JOINT RESOLUTION relative to the printing and distribution of the annual estimates.

*Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States in Congress assembled, That it shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Treasury to cause the estimates of appropriations, which he is by law required to prepare and submit to Congress, to be printed, and copies of the same to be delivered to the Clerk of the House of Representatives in time for distribution at the commencement of each session; and that the Clerk distribute the said estimates in the manner in which documents printed by Congress are directed to be distributed.*

SIR: In compliance with the requirements of the ninth section of the "joint resolution in relation to the public printing," approved on the 23d June, 1860, I have the honor to transmit herewith, in order that they may be embraced in the annual estimates from the Treasury Department, "detailed estimates of the salaries, amount to be paid for wages, engraving, binding, materials, and for every other necessary expense" of the Government Printing and Binding Establishment for the fiscal year ending on the 30th of June, 1866.

These estimates, so far as the number of hands and quantities of material are concerned, are identical with those submitted in September, 1863, for the present fiscal year, but the amount of money required, it will be perceived, is considerably increased, to meet the enhancement in the price of labor and materials of all kinds.

## MINT, BRANCHES, AND ASSAY OFFICE.

MINT OF THE UNITED STATES,  
*Philadelphia, October 24, 1864.*

SIR: I transmit herewith a copy of the estimates of appropriations required to be made for the support of the mint, the branch mint, (Denver,) and assay office, New York, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1866, forwarded this day to the Register of the Treasury. I also transmit certain papers exhibiting the grounds upon which the estimates are based.

The estimates for the mint of the United States, at Philadelphia, are, in the aggregate, \$10,000 greater than the amount appropriated for the current fiscal year. No appropriation was required for incidental and contingent expenses for the present fiscal year, an available balance of former appropriations having been on hand sufficient for our purposes. It is estimated that there will still be a balance of \$30,000 on hand at the close of the current fiscal year. As \$40,000 is the sum necessary for these expenses, an appropriation of \$10,000 is therefore asked for. The sums required under the other heads are the same as were appropriated for the current fiscal year.

The estimates of the assay office, New York are, in the aggregate, \$23,200 greater than the amount appropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1865. The reasons for this increase will be found set forth in the letter from the superintendent, a copy of which is enclosed herewith, marked B.

The estimates of the branch mint, Denver, are, in the aggregate, \$4,666 greater than the amount appropriated for the present fiscal year. Considering the high prices of everything in that Territory, I do not consider the amount asked for unreasonable. I respectfully refer you to letter of the superintendent, a copy of which is enclosed herewith, marked C.

The estimates for the branch mint, San Francisco, have not yet been received, owing, no doubt, to the interruption of the mails, as they were written for some months since, and were due on the 1st instant. With respect to this branch we cannot well prepare an estimate of appropriations required until those prepared by the superintendent are received. The rate of wages at that institution has recently been the subject of correspondence with the department, and until we are fully advised of the state of affairs at this branch mint, it will not be expedient to consider the amount which will probably be required. As soon as the expected papers from the superintendent are received, supplementary estimates will be presented.

The salaries of the officers and clerks of the mint, in Philadelphia, are less than those of any corresponding grade in any of our public institutions, whilst the responsibility is equal to and in many cases greater. They have not been increased for thirty years, and have always been insufficient to meet the expenses incident to the position held. At this time, in consequence of the advanced price of the necessaries of life, all being more than doubled, the compensation of the officers fall far below their actual expenses; and as many of them are entirely dependent on their salaries, I have no hesitation in respectfully and earnestly recommending an increase, as follows:

The director's clerk, and two of the treasurer's clerks, now receiving \$1,800, to be raised to \$2,250, and the four treasurer's clerks, now receiving \$1,500, to be raised to \$1,800.

An increase was approved and recommended by your predecessor, and I would respectfully ask your favorable consideration of the suggested increase, and its recommendation to Congress. Should this increase be granted, the amount required to be appropriated will be \$35,700, instead of \$26,400 now authorized by law.

SIR: I have the honor to enclose to you herewith the usual annual estimates for the support of this branch for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1866.

