## TREASURY DEPARTMENT.

Treasury Department, Comptroller's Officr, Septèmber 6, 1865.

Sir: To-day I transmit to the Register of the Treasury the estimate of approtions required by this office for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1867, under existing laws. The appropriations thus estimated will not, in my judgment, prove to be sufficient for the force required to transact the largely increased and increasing business of the office, and an additional appropriation sufficient for the employment of three clerks should be made. As the increase may not be required permanently, I do not recommend a permannet addition to the force of the office, but an appropriation for the temporary employment of such clerks as may be found necessary in the office, which I estimate at $\$ 4,600$.
I also recommend an additional appropriation for the like purpose for the current fiscal year of $\$ 2,500$.
My impression is that these sums will be necessary to a prompt and satisfactory settlement of accounts and the transaction of the business of the office. I am, very respectfully,

## Mint of the United States, Philadelphia, September 30, 1865.

Sir: I transmit herewith a copy of the estimates of appropriations required to be made for the United States mint, and branches at Denver and San Francisco, and the United States assay office, New York, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1867, forwarded this day to the Register of the Treasury; I also transmit certain papers exhibiting the grounds upon which the estimates are based. The estimates for the United States mint at Philadelphia are, in the aggregate, four thousand seven hundred $(4,700)$ dollars less than the amount appropriated for the current fiscal year. No appropriation is required for incidental and contingent expenses, the unexpended balance of former appropriations on hand being considered sufficient for the next year.

For freight on coin and bullion five thousand $(5,000)$ dollars will be required, this fund being nearly exhausted.

I have estimated six hundred ( 600 ) dollars as the sum necessary for the purchase of specimens of ores and coins for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1867. Three hundred (300) dollars has been the sum for several years past appropriated for this purpose. It has proved entirely too small, and for a great national institution like the mint a more generous appropriation is demanded. six hundred (600) dollars is certainly not a large sum, and I hope that Congress will see fit to allow it. The amounts estimated for under the other heads are the same as appropriated for the current fiscal year.- (See grounds of estimates, marked A.) The estimates of the branch mint at San Francisco are, in the aggregate, one hundred and twenty-three thousand seven hundred and fifty six $(123,756)$ dollars greater than the amount appropriated for the current fiscal year for the use of that institution. A deficiency appropriation approximating to this amount has been required for several years past; considering that gold is the circulating medium in California, and the high prices existing there, I do not consider these estimates too high. You are respectfully referred to the letter of the superintendent, marked B. The estimntes for the assay office, New

York, are, in the aggregate, seven thousand eight hundred $(7,800)$ dollars greater than the amount appropriated for the current fiscal year. The letter of the superintendent, enclosed herewith, marked C , will clearly explain the cause of thisincrease. The amount estimated for the service of the branch mint at Denver is aggregate five thousand five handred and forty-six dollars and fifty cents $(\$ 5,54650)$ greater than that appropriated for the current fiscal year. I do not consider the amount asked for too high, as prices of everything in our western T'erritories are much higher than in the States. I respectfully refer you to the letter of the superintendent, a copy of which is enclosed, marked D.

I respectfully again call your attention to the subject of an increase of the salaries of the officers of the mint. Most of us are entirely dependent on our salaries, and these remaining the same, whilst the prices of all the necessaries of life have so greatly advanced, we cannot, with all the economy that can be used, meet the current and ordinary expenses of living. The salaries here have always been below those of all other national institutions of equal grade and responsibility.

The direetor's salary is $\$ 3,500$, including travelling expenses; deducting these and the national tax, it will not exceed $\$ 3,000$. The same is true of all the other officers in the establishment. I speak knowingly when I say that the compensation is below the point of actual expenses, social and official position being considered. The following increase of salaries is respectfully suggested, viz:

Director of the mint from $\$ 3,500$ to $\$ 5,000$ per annum; treasurer, melter and refiner, engraver, chief coiner and assayer, each from $\$ 2,000$ to $\$ 3,000$ per anxum; assistant assayer from $\$ 1,500$ to $\$ 2,250$ per annum ; the salaries of the clerks now receiving $\$ 1,800$ to be increased to $\$ 2,250$, and that of those receiving $\$ 1,500$ be increased to $\$ 1,800$ per annum.

This increase would still leave the compensation lower than corresponding salaries elsewhere.

