CIVIL ESTABLISHMENT.

The Civil Establishment is a public institution established for the purpose of providing for the education and training of the youth of the State. It is a body corporate and has the right to acquire, hold, and dispose of real and personal property, to sue and be sued, and to do all such other acts and things as may be necessary for the accomplishment of its objects.

The establishment is organized into several departments, each of which is headed by a department head. The departments are: the Department of Education, the Department of Physical Education, the Department of Music, the Department of Art, the Department of Science, and the Department of Social Studies.

The Department of Education is the largest and most important of the departments. It is responsible for the general supervision of the schools and for the preparation of the curriculum. The Department of Physical Education is responsible for the physical training of the students. The Department of Music is responsible for the musical instruction of the students. The Department of Art is responsible for the artistic instruction of the students. The Department of Science is responsible for the scientific instruction of the students. The Department of Social Studies is responsible for the instruction of the students in the principles of government and citizenship.

The establishment is supported by the State and by the people of the State. It is a public institution and is not a private corporation. It is subject to the control and supervision of the State and of the people of the State.

NOTE.—It will be seen by the above estimate that the number of civil assistant professors is reduced, and an increase of pay is recommended for the professors and assistant professors. At its last session, Congress made a liberal increase to the pay of commissioned professors in the Navy, and it seems but just that the civil professors and assistants of this Academy should participate in its liberality. Trusting to that liberality, and in the best interests of the Academy, this estimate for the professors has been based upon the minimum pay allowed to commissioned professors. The rate of pay now allowed to professors here is not sufficient to command and retain competent ones. In the case of the professor at the head of the department of mathematics, it is important in that essential branch of learning that the chief should not only be an accomplished mathematician, but have decided executive ability, and it is impossible to obtain or retain the services of such a one on less pay than that estimated for.

Explanation of item for Reporting Decisions of Court of Claims, submitted on page 13, ante.

In explanation of the item of \$2,000 for clerical hire—labor in preparing and superintending the printing of the 6th volume of the Court of Claims Reports—I would say that the duty of furnishing copies of the decisions of the court to various officers of the Government was, by the act of March 17, 1866, (14 Statutes, p. 9, chapter 19, sec. 3,) assigned to the clerk of the court. These copies of the decisions merely, without a statement of the case and a syllabus of the opinions, would be of no use whatever. The decisions of the court without these would furnish no definite, uniform, and practical rule of action to the officers of the Executive Departments, or to the court or bar. The clerk of the court, therefore, with the assistance and under the supervision of Judge Nott, undertook the duty of reporting the cases in a regular form. Four volumes have been reported, the labor of which has been generally performed in the night, or out of the regular hours of official duties, besides which a considerable sum of money has been necessarily paid for clerical assistance in preparing the 5th volume, now nearly ready for the press, and this sum must be increased for the 6th volume. No compensation for the 4th volume, recently printed, has been received by the reporters, either from the Government or from furnishing copies to the bar, as, under the law relating to the public printing, when a volume is being printed for the use of the Government, any person can order an extra number of copies printed for his own use by paying for the paper and press work, which was done in the case of the 4th volume, by the Messrs. Morrison, who thus received the benefits of the sale of the book to the public. The business of the court has so much increased, that it has become impossible for one of the judges and clerk to prepare these reports without hiring assistance, and without much extra labor performed in extra hours. I have, therefore, placed the compensation for these expenses and this labor at \$2,000 for the 6th volume, instead of \$1,000, as was appropriated for the 5th volume, \$2,000 being much less than would be required to compensate an independent and competent reporter.

APPENDIX C.

UNITED STATES TREASURY,

New York, October 12, 1870.

SIR: In conformity with your instructions, I have the honor to enclose estimates for the salaries of the officers, clerks, and other

employés of this office for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1872. They are based on the actual monthly expenditures for that object at the close of the previous year, except in the case of one clerk, filling a responsible position, whose salary of \$800 per annum is so manifestly inadequate, that I have raised it in the estimates to \$1,000, with the hope that at the proper time I may have your assent to the increase.

No provisions, it will be seen, have been made for any additional force, as I have no means of judging whether it will be required or not. I simply call your attention to the fact, so that if you think it proper you can add a sufficient sum to the estimate to meet the exigency, should it arise.