Various causes combine to make the amount of these estimates larger than that of last year; a few of the most important of which I will proceed to relate to you, viz:

1st. The previous estimates were based upon a currency valuation, as compared with gold, of 80 per cent., whereas to-day currency commands only 50 per cent., and has reached even 40 per cent. It must be borne in mind that all purchases in this State, and all transactions of every nature indeed, are based upon gold prices. Paper money of the United States is not taken here as a legal tender, and is only sold upon the streets by brokers, as gold is sold in New York. Men may place what construction they please upon this state of things, and call it anomalous, unpatriotic, or unworthy of a loyal State of our Union, but the fact exists in its fullest proportions, and cannot be ignored, much as it may be regretted. Not to recognize it as the matter now stands, not to recognize the established principle in California, that all goods purchased are purchased at gold prices, that all contracts made are upon a gold valuation, and that all wages, outside of government employ, are paid in gold, is simply to defy custom and common usage, and disregard, in government matters, its best interests. On account of this depreciation and the enhanced value of nearly every description of merchandise, the amount required for the support of this branch for the fiscal year 1865-'66 will be much greater than that of the preceding year.

2d. Besides, the building in which the operations are conducted is very dilapidated, and insufficient for the wants of the department, and the expense of keeping it in good or even decent order must increase yearly.

3d. The expenses in the treasurer's department have been enhanced by the addition of one clerk, who has been appointed by request of the treasurer to collect the internal revenue tax as bullion.

4th. In the assayer's department also there has been a material increase, by reason of the advance in the wages of assistants. In consequence of the rapid increase of the mining interests on this coast practical assayers are in demand, and it is really no easy matter to preserve in this institution a good and efficient corps.

For these reasons, together with others which may be readily suggested to your mind, the estimates which are submitted, although apparently large, will be no more than sufficient, in the present condition of the currency, for the maintenance of this institution for the year in question. And I beg to express the hope that Congress will not reduce the figures. The estimates of last year were shorn to the extent of \$40,000, and I already see that, in consequence of the depreciation of the currency and this reduction, there will be a deficiency, unless



events not now foreseen come to our aid. At this distance from the head department it is exceedingly difficult to conduct the operations of the branch with a heavy load of debt resting upon it.

## COAST SURVEY.

UNITED STATES COAST SURVEY STATION,  
*Near Danbury, Connecticut, September 30, 1864.*

SIR: In conformity with the regulations for the coast survey, I have the honor to submit my estimates for the fiscal year 1865-66, and would respectfully request that, if approved, they may be included with your estimates for appropriations.

A brief statement of the progress made during the year will be appended, showing the adaptation of the survey, in all parts of its organization, to the present requirements of the government service, in connexion with military and naval operations.

The estimates now presented agree in amount with the appropriations of last year, which, like that for the preceding year, was much less than the appropriation for 1861-'62. They conform to the plan of working approved by the department; being designed to keep the survey in progress in its regular work, to render active aid in co-operating with the fleets and armies of the Union, and to continue the publication of maps and charts, now rendered so important as adjuncts in prosecuting the war. The evidence as to the value of our field and office work, in that connexion, has been made conclusive by the uniform tenor of communications from officers of high position in the army and navy.

The war has not essentially changed the distribution of the working parties. About the same number as were heretofore assigned to duty on the southern coast have been in surveying service with the national forces in the rebellious States. Four parties have acted under the orders of Admiral Lee; three, with as many vessels, under Admiral Dahlgren; and two under Admiral Porter. For the military service in Eastern Virginia and Maryland, six parties have been employed during parts of the season; in West Virginia, three parties; at Knoxville, two parties; at Nashville, two; at Chattanooga, five, previous to and during the movement on the rebel works at Missionary Ridge; two parties accompanied the army in Louisiana and Texas; and one was attached to the Florida tax commission.

From the several officers, in whose commands the parties have been associated, warm acknowledgments have been reiterated as to the importance of the services rendered, and their bearing on the success of military and naval operations. My annual report will contain, as usual, notices of the work in detail. Very brief mention will here be made of the localities and nature of this class of operations, and after it, mention of the advance made in the regular progress of the survey of the coast.