## 1. Salaries of officers and clerks:

The amount appropriated under this head for the current fiscal year was $\$ 26,400$.
The same amount will be required for the year ending June 30, 1867
2. Wages of workmen and adjusters:

No addition to the working force or increase of wages being contemplated, the same amount as was appropriated for the current fiscal year, viz., $\$ 125,000$, will be asked for the next year
3. Incidental and contingent expenses :

There being an anexpended balance of former appropriations on hand under this head, which, it is estimated, will be sufficient for our purposes for the next fiscal year, no appropriation will be asked for.

## 4. Specimens of ores and coins:

An annual appropriation of $\$ 300$ has been made for several years past, for the purchase of specimens of ores and coins for the cabinet of the mint. Considering the importance of the mint as one of our great representative institutions, and the necessity of having a first-class collection of ores and coins there, the above amount is far too small. Many fine specimens are lost to us on thîs account. Six hundred dollars is estimated to be the amount sufficient for the year ending June 30, 1867
5. Freight on coin and bullion :

No appropriation was required under this head for the current fiscal year, the unexpended balance of former appropriations having been sufficient. This balance having been almost entirely exhausted, an appropriation of five thousand ( 5,000 ) dollars will be required for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1867

SIR: I have the honor to enelose to you herein the usual annual estimates of the appropriation for the support of this branch for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1867. The estimates have been prepared with reference to the same valuatipn for currency as last year, viz : 50 per cent. Although I have materially foduced the wages of workmen, and although the currency may rule much higher during the year, I have not thought it expedient to cut down the estimates to too low a figure for fear that the operations of the branch may be embarrassed possibly by a deficiency of funds. I trust that the amount called for will not be reduced by Congress.
It is quite proper that $I$ should add here that if the parting charge and the. charge of one-half of one per cent. for coinage were paid into the mint treasury as they are received, in gold, this institution would be nearly self-supporting.

## United States Assay Office, New York, September 26, 1865.

SIr: The estimates for this office for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1867, which $I$ sent you on the 22d instant. require a word of explanatiou.

1. The appropriation asked for salaries of officers and clerks exceeds that for the current year by $\$ 800$. This increase is occasioned by certain changes of salary authorized by the Secretary of the Treasury under date of February 11 and March 17, 1865, as follows:

2. For wages of workmen, at current rates, we require about $\$ 3,500$ per month, or $\$ 42,000$ per year. If additional workmen should not be required for the current year, a surplus of a few thousand dollars will exist in this appropriation. I have, therefore, asked an appropriation of $\$ 40,000$.
3. Anticipating the necessity of repairs to building and machinery, I estimate our incidental and contingent expenses for the year 1866 -' $^{\prime} 67$ to be about
$\$ 70,000$. I also estimate that at the close of the current fiscal year there will be an unexpended balance of former appropriations, under this head, of $\$ 15,000$. I estimate the deductions from deposits for the year ending June 30, 1867 , at $\$ 20,000$. Appropriation required $\$ 35,000$.

## United States Coast Stirvey Office, Washington, D. C., October 10, 1865.

SIR: The estimates for the deficiency in appropriations for the survey of the coast for the fiscal year 1865-'66, together with those for the fiscal year 1866-'67, are herewith respectfully submitted, and I have the honor to request that if approved, they may be included in your estimates for appropriations.

In regard to the deficiency it is only necessary to state that the late Congress failed to pass the general appropriation bill, in which the items for the coast survey were included. No appropriation, therefore, was made for the fiscal year $1865-$ ' 66 . The work has been continued with the unexpended balance of previous appropriations, and some aid afforded by the Treasury Department. Daring the progress of the bill in the late Congress, the estimates for the work of the survey had been approved by both houses, and the amounts now estimated for are intended to meet the expenditures for the remainder of the present fiscal year, upon the same scale of appropriation.
The following is a brief sketch of the progress made during the past year. While the war continued, a number of parties were connected with government commands, and rendered efficient aid in naval and military operations, as during the preceding years.
Four parties were attached to the South Atlantic blockading squadron, so as to be available also for service in the military department of the south. The labors of these comprise a complete resurvey of the bar and channels leading into Charleston harbor; a survey of the inside water passages between St. Helena and Port Royal sounds, and a survey of Broad river and the Whale branch to Port Royal ferry; of the Wilmington and Thunderbolt rivers, and other communications between the Savannah river and Ossabaw sound, including among them the dependencies of Wassaw sound; a survey of the rebel defences of Charleston and Savannah, the latter embraced within an extended reconnoissance of all the approaches to that city. In this same district, and under instructions of the Light-house Board, the parties have replaced lights, beacons, and buoy, as their places were re-occupied by the national forces. The entrance to Darien was examined and buoyed, for the transportation of released Union prisoners.