It will be noticed that, with the exception of the chief officers, who are mentioned by their titles, all employés of the office are classified by the amount of their salaries, the individuals composing each class receiving equal sums. This was done to avoid a long array of names and figures, and will, I presume, be sufficiently in detail to answer the requirements of the Department.

On a careful consideration, I can see no way to reduce the present amount paid for salaries, without detriment to the business of the office. There are particular periods when perhaps a less number of clerks would suffice, but as these are exceptional, they afford no rule by which to determine the actual force required, which must of necessity be regulated according to the labor performed throughout the year.

A reduction of salaries, considered with reference to the nature and value of the services rendered, appears as impracticable as a reduction of the force. In an office like this, where honesty, capability, and experience, are indispensable, not only for the safety of the Government, but for the prompt and efficient conduct of the public business, it would be a loss rather than a gain to lessen the rate of compensation, if it resulted, as it doubtless would, in lowering the present standard of qualifications, and committing the business of the office to persons who, from their inexperience, if not for other reasons, would be incapable of transacting it in a proper manner.

No estimates have been made for the contingent expenses of this office, including stationery, for the reason that I do not find them included in the estimates for the previous year, and am informed by the Chief Clerk of the Department that they are not required. If I am in error on this point, please notify me, and the omission will be supplied.

APPENDIX D.

DEPARTMENT OF METROPOLITAN POLICE,
Office of the Board, Washington, D. C., October 17, 1870.

SIR: Agreeably to your circular letter of the 8th ultimo, I have the honor to submit, in duplicate, estimates of appropriations necessary for

the support of the Metropolitan Police of the District of Columbia, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1872.

It will be observed, from notes appended to the estimates in explanation, as required by the instructions contained in the act of June 17, 1844, that some changes in amounts for expenditures have been deemed necessary, on account of the act of June 17, 1870, establishing a "Police Court." It was found impracticable to get prisoners to the place where the court is held from whence arrested, in remote precincts, without means of transportation. A single carriage or prison van has been purchased for this purpose. It is believed, however, that for the convenient accommodation of all portions of the District, not less than three such vans will be necessary for the greater portion of the year.

The Board of Police has been obliged to change its quarters and incur increased expenses for rent, furniture, removal, &c., which have been paid, except the current rent, from the surplus of past appropriations. The passage of the act establishing a Police Court has rendered the appropriation of six thousand four hundred dollars for the salaries of eight police magistrates unnecessary for the current year. But a considerable portion of that sum must be absorbed, however, in providing the three spans of horses and vans, and necessary expenses incident to the transportation of prisoners from the several police station-houses to the Police Court, for which no specific appropriation is applicable. These expenditures are, therefore, made from the appropriation as for "necessary expenses," under the general authority embraced in the act of August 6, 1861, and subsequent acts relating to the powers and duties of the Board of Police.

In view of the fact that for new services precise estimates cannot well be relied upon, it is desirable that the phraseology of the appropriation, and conditions imposed, be substantially in the form heretofore employed. But to protect the officers, and secure to them the portion of their salaries required to be paid by the local authorities, I would respectfully suggest, that a proviso be attached to the provision authorizing the collection and payment of the additional fifty per centum by said authorities, in such form as will secure the fund so collected to be kept separate from their general fund, in a special depository; and that none other than requisitions for the purpose of such payment, shall be drawn thereon. Such a provision, it seems to me, would prevent the continuance of a misapplication of that fund to other purposes, and hence, secure the payment of the police as required by law, but which has been withheld on the part of the authorities of Washington city since February, 1870, thereby causing great sacrifices to its members, and seriously embarrassing the efficiency of the force. The adoption of the accompanying form, it is believed, would effect the desired end.

It is deemed proper to remark, that the aggregate sum estimated as required for expenses of the Metropolitan Police, under the changed system of preliminary jurisdiction through the Police Court, effects a reduction of three thousand one hundred and eighty dollars, from the amount heretofore required.

FORM OF APPROPRIATION.