The survey has been kept in full co-operation with the blockading squadrons and with the armies of the Union, as heretofore. In the vicinity of Baltimore the survey of ground connected with the defences has been continued by Sub-Assistant Iardella, and during part of the season by Assistant C. M. Bache. The topography of the approaches to the capital has been further extended beyond the northeast boundary of the District of Columbia by Sub-Assistant Ferguson. A minute topographical survey has been made of Arlington heights by Messrs. Hergesheimer and McMath for the War Department, and special determinations for the effective use of heavy artillery at Washington, New York and Boston, by Assistant Schott. Sub-Assistant Donn is now engaged in surveying the approaches to the fords of the Potomac above and below Harper's Ferry. In West Virginia the latitude and longitude have been determined at eleven military posts by Assistant Dean and Sub-Assistant Mosman, and the magnetic variation at most of them by Mr. S. H. Lyman. At Clarksburg, Virginia, Mr. Linden Kohl assisted in compiling the military map of West Virginia,

and computed the latitude of numerous points from the sextant observations of Lieutenant J. R. Meigs, chief engineer. Sub-Assistant Rockwell, before making a plane-table survey of Strawberry Plains and of the city of Knoxville and its defensive works, in which duty he was associated with Mr. R. H. Talcott, was engaged in similar service at Serwall's Point, Virginia. Assistant West, after reconnoissance duty, which terminated with the battle of Missionary Ridge, Tennessee, was in the same way employed at Bermuda Hundred, Virginia. Sub-Assistants Dorr and Donn made plane-table surveys of the environs and defences of Nashville, and of Chattanooga, Tennessee, previous to the repulse of the enemy from the south approach to that city; and Mr. Donn, in conjunction with Mr. Marindin, afterwards rendered similar service for the army near Petersburg, Virginia. Sub-Assistant Boyd has made a complete survey of the battle-field of Chickamauga, Georgia, and is now under orders to rejoin the army at Chattanooga.

In connexion with the North Atlantic blockading squadron, Mr. Strausz, and subsequently Mr. Cordell, have made resurveys of the bar and channel into Beaufort, North Carolina. The last-named officer sounded the harbor and the entire channel which leads from Beaufort through the straits and through Core sound, marking its course by buoys and stakes. The same parties reset the buoys between the bar and Fort Macon to conform to the resurveys. Mr. Strausz also made a resurvey of Hatteras inlet, and sounded out a stretch of six miles of the Neuse river, below Newbern, marking the channels in both localities by buoys. The triangulation of the Neuse river was at the same time continued by Assistant Fairfield. Sub-Assistant Halter made a triangulation and shore-line survey of Croatan sound, and of Roanoke river, North Carolina, above and below Plymouth. These waters were thoroughly sounded by Sub-Assistant Bradford, and the channel through the latter was marked by spar buoys. He has since sounded and made a chart of Trent's Reach, in James river, Va., and is now engaged in the survey of Bogue sound. A careful reconnoissance of the Cape Lookout shoals has been made by Lieutenant Commander Phelps with the surveying steamer Corwin.

Attached to the South Atlantic blockading squadron, and for service also with the military forces, three parties, with the surveying steamer Vixen and schooners Bailey and Caswell, were assigned. Assistant Boutelle, besides the complete development of the channels at present leading into Charleston harbor, in which also Assistant Edwards was engaged during part of the season, reset the buoys and prepared new sailing directions. Under his direction Folly river and Light-house inlet have been sounded by Sub-Assistant Webber, the hydrography of Warsaw sound has been continued, and a resurvey made of the bar and channel of the St. John's river to a point near Mayport Mills. As heretofore, his party in the Vixen, in charge of Acting Master Platt, rendered the pilot-service required for the vessels of the whole South Atlantic squadron.

Sub-Assistant Dennis made surveys for defensive works at Pilatka, Florida; extended the survey of the St. John's river above Jacksonville, and during the military movements in that vicinity made a reconnoissance of the roads leading towards St. Augustine, Picolata, and Mayport Mills. At Port Royal he surveyed Bay Point and Land's End, for naval purposes, and on Morris and Folly islands traced the shore-lines of the inland passage between Light-house inlet and Folly river.

Mr. McMath was on service with the United States tax commissioners for Florida, at Fernandina and at St. Augustine. He also furnished for military use a copy of the county map showing the interior of Florida beyond Jacksonville.

In the military department of the Gulf, Assistant Oltmanns served on the staff of Major General Franklin, and made surveys along the route of the nine-

teenth army corps, including the environs of Vermilionville, Opelousas, Washington, and Franklin, Louisiana.