Four topographers of the coast survey accompanied General Sherman's army in the march from Savannah to Goldsboro', and rendered effective aid in making reconnoissances.

Two parties were connected with the North Atlantic blockading squadron One of these, after assisting in the operations against the rebel defences of Wilmington, North Carolina, made a complete resurvey of both entrances to the Cape Fear river. The other relighted and baoyed the channels of that river, as also those leading into Beaufort, North Carolina, which was then important as the rendezveus of the squadron for supplies. After the close of hostilities the same party completed the hydrographic survey of the Cape Lookout shoals, and cortinued off-shore soundings along the const of North Carolina.
A topographical survey of the banks of the Potomac river, from the vicinity of Washington to Harper's Ferry, has been made by a party attached to the middle military department; and two other parties have extended the detailed surveys of the approaches to Washington and Baltimore. One topographer was continued on service with the army operating in the valley of Virginiar and furnished the results of reconnoissances at Flint Hill and Cedar creek, after serving in battle at both places. Another remained on duty with the army of the Tennessee, and has mapped the defensive ground and approaches to Lookout mountain, and extended the survey of the battle-field of Chickamauga.

In connexion with the Mississippi squadron, a party of coast survey officers have made a valuable reconnoissance map of over two hundred miles of the Tennessee river, or from its mouth to the Muscle shoals; a map of the lower

Ohio from Paducah to Cairo; and a map of about ninety miles of the course of the Mississippi river from Cairo up to St. Mary's. This work necessarily ceased when, owing to the reduction of the squadron in the western waters, a vessel was no longer available for the uses of the party. It may be hoped, however, that the great and obvious usefulness, in a national point of view, of a reliable map of the Mississippi river may lead Congress to make a special appropriation for the further prosecution of that work. A stretch of forty-five miles of the river was mapped last year above and below Vicksburg, and thus an important part of the Mississippi has already been suryeyed withont involving any public expenditure that would not otherwise have been incurred.

In the regular progress of the survey of the Atlantic coast, parties have been at work on the coast of Maine during the summer and autumn, in Passamaquoddy, Gouldsborough, Frenchman's and Penobscot bays, in Muscongus sound, and in the Medomak, Damariscotta, and New Meadow rivers; on the shores of Narragansett bay and its dependencies, in Rhode Island; and on the coast of New Jersey. The connexion of the primary triangulation in Sections I and II has been completed by the Superintendent's party.

On the western coast, the triangulation between San Francisco and Monterey bays has been completed; that of Suisun bay has been continued; the topography between Point Aũo Nuevo and Point San Pedro, and the off-shore hydrography south of San Francisco entrance have been continued, and the topography and hydrography of Koos bay have been completed.

An early resumption of the work on the coast of the southern States is contemplated, and is provided for on a moderate scale in the estimates herewith presented.

The table appended gives the amounts estimated to supply the deficiency for the fiscal year 1865-'66, in parallel columns, with the estimates which were originally submitted for the whole fiscal year, and which, though approved by both houses of Congress at the last session, failed to become a law before the expiration of that session.

During the rebellion the usual field operations of the coast survey were necessarily somewhat restricted. In the southern sections they were carried on only as far as requisite and practicable in connexion with the operations of the naval forces. In most cases when the assistants and aids have served with military or naval commands, the working parties have been furnished from the command, and only the pay and subsistence of the officers of the survey have been chargeable to the coast survey appropriations. So also the vessels of the survey, when serving with squadrons, have been supplied with coal and kept in repair by the Navy Department.

Under these circumstances a corresponding reduction in the estimates for the work of the coast survey was made, which, from considerations of economy, was extended to the work on the western coast. The appropriations, amounting to over four hundred and fifty thousand dollars in 1860, were reduced, in accordance with the estimates submitted, to about three hundred thousand dollars during the several years of the war.

The estimates herewith presented for the fiscal year 1866-'67 approach more nearly to the scale of expenditure before the war. They contemplate the continuance of work in the southern sections, which! besides being called for to aid in the development of the resources of that part of our country, will be conducive to economy, since it will, as formerly, enable the same parties to push the work on the southern coast during winter, after closing work for the season at the north. Without any material increase in the salaries and office expenses, the amount of field-work accomplished will be far more than proportionably augmented.

