

NOME LACKEE RESERVATION.

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RESOLUTIONS  
OF THE  
LEGISLATURE OF CALIFORNIA,  
RELATIVE TO  
*Nome Lackee reservation.*

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APRIL 6, 1864.—Referred to the Committee on Public Lands and ordered to be printed.

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Whereas the general government of the United States has entirely abandoned "Nome Lackee Indian reservation," situated in the county of Tehama, in this State; and whereas the Indians who were on the same have mostly died, and the remainder have scattered through the country; and whereas the said Nome Lackee Indian reservation is, in its present condition, of no use or benefit to the general government: Therefore, be it

*Resolved by the assembly (the Senate concurring,)* That the land composing the said Nome Lackee Indian reservation should be as speedily as possible, thrown open to pre-emption, and placed back in the Marysville land district for the interest of agriculture, and that pre-emption claims be allowed settlers on the same.

*Resolved,* That his excellency the governor be requested to forward a copy of the resolutions to the President of the United States, Secretary of the Interior, and to each of our senators and members of Congress.