Sub-Assistant Hosmer was present with the army detachment at Aransas Pass, Texas, and located the position of the rebel works on a map, after determining the changes that had taken place in the depth of water on the bar of that pass. He performed similar duty at Pass Cavallo, traced and marked the changes which had occurred at the eastern end of Matagorda island, and buoyed the channel into McHenry bayou. After joining the staff of Brigadier General Grover, in January, Mr. Hosmer made surveys at Madisonville and Morganza, Louisiana, and at Fort Adams, Mississippi. Both of these officers accompanied the army of Major General Banks through the Red River campaign.

On the Mississippi river, and for the use of the squadron under Admiral Porter, Assistant Gerdes made a topographical survey of Grand Gulf and its vicinity, and sounded the channel abreast of that post. This was followed by a reconnoissance, which included the shore and channel of about fifty miles of the course of the Mississippi, between Rodney and Vicksburg. He made also a minute survey of the Ohio river and its shores, from Mound City to Cairo, Illinois, with soundings relative to inquiries concerning a navy yard site. Sub-Assistant Fendall assisted in this important survey, and was afterwards on duty with the gunboats which passed up Red river to act in concert with the land forces.

The transfer of some of these parties from one locality to another, as service required, has been noticed in the abstract just given; the transfer of others therein mentioned, for prosecuting the usual work of the survey, will appear in the short summary which follows.

In the northern sections of the Atlantic coast, the regular operations of the survey have been continued, and the parties here enumerated are now at work. Sub-Assistant Dennis, in the topography of the lower part of Passamaquoddy bay, Maine; Assistant Fairfield, in coast triangulation, near Mount Desert island, and Assistant McCorkle, in similar duty in Penobscot river, near Bangor; Sub-Assistant Dorr, in the topography of the islands at the entrance of Penobscot bay; Sub-Assistant Ferguson, at the entrance of St. George's river, Maine; Assistant West, on the shores of Booth bay, Maine; Mr. McMath, on the east side of the Sheepscot river; Assistant Adams, in completing plane-table work on the shores of the water passages which enter the Kennebec, near Bath, Maine; Assistant R. M. Bache, on the shores of the Kennebec, above Bath, and Sub-Assistant Longfellow, in the survey of islands on the east side of Casco bay; Sub-Assistant Webber has sounded the St. George's river, Maine, and its approaches; Mr. Strausz, the waters of Quohog bay, and Lieutenant Commander Phelps has extended the hydrography eastward of the approaches to Portland entrance; Assistant Mitchell has examined the known dangers to navigation in Eastport harbor and Muscle Ridge channel, (Penobscot bay,) and indicated the position of desirable aids to navigation. He has also continued work connected with the special survey of Boston harbor for the United States commissioners. The detailed survey of the shores of Narragansett bay is in progress by Assistant Harrison and Sub-Assistant Hosmer. On the coast of Connecticut, the work of connecting the primary base lines in Sections I and II has been continued by my own party, and Assistant Blunt has extended the triangulation which connects the primary work with points on the Hudson river. The detailed topography of the shores of the Hudson has been extended, by Assistant Whiting, near Sing Sing and Haverstraw. The hydrography, near Sandy Hook, has been re-examined by Assistant Mitchell, the results, as heretofore, having reference to the labors of the engineer department. Assistant C. M. Bache has been engaged at the Highlands of Navesink, New Jersey; the work of verification, on the coast of New Jersey, has been extended by Assistant Farley, to include Absecom inlet; the shores of Absecom harbor have been

resurveyed by Mr. H. W. Bachc, and the hydrography of the approaches and of the inlet executed by Lieutenant Commander Phelps. Assistant Mitchell made a special examination relative to the effect of the ice drift in the Delaware river during the winter of 1863-'64 for the Navy Department.

Tidal observations have been kept up at the permanent stations—at Eastport and Portland, Maine; Charlestown, Massachusetts; in New York harbor and at Old Point Comfort, and magnetic observations at Eastport and Key West.

On the Pacific coast of the United States the triangulation along the Santa Barbara channel, and between Monterey bay and San Francisco, has been continued, and that of Suisun bay is in progress. The topography and in-shore hydrography between Pt. San Pedro and Tunitas creek have been completed, and a resurvey has been made of Mare Island strait, including the approaches to the navy yard.