Owing to the great increase in the price of labor and supplies of every kind, the appropriations asked for, although the same in amount of the two principal items as those for 1860-'61, will not be equivalent to the latter, yet they are as low as is consistent with an economical prosecution of the work in the several localities where it has been commenced.

The item providing for the continuation of the survey of the Florida reefs and keys has been diminished from forty to twenty-five thousand dollars, because that important work is proportionally far advanced towards completion. The item providing for repairs of vessels, on the contrary, is unavoidably increased by reason of the great increase in the cost of such repairs, and becanse a larger amount of refitting is at present necessary, on account of the greater wear and tear during the war.

The estimates for progress on the Atlantic, Gulf coast, Florida reefe, and western coast of the United States are given, as usual, in separate items, and are preceded by a detailed statement of the progress contemplated in the several sections of the work.

Sir : I have the honor to submit the accompanying estimates of funds required for the support of the light-house establishment for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1867.
The estimates are exhibited in tabular form, from No. 1 to No. 3, inclusive, and are accompanied by explanatory tables, marked from $\mathbf{A}$ to $J$, inclusive.

The sums asked for are bassed upon the assumption that before Juue 30, 1867, (the date covered by the estimates,) the light.house system of the United States will be as it was in 1860, when an unbroken system of aids to our common commerce extended from St. Croix river to Rio Grande; and inasmuch as any speculations as to a decrease in cost of labor and materials for a period so remote are at best but conjectural, it has been deemed but ordinary prudence to estimate upon the basis of present prices.

SIR: I have the honor to submit herewith estimates of appropriations which will be required for the service of this office for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1867.

It will be noticed that these estimates exceed the sums appropriated for 1865-'66 in two respects only. This is rendered necessary for the following reasons:

1st. After the appropriation for 1865-'66 had been made, "An act amendatory of the acts relative to the Attorney General's office, and to fix the compensation of his assistant and clerks," was passed, under the provisions of which the salary of the Assistant Attorney General was increased $\$ 500$ per annum, and the annual aggregate for the salaries of clerks was increased $\$ 2,800$, making an increase, in all, under that law, of $\$ 3,300$.

2 d . The estimate for contingent expenses is double the amount appropriated for 1865-'66. The necessity for this is set forth in a letter to you of this date, explaining why provision should be made to supply deficiencies in the appropriations for the current fiscal year, arising from the increased cost of labor, furniture, and stationery, and especially from the largely increased quantity of stationery required in conducting the pardon business arising under the President's proclamation of amnesty of May 29, 1865.

Sir: I have the honor herewith to submit estimates of appropriations required for this branch of the pablic service for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1867.

1. Estimates of salaries in this office. We have included in this estimate the whole number of employés authorized by the several acts of Onngress, and the amount estimated is the same as that called for and appropriated last year, less $\$ 3,000$ by limitation of the provisions of the act of Congress of June 25, 1864, (Laws, p. 160.)
2. Estimates of salaries and commissions of district land officers. We have not asked for appropriations for this particular branch of the service since the year 1853, having depended on unexpended balances of former appropriations; but such balances are now so much reduced, that we deem it necessary to make the estimates herewith submitted.
3. The estimates of appropriations for contingent expenses of this office, for expenses of depositing the public moneys, for refunding purchase-money for lands illegally sold, and for claims of certain States for the two, three, and five per cents., are omitted, existing balances being thought amply sufficient to meet the requirements of such service for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1867.

## Government Hospital for the Insane, St. Elizabeth, D. C., October 18, 1865.

Sir: I have the honor to present herewith estimates to supply deficiencies in the sums required to support the hospital, and for sundry repairs and improvements, during the current fiscal year; also estimates for the support of the institution, the continuation of sundry improvements, and for the purchase of fiftysix and one-half ( $56 \frac{1}{2}$ ) acres of meadow land needed for the culture of grass for grazing and hay.

The reasons assigned for the estimates for the current fiscal year, both in my letter originally submitting them, dated this day one year ago, and in the 9th annual report of the board of visitors subsequently submitted, hold good at the present moment, and are the grounds upon which they are now presented as deficiencies in consequence of the failure of Congress, at the close of its last session, to pass the appropriation bill in which these items were included. As is well known at the department, the hospital is now being supported with money borrowed, upon the faith of the party loaning it that Congress will very early in the approaching session enable the Hon. Secretary of the Interior to authorize the replacement of the amount advanced.

