## OFFICES CREATED AND THE SALARIES THEREOF.

[Propared in the office of the Secretary of the Senate.]
By the act (Chap. XXXIII) to locate and establish an assay office in the Territory of Idaho.
The President of the United States is authorized to appoint, as soon as the public interest shall require their service, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, one superintendent, at a salary of two thousarid dollars ; one assayer, at a salary of eighteen hundred dollasr; one meiter and refiner, at a salary of eighteen hundred dollars; one clerk, at a salary of eighteen hundred dollars ; and one clerk, at a salary of sixteen hundred dollars. The said officers to take the oath prescribed by the act of July 2, 1862, and to give bonds, which shall be satisfactory to the director of the mint previous to entering upon the discharge of their respective duties.

By the act (Chap. XLII) to establish the collection district of Aroostook, in the State of Maine, and to more accurately define the boundaries of the district of Newark, Nepo Jersey.

The county of Aroostook is made a customs collection district, of which Houlton is to be the only port of entry, and a collector to be appointed, to reside at Houlton, at the same compensation that is allowed to collectors of custums on the northern, northeastern, and northwestern frontiers, by second section of act approved June 17, 1864: Provided, The aggregate does not exceed fifteen hundred dollars.

By the act (Chap. CXXI) making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the government for the year endinq June 30, 1870.
The Secretary of the Interior is authorized to appoint a superintendent of public documents, at a salary of twenty-five hundred dollars per annum, who shall be charged with the duty of packing, collecting, arranging, classifying, \&cc., documents. (P, 292.)
Under the head of "Branch Mint at Carson City," appropriation is made for salaries of officers and clerks, wages of workmen, and other expenses for fiscal year ending June 30, 1870, of seventy-four thousand six hundred dollars. (P. 299.)

By the act (Chap. CXXIII) to supply deficiencies in the appropriations for the service of the government for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1869, and for other purposes.

> Section one provides that after the present fiscal year there shall only be employed and paid for labor in the treasury building and the five other buildings used by the department, for lighting, cleaning, and general care and superintendence thereof, the following persons, to wit: one superintendent, at a salary of twenty-five hundred dollars a year; one clerk of class four and one clerk of class one; one engineer in charge of heating apparatus, at a salary of twelve hundred dollars a year ; five firemen, at a salary of six hund̈red dollars each per year; one machinist and gas-fitter, at a salary of twelve hundred dollars per year; one captain of the watch, at a salary of fourteen hundred dollars per year ; one storekeoper, at a salary of one thonsand dollars per year; thirty watchmen, at a salary of eight hundred and twenty dollars each per year; thirty laborers, at a salary of six hundred dollars each per year; seventy women, as cleaners, at a salary of one handred and eighty dollars each per year.

## By the act (Chap. CXXV) making appropriations for the consular and diplomatic expenses of the government for the year ending June 30, 1870, and for other purposes.

The consulates at Paris and London are created consulates general on and after March 4, 1869.

A consul at Birmingham is authorized to be appointed at an annual salary of two thousand five hundred dollars; and a consul at Tunstall at an annual salary of fifteen hundred dollars ; and a consul at Barmen, at an annual salary of fifteen hundred dollars; and a consul at Winnepeg, Selkirk settlement, British North America, who shall receive an annual salary of one thousand five hundred dollars.
The fourth section authorizes the President, on the recommendation of the Secretary of the Treasury, to cause examinations to be made into the accounts of the consular officers of the United States, and into all matters connected with the business of their offices, and to that end he may appoint such agent or agents as may be necessary for that purpose; and any agent appointed in this behalf shall be paid for his services a just and reasonable compensation, not exceeding five dollars per day for the time necessarily employed, in addition to his actual necessery expenses, but no greater sum than five thousand dollars shall be expended as compensation of such agent or agents in any one year.

## THE OFFICES, THE sALARIES OF WHICH HAVE BEEN INCREASED, WITH THE AMOUNT OF SUCH INCREASE DURING THE SAME PERIOD.

By the act (Chap. XLVIII) making appropriations for the naval.service for the year ending June $30,1870$.

The third section allows thirty-three cents per day to each and every seaman, ordinary seaman, or landsman who shall perform the duty of a fireman or coal-heaver on board any vessel of war for the time they shall be thus employed, in addition to the compensation now allowed.
The fourth section increases the compensation of the secretary of the Naval Academy from twelve hundred and fifty dollars per annum to fourteen hundred dollars per annum.

By the act (Chap. LVII) to allow deputy collectors of internal revenue acting as collectors the pay of collectors, and for other purposes.

Any deputy collector who bas perfurmed, or who may perform, the duty of collector of internal revenue under anthority or requirement of law, or in case of vacancy in office of collector, is entitled to receive the pay of collector; but no such payment to be made when the collector has received, or is entitled to receive, compensation for the same period of time.

Section two authorizes those persons who held the office of distillery inspector on 2d Marcb, 1867 , and who continued to perform the duties of that office in ignorance of the repeal of the statute creating it, to be paid five dollars per day for such time prior to April 1, 1867, as they were actually employed, under approval of the Commissiouer of Internal Revenue.

By.the act (Chap. CXXI) making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the government for the year ending June 30, 1870.
The proviso to the clause for the compensation of the officers, clerks, and employés of the House of Representatives, directs that of the twelve assistant clerks the two designated as reading clerks of the House of Representatives shall receive an annual salary of two thousand five hundred and ninety-two dollars each, being an increase of salary of four hundred and thirty-two dollars each per annum.

By the act (Chap. CXXV) malcing appropriations for the consular and diplomatic expenses of the government for the year ending June 30, 1870, and for other purposes.

The salary of the consul at Valencia is made fifteen hundred dollars per annum-heretofore the consul has had fees only.

By the act (Chap. CXXV) to define the fees of the recorder of deeds, and to provide for the appoiniment of warden of the jail in the District of Columbia, and for other purposes.
The fees of the recorder are fixed as follows:
The filing, recording, and indexing, or for making certified copy of any instrument containing two hundred words or less, fifty cents, and fifteen eents for each additioual hundred words.

For each certificate and seal, twenty-five cents.
For searching records extending back two years or less next preceding current date, twenty-five cents, and five cents for each additional year.

For recording a town plat. three cents for each lot such plat may contain.
For recording a plat or survey, five cents for each course such survey may contain.
For filing and indexing any paper required by law to be filed in his office, fifteen cents.
For each examination of title by the party or his attorney, fifty cents.
For taking any acknowledgment, fifty cents.