The great enhancement of prices during the present year has unavoidably been felt in our operations. It is, however, a matter of gratification that the results here sketched compare favorably with those of the preceding years of the war. On the Pacific coast only has the progress of the work been sensibly retarded by the effect of the basis of currency in use there.

In office-work, numerous direct calls have been met from generals and naval officers for tracings on the full scale of such sheets of the coast survey as were applicable to their purposes. These have been very generally found available in siege operations and in blockading service. Copies of maps for immediate use have in all cases been furnished to the naval and military commanders to whose forces the parties have been attached. The tangible evidence of utility thus presented to a class of minds eminently practical has continued to elicit the warm commendation which marked our first connexion with the military and naval forces of the government at the outset of the war.

Of the regular charts of the coast survey, nearly thirty-seven thousand copies have been distributed during the past year. In this aggregate are included twenty-three thousand copies which were supplied to the naval observatory.

The compilation of maps for use in the armies, and to illustrate their operations, has been continued, and the several sheets include, on a uniform scale, by far the greater part of the area of the States in rebellion. The region embraced in the great campaign of Major General Sherman, beyond Chattanooga, was mapped at the office at his request, and by diligent exertion the sheets intended for the use of his army were completed and forwarded before the opening of the campaign.

The call from public officers in the civil and military service for this class of information has become general. Of all kinds, (excluding charts,) seventeen thousand copies have been distributed or sold during the year, the sales, as heretofore, reimbursing for the publication.

The descriptive memoirs of the southern coast, which were prepared at the outbreak of the rebellion, and intended for the exclusive use of naval and military commanders, retain their interest, and have been supplied, as heretofore, when calls were made for them.

The estimates here submitted are designed to carry forward the work required on the eastern part of the Atlantic coast, and to provide for the progress which may be feasible on the southern part, and in the Gulf; to continue the work on the Pacific coast, and to provide for the assignment of special parties, as heretofore, with the concurrence of the department, for service with the fleets and armies.

The estimates for progress on the Atlantic, Gulf coast, Florida reefs, and western coast of the United States, are given, as usual, in separate items, and are exclusive of the aid formerly, but not now, extended for the work by the detail of officers of the army and navy.

### LIGHT-HOUSE BOARD.

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,  
*Office Light-house Board, Washington City, October 5, 1864.*

SIR: I have the honor to submit the accompanying estimates of funds required for the support and maintenance of the light-house establishment for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1866.

These estimates are exhibited in tabular form, from No. 1 to 4. inclusive, with explanatory tables in detail, marked A, B, C, D, E, F, G.

The great advance in the price of labor and materials of all kinds during the year has borne heavily upon the funds provided by Congress for the light-house service, and notwithstanding the fact that some sixty lights have been discontinued by the rebels during the war, the board has been compelled to limit its expenditures to works of the most pressing necessity in order to avoid calling for funds to cover deficiencies.

The act of Congress approved May 23, 1828, provides that the average of

salaries of keepers of light-houses on the Atlantic, Gulf and lake coasts, shall not exceed \$400 per annum, and the estimate now submitted under that head is based upon the provisions of that act. It is recommended, however, in view of the high prices of all articles of subsistence, that the average be increased to \$500 per annum.

There is also herewith submitted a list of special works for which appropriations are desired, all of which are believed to be necessary to properly facilitate the commerce of the country; but as it is doubted whether the condition of the finances is such as to induce Congress to grant appropriations for all the works named, they have been arranged under two heads,—the first embracing those considered indispensable for the wants of navigation, and the second comprising those of great importance, but whose execution may without actual hazard be deferred.

GOVERNMENT HOSPITAL FOR THE INSANE,

SIR: I have the honor to present herewith estimates to supply a deficiency in the appropriation for the support of the hospital during the current fiscal year; also, estimates for the support of the institution, for sundry needful repairs and improvements, and for the continuation of the wall enclosing the grounds.

The amount asked to supply the deficiency in the current fiscal year will, I trust, be thought reasonable, when the great advance in the cost of supplies is considered, and it is made known that three hundred and fifty-one (351) patients were under treatment on the first of the current fiscal year, and that as early as the first of September the number had reached four hundred (400.)

The amount asked for the support of the hospital during the year ending June 30, 1866, is the sum of the appropriation already made for the current year, (\$60,500,) and of the estimated deficiency of that appropriation, (\$30,000.)