The estimate for the support of the hospital during the next fiscal year is the same as that asked for the same purpose for the current year, and is the product of the multiplication of the estimated average number of insane (360) that will be under treatment during that period, at the expense of the United States under existing laws, and of the average cost (\$250) of the proper support and treatment of one insane person for one year.

The third estimate for the year 1866-67 is sufficiently explained, it is thought, by the language in which that item is expressed.

The fourth estimate is for the continuation of a most important work for which a small sum is annually asked, in order that the government may least feel the expenditure necessary for the whole work.

The last (5th) estimate is for the purchase of an excellent piece of land which
can be obtained at a very moderate price, and which will save to the hospital, in the grazing and hay it will furnish for its stock, the whole amount of this item in three years.

In conclusion, I very respectfully ask that the estimates of this hospital be taken from the class of "sundry civil expenses of the government," which are appropriated in what is known as the miscellaneous or omnibus bill, and placed in the class which is embraced in the annual "Act making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the government." This hos pital was organized by act of Congress approved March 3, 1855, by which the United States most solemnly pledged themselves to afford the uninterrupted benefits of the institution to certain classes of insane persons. That organic act has since been recognized by two important amendments of it, by repeated appropriations for the completion and support of the establishment, and by no less than four different extensions by Congress of its benefits; and I think I do not go too far in claiming that the hospital is as much an established institution of the government which it is bound to maintain, as any bureau of the department, and that its appropriations should not be made in that bill which embraces all occasional or temporary expenditures of the government, and is most likely to be delayed or defeated by what are known in the legislation of the country as "riders" and extraordinary provisoes.

## Department of the Interior, Office Indian Affairs, Washington, D. C., November 1, 1865.

Sir: I have the honor to transmit herewith estimates of funds required to fulfil treaty stipulations with Indian tribes, and for the current and contingent expenses of the Indian department, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1867; and, appended thereto, an estimate for deficiencies for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1866.

The treaty of 1855 with the Chippewas, Pillager and Lake Winnebagoshish bands, and the treaties with the Miamies of Indiana, Pawnees, Poncas, Omahas, Kickapoos, Ottoes and Missourias, and the Yancton tribe of Sioux, contemplate appropriations by the calendar year. Making appropriations by the fiscal year has always left these six months behind, and the department has been compelled to anticipate the appropriations for them each year. This is not only improper and inconvenient, but, in those years when the long sessions occur, it has caused serious embarrassment to the service. I have, therefore, embodied the estimates for the next instalments for these Indians in an estimate for deficiencies, and in the regular estimate have included one instalment in advance, deeming it much better for the Indians, and not less conducive to economy in the service, to have the appropriations made six months in advance than six months too late.

The deficiency for the Pottawatomies is explained by letter of Agent Palmer, dated September 13, 1865, a copy of which is herewith. For the same reason

I have increased the estimate for "permanent provision of fifty barrels of salt" for the Pottawatomies from $\$ 250$ to $\$ 43750$.
In the estimate for deficiencies the items for expenses of negotiating treaties with various Indian tribes are rendered necessary, from the fact that such treaties are now being negotiated under instructions from the Department of the Interior, and the funds necessary to open negotiations have been drawn from appropriations for other objects. The appropriation by the last Congress of $\$ 20,000$, for negotiating a treaty with the hostile Indians of Dakota has proved entirely insufficient; funds for this object have been drawn from other appropriations, and there are claims in this office for transporting goods to be used in this negotiation which cannot he settled till a furtber appropriation is made.

The item of $\$ 504$ to reimburse late Agent Ross for premium paid by him on coin to pay the annuities to the Potlawatomies in 1862 is explained by letters of late Agent Ross, dated April 21, 1862, May 11, 1865, and June 20, 1865, and office letter of June 19, 1863, copies of which are herewith. Under existing laws the Second Auditor of the Treasury has disallowed the account; but as the aunuities were by treaty stipulation payable in coin, and the agent actually paid the premium, I think the circumstances warrant a recommendation that this appropriation be made for his relief.
The growing necessities of the Indian service in many of the western Territories, resulting from encroachments by miners and settlers on their ancient hunting-grounds, will cause the expenditures in some cases to exceed the appropriations for the current fiscal year; and I have, therefore, in estimating for deficiencies, included the items for incidental expenses of the Indian service in the State of Nevada and the Territories of Arizona and Utah. In the case of Nevada, I may state that a large portion of the amount asked for will be necessary to enable the department to settle the accounts of late Superintendent Nye.
The last Congress, by act of March 3, 1865, set apart a reservation for the Indians in Arizona, but made no appropriation to defray the expenses of placing them upon it. I have, therefore, deemed it proper to estimate for this as a deficiency.