“For salaries and other necessary expenses of the Metropolitan Police for the District of Columbia, two hundred and seven thousand eight hundred and seventy dollars: *Provided*, That a further sum, amounting to one hundred and three thousand nine hundred and thirty-five dollars, shall be paid to defray the expenses of said Metropolitan Police by the cities of Washington and Georgetown, and the county of Washington, (beyond the limits of said cities,) in the District of Columbia, in the proportion corresponding to the number of privates allotted severally to said local authorities; and the corporate authorities of said cities, and the levy court of said county, are hereby authorized and required to levy and collect a special tax, not exceeding one-third of one per centum, sufficient therefor, and deposit the same as often as once in each week, when such collections are made, in a special safe depository separate from that of other general funds; and that none other than requisitions for the purpose of paying an additional compensation of fifty per centum, and other expenses of the Metropolitan Police, shall be drawn thereon for the service of the fiscal year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-two.”

APPENDIX D. D.

Explanation of Estimates for the Military Academy.

WAR DEPARTMENT,

*Office of Inspector of the Military Academy,**Washington, D. C., October 20, 1870.*

SIR: I have the honor to submit herewith estimates of the amounts required for the service of the Military Academy during the next fiscal year, for all purposes other than the pay of officers and cadets, estimates for which are submitted by the Paymaster General.

It is proper to explain that the delay in the preparation and submission of these estimates has been occasioned by my desire to verify by personal observation at West Point the necessities attendant upon each amount requested.

The estimates for repairs and improvements, fuel and apparatus, repairs of gas pipes, gasometers, and retorts, fuel for mess-hall and shops, postage and telegrams, stationery, transportation, printing, clerks, departments of instruction, increase and expenses of library, and miscellaneous and incidental expenses, embracing the current and ordinary expenses of the fiscal year, are economically drawn, and do not differ materially from the estimates of past years, and call for little explanation.

It may be stated, that the estimates for the expenses of the library is founded on the reduced appropriations of the past two or three years, and the oft expressed desire of the officers of the Academy and the yearly Board of Visitors to extend a measure of justice to the old sol-

dier, who, for so many years, with but the scanty pay of his rank and a small additional allowance, has been regarded as one of the most useful servants of the Government at West Point. Should the full amount of the estimates for the library be granted by Congress, the succeeding estimate for miscellaneous and incidental expenses is to be regarded as reduced by one hundred and twenty dollars.

The estimates for contingencies of the Superintendent is the same in amount as appropriations heretofore granted, and the necessities of the case have already been fully explained.

The estimates for expenses of the Board of Visitors is based on the probable amount required for the purpose. The expenditures on this account are incurred under the requirements of existing law, and the estimate is submitted in the belief that the outstanding balance cannot, under the act of July 12, 1870, be used for their payment.

The estimates for repairing and opening roads amounts to one-half the sum applied for last year, on which only \$500 were appropriated.

Since then, the destructive rains of last fall and the spring of the present year have still further damaged the roads leading in various directions, and used for necessary purposes, and they cannot be properly repaired and new ones opened for any less than the sum named. It is earnestly recommended that this appropriation, reluctantly asked for, be granted.

For grading, draining, and improving the cavalry and artillery drill ground, five thousand dollars were requested last year, and two thousand granted. The progress made with this sum clearly demonstrates its insufficiency, and an additional thousand dollars is now asked for, as the least amount that will be of any service. The dangerous condition of this ground, and the frequency of accidents to persons and animals, render its improvement a work of humanity.

The estimate for increasing the supply of water is submitted on account of the total failure for two years past of the source from which the supply is usually drawn—a contingency likely to occur again unless something be done towards furnishing a permanent and more abundant supply. For three months during the present year, it has been impracticable to supply any water for bathing purposes, and with rigid economy there was, early in the present month, a scarcity of water for domestic uses. In September of last year, the laundry, a building valued at over \$10,000, was totally destroyed by fire, on account of an insufficiency of water, despite the services of a well-organized fire department, and the presence of a powerful steam fire-engine. The freshets of last spring damaged the reservoir at the foot of Crow Nest Mountain, one of the main sources of supply, to an extent that cannot be repaired for less than five thousand dollars. The rest of the estimate is to cover the expense of a detailed survey and estimate, by some experienced hydraulic engineer, for bringing an abundant supply of water to West Point from "Round Pond," four miles distant.

I desire particularly to state, with reference to the estimate for the fire-proof office building, that the structure itself will be completed for the sum already appropriated, as the Committee on Appropriations were last year assured, and that the sum now requested is for internal fittings

and movable furniture. Indeed, but for the interposition of the eight-hour law, after the original plans and estimates were drawn, no request for the present sum would have become necessary.