The improvements contemplated in submitting the third item are needed to-day, either for the comfort of the patients or for the efficient, economical administration of the establishment.

The ten thousand dollars asked for the continuation of the wall enclosing the grounds is the amount of the usual annual appropriation for an important work commenced a number of years ago, and now well advanced.

I trust that the small amount asked to provide suitable residences on the grounds for the families of the clerk, mechanics, and laborers, in the service of the hospital, will meet with your approval. The necessity and economy of employing men with families has become almost imperative. It is found that it costs less money to provide residences on the grounds for such employés than to pay them the equivalent of the rent of houses situated at a distance from the institution. Every assistant, connected with a hospital for the insane, needs to be incessantly at his post of duty. The vigilance of the maniac, and the thousand necessities of the sick and helpless, have little remission, and conform to no working or office hours. Besides, experience shows that men with families, comfortably provided for, near at hand, are more constant, and become more identified with the interests of an arduous service than do single men, or married men separated from their families.

For salaries and other necessary expenses of the metropolitan police for the District of Columbia, one hundred and ten thousand dollars; and the compen-

sation of said metropolitan police force, officers and clerks, be, and the same is hereby, increased fifty per centum upon the amount hereby appropriated, commencing on the first day of July, 1865; said increase to be borne by the cities of Washington and Georgetown and the county of Washington, in the District of Columbia, in the proportion equal to the number of patrolmen allotted severally to the city of Washington, to the city of Georgetown, and the county of Washington, beyond the limits of said cities. And the corporation authorities of said cities of Washington and Georgetown, and the levy court of said county, be, and they are hereby, authorized and empowered to levy a special tax, not exceeding one-quarter of one per centum, for the purpose aforesaid.

COLUMBIA INSTITUTION FOR THE DEAF AND DUMB, AND THE BLIND,  
*Washington, October 22, 1864.*

SIR: In compliance with the request contained in your letter of the 25th of July last, I have the honor to transmit herewith estimates of expenditures for this institution for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1866.

The greatly increased cost of all articles of domestic use now prevailing renders it necessary that the appropriations for the support of the institution should be somewhat increased. There is every probability that the number of our inmates will be considerably augmented next year, as it has been during the year now current. The proper advancement of our pupils, as they engage in studies of a high grade, renders important the use of illustrative apparatus and books of reference.

To make adequate provision for the support of the institution, and to supply the wants above referred to, will require an appropriation of at least twelve thousand five hundred dollars, (\$12,500.) I therefore respectfully recommend that Congress be asked to appropriate that sum, for "salaries and incidental expenses, including five hundred dollars for the purchase of books and illustrative apparatus."

In my last report estimates were submitted for the erection of buildings needed for the proper accommodation of the male department and mechanic shops, for the purchase of additional land for the use of the institution, and for the introduction of the Potomac water.

Congress, as you are aware, made appropriations for the purchase of the land and for laying of a water-pipe, but failed to provide for the extension of our buildings. A fine tract of land, adjoining the grounds of the institution on the north and west, containing about fourteen acres, has been secured, and the Potomac water introduced into the institution, without exceeding the amount of the appropriation for these objects.

While the benefits thus accruing to the institution are very great, at the same time the inconveniences to which our inmates have been subjected, by the failure on the part of Congress to make the appropriation for the buildings, have been well nigh unendurable. The need for these buildings was so apparent on the occasion of your visit last year as to lead you to express the opinion in your report, that "the wooden structures now appurtenant to the buildings occupied were entirely unsafe for the purposes to which they were applied," and to recommend to Congress that they "be removed and their places supplied by substan-

tial brick buildings." I trust, therefore, in urging the importance of the second estimate, submitted herewith, it will be sufficient for me to say that the necessities for enlargement and improvement which burdened us last year, and still pressing with the added force of increased numbers, and another year's decay of buildings long since so dilapidated as to be a source of mortification and discomfort to every one connected with the institution.

You will observe that I have added eight thousand dollars to the amount as submitted last year. This is to provide for furniture, steam-heating apparatus, gas and water pipes and fixtures, and a gas-making apparatus; these items not being included in the former estimate, and being essential to the completion and fitting up of the buildings. For the carrying out of these improvements, so necessary to the proper management of the institution, I would therefore respectfully recommend that Congress be asked to appropriate the sum of thirty-nine thousand four hundred and forty-five dollars and eighty-seven cents, (\$39,445 87.)