Sir : I am notified by the Second Auditor that the amount of a little over $\$ 500$, which was ordered paid by you on premium for gold to make the Pottawatomies Indian payment in 1861, has been disallowed. It was not paid by you until some time in 1863, when you had the requisition issued. Now, what am I to do? I am not able to lose it. It is true that it is a small amount; but small as it is, it would break me up in business to have to draw that amount from my legitimate business; but even this I would not mind or hesitate a moment at if it was right for me to pay it ; but I paid the money out under orders, and it was necessary that the expenditure should be made in order to appease a restless disposition that then existed among the Indian tribes.

Sir: About the 10th of May I wrote you stating that the Second Auditor had disallowed an account of $\$ 504$ paid by me, in accordance with your instruction of June 19, 1863, for premium on gold for the Pottawatomie payment. In your favor of May 20 you had the kindness to state that a "copy of your instructions had been forwarded to the Second Auditor," which were considered sufficient to authorize him to give me credit for the amount. Upon the receipt of your letter I rested contented until to-day, when I received another statement from the Second Auditor, dated June 3, 1865, in which I find the same amount disallowed, with a statement in connexion, "prohibited by law." Will you please have the kindness to see that the matter is righted at your earliest convenience, and very much oblige

## II.-INCIDENTAL EXPENSES.

For the incidental expenses of the quartermaster's department, consisting of postage on letters and packets received and sent by officers of the army on public service; expenses of court-martials, military commissions, and courts of inquiry, including the additional compensation of judge advocates, recorders, members, and witnesses while on that service, under the act of March 16, 1802 ; extra pay to soldiers employed under the direction of the quartermaster's department in the erection of barracks, quarters, storehouses, and hospitals; in the construction of roads and other constant labor for periods of not less than ten days, under the acts of March 2, 1819, and of August 4, 1854,

## explanations and detais of the foregoing estimate.

Repairs, improvements, and new machinery at the national armories.-To keep up the present machines, and to make such alterations thereof and finish such new ones as may be necessary in consequence of the adoption of the new model breech-loading arms instead of the present style of muzzle-loaders.

Repairs and improvements at arsenals.-Under this head the estimate includes all expenseeg for erecting new and enlarging or repairing old buildings at the arsenals; for making and repairing enclosures, wharves, drains, and sewers; for grading and paving grounde, and roads, and walks; for purchase and repair of machines, engines, shafts, and belting, and for all other permanent repairs and improvements at the arsenals.

Magazines for storing gwnpowder. - The danger of keeping large supplies of gunpowder at our arsenals, which are generally in the vicinity of closely populated districts, makes it a matter of importance, if not of necessity, to provide for an ample depository of this article in some safe place, which should be in a dry climate sufficiently remote from a city or dense population to avoid destruction of life or property by accidental explosion, and of easy access, or susceptible of being made so, for the transportation of powder to and from it.

Purchase of land for enlarging Waterviet arsenal.-The land proposed to be purchased is on the south side of the arsenal grounds, and between the present buildings and the road, and is necessary for the convenient operations of the arsenal, and the safety of the large and valuable amount of public property thereat.

# DETAILS OF DEFICIENCY ESTIMATES. 

## TREASURY DEPARTMENT.

Treasury Department, Office Light-house Board, October 28, 1865.

Sir: I have the honor to submit herewith the accompanying estimates of funds for the support and maintenance of the light-house establishment for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1866; the necessity for which arises from the failure of Oongress to act upon the estimates submitted for the same service last year.

In addition to the funds asked for last year and now again requested, the board has found it necessary to add to certain sums to cover deficiencies found to exist, which deficiencies are readily explained.

The estimate of last year was based upon the assumption that the rebellion which was then in existence would continue to a greater or less extent, subsiding gradually during the period which the estimates were designed to cover; but the presumption has been proved to be erroneous, the rebellion having suddenly collapsed, throwing upon the board the unexpected labor of providing for the restoration of a much larger number of lights and other aids to navigation than was anticipated, and that, too, during a condition of augmented prices for labor and materials.