These estimates, even with the new items introduced, are less than the estimates last presented by over thirty-three thousand dollars, and are seven thousand dollars below the appropriations for the present fiscal year.

APPENDIX E.

Explanation of estimate for Government Hospital for the Insane, ante page 70.

The annual increase of the average number of patients supported by the Government in the last two fiscal years, was 16 per cent. It was 18 per cent. in 1869-'70, upon the number of Government patients under treatment in 1868-'69, and 14 per cent. in 1868-'69, upon the number of such patients in 1867-'68. If the same ratio of increase continues during the current year (1870-'71,) and during the fiscal year for which this estimate is made, (1871-'72,) the average number of patients during the latter year for whose support and treatment provision will need be made, will be 538. Though the admission of the class of patients known as LATE SOLDIERS AND SAILORS, have been greater during the first quarter of the current year than the average of any one year since the passage of the act of July 13, 1866, providing for their care in this institution, it is thought that the occurrence of fresh cases entitled to the benefits of the hospital under the provisions of that act must, in time, diminish. When the accession of this class of cases to the population of the establishment will begin to diminish, and how rapidly they will then lessen, cannot be clearly foreseen. No reason is known for supposing that there will be a lower ratio of admissions of the other classes of the insane which the institution is required to provide for, except the fact that the number of new cases of insanity which have occurred in the Army and Navy, and in the District of Columbia, has been quite as large in the last two years, in proportion to the number of men in the military and naval service, and to the population of the District, as is usual in other bodies of men or in mixed communities, and much increase of the ratio of cases of recent origin to population would be extraordinary. Upon the data and considerations now briefly stated, the Board of Visitors of the hospital base the opinion that the average number of patients supported by the Government in the year ending June 30, 1872, will not be less than 500, and respectfully ask for \$125,000, the amount necessary to maintain that number, with a small addition for contingencies. The amount asked supposes the average cost of maintaining each patient will be about 68 cents per day, which is thought to be the lowest rate at which the classes of the insane under the care of the Government can be comfortably supported, and the disease with which they are afflicted properly treated.

APPENDIX G.

HYDROGRAPHIC OFFICE,

Washington, October 7, 1870,

COMMODORE: As the amount of appropriation required for the coming year is being considered, I would respectfully ask the attention of the Bureau to the necessity of an additional appropriation for this office, in order to place it on a permanent footing, and for its gradual increase.

The amount appropriated for the present year is barely sufficient to carry on the office work, and issue the charts at present belonging to this office.

In order to furnish our commerce with the necessary charts and books, for navigation, it is necessary to increase from year to year the number of our plates, until we are in a condition to furnish every chart, independent of the Hydrographic Office of Great Britain. Within the United States, commerce has no office but this to look to for such a supply. I consider it also of the most vital importance that the building in which this office is located should belong to the Government, and be sufficiently extensive, and fire-proof.

At the present moment, the collection of charts, books, and instruments, stored in this building is valuable, infinitely more so when it is considered that, were any accident to happen to it, all our naval vessels would be without charts, &c., until another supply could be imported from England, and many of the books could not readily be replaced.

I would also state, that the demand for the charts now published at this office is increasing. With a more extended commerce, and an increase of the hydrographic publications, the office will yearly approach

to self-paying, and the amount of purchases from abroad will decrease, until we are wholly independent.

In addition to the amount heretofore appropriated for office-work, correction of plates, &c., I would respectfully suggest, that at least fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) will be required for engraving and gradually increasing the number of plates; and for the purchase or construction of an appropriate building, forty thousand dollars (\$40,000.)

Looking to the necessity of a hydrographic establishment, both for our Government and commercial marine, I believe that the above estimate cannot but be considered as moderate.

APPENDIX H.

SIR: I have the honor to transmit herewith statement of appropriations required to meet the indebtedness of the Government for interest on abstracted Indian trust fund bonds, also estimate of appropriations necessary to meet the interest due on non-paying State bonds, belonging to said fund, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1871.