The third estimate presented at this time, for the proper enclosure, grading, and improvement of the grounds of the institution, is highly important, in that it is necessary to provide suitable protection to the property of the institution, especially the gardens and orchards, from the inroads of straggling pilferers now more than usually numerous in the District. The fences on the property recently acquired are too much decayed to be advantageously repaired, excepting on the west side, and are even too weak to afford a proper enclosure to the domestic animals needed for the use of the household. The grading of Boundary street, between Sixth and Seventh streets east, now being perfected at the expense of the city of Washington, renders it important, both for the proper drainage of, and convenient access to our grounds, that the grade along our front should be made to correspond with that of the street. A necessity also arises for the construction of a new carriage path from the institution buildings to Boundary street, and for the laying of several new drains.

For these improvements; so evidently necessary to the preservation of the property of the institution, and to the proper arrangement of the grounds, I respectfully recommend that Congress be asked to appropriate the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars.

## EXPLANATION OF ESTIMATES.

1. The \$6,000 herein estimated is to close the surveying service in the field, and includes \$2,000 to defray the incidental expenses of the surveyor general's office at Dubuque, Iowa.

2. The \$15,000 herein estimated is to be applied to the survey of pine lands and other public lands required for immediate settlement; it includes, also, \$2,000 for incidental expenses of the surveyor general's office.

3. The \$15,000 herein estimated is for the extension of public surveys to such localities as shall be required for actual settlements.

4. No estimate is submitted, for the reason that no surveys will be required in the present diminished limits of the Territory, and because there exists an unexpended appropriation of \$10,000, which may be used in case surveys will be required.

5 and 6. The \$25,000 for the surveying service in Kansas, and the like amount in Nebraska, is for the extension of the public surveys therein. The surveys are chiefly necessitated by the obligations on the part of the government along the line of the Pacific railroad, preparatory to the allotment of lands to that improvement, the progress of which is stimulated by the vast mineral discoveries in the Territories traversed by its contemplated line.

7. Estimate of \$15,000 is for the extension of public surveys over the regions which will have been settled, and other localities, with the view to affording facilities to pre-emptors, &c.

8. For explanation of estimate 8, see explanation Nos. 5 and 6.

9. For explanation of estimate 9, see explanation No. 4.

10. For the extension of public surveys on the Canadian river, and in the vicinity of Fort Stanton, where settlements have already been formed.

11. No estimate is submitted, for the reason that the unexpended amount of former appropriation is deemed adequate for the service.

12. For explanation of estimate 12, see explanation Nos. 5 and 6.

13. The very large increase of population in eastern Oregon, induced by the rich mineral discoveries upon the rivers and mountain ranges, require the extension of the public surveys, and the sum estimated is the lowest that can possibly be made.

14. For explanation of estimate No. 14, see estimate No. 13.

15. No estimate is submitted for the surveys in Utah; none will be required.

REMARKS.—By the act of Congress approved May 30, 1862, the power of fixing the rate per mile for surveys is expressly delegated to the Commissioner, but in "no case" to exceed the maximum established by law. It is hence his duty to reduce the rates under maximums stipulated in these estimates, according as circumstances may allow, and hence the maximum in said estimates is by no means to be considered as the controlling rates.

The above salaried clerks are required for the proper performance of the duties in the ordnance department of the different yards. The ordnance stores and accounts were formerly kept in charge of the storekeeper, but are now entirely transferred to the ordnance officer. This change of system, and the vast increase in the labors of the ordnance departments, make it absolutely necessary that persons of ability and responsibility should be permanently attached to the ordnance offices, for the performance of the clerical and other duties connected therewith. The salaries are fixed at the very lowest amounts at which it is thought possible to secure competent persons.

The salary asked for the draughtsman is about the same as the pay now received by him.

The services of a skilful analytical chemist are greatly needed in the ordnance department of the navy. For the want of such a person, the department has frequently to resort to outside parties, and often suffers for the want of chemical analysis and information, which, if furnished, would be of great service to the government. Instead, therefore, of a pyrotechnist, which has been heretofore employed, the bureau asks for a skilled analytical chemist and an assistant pyrotechnist.