These estimates are exhibited in tabular form, and accompanied by explanatory tables in detail, marked
The board would most earnestly invite the attention of Congress to its recommendation of last year, that the average pay of light-keepers, now limited by law to $\$ 400$ per annum, be increased to $\$ 500$ per anuum.

The list of special works submitted with the last estimate is herewith repeated, with the further remark that whereas the works were then divided into two lists, one ombracing those considered indispensable, and the other comprising those of great importance but whose execution might without actual hazard be deferred, the board is now of opinion that the interests of commerce require that these works be no longer postponed, and they are therefore submitted in one list and recommended to immediate attention.

## Department of the Interior, General Land Office, October 31, 1886.

Sir: In view of the non-appropriation, at the last session of Congress, for the census, and of the assignment to this office of the superintendence of that work on 7th June last, the commissioner, pursuant to orders from the department, placed on the general land official list the actual and experienced employés who, previous to and at that period, had been engaged in the census branch of the service, and they have accordingly been paid since the 1st June last as clerks of this office. We had, however, not the grades of salaries at command wherewith to continue to these experienced officials the several rates of compensation at which they had been employed.

The paper $\mathbf{A}$, herewith, indicates the compensation of each employe before the assignment was made, and in corresponding column their present salaries respectively.

To make good the aggregate difference between the old rates and the present from 1st June last to 31st December, 1865, I now submit, as a deficiency estimate, the sum of $\$ 2,45031$.

I further submit the sum of $\$ 6,460$ to pay the salaries, at the census rates, of a principal clerk and other clerks from January. 1, 1866, to the 30th June, 1866, the end of the present fiscal year. Also the sum of $\$ 1,500$ for incidentals for the current fiscal year endingJune $30,1866$.

I further submit, as estimate for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1867, in the service of the census, the sum of $\$ 35,000$.

With this amount it is proposed to employ for that year a force of seven experienced persons to prepare for publication an exhibit, by States, of the num-
ber of families in the United States; number of operatives in the country, with ages and sex; the operatives; exhibit to be used in comparison with the next census and with similar reports by Great Britain and European continental powers, thus affording information useful to statesmen, and of interest to our people.

The clerical force proposed to be employed will render service in furnishing data on calls from Congress, from other departments of the government and citizens, in arranging and classifying eighth census returns, and in closing the census financial business with United States marshals for services remaining unliquidated; this estimate being submitted with the understanding, if appropriated, that it will be expended at the discretion of the Secretary of the Interior, for the purposes indicated, and also in gathering statistics of internal commerce, mining, and manufacturing; in making compilation from State census returns of 1865 , and in the publication of a supplemental volume prior to the second session of the thirty-ninth Congress.

I also submit, as a deficiency estimate, the sum of $\$ 230,360$ 21 due to United States marshals and their assistants in the late insurgent States.

The sums which may be adjusted and found due severally to such officers will, of course, only be paid where the loyalty of the parties shall be satisfactorily shown. The progress of the census work, with considerations pertinent to the matter, will form the subject of a separate communication which it is proposed to submit when the present service shall have been advanced to completion.

; For the erection, furnishing, and fitting up of the two extensions to the buildings to provide enlarged accommodations for the male department, and to furnish rooms for the instruction of the pupils in useful labor, thirty-nine thousand four hundred and forty-five dollars and eighty seven cents, ( $\$ 39,44587$.)
For the proper enclosure, grading, and improvement of the grounds of the institution, three thousand five hundred dollars, ( $\$ 3,500$.)
Note,-Attention is called to the fact that the words "and the blind" have been dropped from the corporate name of the institution, as directed by an act of the last Congress.

## United States Jail,

 Washington, October 31, 1865.Dear Sir: Your communication of this date, asking for an estimate of the expenses of the United States jail for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1867, and if an increase over the amount asked for the previous year is required, to state the reasons therefor, has been received, and, in reply, I would state :

The estimate for expenses of the jail for the fiscal year ending June 30 , 1867, is fifty thousand dollars, which is an increase of twenty thousand dollars over previous .year.

My reasons for this estimate are, that thirty thousand dollars was estimated to be appropriated for the past year, when the average number of prisoners was one hundred. Now, the average number of prisoness will reach two hundred, and will require, I think, at least this amount.