In addition to the regular estimate, upon the recommendation of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, and in accordance with my own views, I have introduced an estimate for deficiency to meet incidental expenses from the 4th of March, 1869, connected with the business of the trust fund; and it is proper to remark, that an estimate of this character was submitted by the Commissioner of Indian Affairs to my predecessor, but for reasons satisfactory to the Department was not presented to Congress at its last session.

As there is a large amount of over-due interest on many of the State bonds held by me for the benefit of various Indian tribes, I agree with the Commissioner in the views expressed in the accompanying copy of an extract from his annual report. I request that the estimate for an appropriation of fifteen hundred dollars to meet expenses connected with the business of the Indian trust fund, for the year ending June 30, 1872, may be included in the general estimates to be submitted to the ensuing Congress.

Extract from the report of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs for the year 1870.

In the trust fund report for the year 1869, I had the honor to call your attention especially to several points in relation to the clerical

duties and contingent expenses of the Department in connection with these funds, the principal of which then exceeded \$4,000,000.

In conducting these extensive financial transactions, many intricate and responsible questions often arise, in the proper solution of which considerable time and expense must necessarily occur, I would therefore again respectfully call your attention to the following closing paragraph of my report of November 1, 1869, in relation to this subject:

“As the present honorable Secretary of the Interior considers appropriations as heretofore made for the contingencies of the Indian Department not strictly applicable to such purposes, it would seem highly necessary, in view of this branch of the Indian service, that a request should be made for a special appropriation to aid the department in carrying out with promptness, and to the satisfaction of the Indians, the treaty stipulations made with various tribes in relation to the management of their funds, held in trust by the Secretary of the Interior, as trustee.”

APPENDIX K.

Explanation of the estimates for the Government Hospital for the Insane.

The west wing of the hospital edifice was opened for the reception of patients in January, 1855, and has since been constantly occupied by a large number of insane men. Some of the floors are nearly worn out, and need to be renewed. Some of the furniture is considerably worn, and needs repairs or renewal, and additional furniture is necessary on account of the large increase of patients beyond the number originally provided for in that part of the house.

The roof of the entire wing needs painting, and the interior wood-work needs repainting or varnishing. The car tracks and some of the pavement in the basement require renewal.

These repairs and improvements are required both for the preservation of the building and for the promotion of the health and comfort of the insane under treatment in the institution.

The wall has been built on three sides of the original grounds of the hospital, a distance of nearly two miles. The completion of the work,

by the erection of the wall along the river front, is necessary to render what has already been built fully useful as a barrier against escapes of patients and the intrusion of the public. It is also necessary, both to free the grounds along the river shore from miasm, and to prevent them from being gradually washed away by the action of the water in storms. The completion of the wall will lessen the number of attendants necessary to watch the patients while exercising in the grounds, and make a valuable addition to the productive lands of the institution by reclaiming several acres from the river.

This tract of land is principally used for grazing milch cows and beeves. It is now enclosed by a rail fence, much of which is old and poor, and a more substantial fence is necessary to render the land fully available for the economical purposes of the institution. This land will, in time, be cleared, underdrained, fertilized, and made highly productive by the ordinary labor of the hospital, but the fencing needed cannot be done without the aid of a small special appropriation. The length of the fence required is about two and one-eighth miles.

APPENDIX L.

Explanation of Light-House estimates.

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,
OFFICE OF THE LIGHT-HOUSE BOARD,
Washington, October 13, 1870.

SIR: The estimate for the support and maintenance of the light-house service for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1872, called for by your circular letter of September 1st last, are herewith submitted.

These estimates have been made up with great care, taking for supplies, material, and labor, the current rates as the guide, and including minimum sums to meet contingent expenses growing out of the buoy service, delivery of supplies, and damage by gales, ice, freshets, &c.

The small aggregate increase over last year's appropriation (1870-'71) may be accounted for by the fact that the appropriations were \$99,104 less than the estimates, and that many new aids to navigation have been authorized and established, which will require supplies and light-keepers, and be liable to the ordinary annual expense of other lights, &c. By the construction and operation of the 5th section of the act approved July 12, 1870, making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses, for the year ending June 30, 1871, the sum of \$99,214 85 was carried to the surplus fund from the appropriations made for the support of the Light-house Establishment for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1870.

