them for the defence of the coasts of the United States, including the repair and preservation of the armament already in place. The amount appropriated will be applicable to the purchase of the cannon mentioned, with ammunition therefor, and materials for sea-coast and garrison carriages, with their implements and equipments, and payment of the mechanics at the arsenals employed in their manufacture.

Ordnance service.—The amount of this item is required to defray the expense of receiving, issuing, and keeping in good order the arms, ordnance stores, and other public property in use and in store at the various arsenals and ordnance depots in the United States, and for the purchase of fuel, stationery, forage, and for all other incidental expenses of the ordnance service.

Ordnance, ordnance stores, and supplies.—The amount of this item is to procure siege and field guns, carriages, caissons, and battery wagons, with their implements and harness; accoutrements for the different kinds of troops composing the army, and to defray the expense of making and repairing the same, and for the purchase of materials for and preparing ammunition, and for procuring horse equipments for the mounted troops.

Manufacture of arms at the national armory.—The amount of this item will only suffice to carry on the manufacture of the new rifled arms at the national armory during the year, on a proper scale of operations.

Repairs, &c., at national armory.—To keep up the production of the armory to the utmost possible extent

Additions, &c., at arsenals.—This item is to provide for such additions to, and extensions of, the shop room, machinery, tools, and fixtures at the different arsenals, as may be necessary to increase their capacity, so as to meet the increased demands for their products.

Purchase, &c., of arms, &c.—To procure muskets, rifles, swords, sabres, carbines, and revolver pistols, for arming troops already, and those who may be, called into the service, as elsewhere detailed.

SIR: I beg to submit the following explanatory notes to the estimate which I forwarded by the mail of yesterday.

An increase of two hundred and seventy dollars (\$270) per annum is recommended for the writer to the commandant of midshipmen, and the designation of his office changed to that of clerk. His compensation, in my judgment, is too low. His duties are arduous and responsible, and cannot be intrusted to inexperienced persons.

It will be seen that eight hundred and forty dollars (\$840) per annum is estimated for the pay of an assistant treasurer, in lieu of a paymaster's clerk, heretofore allowed.

The regulations of the academy, and a proper supervision of the midshipmen's accounts, require that they be made out monthly; and this, with the large increase of students, involves very great labor, both by day and by night. His duties are extremely arduous and responsible, and cannot be intrusted to persons of inexperience, or of ordinary intelligence and efficiency. I therefore submit a small increase of three hundred and forty dollars (\$340) per annum.

Two additional attendants, at \$1 25 per day, are asked for at the steam-heating works for heating the school ships Constitution and Santee.

An additional sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) for the purchase of stationery, blank books and forms, and an additional sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the current expenses and repairs of heating and lighting the school ships Constitution and Santee, is also rendered indispensably necessary by the very large increase of the academy.

An increase of twenty-five cents per day is asked for the three attendants to the steam-heating works for heating the academy. They are honest, industrious, and faithful men, and have very laborious duty to perform.

This estimate (C) amounts in the aggregate to \$7,000,000, while the appropriations for the preceding year, ordinary and supplemental, were \$6,617,000.

Nominally, the sum now asked is inconsiderably greater than the appropriation for this year, while in reality, owing to the depreciation of the currency, it is a million and a half less.

The difference in the distribution of the total among the several objects is, in my judgment, the most desirable for the public interests at this time, and is, therefore, most respectfully recommended to the consideration of the department.

The item for magazines has hitherto been in charge of the Bureau of Yards and Docks. It is believed by both bureaus to belong more appropriately to the Bureau of Ordnance.

The immediate action of Congress is respectfully requested on items Nos. 3, 9, 12, and 13.

The above estimates do not include the deductions caused by the additional duty on nitre, which affects the cost of gunpowder, nor the internal tax of one per cent. which operates upon all the articles. It is therefore necessary to meet this by a suitable appropriation, and I submit \$100,000 as an estimate for this purpose. On the 1st November there was a balance to the credit of the bureau of \$3,758,274, while there remained to be paid under existing contracts, when fulfilled, \$4,459,474; showing a liability to be met of \$701,200, besides any other expenditure that may become necessary during the remaining eight months of the present fiscal year, and which, if not appropriated for, must be taken from the appropriation for the year ending June 30, 1864, and will, therefore, reduce the funds for the next fiscal year by that amount.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith triplicate estimates for the support of the quartermaster's department, marine corps, for one year, commencing July 1, 1863, and ending June 30, 1864.

These estimates differ from those submitted by me with my letters dated October 12, 1861, and February 12, 1862, in the following items of appropriation, viz:

For provisions, less	\$29, 419 00
For clothing, more	27, 899 36
For fuel, less	2, 613 75
For military stores, less	3, 000 00
For transportation and recruiting, less	4, 000 00
For contingencies, less	5, 000 00

The aggregate amount required by the present estimates is \$26,592 86 less than the aggregates of the two estimates submitted with my letters above referred to.

The increase in the clothing appropriation is caused by the high prices of the material from which the garments are made, and is based upon data in this office, which shows the average cost of clothing of a marine, for one year, to be \$48 94.

The appropriation for provision has been reduced from 25 cents per ration to 20 cents, that sum being, in my opinion, sufficient, in view of the balance in the treasury to the credit of this appropriation.

Fuel has been reduced from \$7 to \$6 50 per cord for the same reason.

Military stores, transportation and recruiting, and contingencies, have been placed at the amounts asked for previous to the last increase of the corps, and is believed to be sufficient for these purposes.

Ten thousand four hundred and fifty-eight dollars and ninety-seven cents was asked for in the estimate submitted by me on the 12th October, 1861, for repairs of barracks at Charlestown, Massachusetts, which is omitted from the present estimates.