## Attorney General's Office, <br> November 4, 1865.

Sir: I have this day transmitted to you an estimate of the appropriations required for the service of this office for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1867. I now beg leave to submit an estimate of appropriations; and a draught for legislative enactment, which are rendered necessary to meet deficiencies in this office for the current fiscal year, arising out of unanticipated, unusual, and extraordinary expenses, and the largely increased amount of clerical labor which has been devolved upon this office since the passage of the last appropriation bill, together with a statement of the reasons therefor.

## 1.-For salaries.

The appropriation for salaries made for this office at the last session of Congress for the now current fiscal year were made in accordance with estimates based upon laws in existence at the time those estimates were submitted. Since that time, the act (approved March 3, 1865, 13 Laws, p. 516) entitled "An act mendatory of the acts relative to the Attorney General's office, and to fix the compensation of his assistant and clerks," has been passed, under the provisions of which the salary of the Assistant Attorney General has been increased \$500 per annum, and the annual aggregate for salaries of clerks is increased $\$ 2,800$, making in all under that law a deficiency for salaries for the current year of $\$ 3,300$, for the supply of which I have now to ask that provision be made.

## 2.-FOR CONTINGENT EXPENSE8.

Since the estimate was submitted and the appropriation made for the contingent expenses of this office for the current year, a then unlooked-for and extraordinary expenditure from that fund has been thrown upon this office in consequence of the pardon business arising under the President's proclamation of amnesty of May 29, 1865, especially for the increased quantity of stationery required in qransacting that business. In the letter of Mr. Attorney General Bates, of September $16,18 C 4$, transmitting the estimate for contingent expenses for the now current year, an increased appropriation was asked because "the office will very soon require new carpets and other new furniture, and cannot procure them with so small an appropriation." The increase thus asked for was granted by Congress; but when the commencement of the current year had arrived, it was found that the unusual and extraordinary contingent expenditures arising under the President's proclamation, just referred to, had become so great as to make it advisable not to use any of this appropriation for carpets, but to reserve and apply it to the more immediate and pressing necessities of the public service. In the mean time the carpets and furniture have been subjected to a largely increased amount of wear and tear from usage by the large number of applicants for pardon who from day to day frequent the office, so that much of the carpeting is tattered and worn into shreds, and new carpeting is needed now more than ever. It is estimated that $\$ 3,500$ additional for contingent expenses may be sufficient to carry the office through the current year, an appropriation of which sum to supply deficiencies for that time is respectfully asked.

## 3.-TEMPORARY CLERKS.

Under the operation of the President's proclamation, above referred to, the amount of clerical labor devolved upon the pardon division of this office has been greatly increased beyond the usual current work required in attending to pardon applications under ordinary criminal convictions. The large increase of this business has rendered a reorganization of the pardon division necessary, thus devolving greatly increased labor on the "pardon clerk," and making it neces-
sary, in addition to his increased duties, that one of the other regular clerks in the office should be taken from his usual duties and assigned to the pardon division. This, as is evident, throws an increased amount of labor upon the remainder of the regular clerical force of the office. But besides the amount of labor performed by the able pardon clerk and his efficient assistant, there is an amount of work to be done in that division which has thus far required the employment of two temporary clerks; but in the law of March 3, 1865, above referred to, it is provided that the allowances for "temporary clerks shall in no one year exceed $\$ 1,000$." This sum is entirely inadequate to pay for the additional clerical labor that has been thrown upon the office. This labor still continues, with no present prospect of diminution, and the amount of it that will be required, or how long it will continue, is very uncertain, so that I find it impossible to make any accurate estimate of the probable sum that will be required for this service. I therefore have to request that a provision be made for the wants of this office, in this respect, similar to that which was made for compensation of temporary clerks and additional compensation to clerks in the Treasury Department at the last session of Congress.-(Laws, 1864-'65, p. 450.) I respectfully submit the following draught of a provision for that purpose:
"And there is hereby appropriated, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, such sum, not exceeding ten thousand dollars, as shall be necessary to enable the Attorney General to employ a sufficient number of temporary clerks to discharge the duties devolved upon his department under the operation of the President's proclamation of amnesty of May 29, 1865, and to enable him to award such additional compensation to clerks in his office as may be deemed just and in accordance with the service rendered by them, and to pay any other necessary expenses of his office, not otherwise provided for, arising under said proclamation."

The passage by Congress of the foregoing provision will, I believe, enable me to discharge satisfactorily the additional clerical and other duties that have been devolved upon this office.