The balances making this aggregate had been husbanded with the expectation of applying them to the repairing of light-vessels, supply-vessels, and tenders, and to the repairs and preservation of certain lights needing early attention, as soon as the appropriations for the

then next fiscal year should have been made; previous to which it would not have been safe to reduce them, for fear of demands which gales, freshets, &c., are always liable to make on the light-house appropriations.

The cutting down of the estimates for the year \$99,104, and the transfer of the aggregate balance in the Treasury on the 30th June to the surplus fund, amounting to \$99,214 85, making a total of nearly \$200,000. has prevented, and must prevent, unless a sufficient sum be appropriated as a deficiency, the efficient and economical working of the light-house service for the current fiscal year. A certain quantity of oil, wicks, chimneys, and cleaning materials, must be procured in advance, and distributed at regular periods during each year; the buoys must be raised, cleaned, and replaced; and damage to aids by gales, ice, freshets, &c., requires prompt attention, and the not infrequent expenditure of large sums of money. The vessels employed in the light-house service require to be staunch and kept in good repair, otherwise the hazardous service upon which they are employed cannot be performed by them.

The light-house service, unlike that of many other branches of the public service, cannot be contracted at will, without the hazard of great loss of life and property. A light-house cannot be extinguished, a light-vessel or buoy removed from position, without seriously endangering navigation. There is little or no competition among manufacturers of the indispensable articles of supply of the light-house service, and in the main they can only be obtained after considerable time has been allowed to the manufacturers or dealers to provide them at their own prices. It is therefore recommended that the sum of \$200,000 may be included in a deficiency bill, at the next session of Congress, for the general purposes of the Light-House Establishment, to enable the Light-House Board to provide necessary supplies for light-houses and light-vessels, buoys and their fitments, and for the providing and repair of the light-vessels and tenders, which require immediate attention, and for preserving such foundations of and repairing such light-houses as are of pressing importance.

The estimates for special works submitted for the consideration of Congress embrace many items of appropriation for new stations and restoring or renovating old ones, for which appropriations remained in the Treasury on the 30th June, 1870, but reverted on that day, under the operation of the 5th and 6th sections of the act heretofore referred to, approved July 12, 1870; and are, in effect, merely giving Congress the data for determining whether or not previous appropriations were proper. The aggregate amount of the old appropriations that reverted was about \$1,000,000.

APPENDIX M.

Explanations of Coast Survey Estimates.

COAST SURVEY OFFICE,

Washington, September 28, 1870.

SIR: In submitting estimates for continuing the survey of the coast of the United States during the fiscal year 1871-'72, I would respectfully present an abstract of the operations of the present surveying year. The parties now on duty will continue in their respective sites of work until the approach of winter makes it expedient to resume the survey in the southern sections of the coast. Final reports for the year will be received when the parties are transferred, and the results will, as heretofore, be presented in my detailed annual report.

The work of the year has included the topography of the shores and the hydrography of Moose-a-bec Reach, on the coast of Maine; triangulation for the survey of Southwest Harbor, (Mount Desert Island; extension of the hydrography at the entrance to Penobscot Bay; topography of the Fox Islands, of the vicinity of Muscle Ridge Channel, and that of islands in Penobscot Bay, near Camden; plane-table work and soundings on the Kennebec River, near Gardiner; coast topography near Biddeford, Maine. The survey of Lake Champlain is now in progress, and soundings have been commenced in its waters. Supplementary soundings have been made between Portland Harbor and Cape Ann, and in-shore soundings on the west side of Cape Cod Bay. The longitude of Duxbury, Massachusetts, has been determined relative to Brest, in France, by telegraphic operations through the French Atlantic cable; and topography done this year nearly completes the detailed survey of the shores of Narraganset Bay. The triangulation stations in the vicinity of New Haven Harbor have been examined. Special observations have been made of tides and currents in New York Harbor, and the positions of buoys and sea-marks have been verified for the engraved charts.

