THE LEGISLATURE OF KANSAS,

PRAYING

The passage of a bill extending the benefit of the Homestead Law to the settlers on the lands recently purchased from the Osage Indians.

JANUARY 25, 1867.—Referred to the Committee on the Public Lands and ordered to be printed.

Be it resolved by the senate, (the house of representatives concurring therein,)
That the Congress of the United States be, and they are hereby, memorialized to
extend, if consistent with the public interest, the benefit of the homestead law
to the settlers on the lands recently purchased from the Osage Indians, and
known as the east treaty.