South of New York, the operations include triangulation near Mount Holly; coast topography near Atlantic City; the main triangulation along the Blue Ridge, south of Washington; shore-line survey and sounding of the estuaries on the east side of Chesapeake Bay, and of the outer coast of Virginia, north of Cape Charles, developing in that vicinity the Broadwater; triangulation of the James River; off-shore hydrography northward of Cape Hatteras; triangulation, topography, and hydrography in Pamlico Sound; hydrographic resurvey of the channels of Cape Fear River, North Carolina; examination of the station-marks along the coast of South Carolina, north of Charleston; topography between Broad River and Savannah River, defining May River and Wright's River; extension of the primary triangulation of this section to Savannah, Georgia; topography of St. Andrew's Sound; hydrography abreast of Cumberland Island, Georgia; the sounding of North River and Matanzas River, northward and southward of St. Augustine Harbor, Florida; topography of keys in Chatham Bay, and soundings in their vicinity; hydrography of the Gulf of Mexico off the

Marquesas, and of the quicksands between the Marquesas and the Tortugas; triangulation and shore-line survey of St. Andrew's Bay and its branches, including St. Andrew's Sound, on the western side of Florida; soundings completing the hydrography of Lake Borgne, Louisiana; triangulation on the north side of Isle-au-Breton Sound; and triangulation and topography, east and west from Fort St. Philip, of the banks of the Mississippi River.

The work now in progress on the western coast comprises the following operations:

Determination of the latitude, and azimuth, and magnetic elements at three principal stations on the Santa Barbara Channel, coast of California, and difference of longitude between San Francisco and the lighthouse on Point Arena; coast topography between Santa Barbara and Point Conception, and between San Pedro and Point Duma; special examination of the tides and currents of San Francisco Bay; azimuth, triangulation, and topography in the vicinity of Point Arena; reconnaissance and topography of Humboldt Bay, and special examination of changes in shore-line at the mouth of Eel River; shore-line survey from Red Bluff to Eureka; azimuth near Crescent City, and topography north from Point St. George; plane-table survey of the north shore of the Columbia River, Oregon; completion of the topography of Port Discovery and Washington Harbor, and their connection with New Dun-geness Rock; plane-table survey of Blunt's Island, and of the shore from Admiralty Head to Deception Pass.

The parties on the western coast are yet actively engaged in the field, and their final reports have not come in. My visit to San Francisco, in July last, afforded ample evidence of the excellent condition of the work on the western coast, considering the means allotted for its prosecution.

The operations of the Coast Survey Office, embracing the computation of observations, the drawing, engraving, and publication of maps and charts, have kept pace with the field work. Eight new charts have been published, and twenty-three others have been advanced by adding the additional results of the previous season's field work. Eleven new charts have been commenced, and fifty-nine, in all, have been worked upon. Of the various engraved charts, twelve thousand copies have been printed, and ten thousand four hundred issued. Seventy-two manuscript maps have been copied or traced for various departments of the public service. Tide-tables for the ports of the United States, for 1871, have been computed and published, and a new edition, revised and illustrated, of the Pilot for the Pacific coast has been issued.

In further explanation of the objects contemplated under the estimates here submitted, I would state that, of the increase proposed for the western coast, twenty-five thousand dollars would provide for the employment of the new steamer now building for the survey of that coast. It would also, in the simplest and readiest manner, provide for the special hydrographic development mentioned in the proviso. The importance of this provision became known to me during an official visit to San Francisco in July, when I learned that unmarked dangers to navigation exist on the sailing route of our steamers between San

Diego and Panama. The Chamber of Commerce of San Francisco subsequently took action on the subject, and their urgent memorial in regard to the survey of the route is now in my hands. It is hoped that Congress will sanction an object so important to the safety of our citizens and their property in the line of transit between our eastern and western coasts. The additional fifty thousand dollars of the estimate is intended for the survey of Alaska and the Aleutian Islands, in conformity with the recommendation addressed from the Treasury Department to the House of Representatives at the last session of Congress.

Contracts have been made for the building of several new steamers, for which the means was appropriated at the last session. Hence the item in estimates, for the pay and rations of engineers, has been restored to the amount which was allowed in former years, previous to the decay of the vessels.

The next item is also restored to the original estimate. It is intended to pay for the preparing the manuscript records and results for publication. This is a work demanding much labor of a special kind, and it is hoped that adequate provision will be made for that object.

A new item is proposed in the estimates, small in amount but of inestimable importance to the scientific accomplishment of the survey. As suggested in the proviso which is attached to the estimate for the geodetic connection between the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, a collateral advantage will result, which is also very great in comparison with the sum to be expended. It will give the National Government, and incidentally to the several States of the Union, the best possible basis for all accurate surveys which may hereafter be required. The points determined by the triangulation will be carefully marked to await the future wants of the several States. To some of them the work already done furnishes these invaluable data for their ultimate surveys, and the proviso is inserted in order that the same advantages may be impartially extended to the rest of the Union; first of all to the interior States which lie within the range of triangulation which must join the two coasts; and finally, under the authority of the proviso, it will be extended to all the States equally without limitation.

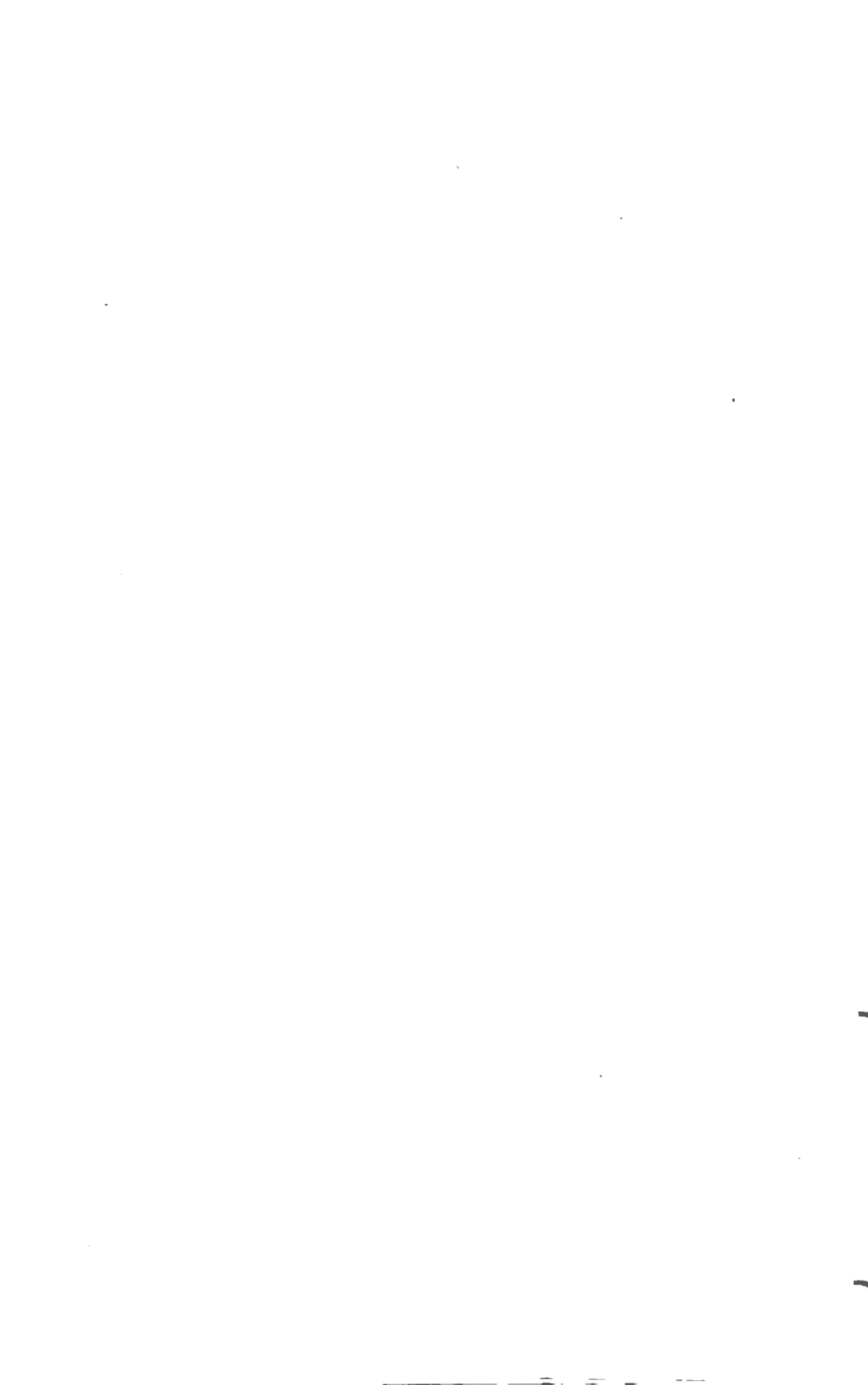
